**An interesting tax proposal** was discussed by Congressman Graham Purcell in his weekly report to constituents of the district. It concerns the issue, now receiving considerable attention, on whether a portion of the income tax should be returned to the states by the federal government.

Apparently this is recommended as a no-strings-attached deal. The money would simply be sent to the states without any directives on how it is to be spent.

**The idea was endorsed** by Governor Connally in his message to the new Texas Legislature. It was also endorsed, on behalf of many Republicans in Congress, by House Minority Leader Gerald Ford.

Connally asked the Texas Legislature to approve an amendment to the Federal Constitution providing for a return of five percent of the income tax to the states. If such an amendment were approved by two thirds of the states the Congress would have to submit the proposal to the nation for ratification. There is also another way. Congress could simply pass a new law to accomplish it.

A related problem concerns the basis of distribution. Should each state's share be governed by its population or by the total income tax collected from it?

**The manner of adopting** the measure and of determining each state's share are, of course, problems that must be decided if the idea is to be adopted. However, that is a subject that can be skipped for now as we consider merits of the proposal itself.

The very first question in most people's minds is: Will income tax remain at its present level, or will it be raised proportionately? If the idea is to increase taxes just to provide revenue for states while federal government continues its outrageous budget, most answers will be an emphatic No. Income tax is already an unreasonable burden. It should not be raised for any reason.

But if the method is to continue the present tax level and give five percent of its proceeds to the states, it is likely to get enthusiastic support. This is the beginning of a long awaited change — that of taking some power from the monstrous centralized federal bureaucracy and returning it to the states. It could be the beginning of a most welcome return to the kind of government intended by our founding fathers, in which all powers not specifically assigned to the central government by the constitution are reserved to the states.

**During the past few decades** we have gone a long way toward fouling up the American system of government. A coalition of do gooders and opportunists in Washington has established hundreds of schemes to do great things for the masses while perpetuating themselves in soft political jobs.

The net results of it all is social and economic confusion and a something-for-nothing attitude among the people, while government has attained a record of waste and graft and arbitrary bureaucratic arrogance.

It is high time for a reversal of trend. And that could be achieved if Washington were told, by either a new law or a new amendment, to give some money back to the states and let them take over a larger portion of service to the people.

**You can bet that many improvements** would come out of the change. For instance, fewer people would find loafing more profitable than working. And fewer people would make a business of bearing illegitimate children. And fewer schools would be deprived of funds because they fail to heed arbitrary regulations from Washington.

And in the federal agencies there would be less of the inexcusable but unavoidable waste from overlapping efforts. We doubt whether there would still be over 400 appropriations for federal aid administered by 21 departments and agencies aided by 150 Washington bureaus and over 400 regional offices empowered to receive applications and pass out money.

We doubt whether government would continue to keep over 2.8 million employees costing almost 19 billion a year. In case you did not know, civilian employment by

## District Gains 9 In School Census, New Count is 742

A gain of nine has been recorded in the scholastic census of the Muenster School District. Superintendent L. B. Bruns revealed Wednesday that the unofficial count after completion of the 1967 enumeration is 742.

That figure is subject to verification by the Texas Education Agency in Austin before it can be regarded as official. The official count for 1966 is 733. The unofficial count at completion of the census was 737, but four names were removed from the list in the check-up at Austin. Normally such deletions are caused by duplications when people move from one district to another and are listed in both districts.

Comparing the new census with last year's Bruns said that 73 on the former list were lost because they passed the scholastic age or moved out of the district and 82 were added because they reached scholastic age or moved into the district.

The census count is especially important in the Muenster district because it is the basis on which the state's per capita allotment is paid.

## Hospital Progress Seen in 3 Year Statistical Report

As Muenster Memorial Hospital approaches the third anniversary of its opening, on February 3, it continues to move forward steadily but slowly. Year end statistics reported this week by Sister Mildred, administrator, show that 1966 was slightly better in most categories than the preceding year and both years were much better than the opening year.

Total admissions last year were 26 higher than the year before and total patient days were 432 higher. That accounts for an increase of almost one in the hospital's average daily census. However the statistics also show a few drops. There was a decrease of 16 in the number of births and a decrease of 7 in the number of operations.

