Ed Remenyi knows where he fits in. Sometimes it takes a catastrophe for persons to find their place in the world. Let us hope that restless students do not have to go through what the Remenyi family did to find the U.S.A. is a pretty good place to fit into and to help perpetuate.

In the bottom right-hand corner of the ad is a coupon for ordering the encyclopedia of benefits. "Only \$2.65 for 3 months ... or send the full price, \$7.96 and get FREE a fabulous treasure map of U.S. Government Benefits."

This big new book will "tell you exactly how to get your full share. How in increase your spending money 20 per-

cent, even 100 percent each week! How the U.S. Government stands ready to help make your dreams come true: Help get your dream home — College for your children — Travel and Adventure abroad free! Security! Free land! Wonderful vacations! Business loans! Luxuries! And Much, Much MORE!"

It'd tell you more, but I must get this coupon off in the mail. See you next week in Acapulco — or some such dreamy place. Courtesy of the U. S. Government, of course.

DOUBLE STANDARD ON U.S. PAYROLL

It is salt in the taxpayer's wounds to mention the congressional payroll. By this is meant not alone the salaries of the membership, but the total spent on all congressional hired hands, from page boys and typists to such lofty personnel as head doorkeepers and sergeants-at-arms. Let none look askance at such a description of these functionaries. The top salary in these positions is for parliamentarians — whose skills may warrant it — is \$28,500 a year. That seems lofty enough to the average wage earner, not to mention a goodly number of business and professional men.

Congressional generosity does not end there. Chaplains whose only duty is to prepare and deliver a prayer to open each day's sessions in House and Senate receive more than \$15,000 annually. Though no one would be so crass as to calculate this at hourly rates, it can be seen that Congress does not stint. This impression is reinforced by word that even the clerks who call the roll and intone the titles of bills get a tidy \$19,000 to keep body and soul together.

Every now and again, some aspect of this congressional largesse goads a member to cry shame. The latest to do so is Sen. Pastore of Rhode Island. Though he couched his objections in terms that some might consider partisan — he chided his colleagues for demanding budget cuts even while fattening their own payrolls — the gist of his complaint is valid without regard to partisanship.

Over the past decade, payrolls have risen 81 percent in the Senate and 84 percent in the House. Further increases have just been made, though there is much talk in Con-

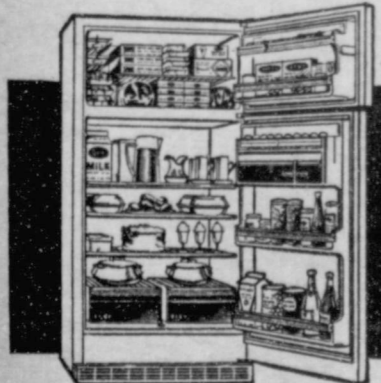

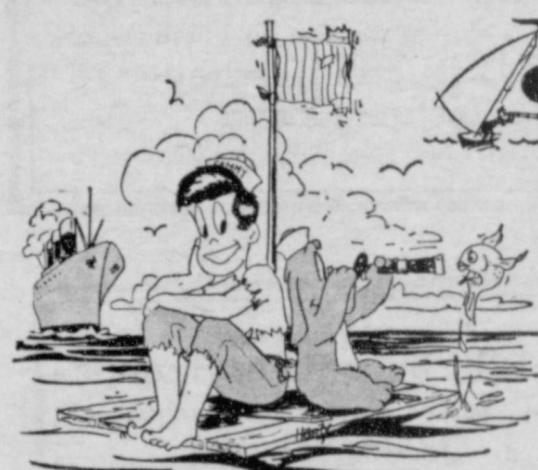

Pictures were made and a musical program was presented by Aaron Wilburn, vocalist, accompanied by his sister, Susie, pianist.

