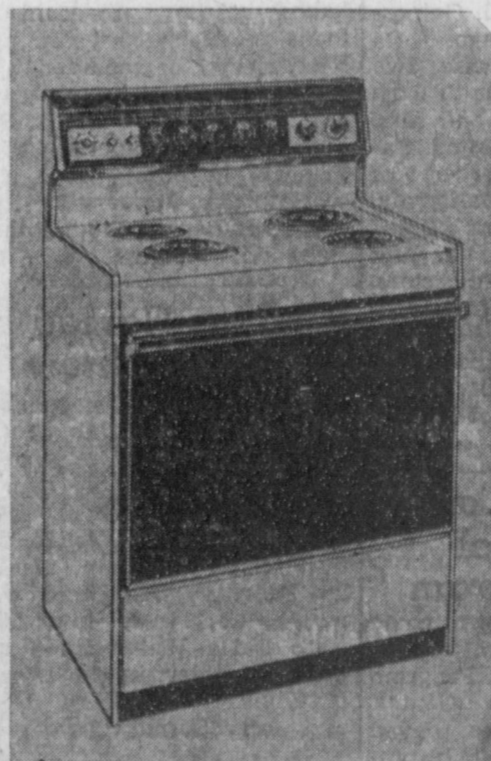
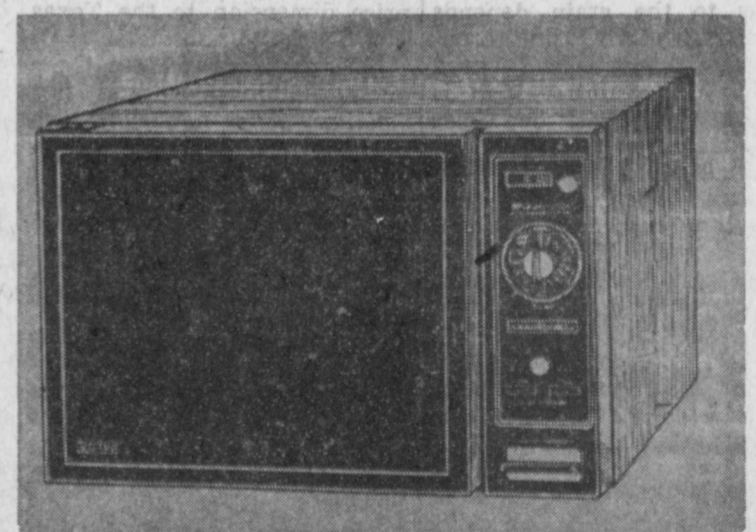

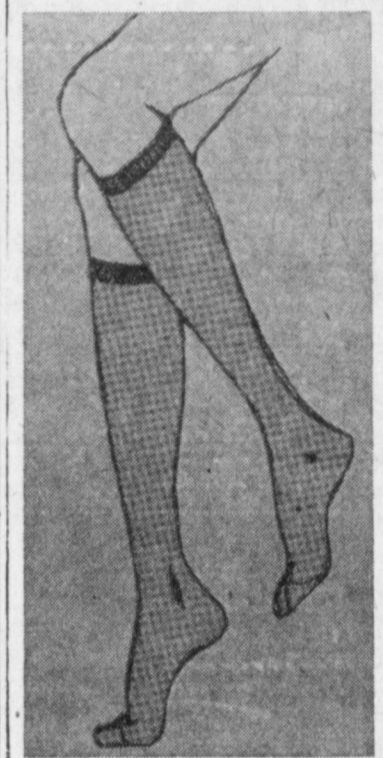

Of a control group of 420 men who kept their old diets, 12 died of heart attack in the same period — three times the rate of the low-fat diet group.

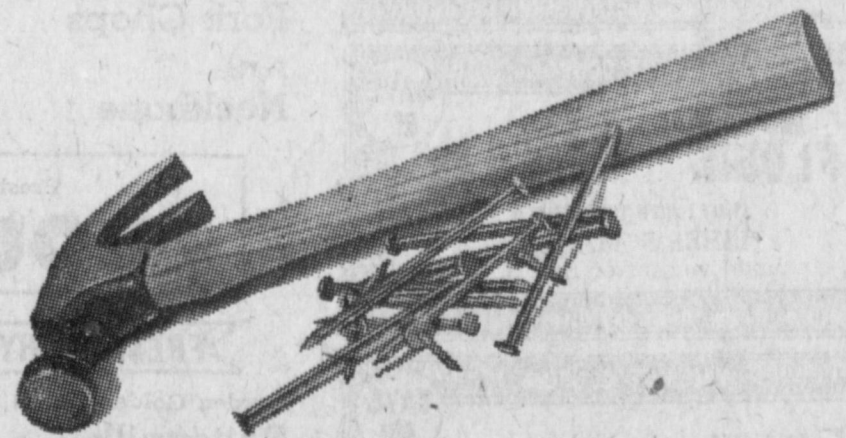

No More Needles?

The surgeon's traditional needle and thread is giving way to staplers which are not too different in appearance from the ones used in homes and offices.

These surgical staples enable surgeons to sew mechanically with very fine stainless steel staples. One reported advantage of the technique is that it reduces operating time.

The United States Surgical Corporation, which produces staples, reports that close to 1,500,000 patients have been "stapled" since its product was introduced in 1968.
