Christening and Dinner

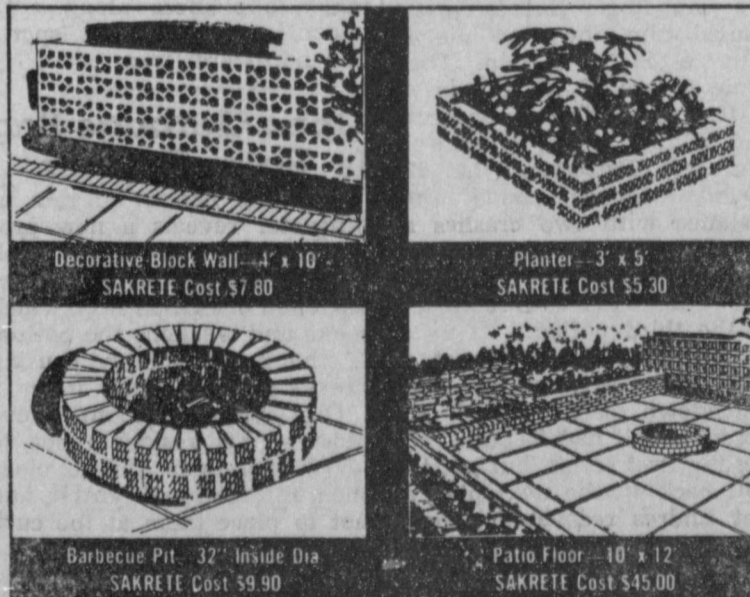

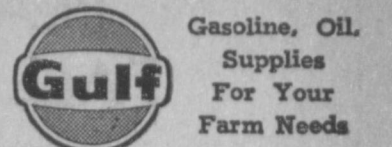
"We'd like all ages to participate in this community project. Bike rides are great family outings, and we're going to have a fun day together," stated Mrs. Johnson.

For the rest of the game the Bearcats put on their best performance. Three plays gained 12 and the next series failed on a fourth down try. Muenster ended its first series with a kick, then Whitesboro, for the first time made two successive first downs. But the next one failed. The game ended two plays later with a 15 yard pass from Mark L. Sicking to Bobby Endres.

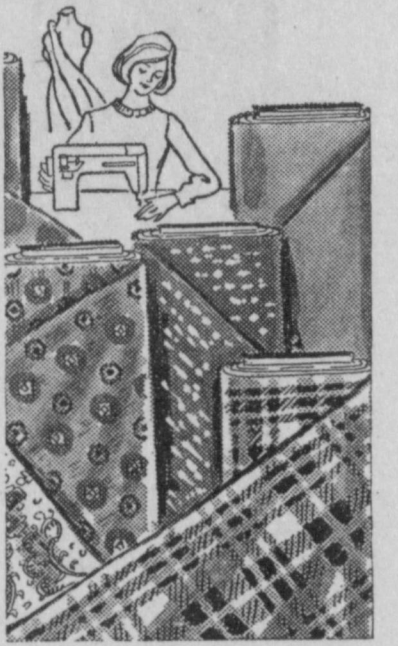

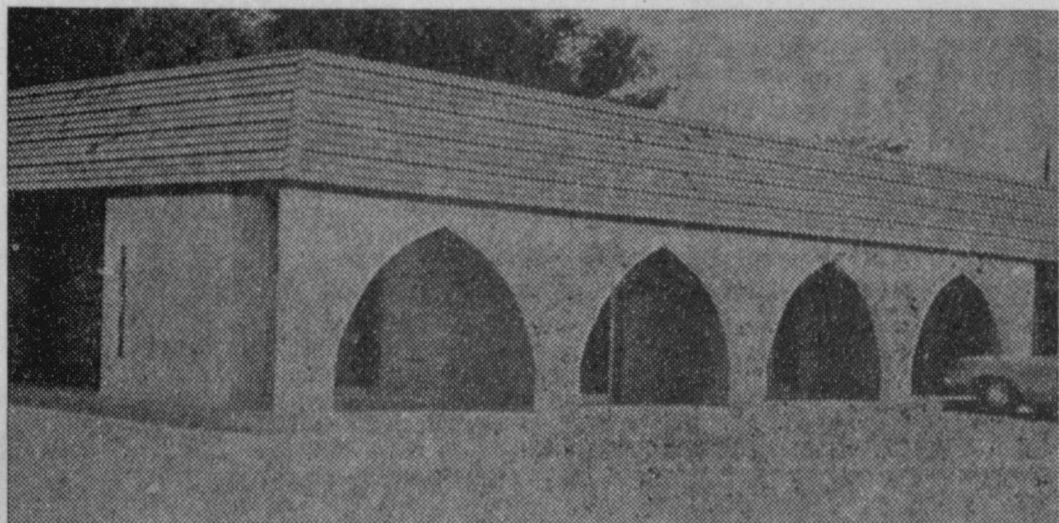

Junior Teams and Whitesboro Divide Pair of Contests

The two junior teams of Muenster Public School broke even in a pair of contests at Whitesboro last Thursday. First the Little Monsters of junior high went down for a count of 26-6, then the Little Hornets had revenge by a 46-14 score.

Big factors in the first game were a few big plays putting all the scores on the board for Whitesboro. There was an 87 yard run along with scoring passes of 55, 21 and 13 yards. Those four plays account for 176 yards out of some 203 made by the hosts.

Discounting those big ones, the Monsters gave a good account of themselves. Total gains of about 100 yards included a 19 yard scoring play by Carl Pagel, who accounted for practically all of Muenster's gains, plus a 13 yard TD that was nullified by a clipping penalty.

The over-all record favors Whitesboro 6-5 in first downs, 103-89 in rushing yardage, and 99-11 in passing yardage. Whitesboro completed 4 of 5, Muenster 1 of 6.

In the second game Muenster JVs were in complete charge all the way. Along with their decisive 46-14 score they led 11-3 in first downs and 394-83 in total yardage. That included 9 of 25 pass completions for 147 yards by Muenster and 1 of 9 for 55 by Whitesboro. Also Muenster led 8-2 in turnovers, with 6 fumble recoveries and 2 interceptions whereas Whitesboro recovered two fumbles. Muenster was penalized 85 yards, Whitesboro 20.

Nick Walterscheid had a great night with total gains of 137 on 17 carries besides doing the team's passing. He scored 24 points on runs and threw touchdown passes of 67 and 31 yards to Mark Cler. Cler likewise was very much in the game. Along with scores on passes he had another by scooping up the ball after Jim Koelzer blocked a punt and racing 25 yards to pay dirt.

First score came on a 13 yard run by Nick Walterscheid followed by Nick's run for extra points. Next one was on a 67 yard pass play to Cler and extra points by Jim Koelzer. Third TD was on the blocked kick and Walterscheid added 2 points. Then Walterscheid went in from the 18 after which Bryan Sicking made bonus points. Fifth was another pass play to Cler for 31 and extra points by Walterscheid. And finally Walterscheid scored from the 21 and the extra point attempt failed.

Whitesboro scored on a 55 yard pass play and on a 33 yard run after a blocked punt. First try for extra points was good, the second failed.

Defensively also the Little Hornets did a big job. They stopped the rushing attempts cold, crowded the passer and hounded the receivers. The only pass completed was for 55 yards and a TD. Boys who recovered fumbles for Muenster were Terry Lewis 2, Bert Walterscheid, Jim Koelzer, Mark Cler and Randy Reiter. Billy Phillips and Neil Walterscheid intercepted for Muenster.
