The crisis in American medicine resulting from the runaway cost of medical malpractice insurance is finally coming to the attention of Washington legislators. Among the corrective efforts are one bill to protect, against "catastrophic" claims recoveries — the settlements that go into six or seven figures. Another bill proposes a drastic cut in the lawyer's share of a malpractice settlement. Also, one bill seeks protection against "catastrophic" loss by insurance companies. At first glance this seems like concern for the big companies rather than the doctors and their patients, but it explains why the premiums are outrageously high and some companies have quit offering the protection.

A survey of Texas doctors by the Texas Medical Association shows that the malpractice claim problem has literally exploded in the past four years. Malpractice suits against Texas doctors have quadrupled during that time and amounts asked in those suits has increased more than 500 per cent. Together the two figures indicate that the total amount of claims now is twenty times as much as four years ago.

A number of factors are blamed for this condition. One is the increasing numbers of claims later proved to have no merit. Another is glorification of the physician as a person who can pay the exorbitant amounts. And it's the system which allows claims for unlimited amounts, sets no limit on the amount of time allowed for filing a claim, and often does not apportion awards on an equitable basis. All of these factors need to be considered in working out the remedies for our malpractice insurance problems.

The urgency of finding solutions is pointed up by the fact that medical and hospital care are not only more expensive but also more limited because of the malpractice suits. When a doctor has to pay up to \$40,000 a year for malpractice insurance he has to recover the amount by increasing his charge to the patients... imagine almost \$800 a week just for that insurance. Meanwhile, the doctor constantly has to be on guard against claims, so he takes extra precautions, like more tests and X-Rays to make the patient's condition a matter of record. That too, has to be added to the bill. These precautions and red tape take time, so doctors have less time to spare for their patients. And besides, some doctors decline to accept cases which they regard as bad risks.

Some of the more significant findings in the Texas survey include the following. The number of reported suits and claims filed has increased sharply in recent years... 60% of all suits being filed since 1972. And a growing percentage of those suits seek larger damages... 70 per cent since '72 being for (Continued on Page 12)

## Gain Reported in Deposits, Loans At Muenster Bank

Deposits at the Muenster bank gained during the past year but declined in the last quarter whereas loans gained for both the year and the quarter.

Responding to the state banking commission's request for a statement of condition as of March 31, 1976, the bank reports total deposits of \$8,072,133.35 and total loans of \$3,414,962.74.

This indicates an increase in deposits of \$530,914.34 during the past year but a drop of \$916,132.72 during the past three months. It also indicates a gain of \$265,182.56 in loans during the year and a gain of \$167,677.22 since the last quarterly report.

Combined records of the four county banks show that deposits gained about \$7 million in the past year and dropped about \$1 million in the past quarter. Also total loans increased by more than \$4 million for the year and by about \$1 million for the quarter. Total deposits in the four banks were \$68,540,822.89 and total loans were \$36,979,440.90.

## Problem Cleared For Ash Street, Work Starts Soon

Long awaited news that the proposed opening of Ash Street has been approved was revealed Monday night in the Muenster City Council. Mayor Bright disclosed that the right-of-way problem requires only an easement allowing Raimy and Wylie, oil producers, to install a flow line under the street.

A resolution to grant the easement was passed Monday night by the council, thereby clearing the way for work on the street and construction of a bridge over Brushy Elm Creek.

Ash is the street marking the west boundary of the city. The street building project is to reach from Sixth Street across the creek and Highway 82 to the recently completed 82nd Street. It will be a welcome short cut from West Highway 82 to the west part of town.

Work on the street and bridge is due to start soon. Funds for it were appropriated before the hassle concerning removal of oil pump rod lines, which has dragged on for more than two years. In the settlement pumps are powered by separate electric motors and the rod lines are not needed.

## Endres and Hess Win City Council Races

Political races, which have been rare in recent years, resulted Saturday in the 168 to 102 defeat of Richard Grewing by Leonard Endres for Place 1 on the City Council, while Incumbent Leo Hess barely held on to Place 4 with 128 votes as his opponents Roger Taylor and Earl Walterscheid polled 122 and 18 respectively.

