In recent years there has been increasing complaint that the revised system of American justice goes to extremes in protecting the rights of criminals and abandons to a corresponding degree the rights of society. New laws and new court rulings are most scrupulous in their desire to see that no one is unjustly convicted, or even unjustly accused, but seem unconcerned that their protective policy allows an alarming number of criminals to escape justice.

Then, as if deliberately creating a new obstacle for law enforcement, the Supreme Court on Monday of this week came forward with another decree to guarantee that criminals are further immunized against effective prosecution.

In essence the court said that police, when questioning a suspect, must first advise him that he may keep silent and that anything he says may be used against him, also that he has the right to have a lawyer beside him. Furthermore, if the accused indicates at any time that he wants the help of a lawyer the questioning must stop until a lawyer is present. And even further, whether or not he wants a lawyer, if he is alone and indicates in any way that he does not want to be questioned the police may not question

It is not surprising that the new decree brought on a barrage of criticism from law enforcement officers all across the country. To most of them it was a matter of adding a new difficulty to the many other difficulties that already stand in their way. To most of them it simply means that an increasing number of criminals will escape justice and continue their dirty work.

It used to be that many crimes were solved in the police station by alert and experienced officers able to match wits with the trickiest criminals. But it's different now. An officer's investigative skill is no match for the impenetrable stony silence which has become a suspect's sacred

The reason behind this over solicitude, of course, is the principle that no person can be forced to testify against himself, and perhaps a precaution against an undeserved conviction. American justice demands that the burden of proof in a person's trial must be presented by society and not by the accused.

However, it seems only reasonable that this rule, like most others, should have its exceptions. There are times, many of them, when vital facts in a case could be obtained by questioning.