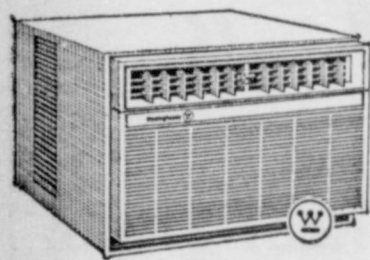

**State Tax on
Property May End**

The proposed constitutional amendment to phase out bulk of the state's 47 cents per \$100 valuation property tax levy by 1977 is near legislative approval.

Senate has passed it and the House Constitutional Amendment Committee has recommended it. Proposal would go to the voters in November, 1968.

If measure is approved, all but 10 cents of the state ad valorem tax (that which is earmarked for state college construction) would be wiped out by December 31, 1976.

While this may be cheering news to property owners, it must be noted that the \$47,900,000 in revenue must be made up from other sources.

Drivers can help reduce the number of automobile thefts by taking a few precautions, according to Oil Facts.

The recommended steps include removing keys from the ignition and locking doors when parking; using well-lighted and well-traveled parking areas when possible; and putting items of value out of sight in locked car trunks.

Federal Bureau of Investigation reports show that of the more than 500,000 cars stolen in 1966, about 80 per cent were unlocked and 40 per cent had the key in the ignition.

