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Another indication of how local governments become dependent on the big central government of Washington can be seen in the revenue sharing program. If after five years of the checks from Uncle Sam, Congress should decide to end the program, city halls and courthouses across the state would find themselves facing the dilemma of reducing services or increasing taxes.

Assuming it is the latter, the additional tax bite would average at least 20 per cent, according to Comptroller Bob Bullock. He estimates that the state now gets \$100 million a year from revenue sharing whereas all municipal governments receive a total of about \$200 million.

Bullock has made a detailed study of the situation and comes up with separate estimates of the tax increases required in all counties and cities to make up the shortage if revenue sharing should be cut off. Regarding Cooke County, he says an increase of 19.3 per cent is needed. Muenster would need an increase of 27.5%, Lindsay 20.8 and Gainesville 16.3. And these figures are very moderate. Included on the list are many cities that would need tax increases of about 50 per cent to maintain the budget level, and a few would need over 200 per cent. Obviously those towns now have a very small income from local tax.

The significant point is the degree to which counties and cities have come to depend on the revenue sharing check as a part of their operating budget. "A lot of people warned in the beginning that this would happen", Bullock said. "And they were right. But like it or not, a vote against revenue sharing at this point is most surely a vote to decrease local services or increase local taxes."

At this stage of the game, let's hope that the program will continue. From what we've seen of the spendthrift Congress, we can't imagine the proposed cut as a way of reducing our federal tax. IRS will continue tapping us regardless, and the politicians will just find another way of spending the money. Meanwhile we have to choose between less service or more local tax.

Originally the program served as a good inducement to improve the counties and cities. The money flowed in, but, as always, taxes remained where they were, so the budgets increased. But the money was not free. Government was taking from us in order to share with us. And you can bet that it will take no less if it quits sharing.

This column has done a lot of beefing about inflation, describing it as a penalty on thrift, a means whereby value has been stolen out of our savings, a cruel hoax whereby people received more income while the increase was being offset by higher prices. Actually buying power has declined because savings bought less and less while higher current income was matched by higher price.

Some will say, of course, that we've never had it so good. We have an abundance of life's needs plus comforts and luxuries galore. However, it's also a fact that we have these goodies in spite of inflation, not because of it. Efficiency and technology have produced the multitude of goods enabling all to have more than before. All that is, except certain victims of inflation who get a much smaller share of the fruits of national progress. They are the people who depend on savings or a fixed income. So, to those who point to the high standard of living we can say that it could be far better without inflation.

This fact also applies in another way. The good life in great part has been due to the favorable economic environment provided for small, independent, family operated farms and businesses. . . many of which now are being wiped out by inflation and high taxes. Back in 1942, for instance, there were over 6 million family farms in the U.S. Today there are less than half that number.

A reason is the crushing blow of federal estate tax. The amount of personal and real property exempt from estate tax was fixed back in 1942, and inflation of values since

## City Concerned With Flooding at Mesquite Street

The drainage problem along the east city limit, particularly in the area of the mobile homes, was the principal subject considered at the city council's regular meeting Monday night.

The council is concerned with flooding, which occurs at almost every heavy rain, by the run-off from an extensive watershed to the north, northwest and northeast. Since much of that area lies beyond the city limit the council is asking for help from Robert Bayer, commissioner of Precinct 4. The intention is to increase drainage capacity at sides of Mesquite Street and possibly divert some of the water away from the area.

Another development was an arrangement whereby Dan Hamric takes over the responsibility of park maintenance along with managing the swim pool. It will be a year round job of repairs and clean-up besides lawn mowing during the growing season.

Another item of the meeting was a report by Bill Bedrick, chairman of the library board. He gave detailed figures of the number of books and publications added, the number of books checked out, the number of hours spent there by volunteer workers, etc. The library is sponsored by the city.

Councilmen also voted to continue their compensation of \$2.00 for attending a meeting. Mayor Bright is an exception because he cannot accept pay by the city while employed by the hospital board.

