## Jack Jones Is Precinct Four Commissioner

Jack P. Jones of Sivells Bend is the commissioner of Precinct 4 succeeding J. E. 'Earl' Robison who died of a heart attack on April 20.

The appointment of Jones was announced by County Judge William Carroll in a special meeting of the Commissioners court last week Thursday.

The appointment is effective for the remainder of this year. A special election to be held along with the November general election will determine Robison's successor for the unexpired two years of his term. Thereafter election of the commissioner will return to its regular schedule, which is the election year between general elections.

According to Judge Carroll, each political party may designate a candidate for the November ballot. Also non-partisan and independent candidates can have their names placed on the ballot upon submitting a petition with signatures equal to five per cent of the ballots cast in the precinct in the last governor's race.

Judge Carroll administered the oath of office to the new commissioner promptly after announcing his appointment.

Jones is 44 years old, a former deputy sheriff and recently, until the present appointment, a member of the Gainesville Police Department. He lives on a farm on the Sivells Bend road near Moss Lake.

Final rites for Charlie O. Cash, 78, of Gainesville were held at 10 a.m. from the Hillcrest Church of Christ and burial was at 1 p.m. in Duncan, Okla., Cemetery under direction of Vernie Keel Funeral Home.

Mr. Cash, father of Charles O. Cash of Muenster, died Sunday at 6:30 a.m. in Gainesville Hospital after being in declining health for several years. He was a native of Georgia and a retired oil field pumpjack.

Survivors include his wife, the one son, one daughter, seven grandchildren and three great-grandchildren.

## 700 Gather for Annual Meeting Of Electric Co-op

Some 700 members and guests of Cooke County Electric Cooperative Association attended the organization's 30th annual membership meeting Monday evening, April 29, in the Muenster Public School Auditorium.

Rev. Wm. D. Craig, a well-known retired Methodist minister from Nocona, Texas, opened the meeting with invocation. Entertainment was furnished by the Gainesville State School for Girls Choir, under direction of Mr. Dale Dennis.

Michael Sloan, manager of Cooke County Electric, reported to the members on the operations of the Cooperative for the year 1967, stating that the growth of the cooperative for that year continued to be "substantially above the national average."

In the business session, the members unanimously re-elected Jack Crowover, Pete Skinner and Robert Lewis Jr. to the three year terms as directors. At the traditional drawing following the business session, 32 members won \$700 worth of door prizes ranging from electric home shops to hair dryers. ## Jaycees Start on Organizing Work For Little League

Muenster's Little League program will be in operation again this summer under sponsorship of the Jaycees and supervision of Butch Fisher. The decision and the appointment were made at the regular Jaycee meeting last week.

Fisher said the program will be about the same as before. Local business firms are asked to continue as team sponsors providing uniforms for the kiddies. And teams will be divided according to age into senior and junior leagues.

Present plans are to open the season on June 3 but to organize the teams soon so that they will have a few weeks of practice before starting to play for the record.

Applications for team membership will be available at both local schools in the near future. To qualify for the program each child will need an application with a parent's signature indicating permission to play and excusing the sponsor from liability in case of injury.

Other details of the program such as the schedule, names of team managers, ages of eligibility, etc., will be worked out soon by Fisher and his committee.

Muenster High's season opener with Era last Friday was the kind that makes coaches cheer or pull their hair. Dan Hamric was happy and Bo Reid was miserable. And the final count was 9-6.

A hectic fifth inning produced all of those 9 Muenster runs. Before that Era had scored 1 in the first, 2 in the third and 3 in the fourth on six walks and 8 hits aided by 10 Muenster errors. Meanwhile Robison pitched a hitless game and Muenster was scoreless.