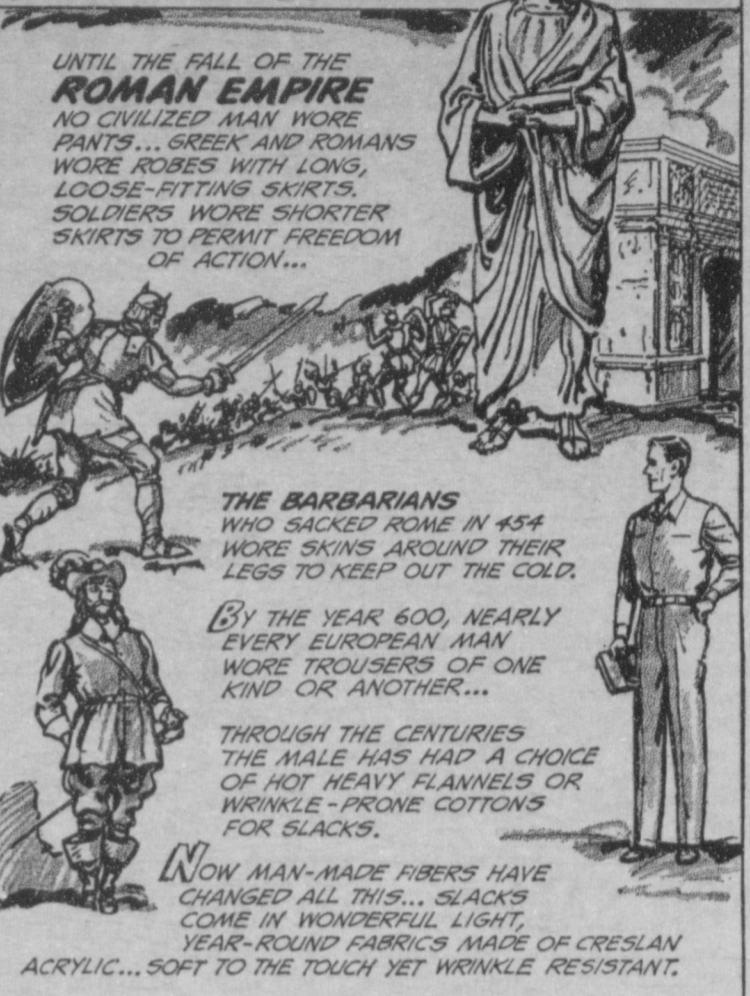

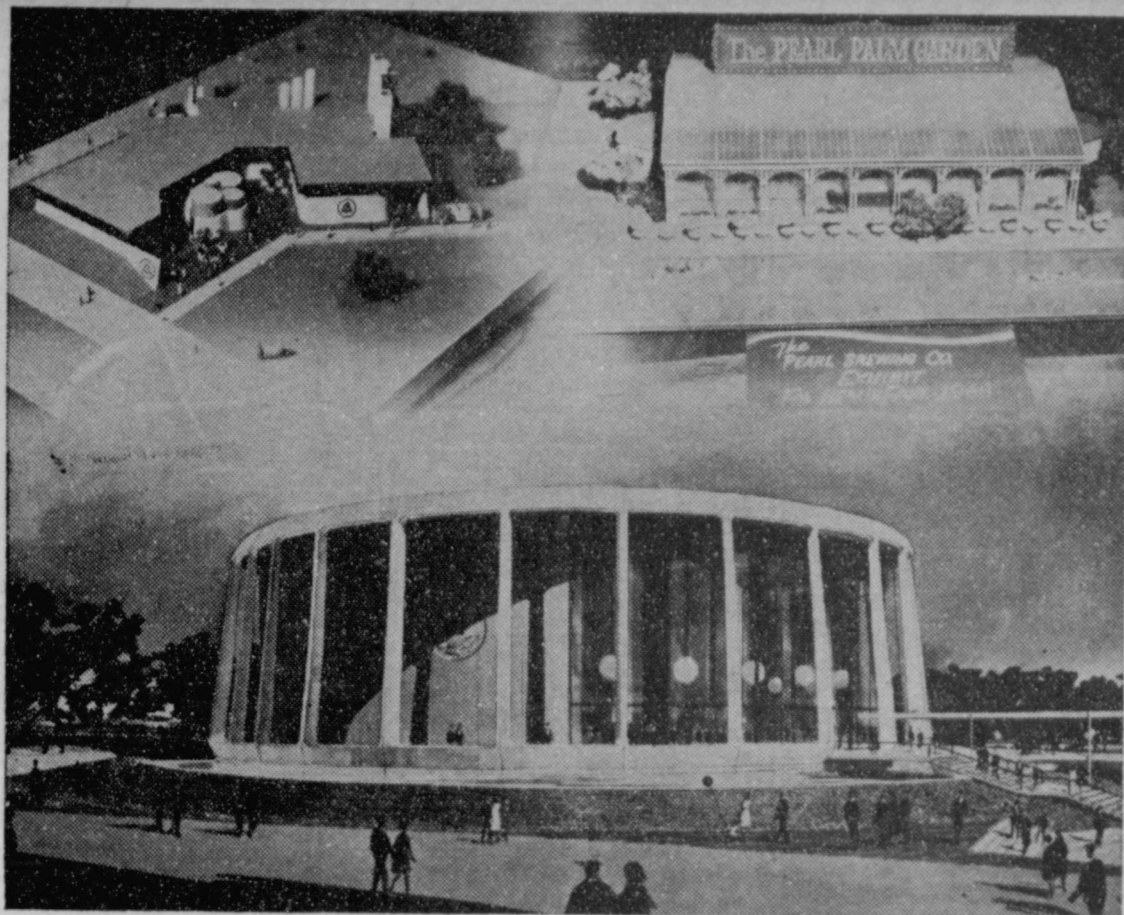

Health Service Okays State Wide Vaccination Plan

AUSTIN — Approval of a \$315,659 Public Health Service grant to Texas for a state-wide immunization project has been announced by Dr. J. E. Peavy, State Health Commissioner.

The funds will be used to wage immunization campaigns in cooperation with local health departments and medical societies against measles, polio, diphtheria, tetanus and whooping cough, Dr. Peavy said.

The project will last until April 30, 1968. An additional year has been tentatively founded with \$325,000 for a continuation of the project, Dr. Peavy added, and a supplemental budget of \$35,775 for polio vaccine for use this year has also been requested.

Texas has an estimated 1,550,000 preschool children, with 40 percent of these, or 620,000 believed susceptible to measles; and at least 30 percent, or 465,000, are susceptible to polio.

There are no state laws requiring immunization for entry into elementary schools, such requirements being matters of local school board option. Most school systems do recommend and many require diphtheria and smallpox immunization prior to school entry. In many areas polio and measles inoculations are also recommended.

