To get the record straight and correct a boner in last week's article about the proposed city sales tax; it is not true that the estimated revenue of \$9,000, if raised by ad valorem tax, would require a 100 per cent increase of tax charges.

Actually, the city's annual revenue from property tax is slightly over \$25,400 and the total sewer fees are about \$8500. So, to raise as much money as the sales tax is expected to yield would require over one third increase in property tax charges or more than 100 per cent increase in sewer use charges.

Those figures present the most important facts relative to this city's sales tax issue. Our people face an imperative sewer improvement project, required by increasingly rigid anti pollution standards. The cost of that is estimated at \$90,000, which is \$65,000 more than the city has on hand. And that presents a problem of how to raise the needed funds. Should it be by increasing the property tax or the sewer charge or a combination of two or three of the methods? Or should the city adopt a one per cent sales tax?

Councilmen decided that the latter method is the best and ordered an election in which the people of town can express their wish.

Pros and cons of the city sales tax have been kicked around a lot during the several months that it was permitted by state law. The fact that it has been adopted by more than 150 cities while being turned down by less than 20 indicates very definitely that most people favor it. It is significant too that most cities adopted it by a strong majority.

Several appealing features account for its popularity. It departs from the old custom of piling an additional burden on property owners and shifts the burden to spenders. Furthermore it applies more to luxuries and less to necessities. Poor folks whose spending is limited principally to groceries, utilities, rent and medicines will pay little if any tax. On the other hand the more affluent people, who buy many things besides the bare essentials, will find themselves paying considerably more. Because of its exemption of necessities the sales tax is generally regarded as one of the fairest of all taxes.

Convenience of applying it is another appealing feature. There are no new regulations, no red tape. Just a matter of increasing the present sales tax rate by one percent. Stores remit 3 per cent to the state comptroller rather than 2 per cent, and he sends the city its one third, less a 2 per cent collection fee. It's easy and inexpensive.

An objection is that it taxes some people who are not residents of the city. For instance, farmers. A point to consider in this regard is that a sales tax here would be more fair than unfair. Facilities and services like streets, parks, swim pool, fire protection, etc., are customarily used by farmers and a small tax for their use would be proper. About the only rural help to the city hereabouts is the county's remittance of \$1,000 a year to the fire department—of which, in the first place, about half is paid by city taxpayers.

Statewide Drive Starts to Promote Voter Registration

This week marked the opening of a statewide newspaper campaign organized by Secretary of State John L. Hill to promote voter registration in Texas. One feature of the registration drive is the publication of an application form which voters may cut out and mail to the county tax assessor-collector, who acts as the registrar of voters. The form is printed on page 4 of today's paper, and publication will be repeated each week during January. The deadline for registration is January 31.

Hill has organized the registration drive in his capacity as chief election officer of the state, a title which the Texas legislature conferred on the Secretary of State last year, along with placing upon him important new responsibilities in the administration of the state's election laws. In commenting on the drive, Hill said that one of his purposes is to publicize new laws affecting voting rights, which otherwise might go unnoticed by the average citizen.

One of the new laws in 1967 makes registration necessary, for the first time in Texas history, for persons over 60 years old who live in rural communities and towns under ten thousand population. Heretofore, persons over 60 were required to register only if they lived in a city having more than ten thousand inhabitants. Many tax assessor-collectors have expressed a fear that lack of information concerning this new requirement will bring about disfranchisement of many elderly voters through their failure to register.

In order to vote in statewide elections, a person must meet the following qualifications on the day of the election; he must be over 21 years old and must be a citizen of the United States; he must have resided in Texas for one year immediately preceding the election; and he must have registered for the voting year in which the election is held. In order to vote in local elections (county, school district, etc.), he must also have resided in the county for six months immediately preceding the election. Residence in the city for six months is required for voting in a city election.

A new law enacted in 1967 permits voters who move from one Texas county to another within the period of six months preceding an election to vote on statewide offices and issues if they have lived in the voter for a year. Formerly, a voter was totally disfranchised for a six-month period following removal to another county unless the county from which he moved was in the same congressional, legislative or judicial district as the county to which he moved. James Fuhrmann's Unit Named Best Awarded Citation

WRIGHTSTOWN, N. J. — Sergeant James D. Fuhrmann, son of Mr. and Mrs. Val Fuhrmann, is a member of a unit at McGuire AFB, N. J., which has been named as the best of its type in the Military Air Force Command (MAC).