Results of the latter contest brought up the question of whether a run-off would be needed, and City Attorney Julian Smith supplied the answer, explaining that in this case a plurality is sufficient and a majority is not needed.

The other candidate on the ballot, Aubrey Tuggle, sailed back into office without opposition. Accordingly Endres, Hess and Tuggle were sworn into office Monday night at the regular meeting of the city council. Members with another year to serve are Mayor David Bright, Ted Henschel and Herbert Miller.

Another bit of election activity concerns the contest for Place I on the board of directors for Cooke County College, in which Incumbent William Pulte was opposed by Flossie Kidd Schoppa. Pulte, winner by 1290 to 525 in the county, led 189 to 80 at Muenster.

Other candidates on the local ballots were unopposed and the voting was routine with exception of a few write-in votes. Sloan Fortenberry received 225 for place 2 on the college board and Herman Hartman received 280 for member on the county school board.

For the Muenster school board voting went as follows. Place 5: John David Meurer 273, Theresa Walterscheid 5, Charles Bartush 1; Place 6: D. J. Hellman 264, David Bright 2; Place 7: Urban Endres 267, Kenny Fette 2, Thomas Hartman 2. Names of Meurer, Hellman and Endres were on the ballot and other votes were write-ins. Other trustees are Eddie Fleitman, Adam Wolf, Willie Walterscheid and Ed Cleer.

Voting on the hospital ballot went as follows. Rufus Henschel 265, William Hermes 264, Ray Voth 266, Norbert Walterscheid 272, Albert Dangelmayr 267, David Trachta 1, R. F. Walterscheid 1. The latter two were write-in votes. Hospital board members with unexpired terms are Al Trubenbach, Paul Fetsch, Jimmy Jack Biffle and Al Felderhoff.

## Council Has Busy Meeting

The Muenster City Council had a crowded agenda for its regular meeting Monday night, starting with acceptance of a resignation by Leonard Endres from the Muenster Water Board in order to qualify him for a place on the city council. According to municipal regulation a person can not be on both the board and the council.

Then, with an opening on the water board, the council appointed Richard Grewing to it. The net result is that Endres and Grewing have traded positions.

Another appointment was Dr. Enrique Juarez as the city's health officer. Previously this position alternated between the two resident doctors, and Juarez recently became the third resident doctor.

In an effort to avoid future discrepancies in surveys, the council has asked for establishment of an official point which will be the origin of future surveys. The problem is that variations exist because they are based on old surveys that do not agree. The council favors accepting existing surveys but requiring new ones to be based on a common origin.

Jaycees asked the council for a special permit to sell beer at the week-long softball tournament ending on May 2. The city approved it as a special accommodation for German Week, but not to be considered as a precedent for future tournaments.

Two additional mercury vapor street lights also received the city's okay. One will be installed at the corner of Sixth and Hickory, the other at the corner of Sixth and Ash.

Other council action concerned a long delayed clearance to construct the road and bridge on Ash Street, setting an opening date for the swimming pool, and shelving a Jaycee proposal to build a log cabin in the park.

Muenster Swimming Pool will start its 1976 season on Saturday, May 22. The date was set Monday night in the regular city council meeting and Don Ostermann was named the pool manager. Closing date will be determined after announcements of opening dates at the schools.

Other plans for the park concern repairs and paint for the cable fence along the driveway. Jaycees have offered to do the work if the city will provide materials.