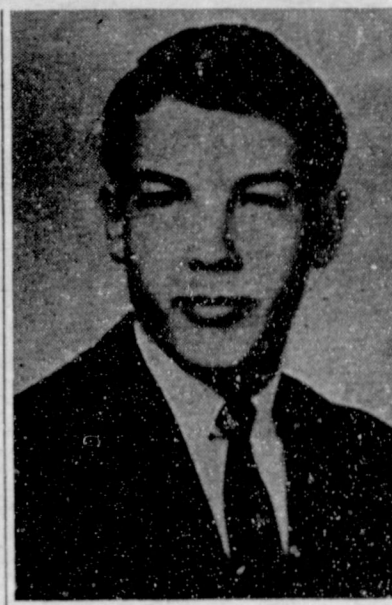

## Texans Will Vote in Primary Saturday

One of the less eventful political seasons in this community will come to an end Saturday when voters of the two Muenster boxes join others of the state in a Democratic primary.

While sharing statewide interest in the state's top races, the Muenster voters have only one local race. Five are running for the office of representative for Cooke and Denton Counties. In the county and precinct four offices are unopposed for offices of sheriff, county attorney, tax assessor-collector and commissioner of Precinct 3. Also unopposed is the incumbent district judge.

The election here will be held at the customary time, from 8 a.m. to 7 p.m., with Joe Luke as judge at the north box and Paul Fisher as judge at the south box. The north box is in its usual location, the main corridor of Muenster Public School. The south box will be in the scale house of Muenster Milling Company, just south of the railroad.

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Still another reminder: every voter is expected to have his registration certificate. State law requires the proof of eligibility and election personnel are expected to ask for it.

In case a person has lost his certificate, Fisher said, he will still be able to vote if he will certify in writing that he has registered.

The election this year is combined with an opinion poll on three prominent current issues — pari-mutuel betting, liquor by the drink and creation of a state agency to regulate milk prices. Results of the poll are not official, however they can be regarded as guides in future consideration of legislature. Voters are encouraged to give an opinion on each issue.

### GUEST EDITORIAL

This is to share with you the following from the monthly newsletter of the American Economic Foundation, edited by Fred G. Clark and Richard S. Rimanoczy:

"LSD, STP and POT — the escape-from-reality drugs — have attracted an enormous amount of attention because they are undermining the character of a small fraction of our young people.

"Unfortunately, the most prevalent, pernicious and destructive of all escape-from-reality drugs — SFN — is destroying the American character on a much wider scale, almost unnoticed and unmentioned.

"The full name of SFN is

something for nothing. For most people, its temptation is almost irresistible. It is habit-forming to a frightening degree. In almost every human heart there is a spark of larceny which, fanned by the insidious influence of SFN, burns away the two cardinal virtues of man — self-respect and self-reliance. Psychologically, it has the guilt-producing impact of receiving stolen goods — even if these goods are legally stolen.

"Nothing corrodes the human spirit as deeply as subsidized idleness. As proven by the rioting and looting, it leads to the desire for illegally stolen goods. The experts say that many people on SFN reach the point where they are virtually beyond rehabilitation....

"The use (acceptance) of SFN is encouraged by the world-wide fundamental weakness of the mass mind — ignorance of the simple fundamentals of how man produces and exchanges goods and services. There is no such thing as something for nothing. Every economic good has a source, a destination, and a cost that must be paid. And the man who pays nothing pays the highest price of all.

"The tragic irony of SFN is the humanitarian spirit in which it is dispensed. The truth is that nothing is more inhumane than destroying the fabric of character. To the normal man who wakes up in the morning with nothing to do, and nowhere to go where he is needed, life becomes a nightmare out of which he must make sense or lose his senses.

"This 'sense' is that he is one of those special persons to whom the world owes a living. And if it is not a good living, or as good as he thinks he deserves, his resentment against society knows no bounds.

"LSD, STP and POT are frightening, but SFN is worse...

**WHEN THEY COME HOME**  
 When Johnny comes home again, from Vietnam, he is going to have to learn a new way of life. Over there, our GS's found out that a Communist is an enemy and, if he wasn't killed, he'd kill you. They learned, the hard way, how Communists make it a practice to disguise themselves to work their way into strategic places, and they became well aware of the damage and atrocities Communists commit, given the least opportunity.

