Steve Moster, water and sanitation superintendent, said that official authorization to proceed with the job will follow Monday's report and the city is expected to advertise for bids within 15 days after it is received. Award of a contract is due 15 days after

The project being planned is an oxidation ditch, often rereferred to as the race track type of sewage treatment plant. As explained by Moster it is an addition for secondary treatment and does a more complete job of oxidizing than the present facilities. It meets the more rigid standards of purity demanded by anti-pollution regulations.

When the present plant was built it met the standards of the State Health Department. It has not lost any of its efficiency since then but requirements have been upped to a level it cannot reach. With the addition the plant's output should be better than the regulations call for.

Although none of the voters' answers to the three quesions will be binding, the isues do assure a high turnout of the more than 4,000,000 registered voters. 





#### LIVER ABSCESSES

#### An Invisible Tax On Cattlemen Every packing plant and many beef feedlots are constantly

battling to produce as many healthy livers and as few condemned livers as possible. Beef liver as a variety meat has become an important staple in the diet of Americans, and thanks to the efforts of feedlot operators, packers and U. S. government inspectors, more than 27 million premium quality livers are

processed annually Another 41/2 million livers, however, are condemned annually at slaughter, primarily because of a disease complex few cattlemen ever see evidence of-except in the packing plant. It is estimated that rumenitis, or liver abscess complex, causes more than half of all con-

demned livers. As one western packer recently commented, "Every liver we lose is a \$3.50 write-off for us, and if a feedlot shows a record of heavy losses, we in turn must dock subsequent cattle from the source. For us, liver condemnations are a very serious matter.

But, in addition to docking, cattlemen have found that ani-mals with liver abscesses are less economical gainers and take extra feed to make a pound of gain. Evidence to this effect was recently turned up in University of Illinois studies along with another important fact. Medication, at a level of 70 milligrams per head daily with a broad-spectrum antibiotic, such as Aureomycin, does an excellent job of reducing the incidence of abscesses. In previous studies, at Colorado State University, results with 1,895 animals showed that Aureomycin reduced condemnations for liver abscesses by 70 per cent.

Today some meat packers

such as Monfort Packing Company at Greeley, Colorado, ask feedlot operators from whom they buy to include an antibiotic such as Aureomycin in their feeds.

Today more and more meat packers are alerting cattle producers to the seriousness of the disease and of liver abscesses that mean a loss to the industry of 7 million dollars a year. One answer for cattlemen seems to be the use of continuous medication in the feed with a broad range antiobiotic such as Aureomycin. It will pay off in bigger profits at marketing.

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#### **Auto Corrosion Loss In Billions!**

DETROIT, MICHIGAN -The U.S. Department of Com-merce reports that corrosion loss in the United States is estimated at \$10-billion annually and, perhaps 50 per cent of this loss is in the automotive field. It appears this figure is on the rise

One of the contributing factors is 1968 vehicle body design. This, 'along with industrial fallout and air pollution, moist and salty coastal air, road chemicals, heated garages, snow and just plain water --the principal causes of rust and corrosion - points toward continuing rust problems for car and truck owners throughout the U.S.

Although auto companies spend millions of dollars each year on rust preventives, an estimated 30 per cent of all buyers still get additional after-market rust protection for their cars and trucks.

In the past few years, the manufacturers have stepped up their use of rust-inhibiting primers either with a spray application or dip. Use of galvanized steel, zinc and alum-inum coatings have also increased. But, body design, in itself, an ever-changing necessity, aggravates the problem as certain design features are conducive to corrosion.

Often those curving lines attractive to the eye lead to confined, poorly ventilated

areas in which moisture and dirt can accumulate. And, it is now an accepted fact that most rust begins from the inside, rather than from the outside as had been the popularly accepted theory. Salt, either from the air in

coastal regions or from deicing chemicals, has often been felt to be the principal culprit in speeding up rust destruction. However, recent studies, such as those conducted by the Ontario (Canada) Highway Department, are specifically reporting that "atmosphere pollution rather than salt is shaping up as the real villain in the rusting of automobiles

Over New York City alone, almost 600,000 tons of sulfur dioxide is in the air and a simple rain contributes to form dilute acid which accelerates the natural tendency of steel to rust. In fact, pure water itself has been found to be more corrosive than certain salt solutions.

Heated garages, where solid ice or snow on a vehicle is turned into a liquid state in the melting process, also are rust

inducing.

Besides the obvious liability to a vehicle's looks and resale value, auto rust also is becoming an increasing safety problem. The Society of Automotive Engineers (SAE) has stated that salt spray rapidly

deteriorates brake lines and steering apparatus, and some fleets report that 40 per cent of their brake lines are rust damaged after two years of service.

The auto industry's advances in surface rust protectives, costly salt additives now in use by certain municipalities, and undercoating which reaches only 12 per cent of a vehicle's rust problem areas are all attempts to solve the rust

Still another, and probably the most complete of the rustpreventing activities, is aftermarket rustproofing

One firm (Ziebart Process Corp. of Detroit) uses patented equipment and strategically located access holes to get to the critical inside areas of a vehicle, such as doors and body panels, which are coated with factory-engineered and government - proven rust - preventive sealant for guaranteed protec-




