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Muenster PTO Has Planning Session

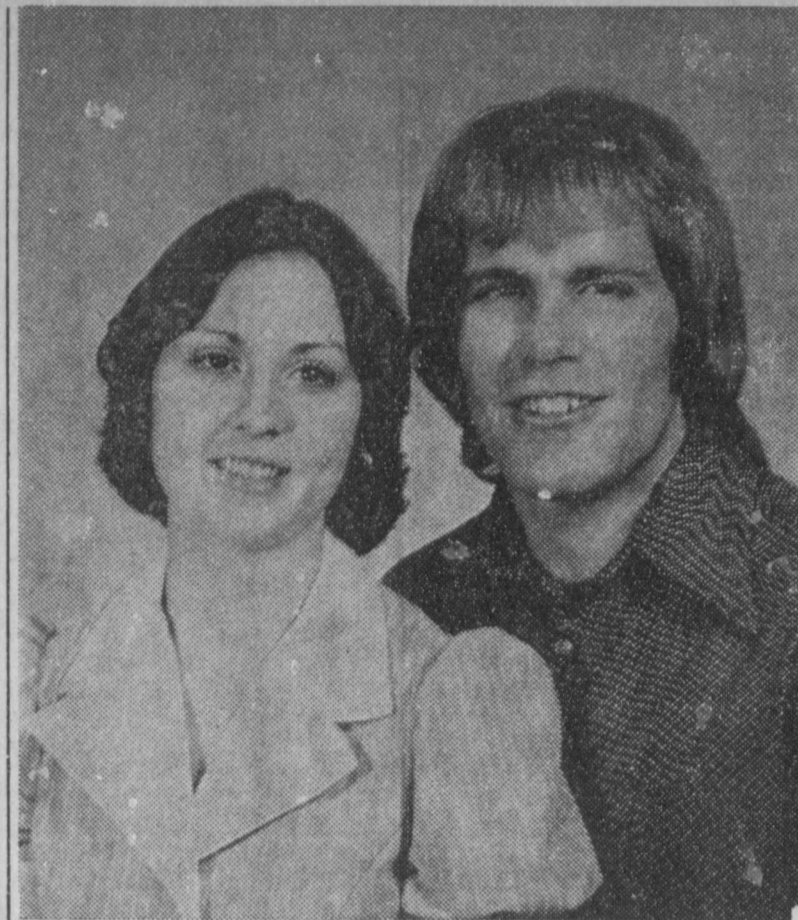
The executive committee of Muenster Public School met Monday, July 15, to outline plans for the coming year.

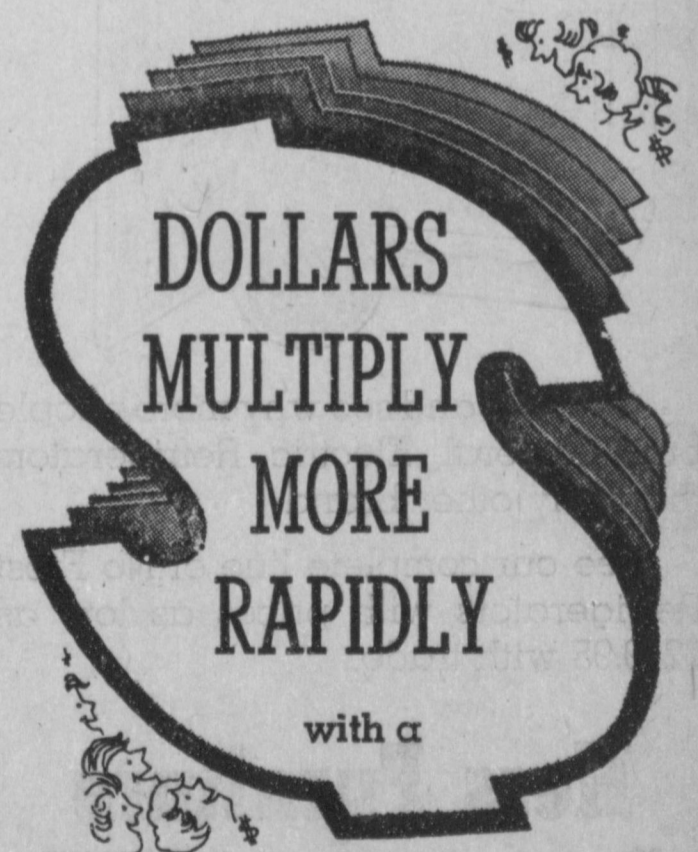

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Hearing Set for Proposed TP&L Nuclear Plant

The Atomic Energy Commission has set July 31 - August 1 for public environmental hearings on the proposed Comanche Peak Steam Electric Station, located in Somervell County about 60 miles southwest of the Dallas-Fort Worth area, J. F. Skelton, president of Texas Power & Light Company, announced.