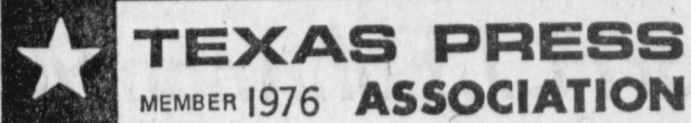

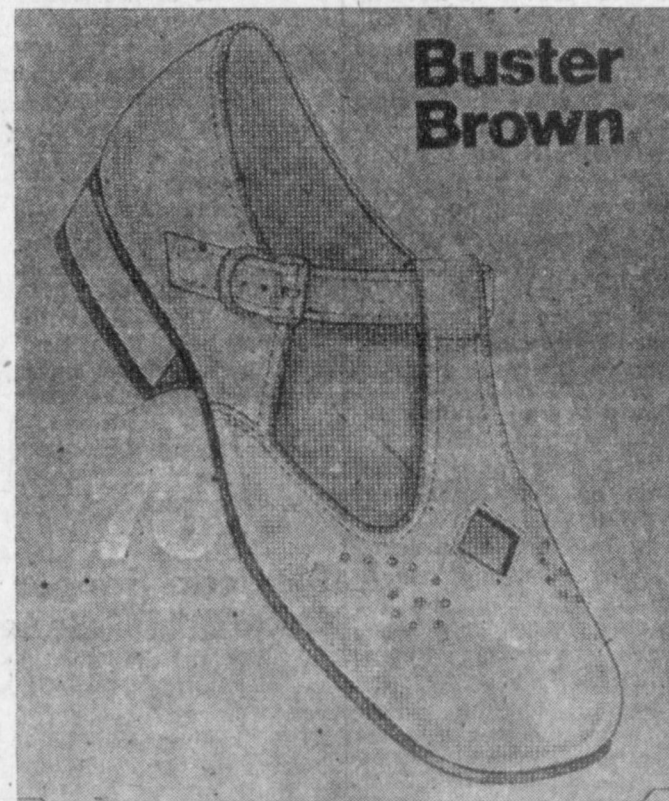

One of the major features of the Museum is the stained glass skylight originally made for the home built by the late Senator Joseph