But these horrible lessons have taught Americans at home precious little concerning the real nature of Communism. It is overdue that we learn, and lesson number

one is that a Communist in this country is just as treacherous, just as venomous, and just as deadly as a Communist in Vietnam.

Despite this obvious fact, these enemy agents are not only tolerated and listened to, they enjoy all the rights and privileges of citizenship, reinforced through a succession of decisions of the United States Supreme Court. They are allowed to operate freely, conspire without hindrance, agitate, hold jobs in industries where our national security is involved, and even to teach in our schools. Anyone who expresses alarm at this incredible state of affairs is denounced as a "McCarthyite," the ultimate epithet in the Communist lexicon — prized

particularly by the Communists because they invented it.

Our returning GI's may have trouble understanding this weird state of affairs. To them a Communist is a Communist, whether he is butchering innocent peasants in a village in South Vietnam, directing a riot in a large American City, singing folk songs with a political message, or teaching political science on some college campus.

It will take some doing to make our GI's change their

ideas about Communists being the enemy. It may be that they'll have to be given a special brainwashing course, and paraded through the streets in various cities across the country with yokes about their necks labelled "extremist."

An alternative would be to

have the members of the US Supreme Court spend a few months in South Vietnam learning some elemental things about Communist tactics first hand. So far, the Court has specialized in granting liberties to the enemy, while denying the rest of us the right to defend our own intelligently.

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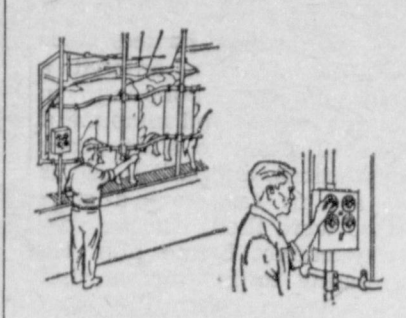

