



37 MILLION BOMBS

It is ironic that one of the leading exports of the antireligious government of Communist Poland is Christmas tree ornaments. These gayly painted bulbs are called "bombki," which is the Polish word for ornament. And Poland exports something like 50 million of the Christmas tree bombs each year, about threefourths of that total to the U. S. Stores across the county have been flooded with the pretty bulbs of blown glass.

It will be even more ironic if some of these decorative bombs come to hang on the branches of a tree decorated by some child whose Daddy fell victim to a polish-supplied weapon in Vietnam - a weapon subsidized by the purchase of the pretty pieces of glass.
Of course the Communist

made ornaments can compete with those made in the United States or West Germany, for example, because of the price The Polish worker who makes them earns a miserable \$87 a month, on the average. It seems probable that most Americans who buy the Polishmade ornaments make more than that in a week.

Meantime, Polish hams are being advertised widely, at least in the Eastern part of the United States, and it will come to pass in many homes that the family will bow for Grace before a Christmas dinner of ham from Communist Poland. Some will do so unknowingly, simply having failed to inspect can labels.

Our legislators insist on protecting us by warning statements on packages of cigarettes and lables on the bottles we buy. But who will speak out to stop this flow of slavemade goods into our homes, and the return flow of capital

bune. It speaks for itself. "Instead of rioting and destroying property, American Negroes should recite this prayer daily: God bless America for treating us Negroes so well. No other country in the world offers us so much. God bless the white people who brought us to this country where, as slaves, we were much better housed and clothed than our kindered left in

"Thank God we do not live in an all-Negro country like Haiti! Thanks to the white people who have given us what civilization we have, and their patience in trying to educate us and teach us things we're unable to learn.

"Thank God for these welfare checks. With 11 percent of the people in America, we get half of the welfare money, even though whites out-number us 3 to 1. We have more than our share of high-salaried athletes because of open competition and in areas where we are unable to compete with white people special rules are made to give us jobs that we are not qualified for.

"God, thank the white people who give us an alibi for our terrible crime rate which is five times as high as that of the white people. America is our home - we have no other place to go to. Santa Treats Tots At VFW Auxiliary Christmas Party





#### Driving Tips Tell How to Get More Gasoline Mileage

With products like ordinary spring water and household vinegar selling for about 50c and \$1.25 a gallon, respectively, gasoline is a buy. Tax excluded, in fact, gasoline averages only 22½c a gallon, about the same is it did 10 years ago.

It's no bargain for you, though, if fuel is being wasted in your car and if, in the wasting process, there is damage to the car's system. More maintenance problems ... more repair bills ... ultimately, much less value than your car could be worth in a sale or

How can you get maximum mileage from your gasoline, increase your car's life expect-ancy, and, all in all, save a substantial amount of money every year? Be diligent, says the American Oil Company, in following these driving tips:

1. Avoid jackrabbit starts, jerky driving, sudden hardbraking stops. The first two habits entail pumping the accelerator, which causes excess gasoline to spurt into the carburetor. The fuel can't possibly mix properly with the air coming into the carburetor; some of the gasoline consequently, doesn't burn. Cutting in and out of traffic is another bad, gasoline-gulping habit.

2. Travel at moderate speeds relatively speaking. It takes up to 50 per cent more gasoline to average 75 miles an hour, for example, than it does to drive steadily at 50 miles an

3. If you commute or travel regularly between other points around town, choose the route with the least traffic, stop signs, and lights, Stop-and-go driving reduces miles per gallon considerably. Although you probably can't avoid all red lights, you can still drive smoothly, slowing well in advance of an intersection whereever possible, but continuing to roll while waiting for the light to change. Starting form a dead stop can use four to nine times the gasoline as simply slowing while you wait.

4. Turn off the ignition when you know you'll be waiting more than just a few minutes in the car. It costs less to restart your engine than to let it idle that long.

## Here's Where It

The record snowfall for a calendar month occurred at Tamarack, Calif., which got 390 inches during January, 1911, according to World Book Encyclopedia. In the same year a record depth of snow accumulated at Tamarack, where 454 inches covered the ground.

The all-time U.S. record for snowfall in one season was set from July, 1955, to June, 1956, when 1,000.3 inches of snow fell at the 5,500-foot level of Mount Rainier, Wash. Be glad you don't live there.

All these figures are records, and therefore unusual. But individual snowfalls of 30 inches are not unusual at all. In the hills southeast of Lake Erie and Lake Ontario, the average winter snowfall is more than 150 inches. Erie, Pa. on the southeast shore of Lake Erie, was burried by a 17-inch snowfall on Thanksgiving Day, 1956. Be glad you don't live there, either.

But no matter where you live, there are few spots in the United States which never get snow. For instance, snow fell as far south as Lakeland, Fla., near St. Petersburg, in January, 1958.



Few names are more widely associated with Christmas than that of Charles Dickens, whose memorable Christmas stories have endeared him to millions.

One of Dickens' greatest and least-known works was written especially for his own children. It was called "The Life of the Lord." Dickens left instructions that his work not be commercialized, and it was never publicized until some 100 years after his own death, and the death of his youngest child, Sir Henry Fielding Dickens.

"Everybody ought to know about Him. No one ever lived who was so good, so kind, so gentle, and so sorry for people who did wrong or were in any way ill and miserable,

"And as He is known in Heaven, where we all hope to go, and all meet each other after we are dead, and there be happy always together, you can never think what a good place Heaven is, without knowing who He was and what

This year, as usual, and perhaps even more so, a review of the news calls attention to many interesting happenings. Some were sensational, some were sad, some reflected the continued growth and progress of the community.

Nationwide attention was focused on Muenster by the deluge of publicity in the fabulous Medders career built on millions of dollars in borrowed money and credit and ended by a colossal bankrupt auction - with the showplace farm and mansion apparently being retained as a homestead.

More important to most Muenster people, and to many others of North Texas, was the tragic death of Dr. Hejduk by carbon monoxide poisoning. He was a great man in knowledge, skill and kindness. He left a big vacancy in the com-

It's been an eventful year for the school district. Property owners avoided valuation increases by voting a rate increase. Division of the dormant Myra district added a sizeable area to Muenster. Enrollment increase required addition of two new buildings. Combined enrollment of the two local schools was 749

A city census showed a gain of 185 since 1960 for a present count of 1375.

As usual, death struck in all age brackets, however, the loss of pioneer citizens was especially high. All but a few of the 25 funerals in Sacred Heart Church were old timers.

Two construction projects, the Valeron factory and four lane road east of town are welcomed as important progress. Also notable are the growth of Jr. Elite dress factory and the coming of Cable TV. And new home construction continues at the usual pace.
