Solemn services during Holy Week and Easter commemorated again the boundless love of the Son of God in atoning for the sins of mankind and giving every person the opportunity to become an heir of heaven. It is a beautiful, inspiring and thoroughly authenticated story which leaves no doubt in any open mind about the spiritual destiny of mankind.

As wonderful as it is, however, the story of salvation is only one side of Christ's magnificent life. It has been said that the way taught by Him, besides leading to eternal happiness, is also the best way of attaining temporal happiness. Wise men ever since His time have taught that mankind makes the most of this earthly existence when it strives to follow the rules He prescribed.

Actually, the Savior's precept was simple. He tells us to love God and love our neighbor, which is only a summary of the ten commandments given to Moses. In other words to know and appreciate what the Creator has done for us, and the need of living in harmony with His wishes to enjoy a well ordered life.

Nothing is more obvious than the fact that if people of the world, as individuals and as groups, seriously tried to please God they would also please each other.

Last week our national legislature passed the highly controversial civil rights law, the purpose of which is to assure that certain rights of a minority group will not be violated by the majority. Like other laws previously passed, it seeks to accomplish by force what should be accomplished by conscience and good will. Its greatest weakness is failure to remove the ill will which divides the two sides of the controversy. It faces the difficult and near impossible task of bringing harmony out of an atmosphere of antagonism. As stated so many times, morality can not be legislated.

It is time for our country to face reality. Legislating reform is only a second best way, a sort of necessary evil to compensate for a breakdown of conscience. The correct way was recommended by George Washington when he pointed out that religion is essential to just and stable government.

Our country could do much better if its people were guided by firm concepts of right and wrong rather than by coercive measures which only admit the absence of a proper attitude — and which bring mandatory solutions without improved attitudes.

What our people need most of all is a re-birth of old time religion, the kind which stresses personal duty and responsibility, and accountability to Almighty God for failure to live up to His commandments. We especially need to remove the modern heresy of excusing evil on the ground that a heartless but impersonal society is accountable for the sins of individuals.

Reform of society needs to come from two sides, each of which is made up of individuals realizing that they have personal obligations to live according to the Divine law. They must be convinced, as Scripture says, that God's grace is sufficient for every individual and the person who fails is accountable to Him. In civil rights issues as in many other matters, people need to search their own conscience instead of blaming others when judging the guilt for their own misdeeds.

George Washington had the right idea. Religion is fundamental. Stability in society is impossible without an awareness of duty to honor God and respect other people, along with accountability for failure to do so.

When will our nation come to the realization? That's a big question. Perhaps we'll have to go on a while longer in our blundering ways until brought to our knees by calamity of our own making. Perhaps, on the other hand, we'll see the light sooner and change before drifting into chaos.

A few simple fundamental facts should be clear to any intelligent person. This is God's world. He made all of us as well as the rules He expects us to live by. When we replace His rules by our own we make a mess of things. Acceptance of those facts is the first essential for an orderly personal life — and an orderly society.

City and Jaycees Work Together on Park Program

More improvements are under way at the Muenster City park as a joint venture of the city council and the Jaycees. When it is finished the park will have separate entrance and exit and will also have a big increase of picnic area.

Jaycees are clearing underbrush and unwanted trees. The city has build a culvert which solves a drainage problem and opens the way for the new driveway.

The improvements are at the east side of the park. The area formerly consisted of a meandering ditch with heavy underbrush. Now brush and surplus trees are gone and the ditch awaits a fill in. After that the entire area is to be sodded.

Drainage formerly carried by the branch is diverted through the culvert for a short cut to Elm Creek.

The new road will enter the park at the southeast corner and connect with the present driveway about 100 feet south of the swim pool. When finished the driveway will be one way with entrance at the south and exit at the north.

Another improvement since last summer is removal of several oil storage tanks by Alois Rohmer and Muntex Oil Co. from their former location near the swimming pool to the northeast area of the park. General appearance as well as location is vastly improved. They are neatly grouped, surrounded by sturdy railing and coated with aluminum paint.

Brucellosis Testing Here Starts Soon

The second stage of the Brucellosis eradication program in Cooke County is about to begin. County Agent Neil Tibbets announced this week that a meeting to organize it will be held next Monday night, the 22nd, at 8 p.m. in the TP&L building in Muenster.

This stage of the program is in the northwest part of the county which is the area west of Int. 35 and north of Hwy. 82. Stockmen of the area are urged to attend Monday's meeting and help set up a testing schedule. The southwest area's program has just been finished.