**Fred Herr Feted On 80th Birthday**

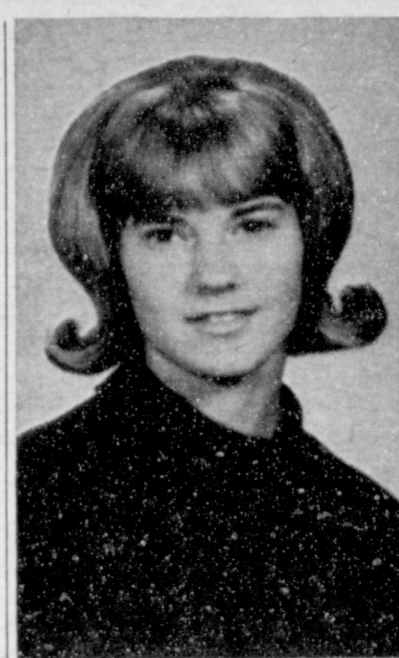

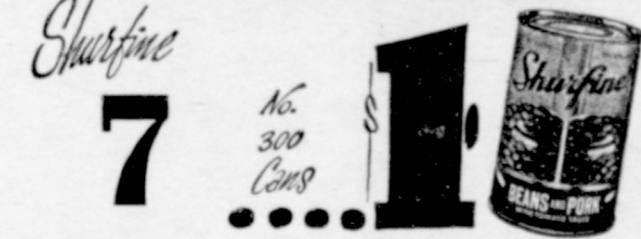

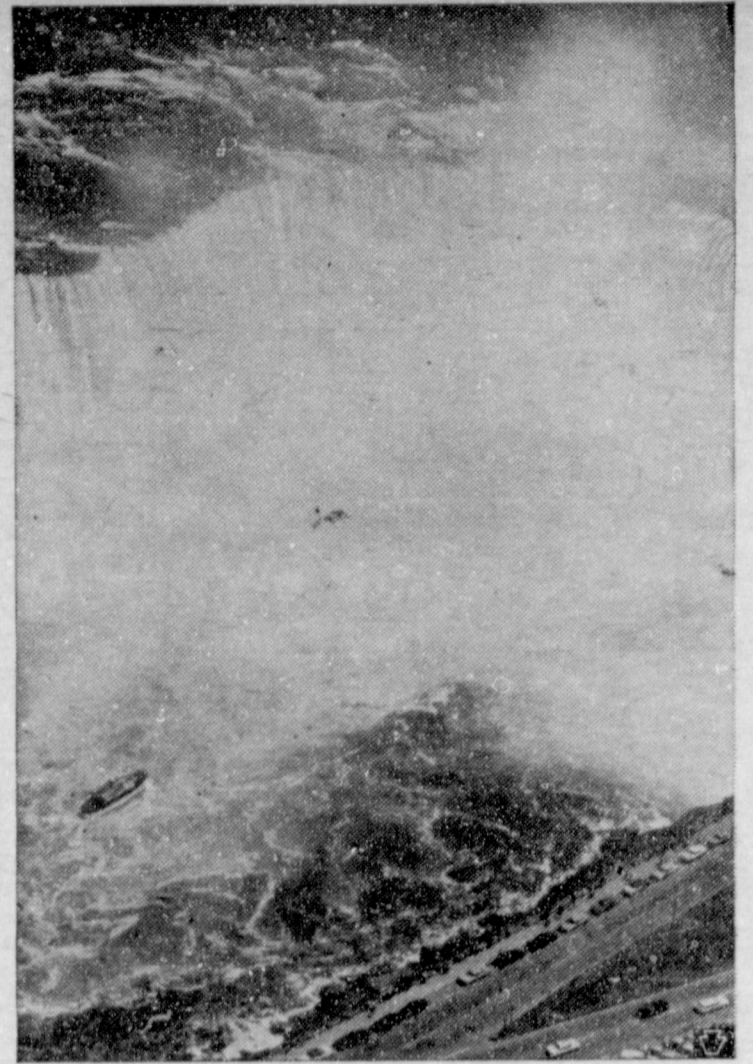
Many people have the idea that they do not need to get in touch with the social security office until they retire. This is not true, according to Gus Jones, District Manager of the Sherman office. Recent changes in the social security law make it possible for people who are still working full time to qualify for medicare, monthly cash benefits, or both.

"Upon reaching age sixty-five," Jones said, "almost everyone can qualify for both the hospital insurance and the supplementary insurance programs of medicare, even if he is still working and earning too much to be eligible for monthly cash benefits. Retirement is not a requirement for medicare eligibility. Therefore, it is extremely important to get in touch with the social security office during the three-month period before the month you become age sixty-five."

"Another change in the law increases the possibility of receiving some social security cash benefits for those who are still working. Beginning this year, one can earn up to \$1680 and still receive all of his social security benefits for the year. Even if the applicant is earning over \$1680, it may be possible for him to receive some benefits during the year," Jones added.

For additional information about medicare and social security benefits, contact the Sherman Social Security office which is located at 315 West Mulberry. The office hours are from 8:30 a.m. to 4:45 p.m. Monday through Friday and each Thursday evening until 6:45 p.m. A representative may also be contacted in Gainesville each Tuesday and Thursday from 9:30 a.m. to 12:00 noon in the Federal Building.

### Bye Bye Blackboard



"Students are stimulated to more creative work by the easy use of color. It also makes identification of letters easier," says Mrs. Connie Emshwiler, teacher in Okemas, Michigan.

Millions of American school children may soon wonder what black boards were. Their teachers will be writing in colors on a white, glare-free surface, using a new device which many believe has vast implications for education.

It is well known that advertising in color attracts more attention and is more persuasive than black and white. Attracting attention and persuading are strongly analogous to the process of teaching. In the words of one educator, "if writing on a black board with chalk were the way to communicate, we'd be writing with white pencils on black paper today."

The new device, the Eberhard Faber-Board visual aid panel is a four way communications device now being introduced nationally. It is used for writing with color markers, as a magnetic board, art board and projection screen. Combining these four features in one simple panel, says the manufacturer will help students learn faster, and also result in significant savings to schools.