## Building Notes

Building activity in the community keeps going at a lively pace with construction in progress on five non residential jobs and a number of new homes and major remodel and repair jobs.

Biggest job of them all is the AMPI milk plant, which is also the community's biggest ever. The new structure west of the old location is almost finished and most of the work now is concentrating on extensive changes to the old building and equipment. The entire effort will result in a plant that is modern, good looking, efficient and with capacity that is three times as much as the old factory.

The Telephone Company has almost finished a 50x47 addition which will more than double space in the equipment room and provide space for toll line equipment which is due to be in use in June 1977. Also in the addition are a

store room, rest rooms, a mini kitchen and TV studio facilities. An office for Dr. Enrique Juarez involved extensive work in the space previously provided in the addition to the Medical Center. Facilities are a private office, three exam rooms, laboratory, rest rooms, business office and waiting room. The suite connects with the suites of Dr. Antonetti and Dr. Kralicke. The site of a new business is Willie Wimmer's steel building near completion a mile east of town. It's a 40x80 colored metal structure with brick front and metal roof. It will be a diesel service shop. A pavilion in the park, octagonal in shape and 60 feet across, is a Jaycee project that has been cooking for years. It will have steel uprights and beams, asphalt shingles on a 3/4 inch ply. (Continued on Page 10)

In the city election incumbent Richard Grewing is challenged by Leonard Endres for Place 1 on the council, and incumbent Leo Hess is opposed by Roger Taylor and Earl Walterscheid for Place 4. Incumbent Aubrey Tuggle has no opposition in his bid for reelection to Place 2.

The school district ballot has three unopposed candidates. D. J. Hellman and Urban Endres are seeking reelection to Positions 6 and 7 respectively. And John David Meurer is a candidate for Position 5 to succeed Theresa Walterscheid.

A similar situation applies up to now in the hospital district election. There are five unopposed candidates for the five positions with expiring terms.

A change of by laws when the district was enlarged specifies that only residents of the district can serve on the board.

A petition with 15 signatures is required to get on the hospital ballot, and it must be submitted to Secretary Henscheid on or before the 8th.

## Landmark Elevator At Myra Destroyed

An old area landmark was lost last Thursday about 5 p.m. when the Stockmen's Feed Store grain elevator at Myra was totally destroyed by fire. It is reported to have been built in 1880.

Cause of the blaze was a grass fire which ignited the tinder dry old lumber. It burned fast and was far beyond control when Muenster firemen arrived just a few minutes after being notified.

Loss is estimated at about \$3500 for the building plus about \$1500 more for some 500 bushels of grain in storage. It was partly covered by insurance.

## No Foolin'! \$2 Bill Is Back

If you receive one on April 1, you might think it was an April Fool's joke, so the U.S. Treasury Department is waiting until April 13 to reissue the \$2 bill.

Printing of the bill was discontinued in 1966, with the low level of public demand cited as the primary reason. Reissuance of the bill was prompted by recent studies which show major savings resulting from the reduction in the number of \$1 bills required.

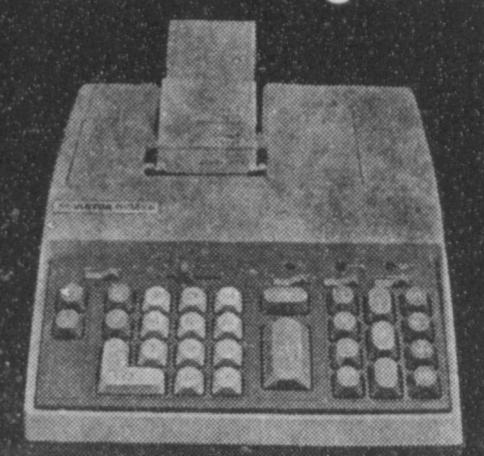
At present, the \$1 bill represents about 60 per cent, or 1.7 billion, of the total number of currency pieces produced annually. By gradually replacing half of the face value of the annual requirement with \$2 notes, the Treasury expects to save \$35 million over the next five years.

By April 13, 1976, which is Thomas Jefferson's birthday, more than 225 million \$2 bills will be ready.