They will be held at the Glen Rose High School in Glen Rose and will be open to private citizens, state and local officials, and community groups or individuals.

The 2,300,000 kilowatt nuclear plant will be owned jointly by Texas Power & Light Company, Texas Electric Service Company and Dallas Power & Light Company. There will be two generating units. One is scheduled for operation in 1980 and the second two years later.

The hearing will be conducted by the Atomic Safety & Licensing Board, appointed by the AEC especially for the Comanche Peak location.

Application to build Comanche Peak along with the Preliminary Safety Analysis Report and the Environmental Report was submitted to the Atomic Energy Commission June 5, 1973. This involved some three tons of paper representing hundreds of hours compiling all types of studies and information relating to the plant, the environment, safety, economic impact, and other factors. Since that time there have been on-site inspections by various groups from the AEC.

Plans and proposals and information on the plant have been filed also with numerous local, state and federal agencies.

Construction of the plant is subject to the approval of the Atomic Energy Commission and other agencies.

Several hundred construction workers will be needed to build the plant and 3,200-acre lake. The lake will be used for cooling water. It will be formed by constructing a dam on Squaw Creek, an action which already has been approved by both the Texas Water Rights Commission and the Texas Water Quality Board. 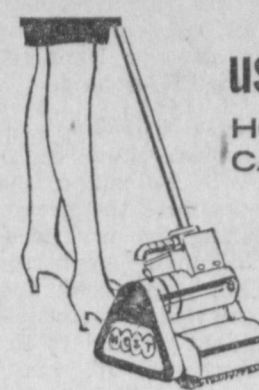

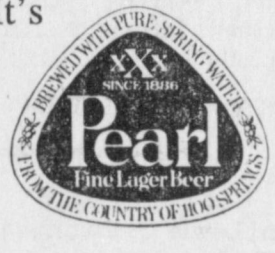

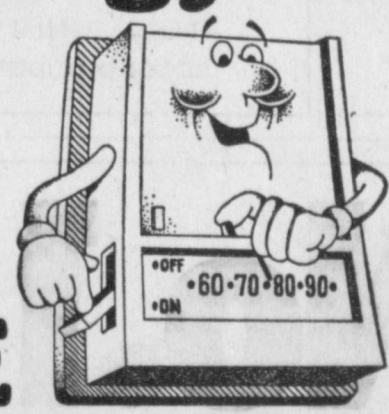

Reducing plan for energy users



Plan E How to save electricity when using air conditioning

Central Systems

1. Keep equipment at top operating efficiency. Have it checked seasonally by qualified serviceman.
2. Check filter every 30 days. Dirty filters cause equipment to use excessive electricity. If filter is permanent, clean by manufacturer's directions; if it's disposable, it should be replaced when dirty.
3. Keep furniture, draperies away from air outlets and returns. Clean often.
4. Close draperies and blinds to keep out direct sunlight.
5. Keep fireplace damper closed. Draft pulls cool air up the chimney.
6. Proper home insulation keeps the cool in, cuts energy use. Attic ventilation helps, too. Insulation questions? Call TP&L.
7. Shade on roof and walls can reduce energy needed to cool. But trim trees, shrubs away from outside compressor unit. Keep it free of leaves, debris. If air flow is blocked, unit uses more energy.
8. Weatherstrip doors and windows; caulk cracks to prevent drafts and cool air loss.
9. Keep windows closed. Open outside doors as little as possible.
10. Set thermostat on 78° and leave it there. Turn unit off if you'll be away from home several days.

Window Units

- Follow all above suggestions, plus these:
11. Buy unit with highest "energy efficiency ratio" (EER). Uses less electricity to

cool. If EER is not on sales tag, ask for it or figure it yourself. Divide "wattage" into "BTU" capacity. Both figures are on unit.