At present immunizations are provided through 64 health departments located throughout the state, and covering about 75% of the population, the health commissioner reported. He said these are administered through various types of clinics using diphtheria, tetanus and pertussis vaccines manufactured in the State Health Department laboratories.

Polio and measles vaccines are purchased from commercial outlets, he said.

"Health departments, with cooperation from private physicians, have actively promoted immunizations in the past among the preschool and school-age population," Dr. Peavy said, "but, many preschool children are not being reached by the usual and customary procedures."

The current state plan to make 1967 the "measles eradication year" coincides with a national project urged by President Lyndon Johnson and already outlined by U. S. Surgeon General William Stewart.

"We hope that by the end of 1967 a case of measles will be a thing of rarity," Dr. Peavy said.

The commissioner said steps will also be taken to organize intensive polio campaigns in certain areas of greatest need—or, those counties with one or more reported cases during the past two years. These campaigns will be conducted in cooperation with local health departments and county medical societies in the state, he indicated.

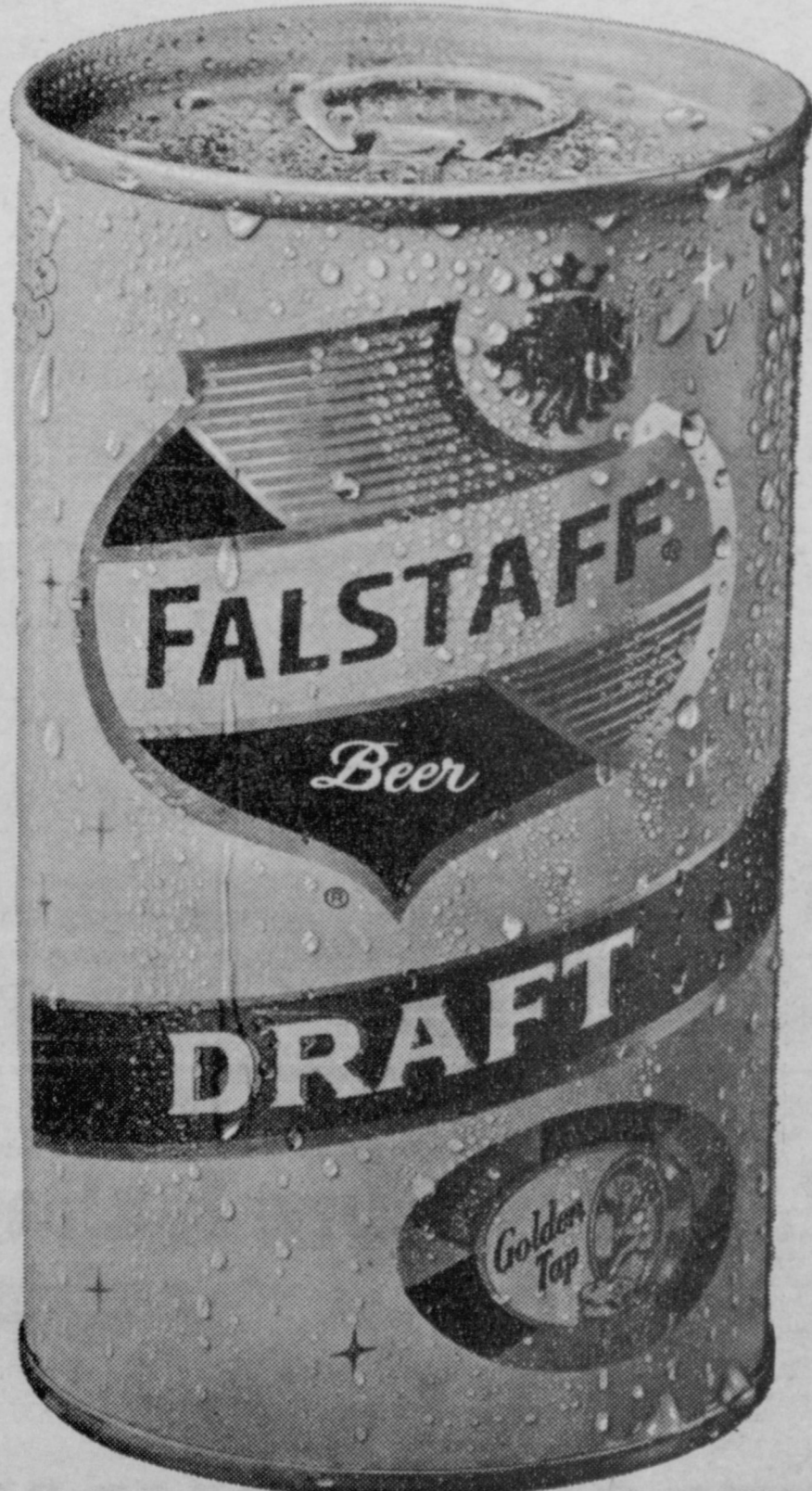

Lone Star Gas Accepts Bids for 30 Inch Pipeline

Lone Star Gas Company this week accepted bids from three Texas companies for construction of a 219-mile natural gas pipeline inter-connecting Dallas with Katy Gas Field near Houston, according to T. J. Skrabanek, vice-president of the utility's Transmission Division.

Skrabanek said that construction in four sections of the 30-inch gas pipeline will begin June 15 with all segments interconnecting and ready for gas delivery by October 1. An October 1 completion date will allow the utility to bring gas to Lone Star's distribution system for the 1967-68 heating season.

The utility's latest transmission pipeline will supply part of the energy needs of the Dallas Metropolitan Area. Gas purchase contracts finalized earlier this year will allow Lone Star to utilize more than 1.6 trillion cubic feet of natural gas reserves in the Katy Gas Field during the next 20 years.