The statistics also showed that almost 41 per cent of the Muenster Hospital care is administered to Medicare patients. Since the program went into effect on July 1, there have been 1143 patient days of care to Medicare patients and 1650 days of care

## Texas to Register Over 6.7 Million Motor Vehicles

AUSTIN — The Texas Highway Department reported today that more than 6.7 million motor vehicles will be registered in Texas in 1967 and urged car owners to buy their license plates early.

The new license plates may be purchased during February and March at county tax assessor-collector's offices or at authorized sub-stations. New license plates must be displayed after midnight April 1.

A Highway Department spokesman said motorists can help shorten waiting lines and speed up registration by buying license plates early and by presenting proper ownership documents.

Car owners are required by law to present certificates of title and last year's license plate receipts when renewing vehicle registrations.

In previous years there has been some confusion and misunderstanding about the ownership documents needed to obtain license plates.

In one Texas county, for instance, motor car owners were permitted to renew their vehicle registrations with their old license numbers written on the backs of envelopes or other scratch paper without proof of ownership.

The Highway Department stressed that county tax assessor-collectors and their sub-station agents must demand proper credentials before issuing license plates. Motorists may speed up the process by taking last year's license plate receipts and certificates of title with them to the tax office to obtain their 1967 license plates.

## 90.8 Per Cent of City Tax Paid as Deadline Passes

Payments of city taxes in Muenster for 1966 are fair but not as good as the year before. Mrs. Arnold Henschel, city secretary, said Wednesday that \$23,482.43 had been received before the deadline. That is 90.8 per cent of the total assessment of \$25,859.51. Last year 95 per cent was received before the deadline.

This means that 9.2 per cent of the city's assessed property becomes subject to penalty, which is 3 per cent now and will increase through the year until it reaches 12 per cent next January. In addition the city charges \$1.00 for special bookkeeping and delinquent notices on past due accounts.

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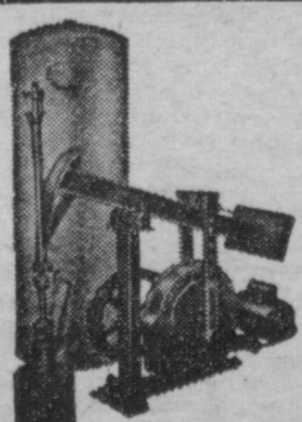

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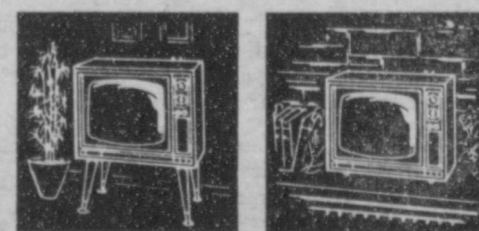

Technical Writing, a sophomore-level course especially designed for students in science, mathematics, agriculture, and business, will be taught during the Spring Semester at Cooke County Junior College by Mrs. Ed Wright of the English faculty.

The course emphasizes clear, objective factual writing, with emphasis upon logic, structure, proofreading, and rewriting. The study starts with definitions and classification. A review of basic grammar, fundamental to the acquisition of writing skills, is a major emphasis of the course.

Experience in the techniques for writing reports and preparing research papers is helpful to any student intending to transfer from CCJC into senior colleges, but Technical Writing is required for scientists and engineers.

"In addition to mastering report writing, we write business letters, prepare job applications, and gain practice in job interviews," Mrs. Wright explained.

The course meets on Mondays, Wednesdays, and Fridays at 10 a.m.

the federal government increased 431,670 since 1960, and 338,516 of that increase was made during the past year, mostly to administer the Great Society.

This isn't meant to imply

that the tax sharing suggestion should replace the entire federal welfare program. Rather the proposal seems to recommend it as a substitute for that part of the federal system in which funds are sent to the states and designated for use in specific federal programs. This would eliminate red tape and simply return each state a portion of its own income tax money to use as it sees fit.

The tax sharing proposal for states definitely has merit, and the country's attitude probably would accept it more eagerly now than at any time in the recent past. People were never more unhappy with wild federal spending than they were never more exasperated with misguided social policies or bureaucratic high handedness and inefficiency. Most people think the states would do a better job for less money.