The sergeant is a jet aircraft mechanic in the 612th Organizational Maintenance Squadron which was recently selected as the top maintenance unit in competition with all others in the command.

The unit was cited for its outstanding accomplishments in readying C-141 Starliner and C-135 Stratoliner aircraft for support of the Vietnam war and numerous airlift missions.

The 612th was a prime support organization for the recent 10,000-mile airlift of 101st Airborne Division units to Vietnam — the largest and longest aerial troop deployment in history.

In the deployment, MAC C-141s and C-133 Cargomasters airlifted units of the 101st — the famed Screaming Eagles — from Ft. Campbell, Ky., to Vietnam.

Dubbed Operation Eagle Thrust, the airlift involved more than 10,000 troops and some 5,000 tons of equipment. MAC aircrews from seven U.S. bases, including McGuire, took part in the giant airlift.

Muenster Bank's Deposits in 1967 Make Strong Gain

Deposits in Muenster State Bank increased by more than a third of a million dollars last year, and loans dropped by slightly more than \$5,000.

Those figures were indicated last week Friday in the statement of condition requested by the state banking commission. It called for a report as of December 29.

Deposits on that day were \$3,717,639.02, a gain of \$361,270.30 for the year and also a gain of \$163,116.76 since the previous statement of October 4.

In gaining, the local bank was keeping pace with the other three of the county. Combined deposits of all were \$26,052,437.51 for a twelve month gain of \$2,042,191.64.

The combined deposits set a new record for the quarterly reports of the four banks. The previous high was last October 4, when the total was about a half million less.

However Muenster does not share in the record. The local high was several years ago when the bank held substantial construction funds awaiting completion of the Muenster hospital.

Loans in the Muenster bank were reported as \$1,880,688.03, a drop of \$5,300.08 for the year and a gain of \$934.37 for the past quarter.

Combined loans of the four county banks were \$12,136,919.13, also a new high for the county and a gain of \$503,178.00 for the year.

Physics Students Simulate Explosion

An experiment on the "Conservation of Momentum" was performed recently by the physics class of Sacred Heart High with apparatus constructed by Father Andrew Wewer, OSB, last summer. The equipment performed marvelously, according to Sister Theresina, instructor, simulating an explosion by sending two carts — constructed from scratch by Father Andrew — in opposite directions after the release of a compressed exploder spring.

Father Andrew's homemade gyroscope also performed to order as it did the unbelievable — gyrating on a surface of a few millimeters although the gyroscope has a diameter of twenty inches and is quite heavy. Students standing on the very heavy platform found it a challenge to balance themselves holding the revolving gyroscope in various positions in their hands. It was fun while at the same time great laws of physics were enacted.

The latest equipment — an inclined plane — made for the science department came as a complete surprise. Again Father Andrew's skills are in evidence in the lab; in fact, the apparatus has a wood base to which a hinged plane is attached. The plane is provided with a bakelite pulley with cone bearings held in an adjustable clamp. There is also an angular indicator.

Father Andrew, who teaches shop, shop math and mechanical drawing, is a long-time math instructor and former physics teacher and is extremely skilled in making scientific equipment. Sincerest thanks of the science department and entire Sacred Heart School go to him.

Spanish Magazines And Records Aid SH High Classes

Fifteen freshmen and 14 sophomores enrolled in Spanish classes at Sacred Heart High hail their monthly magazines as a welcome relief from the more strenuous work of the text. Students enjoy "El Sol" (The Sun) and "Hoy Dia" (Nowadays) of the Scholastic Magazine series.

Spanish I has a record accompanying the magazine for the best possible opportunity for beginners to get pronunciation correctly. The recordings are made by natives of Spain.

A typical monthly number of Hoy Dia offers a biography of a well known person in the fields of art, music or sports, a story about a celebration of a feast in another land — Christmas in Argentina; Trafalgar, based on the novel by B. Perez Galdos in comic strip form, a science fiction story, a crossword puzzle, and a vocabulary. The magazines also feature pictures to go with the text.

