



Victim of Radium Poisioning Is Dead After Long Fight

CAMBRIDGE, Md., Dec. 23.-(A) Pauline De Haven Kenton, 30vear-old victim of radium poisoning, died here today of the malady which physicians believed she contracted while painting watch dials in a Chicago factory.

She entered the Cambridge hospital last October 28 in a serious condition and grew steadily worse She had battled against the poise for several years.

Miss Kenton left the employ of the Dial factory nine years ago. She was believed to have contracted the poisoning while pointing fine camel hair brush with her lips It was not until 1923, however, that she noticed the first effects of radium poisoning when she discovered several cavities in her teeth.