Head man at the meeting will be Dr. W. H. Horn, veterinarian in charge of the program in about 20 counties. He will answer questions and begin the area testing schedule.

The Brucellosis program is sponsored by the federal and state government to help stockmen eliminate the disease. It was adopted in Cooke County by vote of the stockmen.

Up to now, Tibbets said, the program is about 40 per cent complete in the county. County veterinarians as well as the program's testing crew are working on it. In the stage just starting here the purpose is to test all animals that are not already cleared. Particulars will be explained at Monday's meeting.

Tibbets added that dairy cattle, which are tested regularly, do not have to be tested in this program. However, dairymen who have found reactors are invited to have herds checked in the program.

The project will be an oxidation ditch, sometimes called the race track type of sewage treatment plant. Moster said it is an addition for secondary treatment and does a more complete job of oxidizing than the present facilities. It meets the more rigid standards of purity demand by anti-pollution regulations.

When the present plant was built it met the standards of the State Health Department. It has not lost any of its efficiency since then but requirements have been raised to a level is cannot reach. After the addition the plant's performance should exceed the new requirements.

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
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

TP&L to Dedicate System's Biggest Generating Plant

Texas Power & Light Company will formally dedicate its 550,000 - kilowatt Valley Generating Unit No. 2, located near Savoy in North Texas, Friday April 26.

United States Congressman Ray Roberts will deliver the dedicatory address to the invited guests. Included in the dedication ceremonies will be a luncheon and tour of the TP&L's Valley facilities.

Construction of Valley No. 2, the largest on the TP&L system, was begun in 1965 and it was placed in service in late 1967. It is located adjacent to the 125,000 kilowatt Valley No. 1 unit.

T. L. Austin, Jr., TP&L president, said the new unit represents "a continuing phase of our construction program which is designed to have at all times abundant power for all the needs of the area we serve. New generating facilities are planned as much as ten years ahead so that ample power will be always available to meet every requirement for electrical service."

The new unit at Valley will be tied into a 345,000-volt transmission line system which serves the TP&L area and extends from Houston to North Texas and west to the Permian Basin area of West Texas.

The unit is an outdoor-type generating unit and features the latest design in large steam electric generating equipment.

Electric power has been produced by Texas Power & Light at Valley since 1962 when Valley No. 1 was placed in service.

The new generating unit is part of a long-range growth plan by Texas Power & Light Company in which expenditures in 1968 and 1969 are expected to total about \$315 million.

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

Jamison, a seven term veteran of the Texas House of Representatives announced about three weeks before filing deadline that he would not seek re-election in our district.

"Before jumping into the race I sought advice and support of civic leaders in the two-county district and I found the results highly encouraging," the Democrat said. Concerning current issues, Sheppard says that he is "deeply concerned over falling prices and sharply rising farm expenses," and wants "to seek state legislation to remedy these circumstances."

Speaking of urban matters, Sheppard said that "one of the most serious problems facing Texans today is steadily increasing automobile insurance rates. I know personally that some people are now paying more for their insurance than they are for their cars. Something must be done."

And of academic advancements: "The future of Texas lies in the education of our youth. We must continually improve our educational opportunities, and to do this, we must have a practical increase in teachers' salaries so that our talented teachers will stay in the state."

"As a constructive Democrat," Sheppard continued, "I wish to help Texas move forward into an era of growth and leadership — I want to see Texas admired as a state which welcomes the future — I want our people to have constructive, personal representation in the House of Representatives."

Having been a candidate in 1962 for the State Senate in (ten county) District 22, Sheppard carried Denton County by a margin of two to one, but narrowly lost district-wide.

A native Texan, Sheppard has been a resident of Denton County for 20 years, a World War II veteran, attended North Texas State University - First Field, Government, a past Parent Teacher's Association president, a successful Businessman and Newspaper Publisher, a member of the Texas Press Association, belongs to the I.O.O.F., a life long Democrat and also, a relative of the late U.S. Senator Morris Sheppard.

Sheppard, 38, his wife, the former Jacqueline Chandler, and their five children, live at 922 Fort Worth Drive in Denton. The family are members of the First Methodist Church.

"I am covering Denton and Cooke Counties thoroughly in my campaign to show the voters clearly where I stand, and, prove without a doubt that I am qualified for this office," he concluded.

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