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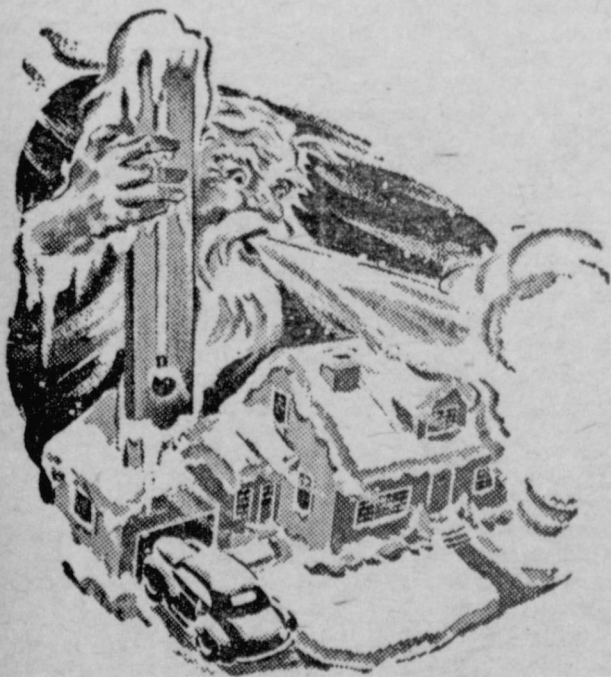

Students can follow drawings pointing out the location of the various parts at home as well as at school. At times interested members of the family, including the parents, more often of course younger sisters and brothers will eagerly partake in the dissection.

A last advantage, small but important, is that equipment comes back in top shape — dry, clean and in good condition. This is not always the case in class work when some 28 students try to clean up after a dissection.

Students who do not care to carry on dissections, and there are usually a few in any biology class, are given the equivalent amount of drawings to be made on the specimen for dissection.

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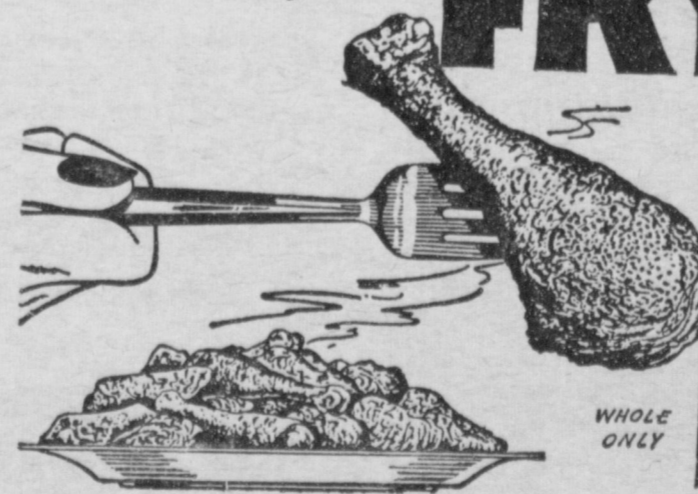

Voters Register

in 1966 authorized enactment of the new legislation. The Texas Election Code enumerates "idiots and lunatics, and all persons convicted of any felony except those restored to full citizenship and right of suffrage or pardoned" as classes of persons who are not qualified to vote. Texas voters must register annually. The 1968 voting year will begin on March 1, 1968, and will end on February 28, 1969. The registration period for the 1968 voting year began last October 1 and will end on January 31, 1968. Any citizen of Texas who now possesses the necessary qualifications for voting or who will attain them by February 28, 1968, may register during the current registration period. Except for three limited classes of voters, all persons wishing to vote at any time during the 1968 voting year must register by the January 31 deadline, even though they may not yet possess full qualifications for voting. The only registration permitted after January 31 is (1) by persons who move into Texas after October 1, 1967, (2) by persons who become 21 years old after January 31, 1968, and (3) by former aliens who are naturalized after January 31, 1968. The first and second classes may also register during the regular period. Registration certificates issued to persons not yet qualified to vote are

marked to show the date on which they will become qualified. Any person eligible to register may apply for registration by mailing an application form to the county tax assessor-collector of the county of his residence. Registration certificates will be mailed before the beginning of the voting year on March 1 to persons who apply by mail. Voters may also register by applying in person at the county tax assessor-collector's office or at a registration sub-station. The husband, wife, father, mother, son, or daughter of a voter may act as the voter's agent in applying for registration if the relative is a qualified voter in the same county. Except for these listed relatives, which do not include those related by marriage, no one may act as agent for another in applying for registration. Voters who have not already applied for registration are urged to cut out the application form which appears in this paper, fill in all the blanks, and mail it to the county tax assessor-collector without delay. For the information of families needing more than one application blank, this form will be printed on January 19 and 26 and other members of the family may use a form published at one of these later dates. Additional forms may also be obtained from the county tax assessor-collector.