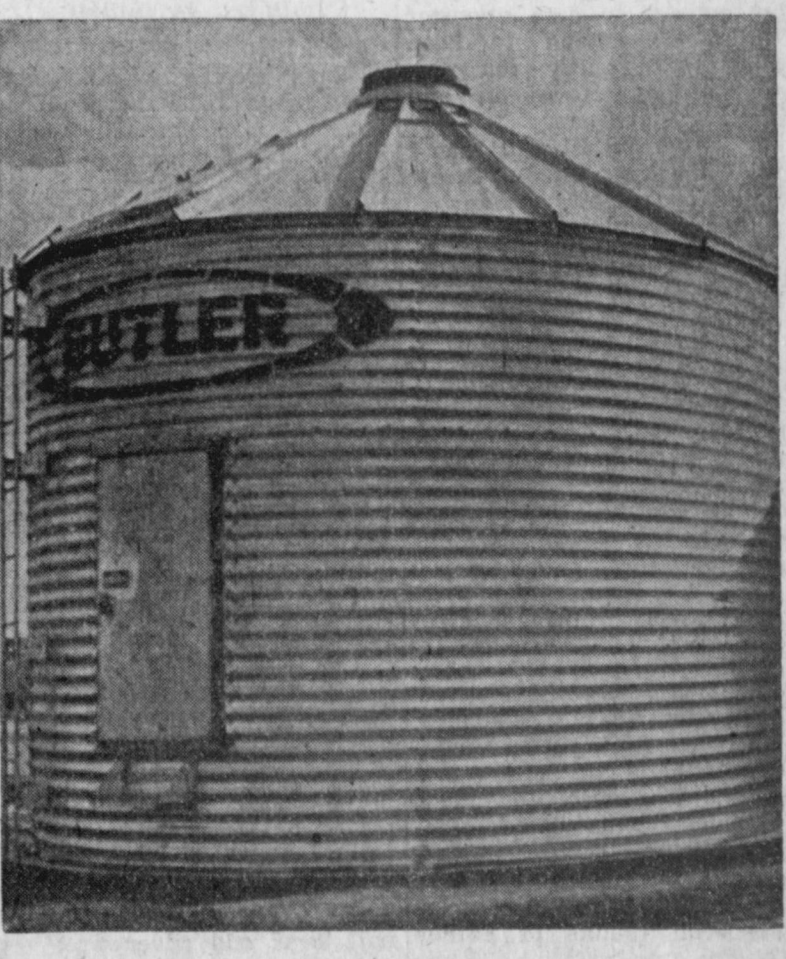

**Cooke County Is First in Texas Oat Production**

With a total crop of 816,500 bushels, Cooke County placed first in 1975 Texas oat production.  
 According to Agriculture Commissioner John C. White, county farmers harvested some 15,000 acres with an average yield of 54.4 bushels per acre.  
 Most areas of the state had moderate to heavy rains in late August and September that provided excellent surface and subsurface moisture for planting. Seeding was completed by the end of October. Early growth was good, with many fields enjoying adequate to surplus moisture, and many farmers were not able to graze the crop since fields were too wet or muddy.  
 Grazing increased as fields began to dry, but growth rates exceeded grazing in some localities and rank, unpalatable forage developed. Harvest for grain started on schedule in late April, but because of rains, ran behind schedule in May reaching completion in early July.  
 Texas ranked eleventh in production last year with a crop of 19.5 million bushels.  
 Complete figures on small grains have been compiled in the "1975" Texas Small Grain Statistics." Copies may be obtained by writing John C. White, Commissioner, Texas Department of Agriculture, P. O. Box 12847, Austin, Texas 78711.

### First 100 Years Of Cooke County Reprints Available

Four dramatic eras — pioneering, ranching, farming and oil production — dominated the development of Cooke County in the first 100 years of its history, 1848-1948.

Now 1955's THE FIRST 100 YEARS IN COOKE COUNTY has been reprinted by The Naylor Company of San Antonio, publishers of the original book.

The new edition has the same features as the original: mapped endsheets by Daniel Montague Smith, forty-two original photographs, a foreward by the author, an extensive appendix, a bibliography and a complete index.

The infamous "great hangings" of Cooke County Civil War days are described here by a member of the jury and by the man who drove the wagon from Gainesville out to the "hanging tree" and back to town with the bodies.

The Indian raids which terrorized Cooke's early settlers are documented through military and county records, which indicate little success by the soldiers in apprehending marauding bands who burned, murdered and kidnapped at will.

A microcosm of United States history is here also, as county residents are called to World Wars I and II.

Author A. Morton Smith was a great-great-grandson of Daniel Montague, for whom neighboring Montague County was named and whose commission as surveyor of Cooke County is the first document (1848) recorded in the deed records of Cooke.

Mr. Smith was chairman of the Cooke County Centennial Commission in 1948, and was

inspired to write this Cooke County history.

Born in Gainesville, county seat of Cooke, he joined the staff of the Daily Register in 1922, became city editor in 1924 and editor in 1942.

He was one of the founders of the Gainesville Community Circus, among other civic activities, and in 1952-53 served as national president of the Circus Fans Association of America.

A. Morton Smith died only a short time after the publication of "The First 100 Years in Cooke County", but ever since the book went out of print, county residents and the author's relatives have been requesting another edition.

Books are available from the Gainesville American Revolution Bicentennial Committee, the Cooke County Heritage Society and local book outlets.

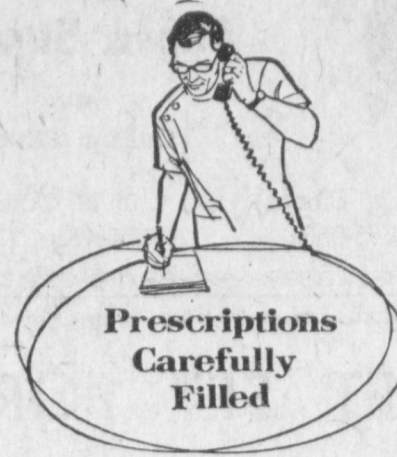

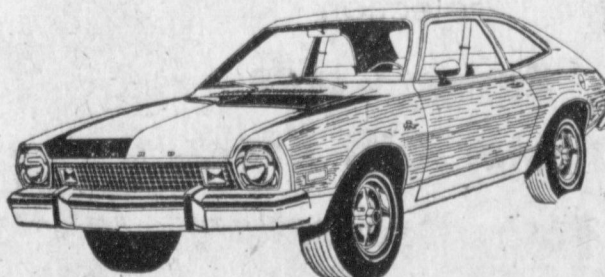

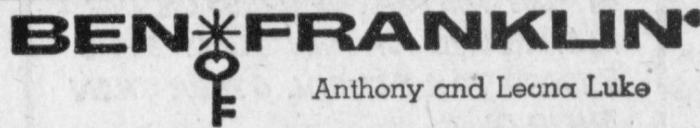

"How do rising fuel prices affect my electric bill?"