One university is using the panel not only for motion picture projection, and color writing, but as a giant display panel and scoreboard for swimming meets.

During a year-long experimental program, the new panel has also brought color graphics to courtrooms, business conference rooms, and police academies. A computer programmer reported "the use of color on the panel to key input, output and interim procedures in flow charts greatly simplifies computer programming techniques."

"Grey is the color of all theory," wrote Goethe, the German philosopher-poet. Not so today. Color it bright!

### Brazos Electric's New Power Plant Will Open Soon

Brazos Electric Power Cooperative, Inc., will soon add its third electric generating plant, it was announced today by Hollis Dalton, General Manager.

The new plant, named for Randle W. Miller, General Manager from the company's beginning in 1941 until his death in 1963, is situated on the shores of Lake Palo Pinto, southwest of Mineral Wells.

The Miller plant will add 66,000 kilowatts of additional generating capacity to the 89,000 kilowatts in existing plants.

Brazos, organized in 1941 to make low cost, dependable power available to the rural areas of Texas, currently owns and operates two steam electric generating plants — the W. R. (Bob) Poage Plant near Belton, Texas, and the North Texas Plant on the shores of Lake Weatherford near Weatherford.

A non-profit, tax paying Texas corporation, the cooperative is owned by 19 rural electric cooperatives who buy wholesale electricity from Brazos and deliver it at retail to over 80,000 rural consumers.

The Brazos member system, with more than 1,650 miles of heavy duty transmission line and over 31,000 miles of distribution line, is also interconnected with the electrical systems of the cities of Bartlett, Bryan, Denton, Garland, Grandbury, Greenville, Hearne, Sanger, Seymour, Weatherford and Whitesboro to insure system stability and gain the economics of an interconnected operation.

The Miller plant is expected to go into operation in June of this year.

### Barbecue Begins With A Good Base



Along with the robin and the lilac, a sure harbinger of Spring is the unveiling of the barbecue grill.

Better results can be obtained in outdoor cooking with a few preliminary steps.

1. First, put the grill in condition with a thorough cleaning, as you would the range on which your indoor menus are prepared. Wire-brush any rust spots, and touch up bare metal with paint.

2. Check the grill motor and clean related tools and hardware.

3. Find a location where smoke will not blow directly into the house or be offensive to neighbors, yet is accessible for serving.

4. Now you're ready to test your culinary skill. The Zonolite Division, W. R. Grace & Co., suggests these simple steps for more successful barbecuing results:

1. A layer of extra coarse vermiculite, such as Bar-B-Sorb, should be spread on the bottom of the grill. The material absorbs drippings and protects the grill, while providing a better draft beneath the coals. Because it insulates, the grill stays cooler, thus safer.

2. Center the charcoal briquets on the vermiculite. Spray fire lighter fluid across the coals, and ignite. Vermiculite acts as a wick to provide uniform burning.

3. Tap coals frequently with a tool or utensil to remove ash. Ash insulates the coals, and retards the heat.

4. After the guests leave, pour a layer of vermiculite over the hot coals for safety's sake. You'll be able to save the charcoal for the next cookout — both the briquets and Bar-B-Sorb can be re-used.

When you do decide to change the vermiculite in the grill, it's easy. The lightweight mineral can be dumped in the garden as a soil conditioner.

The coarse grade of vermiculite recommended for outdoor cooking is usually found wherever charcoal is sold.

### Texas FB Opposes Control Agency On Price of Milk

WACO — The president of the Texas Farm Bureau said today that creation of a state agency with the power of fix milk prices could prove harmful to the consumer as well as the dairy farmer.

A proposition on the ballots of May 4 Democratic and Republican primaries seeks to ascertain public opinion on the "Enactment by the Texas Legislature of a law creating the Texas Dairy Commission with the power to regulate and fix the retail and wholesale price of milk." This was a controversial issue during the regular session of the Legislature last year.

