principles of communism but favors the realistic solution which admits that reds are in Vietnam and therefore are entitled to full consideration not only in peace negotiation but also in the formation of a coalition government. The man also says that it is time for the United States to recognize Red China diplomatically and to abandon Nationalist China.

Urban renewal and other federal programs are major causes of despondency and decay among the very people the projects are supposed to help, members of the United States Commission on Civil Rights said at a recent meeting in Cleveland, Ohio.
