Investigations of riots are just getting started on Capitol Hill and already the legislators are getting some eye openers. The riots are not just spontaneous outbreaks of built-up resement by the underprivileged as we have been told so often. Rather they are well planned skirmishes in a war on capitalism, inspired by the world wide enemy of freedom.

When the time comes to have a riot, a sparking incident is set off and in minutes the mobs are in action with their rifles, fire bombs, etc. As one veteran police officer told the investigating committee, violence cannot build up that fast. The only explanation is that it was organized before the incident.

It's not just a coincidence that mob violence in a city follows the appearance of rabble rousers like Stokely Carmichael and Rap Brown. These fellows are experts in trouble making and their activity is a lot more extensive than "Black Power" harangues of spewing hatred. It also includes the strategy of guerrilla attack, as was threatened by no less a scoundrel than Fidel Castro.

Carmichael removed any possible doubt on that matter when he went to Havana for Castro's big pow wow with the top communists of Latin America. While there he revealed his intentions and affiliations even more clearly by bragging that black power guerrillas are being organized in the US to "bring the collapse of capitalism and imperialism." From what he said and what has already happened thinking people are compelled to believe that red training cadres are well advanced in their work and thousands of fanatics await their orders start the war.

One can well imagine his reaction upon finding file after file and case after case in which the CIA was secretely investing staggering sums of money in individuals, institutions and organizations which were openly hostile to US policy, foreign and domestic.
