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Communism is celebrating its fiftieth anniversary this year with an all out effort to convince its captive peoples and gullible people elsewhere that it is the greatest system of society in the worlds history.

The red propaganda mills are grinding furiously, bringing out the brags of communism's marvelous scientific, industrial and military achievement. What's more the brags are backed up by the well known facts that Marxism dominates a third of the world's population, red armies are the world's biggest, and Russia can claim several space spectaculars. And of course communists still claim to have a worker's paradise where everyone gives according to his ability and receives according to his needs.

Some of those claims to greatness are hard to refute. No one can deny that Russia and China are big and powerful nations. The indisputable fact stares us in the face. Russia got that far in fifty years after starting with the savage and treacherous uprising of 1917. Red China's achievement took only twenty years.

Despite those obvious facts, the red story is the big hoax of our time. Instead of being master men, as they claim, communists are the great failures of this century. Instead of developing a strong economy with a high standard of living, Russia and China both have miserable systems, plus a serious shortage of food, clothing and housing.

The red countries are able to put up a big front only because of the help given by free countries, especially United States. In fact, communism would have folded long ago if it had to advance on its own power. A current joke in Russia is that Marxists are revising their goal of taking over all the world. They have to leave a few capitalist countries to keep reds from starving.

The sad fact about this red anniversary is that it is less an occasion for Soviet glee than for American regret. Russia got where it is as a world power not so much on its own ability as on America's boners — most of those boners being trust in people who did not deserve trust. Communism is America's Frankenstein. It is the monster we created by a long succession of undeserved help and favors often betraying our own best interests or our deserving friends.

The first mistake was recognition of Russia in 1933. Prestige and trade helped the reds tremendously. In return they sent over their agents to start wrecking our country. In World War II we helped Russia with billions of dollars worth of supplies and materials. And all the while their spies were stealing all the scientific, military and industrial secrets they could get their hands on.

After the war we agreed to Russia's take over of Eastern Europe and we also helped Russia establish the United Nations in a system that aided the red expansion. Ever since then Soviets in the UN and consulates have had their spies busy over here while the Kremlin's world planners have been manipulating the UN.

In diplomacy, in trade, in foreign give-away — in practically every way we could help the communists — we sustained the system which they now arrogantly claim as the product of their own genius and industry. The greatness they are bragging about is actually a monument to American mistakes. Except for us, communism would be insignificant or non-existent by now.

But that's still only half the story. Despite its bigness and its very serious threat to all free people, communism is still the most depraved system of all world history. Its record is one of colossal failure, not of success. The "dictatorship of the proletariat" is a "dictatorship over the proletariat." Never since it started has it been willingly adopted by the people. Everywhere it exists it has been imposed on the public.

And during the past fifty years, while other countries have attained the highest standard of living of all time, communism has slipped backward. While free workers advanced to a luxury standard, red workers have not been able to overcome scarcities of food, housing and clothing. While free men got big pay for doing work of their choice the red workers got slave's pay for work they were forced to do.

She later won her wings as a stewardess and flew for United Airlines before going to Washington.

Elm Flood Control Projects Face Loss Of Federal Funds

Eleventh hour urgency confronts the flood prevention program on the Elm Creek watershed.

A letter just received from the Soil Conservation Service by John Tippie, area conservationist, reveals that remaining reservoir projects of the watershed must be submitted to the state SCS office in Temple by April 1 in order to qualify for federal funds.

It means, he pointed out, that ten of the 51 reservoirs proposed for the watershed are in danger of being cancelled out, and people interested in those sites have little time left to get the easements that can keep their projects alive. Three of those sites are in the west part of the county. They are four miles northwest of Muenster, two miles southeast of Myra and two miles southeast of Lindsay.

The 41 dams completed in the watershed are credited with vast improvements in flood control, however SCS engineers feel that the other ten are needed to complete the control of area floodwater.

A meeting on the problem has been set for 2:30 p.m. Friday in the county courtroom of the Cooke County courthouse. Interested persons are urged to attend.

Rosary was recited almost continuously at the Nick Miller Funeral Home Chapel Wednesday from noon to 4 p.m. by school children and their teachers. St. Anne's Society conducted the 4 o'clock rosary and the community rosary was at 8.

