Medicare has arrived. Not the benefits — they are still six months away — but payments for them begin next week. Considering the usual tendency of federal programs to run into the red this looks like a wise provision. Medicare's revenue will have a six months head start before drainage on the fund begins, which should assure a nice stretch of time before the program runs into financial trouble.

Hasty calculation prompts us to think that, with a fund as lush as that, the financial pinch ought to be a very long time in coming. The upcoming tax hike to take care of it is a real dandy, especially if one's annual pay happens to be above the former maximum of \$4,800 a year.

Even a person under that maximum will feel the difference as his Social Security tax rate jumps from 3.625 per cent to 4.2 per cent. That's just under 6 per cent, which means a raise of over \$17 on \$3,000 of pay and over \$23 on \$4,000 of pay. On \$4,800 the increase is \$27.60. So don't feel too satisfied if you are in the lower pay bracket. The hike is still enough to hurt.

Above \$4,800, up to the new maximum of \$6,600, is where the increase is really felt. The spread of \$1,800 which formerly was not taxed is now subject to the full 4.2 per cent rate. It means, your tax can increase as much as \$103.20 next year.

And that's only the half of it. Every dollar of your tax has to be matched by employers. If you make \$6,600 a year your tax plus your employer's will net \$554.40 to the Social Security pot.

First of all, let's notice that Medicare does not get all the increase. Former SS benefits still have to be paid, and they were increased by 7 per cent last year. According to the new Employer's Tax Guide issued by the Internal Revenue Service, your new tax of 4.2 is split up as follows: "3.85 percent for old age, survivors and disability insurance plus .35 per cent for hospital insurance benefits." In other words, eleven twelfths of your tax applies to former benefits and one twelfth applies to Medicare.

It would be interesting to know just how much that amounts to in Medicare insurance for each beneficiary, but without official figures an estimate is impossible. However, we can make a guess. Suppose the average taxable wage is \$5,000 and the total SS bite is \$210. Medicare's twelfth would come to \$17.50. Getting an equal amount from employers, Medicare would bank \$35 for every wage earner and salaried person in the country. Next, what is the ratio of SS payers to SS beneficiaries? In other words, how many persons are paying in for each person receiving benefits? Again, that's a hard one to answer without official figures, but one can guess it conservatively, at six to one. In that case we can say that the Medicare share for each SS beneficiary amounts to \$210 a year.

But that's not all. For adequate coverage each SS beneficiary pays \$36 a year of his own, making a total of \$246 a year for each beneficiary. As stated before, these figures are purely guesses, but we're inclined to think they are fairly close to right. It might be noted that a family of five can get a very good hospitalization policy for that amount.

This column is inclined to think that Americans will understand Medicare more and appreciate it less as they learn how much it costs them. Perhaps the facts will be aired sufficiently to bring political repercussions in the next campaign and eventually lead to a more practical program. Politicians who rammed this scheme through when they could have accomplished as much or more at lower cost should be held accountable.

Nobody can rightly criticize the idea of providing hospital insurance for old people. The fault is in setting up a system that is unnecessarily expensive and at the same time establishes a big federal bureaucracy. As a matter of fact we all have a right to wonder how much of our Social Security money goes to beneficiaries and how much is absorbed in the high cost of bureaucratic administration.

You Must Apply To Get Medicare Says SS Office

Gus Jones, social security district director in Sherman, said today that his office is searching for persons 65 and over who have never worked under social security or railroad retirement system. These people, Jones said, may qualify for Medicare protection.

Jones emphasized that the new Federal law on Medicare will protect them only if they apply for the protection. There is a deadline for applying. All persons now 65 or over will have the medical insurance part of Medicare only if they apply before next March 31.

All U.S. citizens are eligible for Medicare at 65. If you are not a U.S. citizen, you may still qualify if you were lawfully admitted for permanent residence and have lived in the United States for 5 consecutive years at the time of application.

Jones also noted that public welfare recipients who are 65 and over need not get in touch with the social security office. Details for covering those on the welfare rolls are being worked out, and the public welfare agency will give these people information on how they may secure Medicare protection.

Rural Area Gets Most of Firemen's Attention in 1965

Most of the attention of Muenster firemen during the past year, as usual has been out of the city. A review of the Fire Department's log shows that it has answered nineteen calls outside the city limits and ten calls inside the city limits.

The log also shows that about 60 per cent of the department's fire runs are for grass fires. There were a total of 18, twelve in the country and six in town. And the MK&T Railroad continues as the fire department's best customer. Eight of the grass fires were along the Katy right of way, all discovered after freight locomotives had passed by.

The most damaging losses of the year were all in the country. W.F. Davidson's home and Hill Campbell's hay barn were completely destroyed by fires which are believed to have been caused by lightning. A store at Forestburg was badly damaged but the flames were brought under control by the Forestburg fire truck before Muenster's truck arrived. Worst of the grass fires was at Earl Robison's, clearing about 50 acres of pasture in about 3 1/2 hours.

The Muenster Volunteer Fire Department at this time has thirty members, a net increase of four during the past year when seven members joined the organization and three dropped out. Thirteen members have attended 20 or more of the 24 meetings and practice sessions during the year. They are Alvin Hartman, Earl Fisher, Herbert Walterscheid, Conrad Walterscheid, Henry Pels, Jerry Wimmer, Tommy Herr, Ed Schneider, Ed Endres, George Gehrig, Gene Hoedebeck, Robert Walterscheid and Lambert Walterscheid. Three of the new members, Herbert Knabe, Harvey Schmitt and Bernard McNamara have perfect attendance records since they joined this year.

