Nineteen hundred and sixty five years ago a star gleamed in the heavens and guided three wise men to the crib of a new-born child in a manger. The occasion was the first Christmas, when the eternal source of goodness and wisedom and justice took on the nature of us human beings to atone or our shortcomings and to leach by word and example a way of life that is pleasing to His Heavenly Father. His purpose was clearly explained in the angelic chorus that announced his birth: "Glory to God in the highest, and on earth peace to men of

Those few words combined the two basic precepts of the ages. Summarizing the ten commandments, they told us how best to get along with Almighty God and our fellow man. They prefaced the instruction He was to give us later in life — to love thy God and thy neighbor.

Another anniversary of that wonderful event has arrived, and things are very much the same as they were then. Though He is not present in the flesh He is here in spirit as He always has been. The story of the star and the angelic song are vividly impressed on our minds as a part of the great feast. Wise men all over the world are going to His crib acknowledging that His way is the only way to

Likewise, the world conditions into which he comes are still very much as He first found them. There are despots trying to enslave other people and selfish individuals trying to gratify their own desires without regard for the right or welfare of others. The kind of people who seek His way are still in a pitiful minority. The odds seem to be stacked against Him as much as they ever were.

Nevertheless we know that He and His spirit wil be here always. First of all we have his assurance that "I will be with you until the end of time." And His survival through almost twenty centuries is the miracle of history He was a humble man who chose a life of poverty and a crown of thorns. Of all the great people of history He was the poorest and least influential in a worldly way. But by wisdom, kindness and compassion he had more influence on the minds and hearts of mankind than all of the other greats combined. Starting as an almost unknown man, except in His small country, He has become the most beloved, best known person of all time.

One would think ,under such circumstances, that the world should be convinced by now, and His following should be universal. But the same old difficulty still has to be reckoned with. People now as during His lifetime are still slow to accept His standards. They prefer to do things their way instead of God's way. So they go on making a mess of

Texas draft boards soon may take married men up to 35 years old who have no children in order to fill armed forces quotas. This will be done for the first time since World War II.



"Newspapers are used everywhere by housewives as covering for shelves on which pots and pans are stored. Newspapers can be and are spread on chairs when standing on them to hang pictures, to prevent scratching the varnish. They also are used to wrap things that are to be packed in an attic, as the printer's ink discourages moths.

"Housekeeping cannot be carried on without newspapers. A newspaper of wide circulation, crumpled in the hand, makes an excellent mop with which to polish windows. The newspaper is unequaled for starting a fire, or for lining garbage cans.


"In cold weather the editorial page of a newsaper, spread over the chest and buttoned under a coat, will keep out the cold. Newspapers stuffed in a leaky pipe can be used as a temporary measure. The society section of a newspeper is valuable to spread on a floor when painting, to keep paint stains off the linoleum.

During World War I, the Salvation Army lassies under her jurisdiction spent Christmas — as well as many other days - ministering to the needs of American doughboys in France. The word "doughboy" stems from the celebrated Salvation Army doughnut, a World War I staple.

A Lesson in Style By Mark Twain

Mark Twain, being himself a writer possessed of a direct, sinewy style, was not an admirer of James Fenimore Cooper. He properly regarded the author of the Leatherstocking yarns as a windbag who never missed a chance to use three long words where one short one would do.

Twain wrote some things on the subject. What he had to is excellent instruction, even in this day of staccato prose, for those who seek to improve their style. Consider his distillation of this sentence from Chapter XI of "The Last of the Mohicans": "Notwithstanding the swiftness of their flight, one of the Indians had found an opportunity to strike a straggling fawn with an arrow, and had borne the more preferable fragments of the victim, patiently on his shoul-

ders, to the stopping place." This Mark Twain comments, could have been said thus: During the flight one of the Indians had killed a fawn and he brought it into camp."

Cost of Raising A Child to Age 18 Is About \$35,000

How much to raise a child? Plenty, according to Changing Times magazine. It estimates that raising a child to age 18 costs the average middle-class city family \$35,000.

child to age 18 runs around \$12,000 for a family with a very modest standard of living and as high as \$60,000 or more for a pampered, upper-class urbanite. A comfortable-off farm amily might spend \$20,000.

Just how much depends on many things, but the magazine points out that none of the totals include "the real crusher that may start at 18—the cost

Major expenses come to about \$28,000 and include: cost of being born, medical and dental, food, clothing, housing and transportation. A few of the itemized incidental are diaper service, haircuts, toys, alowance, school fees and sup-

That it can be done for less is admitted. In fact, Changing Times reminds its readers that comfortably and bringing up their children for less. It points out that the Community Council of Greater New York figures that a family with a low to moderate income in New York City—a fairly expensive modest but adequate standard of living while spending about the figure doesn't include the

The wekly rate is \$4.15 for the first ear; \$5.55 from 1 to 5, and 7.90 from 6 to 11. Although considered a bit frugal, this bill might be \$7,000 to \$8,000 for 18 years.