Texas Power & Light generating plants require enormous quantities of natural gas, lignite coal and, when deliveries of gas are curtailed, fuel oil, to produce electricity.

In 1975, TP&L's fuel costs were \$147 million, more than five and a half times greater than in 1970. In 1970, only 15 cents of each dollar paid to TP&L by its customers was used to purchase fuel. In 1975, fuel required 37 cents of each revenue dollar.

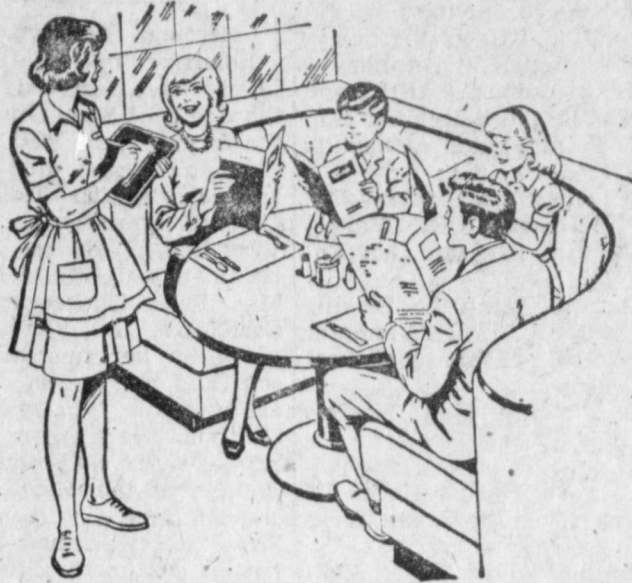

**4-H Clothing Training Set by Mary Hinton**

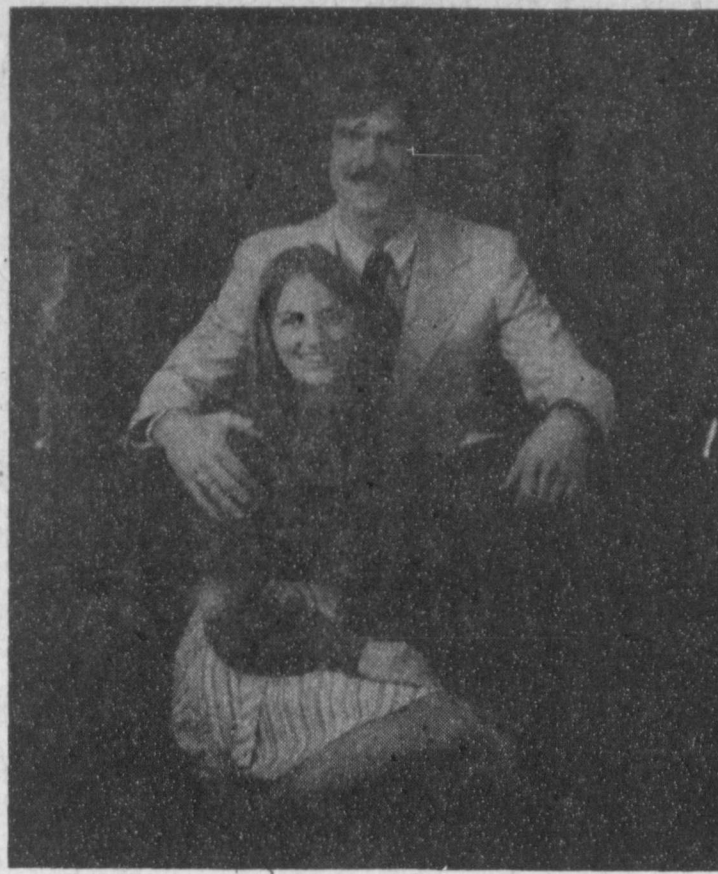

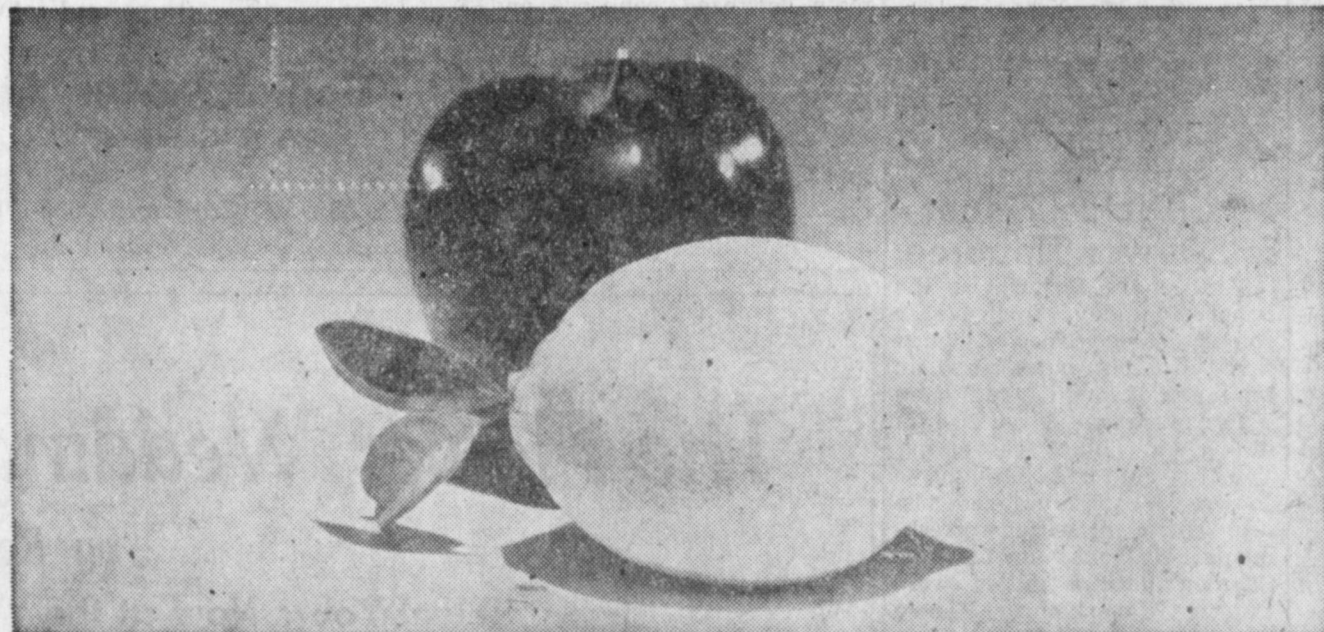

more than \$100,000. 54 per cent of all malpractice awards have been made since 1972, even though more than half the suits filed in that time are still pending. Insurance premiums for physicians in high risk specialties have increased as much as 600 per cent. And cost to patients has gone up because of the premiums and extra precautions in lab, x-ray and consultations. Meanwhile some physicians are reducing the scope of their services and avoiding some procedures in order to obtain insurance.

The whole situation in a nutshell is that too many people have the idea that they are entitled to anything they can get legally, and they are easily persuaded by unscrupulous lawyers who see the opportunity to make some easy money. Too often a shyster will tell a patient that he has a chance to get big money by magnifying a slight injury or claiming one that does not exist.

It's a good gamble: lots to win and nothing to lose. Perhaps the lawyer can get a good settlement out of court just because the doctor and insurance company don't want to spare the time and expense of fighting the case. Otherwise he presents the client as a distress case and the defending doctor and insurance company as rich people who will never miss the money. So a sympathetic jury decides in favor of the "poor fellow".

Getting down to basic principles, the malpractice suits too often are a matter of dishonesty, either faking a non-existent ailment or exaggerating a lesser problem, and as such they can be classified wholly or partially as criminal acts. It might make a great difference if courts took this factor into consideration and filed criminal charges on persons whose cases turn out to be fraudulent. Or perhaps the defendant ought to counter-attack by filing suit against the lawyer and client who made the false claim.

Of course there are exceptions where malpractice suits are justified. But they are not causing the present malpractice troubles. Our problem is plain legalized robbery, and the solution lies in dealing with it as crime. This isn't just a legal game with much to win or nothing to lose. Whenever shown to be fraudulent the client and lawyer should both be punished, and the lawyer ought to be disbarred besides.