Sister Leonarda was a talented musician. For 56 years she taught instruments, voice and band.

A native of Switzerland, she came to America in company of another young girl to enter the novitiate of the Olivetan Benedictine Sisters. Sister Leonarda and Sister Bertha made their professions August 12, 1910. In 1960 they celebrated their golden jubilee together. Both had long rewarding careers in Sacred Heart Parish. Sister Bertha is teaching at Wynne, Ark., this year.

Sister Leonarda taught her classes this year until February. She entered the hospital as a medical patient on Feb. 17 and was released Feb. 25. Apparently feeling all right, she was out and around until Sunday evening. She attended Mass in the morning in Sacred Heart Church.

Her survivors, brothers and sisters, still live in Switzerland. She spent the past summer there with them.

Fisher's Store Marks Fortieth Anniversary

Friday is anniversary day at Fisher's Market and Grocery, and the event will be marked by a two-day sales festival featuring a big list of special values plus give-aways and free coffee and cookies.

Forty families are going to gain from this observance of Fisher's fortieth birthday. Forty bushels of groceries will be given to as many winners in a drawing to be held Saturday afternoon. Registration for it has been in progress for two weeks and will continue up to the drawing. In addition coffee and cookies will be served both days.

Fisher's store got its start on St. Patrick's Day, 1927, as Joe and John Fisher, the present owners, were joined by Walter Pulte in opening a meat market in the location now occupied by one of the vaults of the NTPA milk plant. Another meat market was operated here at the time, but there was room for more business. Muenster was buzzing with the boom that followed discovery of oil in 1926.

They continued in that location for 14 months before moving to their next location, which they occupied for 34 years before moving to their present supermarket on August 13, 1962.

Until 1933 the business continued exclusively as a market, except that bread was added as an extra item. By then the oil boom had fizzled and the depression had arrived. Business was getting slim. Also at that time grocery stores were installing meat departments.

Jaycees Set Up 4 Litter Barrels

Credit for another effort to reduce local littering goes to the Muenster Jaycees this week. They have just installed four trash barrels, good looking and sturdy, at strategic spots on Main Street and the highway.

The barrels are painted white and mounted on a heavy frame in a tilted position for more convenience in making deposits. The units are very similar to those used by the highway department.

The four barrels are set up at three locations. Two are in the area of the curve of FM 373 just north of town, one is at city limit on North Main and one is at the intersection of Highway 82 and Mesquite Street.

The Jaycees are also participating in another de-littering project. They share with the city in the cost of regular trash pickups by Fred Hennigan on Main Street and Highway 82.

With the trash barrel installations Jaycees make a special request. "Please quit throwing litter out of cars. Just hold it a few moments and stash it in one of the convenient trash barrels."

Center Team Wins Trophy at Nocona V'Ball Tournament

Two Muenster teams, the Center and the VIP's, fought it out for the consolation trophy in the ladies division of Saint Jo's invitation tournament last Saturday night — and the Center won.

In prior games VIP lost to Russell Newman of Saint Jo and beat Russell Newman of Pilot Point. The Center lost to Bowie Independents and beat O'Neal of Nocona.

Six other Muenster teams were also in the tournament: Sacred Heart Tigettes in the ladies division and Muenster Mill, SH Tigers, SH Tiger B, SH Alumni and the Center in the men's division.

Big winner was Lindsay Presto-Lite. It beat Molloy of Chico in the champ final. Molloy Pump got the runner up trophy. Other trophy winners were Greenwood Zips champs and Decatur Independents runner up in the ladies division and O'Neal's of Nocona, consolation in the men's division.

Three Muenster teams are in a Sanger tournament this week. Center ladies lost their opener and are in the consolation bracket. Muenster Mill and Center men both won their games and got in the champ bracket.

So the Fishers decided to add a grocery department.

That's when grocery stores were still fairly simple. The floor space of less than 1000 square feet was enough for an adequate stock. But their stock grew and the list of grocery items increased until they were cramped in 1940. Storage space was then converted to store space, doubling the store's area.