"The donor sets the fair value of the item," he added. The amount is then deducted on the income tax form just as a regular gift of money to any recognized church or charity.

SECTION 1: That a special election shall be held in and throughout the City of Muenster, Texas, on the 3rd day of February, A.D. 1968, at which election there shall be submitted to the resident qualified voters of said City, for their action thereupon, the following propositions:

"FOR adoption of a one percent (1%) local sales and use tax within the city."

"AGAINST adoption of a one percent (1%) local sales and use tax within the city."

SECTION 2: That said election shall be held at one polling place for all qualified voters of said City of Muenster, and the polling place and officers for said election shall be as follows: At City Hall, 400 N. Main Street, in Muenster, Texas, and the presiding Judge shall be C. F. Goble and Lee Toothaker shall be Alternate Presiding Judge. The Presiding Judge at such election shall appoint _____ as clerks.

SECTION 3: That said election shall be held in accordance with the Constitution and laws of the State of Texas, and all duly qualified resident electors of the City of Muenster, Texas, shall be qualified to vote.

SECTION 4: That the ballots of said election shall conform to the requirements of Section 2, Sub-section C, of Article 1066c, Vernon's Texas Civil Statutes (Acts 1967, 60th Legislature, Regular Session, Chapter 36, Page 62, and to the requirements of Chapter 6 of the Election Code of the State of Texas, as amended, and the language to be printed thereon shall include the following:

(INSTRUCTIONS: Place an "X" in the space beside the statement indicating the way you wish to vote.)

() FOR adoption of a one percent (1%) local sales and use tax within the city.

() AGAINST adoption of a one percent (1%) local sales and use tax within the city. SECTION 5: That election judges and clerks are directed to comply with Article 6.06, Election Code of the State of Texas, as amended (Section 2 House Bill 181, Acts 1967, 60th Legislature, Regular Session, Chapter 452, Pages 1026, 1028), which provides that a space shall be placed beside each proposition in which the voter is instructed to place an "X" or other clear mark to indicate the way he wishes to vote; but which also provides that failure to a voter to mark his ballot in strict conformity with directions on the ballot shall not invalidate the ballot and the ballot shall be counted if the intention of the voter is clearly ascertainable, except where the law expressly prohibits the counting of the ballot. It is specifically provided that the election officers shall not refuse to count a ballot because of the voter's having marked his ballot by scratching out the statement of proposition for which he does not wish to vote.

SECTION 6: That notice of the election hereby ordered and called shall be given: (a) by publication on the same day of two successive weeks in a newspaper of general circulation published within said City of Muenster, the date of the first publication to be at least twenty one (21) days prior to the date set herein for such election; and (b) by posting of such notice at the polling place in the election precinct of the City of Muenster, Texas not less than twenty (20) days prior to the date set herein for such election. It is hereby found and determined that the MUESTER ENTERPRISE is a newspaper published within the City of Muenster, Cooke County, Texas, and a newspaper of general circulation within said City of Muenster.

SECTION 7: The terms and conditions of the provisions of this ordinance are declared to be an emergency, effecting the welfare, health and police protection of the citizens and therefore the rules or any rule requiring more than one reading before adoption of an Ordinance is hereby suspended, and this Ordinance shall be declared as adopted after one reading and passage by the affirmative vote of the Board of Aldermen of the City Council of the City of Muenster, Texas.

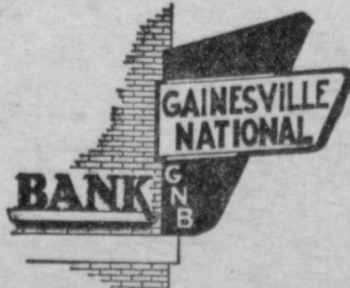