**Child Abuse Film Shown to NCCW**

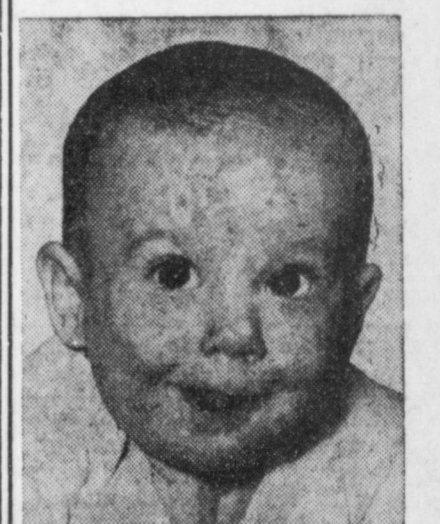

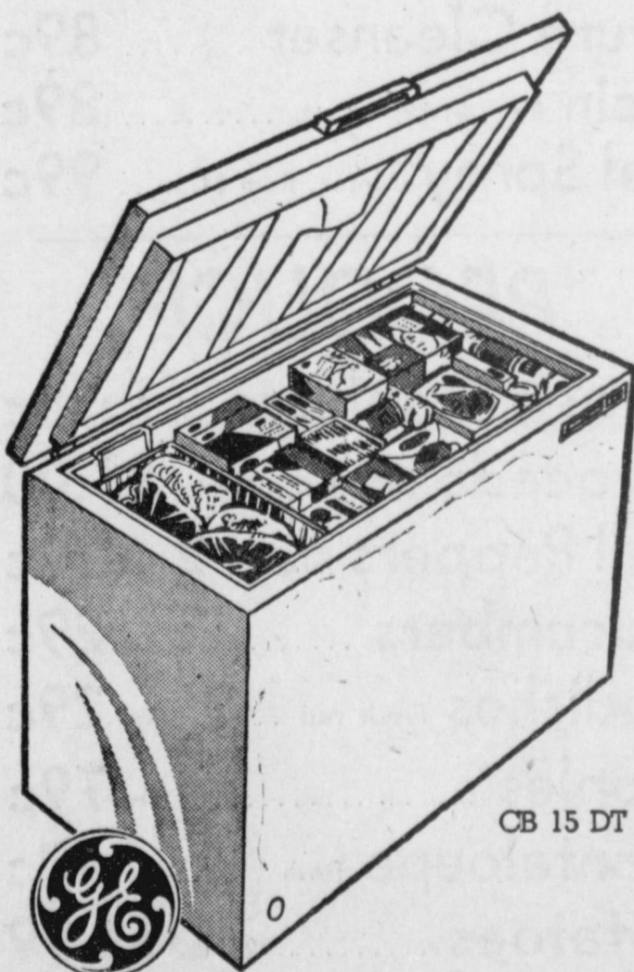

The polls at the above designated place shall on election day be open from 8 o'clock a.m. to 7 o'clock p.m.

4. L. E. Bruns is hereby appointed Clerk for absentee voting. The absentee voting for the above designated election shall be held at the superintendent's office within the boundaries of the above named School District and said place of absentee voting shall remain open for at least eight hours on each day for absentee voting which is not a Saturday, a Sunday, or an official State holiday, beginning on the 20th day and continuing through the 4th day preceding the date of said election. The amount of exemption allowed, \$60,000, was reasonable back in '42, but it isn't any more. Values have soared since then, so the property originally worth \$60,000 is now worth about \$240,000. Instead of being tax free, the property is subject to inheritance tax on \$180,000, which is estimated at about \$42,000. Well, how many heirs can shell out that kind of money to clear their title? Either they have to go deep in debt to hold the title or sell all or part of it to pay off the tax.

People must realize that

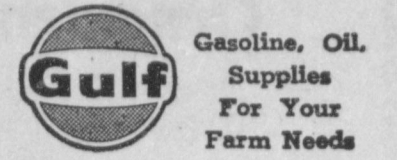
