fight with all that's needed to win. At first glance that seems to invite the treachery we've experienced a few times before — unless enemy buildup is regarded as renewed hostility and subject to immediate cancellation of the deal.

The real merit of Symington's suggestion is that it rules out the frustrating half effort we have had to date. Either we quit on the best terms we can get or we finish the job and make the enemy quit on our terms.

Even so, it's hard to see how the first alternative will solve the real problem. Just quitting and allowing North Vietnam to repeat its aggression as soon as our troops are gone leaves the trouble as it was at

the start. The real solution, it seems to defeat the aggressor. That means helping South Vietnamese occupy the North and kick out the reds. After all, why should we now change the ways of history? It used to be that a ruler who grabbed at another's property took the risk of losing his. Why should the custom be changed to favor Ho Chi Minh?
