



#### New S.S. Provision Has Extra Benefit For 72 Year Olds

Many persons age 72 or older who can qualify for social security payments under a recent change have not yet applied, according to Gus Jones, social security district mana-

ger in Sherman. A little-known amendment allows persons now 72 or older to qualify for a special benefit with less credit than is required for regular benefits. For example, a man who was at least 76, or a woman who was at least 73, in 1965 has to have only about nine months of covered work credit. Also, a widow who was at least 72 in 1965, whose husband either died or became 65 in 1954 or earlier, is eligible if her husband had about nine months of covered work.

This special benefit is a flat \$35 a month, Jones said. Wife's benefits of \$17.50 a month are payable at age 72 to a woman whose husband is entitled under this provision, if she Doc. No. 5393 (R. 10-65) 16-78926-1 GPO reaches 72 before 1969.

Jones advised these persons to get in touch with the Sherman social security office as soon as possible. They can apply for payments and enroll



#### Tax Hike Due to Support Growth Of State Colleges

AUSTIN, A substantial tax increase will be need next year to provide for fast growing colleges and universities.

Frank Erwin, chairman of the Committee for the Governing Board of Texas Colleges and Universities, estimates that higher-education expenditures will go up \$100,000,000 for the coming biennium — above the present \$432,000,000 budget. That's a hike of nearly 25 per

Some authorities feel that increased expenditures for education will run closer to \$170,000,000.

Erwin predicted that collegeuniversity enrollment will double by the early 1970's and admitted that the task of providing facilities for all appears virtually hopeless.

Texans, he said, must be as enthusiastic in support of new taxes for education as they were in backing increased appropriations last year.

Other sources said the higher education budget looming next year may reach \$650,000,-000. In that event about \$500,-

000,000 may have to come from direct taxation.

Should an increase as large as now foreseen become necessary, pressure almost certainly would be removed to hike the \$50 a semester tuition fee required at state institutions. In the past, however legislators have been quicker to raise taxes than



Under the Postmaster General's proposal, six-day parcel post delivery would be re-stored in 6,091 cities where delivery routes served by foot carriers are now receiving parcel post delivery only five days a week. One delivery day is skipped each week in these cities, though on routes served by mounted carriers, six-day parcel delivery has been maintained. Post Office window service on Saturdays - and, in cases, Sundays would be authorized on an as needed basis in nearly 15,000 post offices. Late-window-hour service would also be resumed on week nights, where needed.

Postmasters would be authorized to resume selling money orders on Saturdays as part of the window service restoration in these cities where money order sales have been curtailed.


