

Even though very few people are aware of what's going on in the Constitutional Convention, we occasionally see and hear remarks which indicate that Cooke County's Bill Sullivant is in the big middle of the action.

One of those remarks was included in a recent article by Dave Montgomery of the Dallas Times Herald entitled "Standouts of the Convention." He says "the constitutional convention has produced its share of unsung heroes, delegates who have attained general accolades among their colleagues for working aggressively to present a salable document to the public.

"The standouts cut across philosophical lines, representing both liberal and conservative thinking. They have attained recognition for effective committee work, skillful debate and ability to compromise in an effort to meet the cliché-ridden goal of attaining a constitution that 'offers the most to the most Texans'.

"Among eight standouts named, Montgomery has this to say: 'Bill Sullivant, a former prosecutor from Gainesville, who was instrumental in ironing out devastating objections centering around state appeals and county court provisions in the volatile judiciary article. Referred to as one of the most under-rated members of the legislature, Sullivant's reputation for doing his homework was repeatedly displayed at the front microphone, in spite of his monotone debating style. He is admired for never backing down on a position once committing himself.'

President Nixon's remarks last week about the inflation were obscured to a great extent because of the present pressure to impeach him. And that's a shame, because what he said was a lot more important to this country's future than what may happen to him personally.

The economic crisis, if permitted to run its course, could have a devastating effect on the country. The deterioration of money value could go on and on until all of a person's savings are wiped out, until store prices jump to a hundred or a thousand times as high as now. It would mean that millions of people would be hurt before the financial mess grinds to a halt, and millions more would be hurt in the readjustment.

The president said things that make sense, and which deserve to be heeded in spite of the current plot to belittle him personally. It will help if the country will quit its policy of deficit spending, especially the wasteful spending. It will help also if private citizens turn back the present tendency to spend money as if it's going out of use. Our money will retain more of its value if we will put more value on it. On the other hand it will lose more value if we value it less.

At the same time we can help by heeding Nixon's urge to step up production. Needless to say, this means to produce more goods without corresponding increase of wages and profits. To put it bluntly, let's shake off the greed. Let everyone along the chain of production give a little more than before for the same pay, or even for a little less pay.

A little thought on this reveals that, adopted as an overall national policy, it will solve the inflation problem for us. If we will increase production without more wages and profits, unit prices can come down and the consumer can start getting more for his money. Inflation can be stopped and even reversed. Our money can regain some of the value that it lost.

This is what the president referred to as the long term benefit from the short term sacrifice. Obviously if all of the country's producers and distributors adopted the policy of giving a little more without more pay or profit, it would not be long until the benefits would start coming back to them as the buyers.

These methods of busting inflation ought to work perfectly because they are the opposite of what caused it in the first place. A balanced budget and possibly even a surplus would be a welcome change from years of deficit spending.

Classes to Start Monday the 12th At Public School

The next scholastic year at Muenster Public School begins next Monday, August 5, for the faculty members and a week later for the students.

Superintendent L. B. Bruns this week announced the calendar which will have 180 class days and 15 holidays and 10 in service days for the teachers.

Teachers in-service days will extend Monday through Friday of next week. Also booked for Friday, the 9th, is registration beginning at 9 a.m. Students on the bus routes are reminded that buses are scheduled to start at 8 and arrive in time for the registration. Classes will start at 8 on August 12.

The first holiday is Labor Day on September 2. The two holidays for Thanksgiving will come on November 28 and 29. Christmas holidays begin at the end of classes on December 19 and classes resume on January 2. And Easter holidays will be the Friday and Saturday before the feast along with the Monday after.

The first six weeks period will have 29 class days ending on September 20, the second will have 30 days ending November 1, the third will have 31 ending December 19, the fourth will have 31 ending February 13, the fifth will have 28 ending March 26 and the sixth will have 31 ending May 14. Graduation will be held on May 16.

Following the first week, additional in-service days for teachers are November 8, December 20, February 14, May 15 and 16.

Building Notes

Building activity in the community is going strong even though little new construction has started lately. The reason is that the construction personnel are all occupied by the jobs in progress.

The biggest of those is the new community center of Sacred Heart parish, which got under way shortly before the first of the year. Father Placidus indicated this week that work is about on schedule and should be finished near the end of October. Air conditioning is finished. Interior walls are almost finished.