For the next twenty years that space gradually became crowded with the growing variety of products and package sizes and addition of non-grocery items. In 1962 the Fishers bought their present location from Wilde Chevrolet, remodeled the 50x100 building and added a 30x40 warehouse. The result is their present modern supermarket.

Since then their original line has again become their principal line. The Fishers' slaughter an average of 12 to 15 head of cattle a week, sell some of the meat over the counter and process most of it for home freezers. They are furnishing frozen meat for a big percentage of local people and many outside the community.

Probably their best known product is Fisher's pork sausage, made the old fashioned way and hickory smoked. They sell an average of 1,000 pounds a month, much of it going outside the community and state. The volume runs twice as high during the Christmas season.

A vital part of Fisher's store is its slaughter house on the Joe Fisher Sr. farm, about two miles south of town. The Fishers did their own slaughtering from the beginning, and they improved those facilities as they did the business. Their present operation includes electric hoists, saw, skinning knife and other equipment and packing house standards of sanitation.

The store's personnel list has kept pace with its growth. It has six full time workers: John and Joe Fisher, Mrs. Joe Fisher, Mrs. Dick Dittfurth, Francis Fisher and Lambert Walterscheid. And it has six part time helpers: Robert and Gary Fisher, Bobby Bruns, Mrs. James Walterscheid and Misses Rosemary Fisher and Rita Trubenbach.

GREATNESS OF AMERICA

This Lenten season seems an appropriate time for printing here a quote from that eloquent historian of the last century, the Frenchman Alexis de Tocqueville. Time was when his classic "Democracy in America," was required reading in high school. We hope it still is. "I sought," wrote de Tocqueville, "for the greatness and genius of America in her fertile fields and moundless forests; it was not there. I sought for it in her free schools and her institutions of learning; it was not there. I sought for it in her matchless constitution and democratic congress; it was not there. Not until I went to the churches of America and found them aflame for righteousness did I understand the greatness of America. America is good because America is good. When America ceases to be good, America will cease to be great."

It has been more than a century-and-a-quarter since those observations were reported to the French nation. Perhaps it will be useful to reflect upon them as the most joyous day on the Christian calendar approaches.

One would like to read what de Tocqueville would write after seeing the Americans today who chant the "God is dead," theme. Our own experience has been that it took some really hard thinking to remember in Whose image it was that man was created.

Historian de Tocqueville had something more to say about Americans.

"They have all a lively faith in the perfectibility of man, they judge that the diffusion of knowledge must necessarily be advantageous, and the consequences of ignorance fatal; they all consider society as a body in a state of improvement, humanity as a changing scene, in which nothing is, or ought to be, permanent; and they admit that what appears to them today to be good may be superseded by something better tomorrow... It is strange to see with what feverish ardor the Americans pursue their own welfare, and to watch the vague dread that constantly torments them lest they should not have chosen the shortest path which may lead to it."

If the flame of America's greatness was in its churches a century-and-a-quarter ago, perhaps it is still there today. The Easter season of redemption would be a good time to go and find out.