TFB President Sidney Dean of Victoria said that delegates to the last annual convention of the Texas Farm Bureau voted to "oppose the establishment of a Texas Dairy Commission."

The Farm leader said Farm Bureau opposes the authority to regulate dairymen and fix milk prices for three reasons:

(1) Price fixing cannot successfully substitute for competitive prices in determining consumer demand for any product. An artificial price set by government edict runs the risk of jeopardizing consumer supplies as well as making the producer dependent upon government for his income. A price considered "fair" to the consumer might not assure an adequate return to the producer.

(2) A commission empowered to fix prices would necessarily be required to regulate the day-to-day business operations of dairymen.

(3) An artificial price of milk at the retail level could encourage the consumption of milk substitutes at a time when dairymen can ill afford unfair competition. Imitation milk and "filled" milk products already present crucial problems for dairy producers.

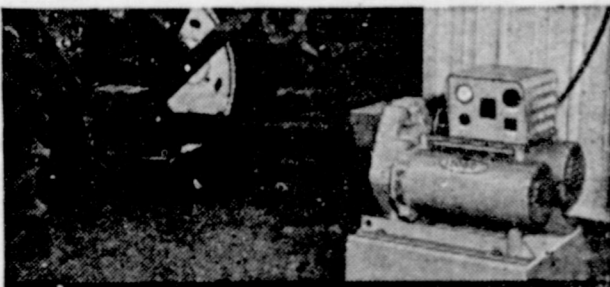

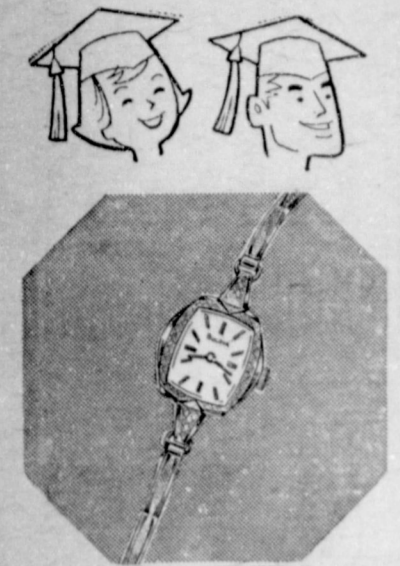

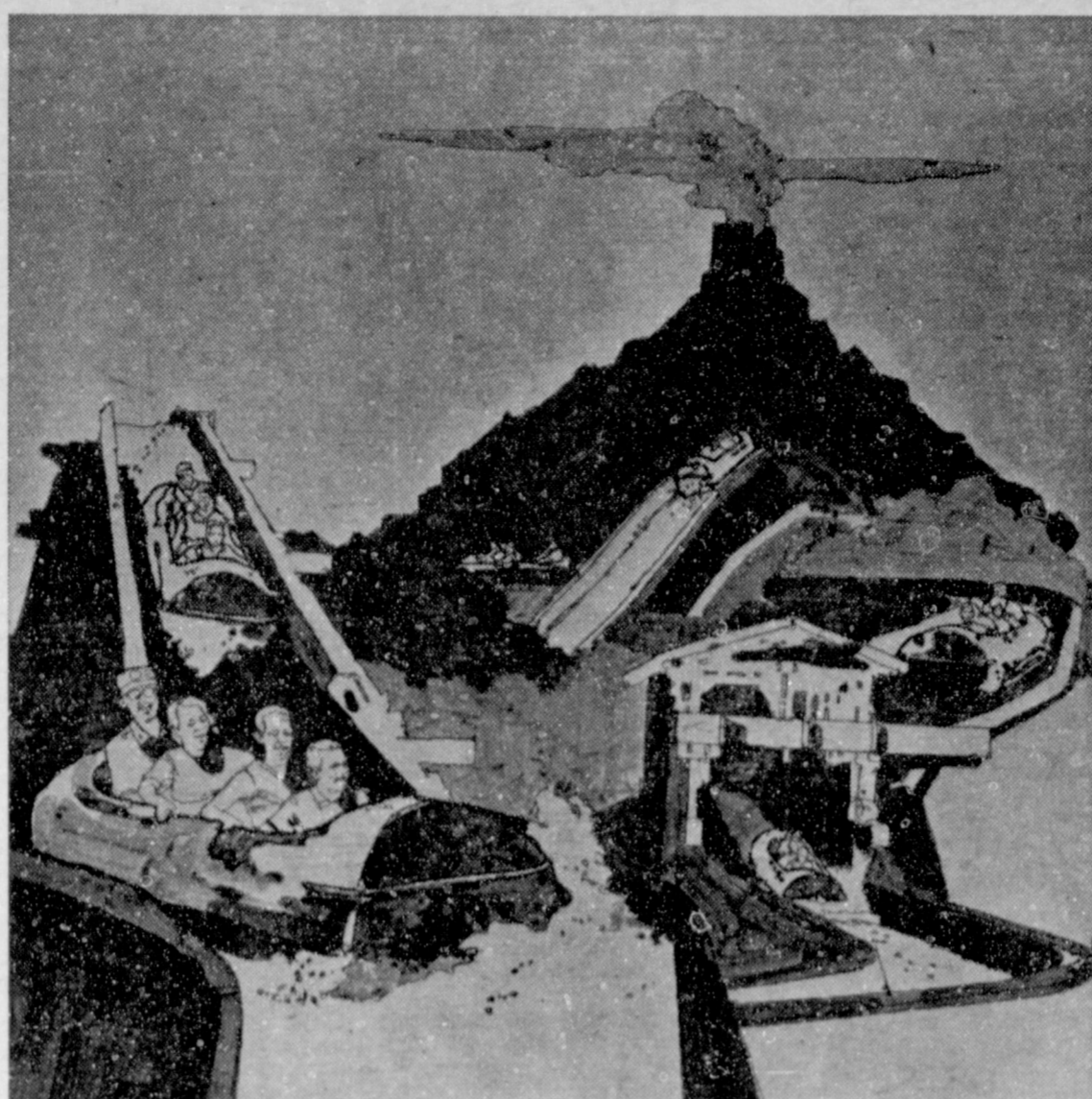

**Lone Star Gas Co. Reports Record First Quarter Net**

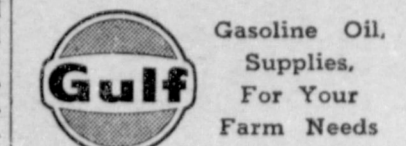

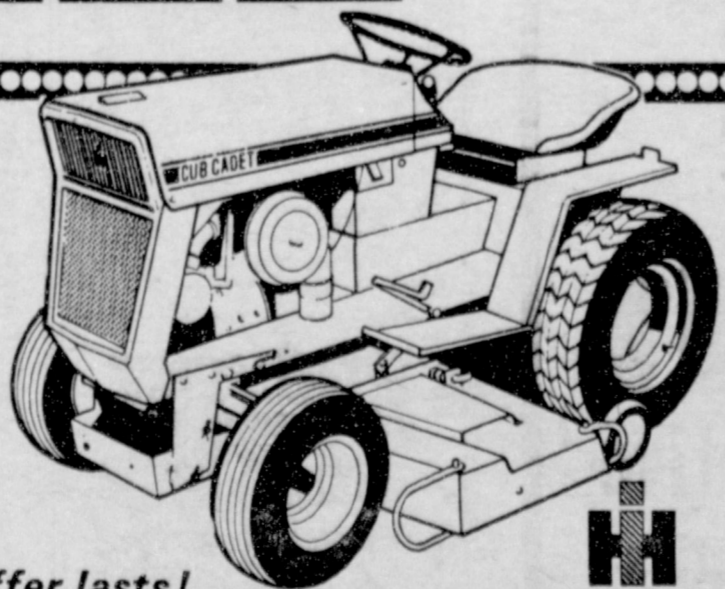
