Society Collects 1250 Pounds of Mission Clothing

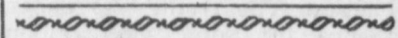

Mrs. Al Hess conducted the business meeting attended by twenty eight. Mrs. Joe Hoening won the door prize.

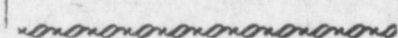

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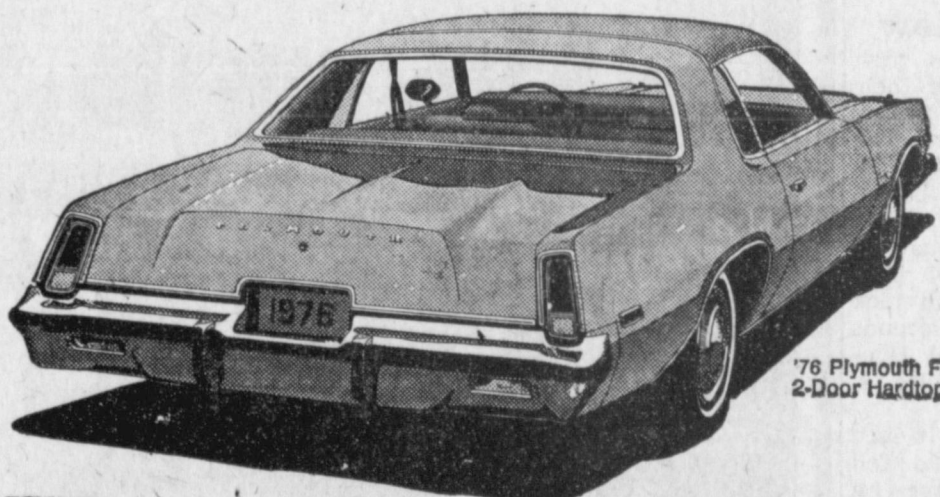
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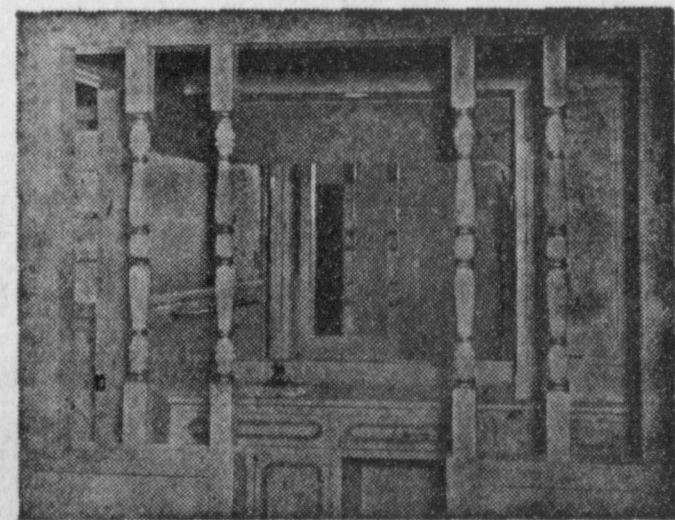

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Muenster Blanked In Last Mailing of Sales Tax Checks

The city of Muenster was one of many that was left empty handed last week when State Comptroller Bob Bullock mailed checks to 493 cities and towns for their one per cent sales tax collected by the state. The reason is that during the first two months of each quarter checks are not mailed to the cities whose allocations are under \$500 at the end of the period, which in this case was January 3.

Other towns of the area who got no checks were Saint Jo, Sanger, Pilot Point and Whitesboro. Area towns that fared better are Nocona \$4,142.81, Lindsay \$2,115.71 and Gainesville \$11,335.80.

Another report just released by Comptroller Bullock compares each city's 1975 sales tax rebates with rebates during the first full calendar year that the city collected sales tax. It reveals that the rebates increased for 780 cities and decreased for only 30. As Bullock observes: "It shows what we've known all along, that the city sales tax has become a cornerstone of the city hall budget." He also observed that while some of the increase is due to inflation "no body could read this story of mushrooming retail sales and conclude Texas has anything other than a prosperous business community."

The latter remark applies well to Muenster which has a first year total of \$20,541.34 and a 1975 total of \$42,615.03 a gain of 107 per cent.

1975 totals for some other cities of the area and their percentage of gain are Nocona \$69,633, up 76%; Bowie \$158,616, up 63%; Gainesville \$344,999, up 80%; Lindsay \$29,532, up 55%; Pilot Point \$20,170, up 86%; Saint Jo \$11,489, up 71%; Sanger \$16,709, up 93%; Whitesboro \$46,554, up 59%.