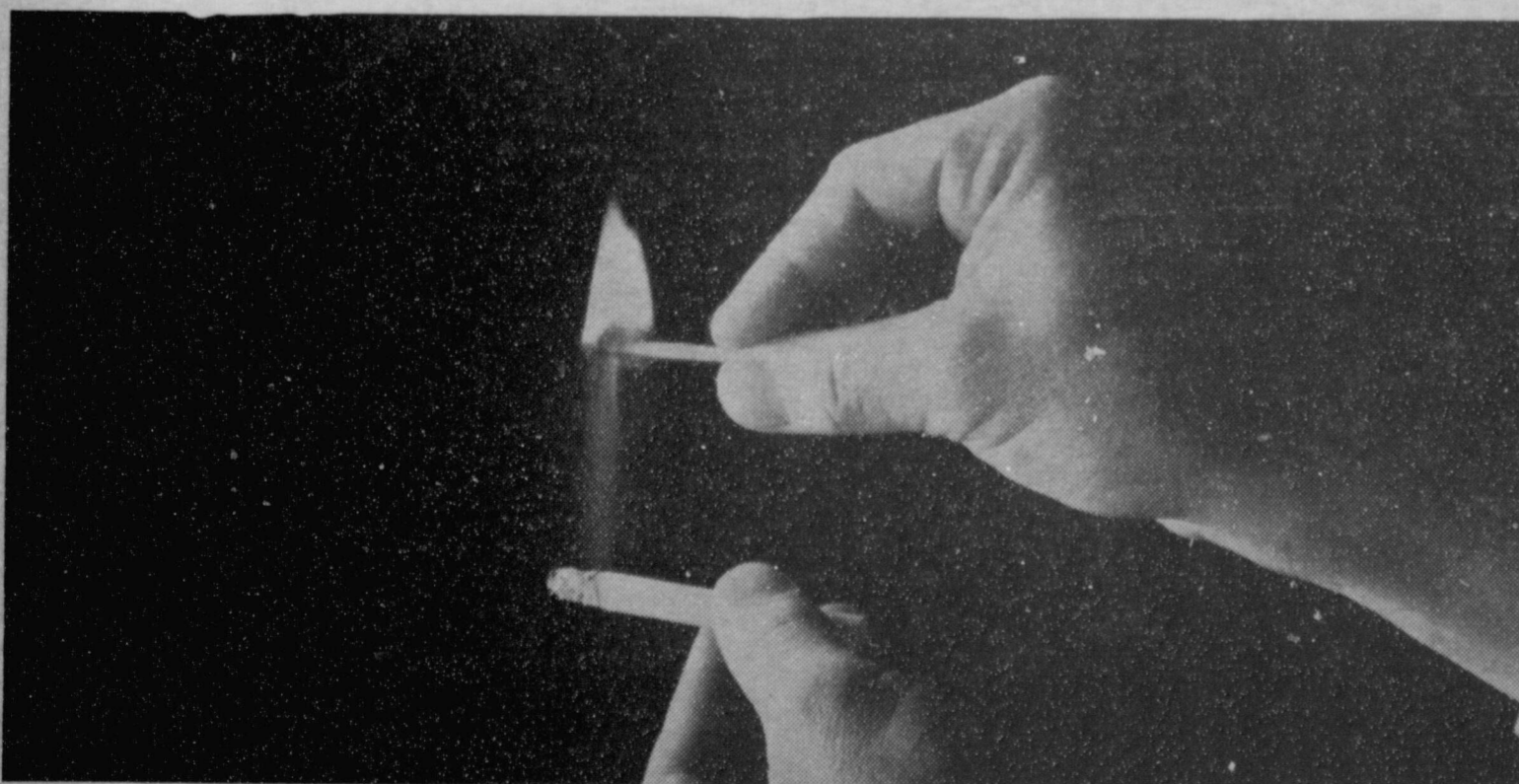

A BILL
To be entitled
AN ACT to amend Chapter 477 of the 59th Legislature, Regular Session, 1965, by adding new sections to permit the Directors to adopt a new fiscal year and providing a hearing on the budget in conformity with such new fiscal year; and declaring an emergency.
BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

SECTION 1: That Chapter 477, Acts of the 59th Legislature, Regular Session, 1965, be amended and the same is hereby amended by adding thereto a new section to be known as "Section 6(a)" which said section shall read as follows: "Section 6 (a): The Board of Directors of the District by majority vote may, from time to time, adopt a fiscal budget year other than the one specified in Section 6 after making a finding that such new fiscal year would be in conformity with the reporting or accounting requirements of any state or federal agency."

SECTION 2: That Chapter 477, Acts of the 59th Legislature, Regular Session, 1965, be amended and the same is hereby amended by adding thereto a new section to be known as "Section 6 (b)" which said section shall read as follows: "Section 6 (b): In event a new fiscal year is adopted under the provisions of Section 6 (a) of this Act, notice of the public hearing (required by Section 10 of this law) on the adoption of a proposed budget shall be given at least thirty (30) days prior to the beginning of the fiscal or budget year the budget is to cover."

SECTION 3: The fact that under Medicare reports are required to be filed with the administering agency on the basis of the year ending June 30th of each year, and the further fact that the Hospital District is now required to prepare two audits by reason of these new regulations creates an emergency and an imperative public necessity that the Constitutional rule requiring bills to be read on three several days be suspended, and said rule is hereby suspended, and that this Act shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage, and it is so enacted.