The organization was represented by Jerry Wimmer at the annual firemen's training school at A & M University. It sponsored the local drive for Muscular Dystrophy and it secured labels with emergency numbers for all local phones.

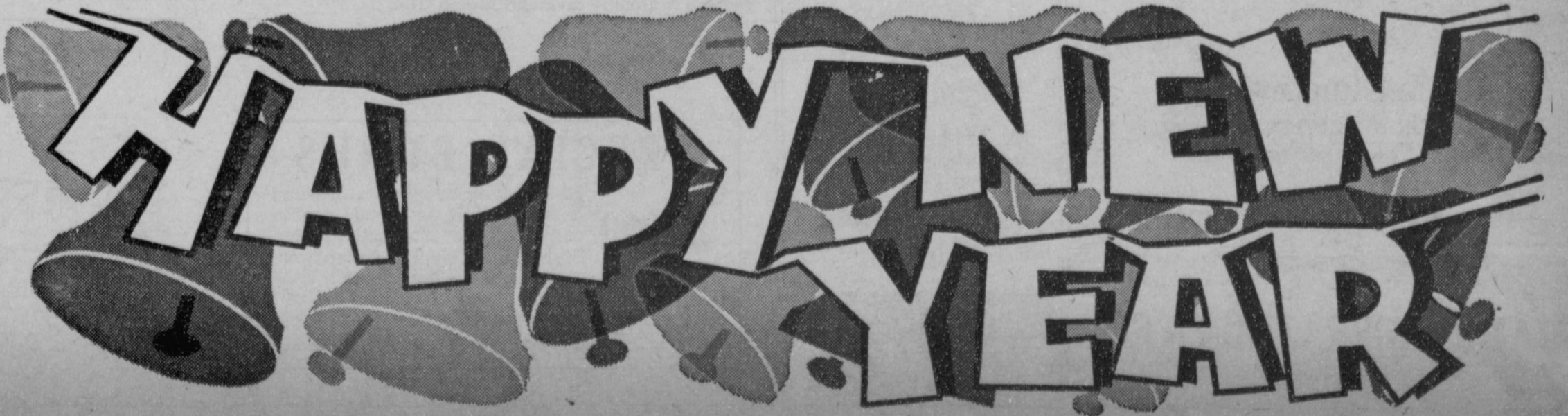

LET'S LOOK AT THE RECORD

In 1907 the Edison Light and Power Co. billed a customer in Wichita \$7 for a month's service which consisted of 14 kilowatts of electricity. The bill, a postcard, had a one-cent stamp on it. Today the postage rate has risen to 400 percent of the 1907 cost, while the electricity rate is four percent of what it was then. A modern home today, if fully electrified with air conditioning and heating, uses 24,000 kwh a year, which would cost about \$480, depending on the local rate. At the 1907 rate that amount of electricity would cost \$12,000, and if the electric rates had climbed at the same ratio as those of the Post Office, the home electric bill this year would have been \$48,000. And to top it off, while the privately owned electric companies were paying taxes and dividends, the government postal system ran up a deficit of \$10 billion during the period under review.

Wedding reception and buffet were held in the Parish Hall where Mrs. Joe Lehnertz and Mrs. Gertrude Bayer were members of the house party.

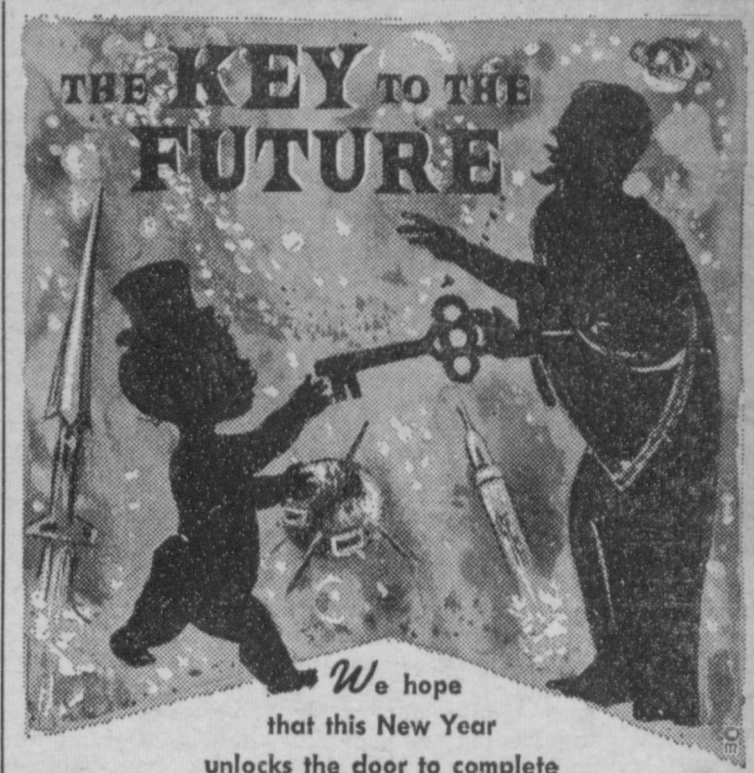
Presiding at the bride's book, registering guests, were Miss Carolyn Cunningham of Dallas, cousin of the bride and Miss Glenda Bridges.