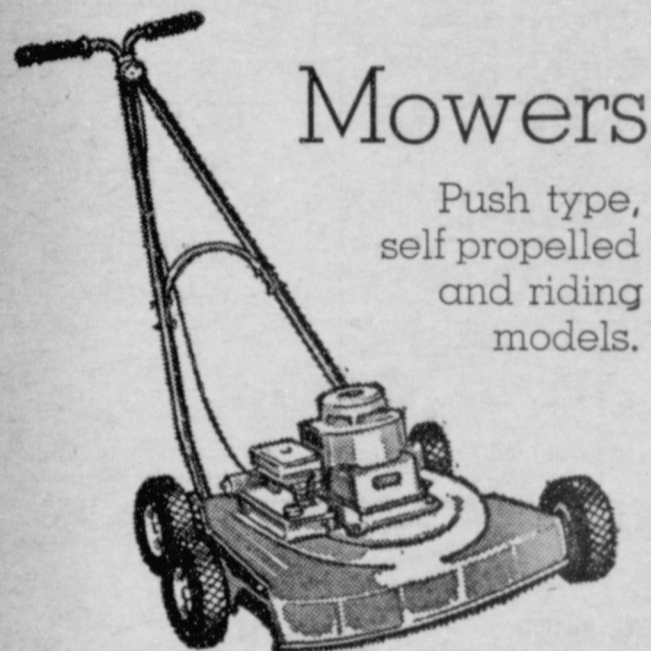

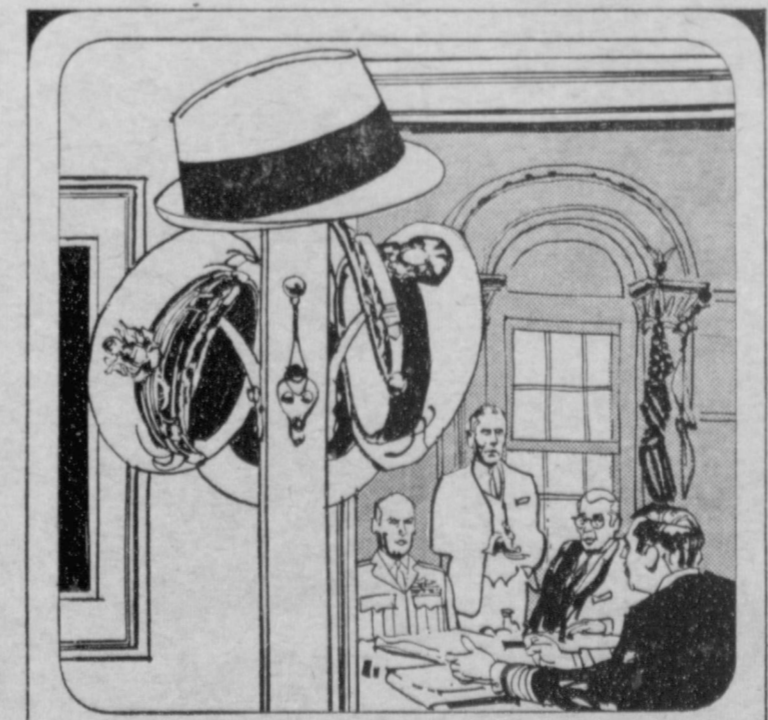
Father Bertin Roll's recording for the month was on the Corporal Work of Mercy to clothe the naked.

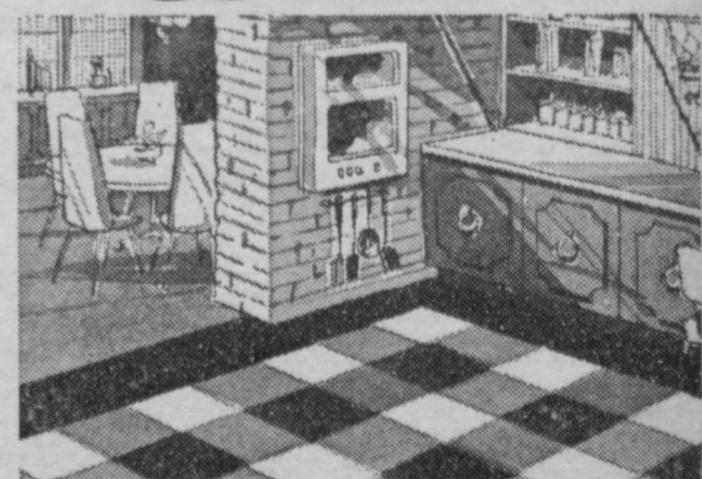

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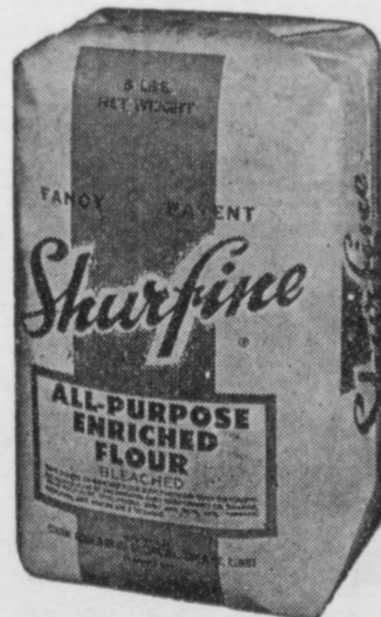
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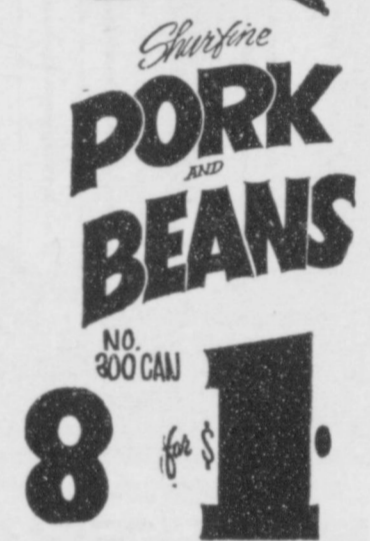
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