12. Place unit where it'll get as little direct sun as possible.
13. Airn air outlets at lower half of doorway to next room to allow warm air from that room to enter at the doortop for recouling, recirculation.
14. Never vent air conditioner into garage. Ventilation is usually too poor for top performance of your unit.

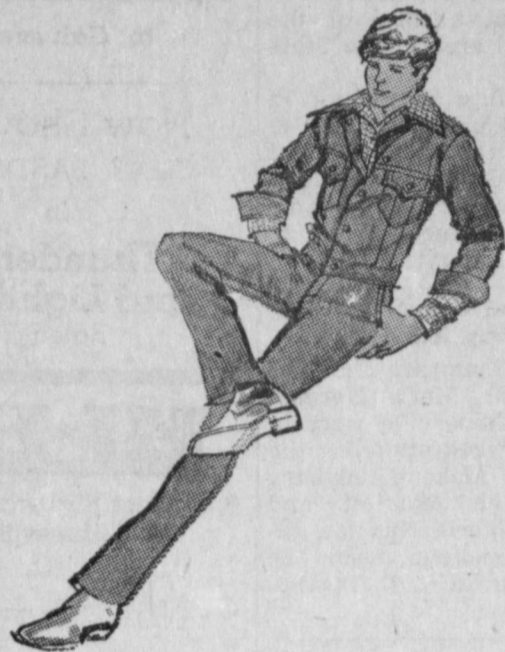

be obtained through an existing agreement with the Brazos River Authority.

Skelton, in announcing the plant last year, pointed to the oil and gas shortage as one reason for using nuclear energy to produce electric power.

A nuclear plant produces electricity the same way as a conventional plant — the heat source is the difference. In fossil plants, gas, oil or coal are used to boil water which creates steam to spin the turbine which spins the generator and produces electricity. In a nuclear plant, nuclear fission provides the heat — the rest of the process is the same.

lignite to use in generating electricity, but these sources of fuel are limited to the life-time of plants now being built or to be built near those lignite deposits.

The three companies provide electric power to a combined total of more than three and one-half million people in North, East, Central and West Texas. This represents about a third of the population and covers about a third of the geographical area of the State of Texas.

Other utility companies in Texas — Houston Lighting & Power, Central Power & Light Company, Gulf States Utilities, the City of San Antonio — have announced plans to build nuclear units.

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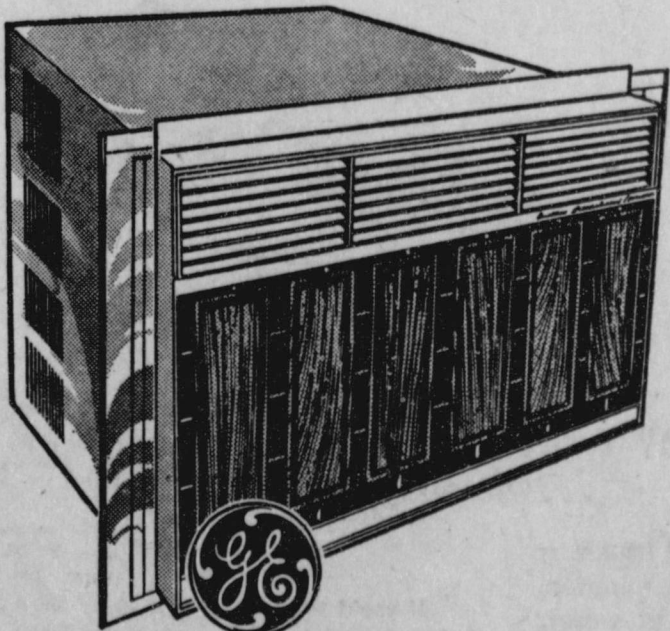
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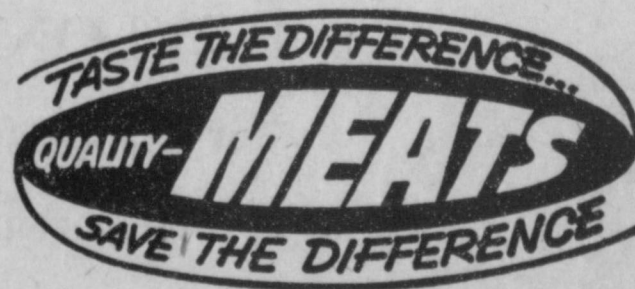
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
