

Whether they call it detente or peaceful coexistence, our deal with the Soviet Union isn't as satisfactory as Secretary of State Kissinger would like to have us believe. Now, as in all of the fifty odd years since communism started, the Russian aim is to get along with us while constantly pursuing its ultimate goal of world domination. And in the meantime the reds cheat on their agreements every time they have the opportunity.

A case in point is an agreement following the great grain Home. deal of 1972 in which the Soviets took not only 20 million tons of grain but our shirts as well. The vast purchase financed partly by American taxpayers, wiped T. Pagel, Charles Pagel and out our food reserves and aggravated world wide inflation, particulary our food prices.

To avoid another such economic crisis the US last year signed an agreement with the Soviets whereby each was to keep the other informed about grain production. But the reds now refuse to abide by that agreement. They do not say how much grain they have or how much they expect to harvest and they will not permit any of our people to make a survey of their own. Needless to say they have no problems getting information on our storage and crops. That information is published regularly.

This gives an idea of how Russia regards the detente, and it should also give a hint that agreements with that country ought to be avoided rather than sought.

This aspect about dealings with Russia is a cause of great concern. After more than a half century of broken agreements and financial defaults, we certainly know that they can't be trusted, but we keep on making deals. Why? 

Out of consideration to the persons concerned, it should be pointed out that some most unfortunate conditions prevailed then.