Principal jobs remaining are the acoustical ceiling and terrazo floors and fixtures in kitchens and rest rooms. The building, under contract for \$386,944, is a white brick structure measuring 95x137 and will more than double the space in the present parish hall.

Newest of the new homes is that for the Arnold Mullers, with foundation work just starting. It will have three bedrooms, two baths, attached garage, brick veneer, central heating and cooling, and is located on Sixth across from the cemetery.

SH Students Will Register Aug. 12

Registration for the students of Sacred Heart School has been set for Monday, August 12, between the hours of 9 and 3. Classes will start a week later, on the 19th.

Football practice for the high school boys begins on the 12th and will be held once daily, in the evenings, during the first week. A later announcement will advise whether practice after the 19th will be afternoons or nights.

Hornet Practice Begins August 12

Officially, football practice for the MHS Hornets does not begin until the first school day on August 12, but a number of the boys are already at work to shape up for the season.

UIL regulations do not allow them to practice under the coach's supervision, so they are on their own, doing road work, lifting weights, passing the ball, etc.

The Hornets this year are in District 13-A along with Holliday, Archer City, Windthorst and Callisburg. According to Campbell's annual ratings of Texas football, they are due to finish the season in fourth place.

Holiday, a traditional powerhouse, is picked for No. 1, and Callisburg, with no personnel losses from last year's 0-10 team is favored for the No. 2 spot. Others in order are Archer City, Muenster and Windthorst.

The completely new Hornet coaching staff, Donald Neal, Donald Osterman and Harold Tipps, are at coaching school this week and unavailable for comment, however, members of the team dispute the Campbell rating. Reinforced by the boys of last year's 14-A champion Hornet B, team they expect to be more potent than before.

Shaping up for the district race, the Hornets will have a tough pre-season facing two of last year's 14-A foes, two strong Class B teams and two AA teams. Before that they'll have their first tests in a pair of scrimmages. They'll meet Saint Jo here on August 23 after two weeks of practice, then Nocona there on the 30th. Local Moisture Continues at Half of Normal

With a mere drizzle of .15 inch, Muenster failed to share in this week's rainfall over a wide area of the state.

So, the drought continues. Total measure for July was only .92 inch, which is less than half the normal of about 2.25. And it brought the year's total through July to 10.87 which is only slightly more than half the normal measure, about 20.42, for that period.

Though rugged, the drought is not breaking any records. The driest for the first seven months was 9.29 inches in 1971. Next was 10.27 in 1972, then 10.65 in 1956. The present total of 10.87 is running fourth in the local 27 years record.

The dryness contrasts sharply with last year when the July measure was a big 8.91 and the 7 month's total was 32.92 inches. That was also the wettest of the present decade, and next wettest was 32.76 in 1968. The 27 year record for the first seven months was 33.17 in 1957.

The present drought is being felt keenly throughout the community. After about a half crop of grain, the corn and maize are doing equally poor. Hay and grazing crops too are far below normal. In the city it has required extensive lawn sprinkling, which has brought on the need for water rationing.

Water Shortage Due To Declining Supply

Muenster has been hot and dry and water consumption has increased, but that's only one of the factors behind the city's present program of water rationing. The other factor is the drop in water production.

City Superintendent Steve Mosler pointed out this week that this year's peak consumption of 629,000 gallons on July 23 is considerably below the all time record of 707,000 on July 16, 1971, also less than last year's 635,000 on July 26, 1972. However, pumps were producing more then and the city had no emergency.

Previous rationing was in 1970 following a peak of 591,000. City's reaction was to drill Well No. 5, and the problem was solved for a while. But the constant drop of water level now has the five wells producing less than four

used to, and the trend of recent years indicates that the water level will keep falling. Still another well apparently will not help. The problem is availability, not pumping capacity.

According to Mosler, indications are that the city will have to get active on its proposed surface water reservoir. That seems to be the only solution to the declining supply.

Concerning last week's appeal for rationing, Mosler said that the public response was great. From a total of 509,000 gallons on the 25th the consumption dropped to 345,000 on the 26th. After a weekend of rationing the supply again is in fine condition. Nevertheless the council asks people to continue rationing until the next rain to assure a continued adequate supply.

Tigers Have First Practice Aug. 12
