

ports that imports of baler twine is up, and domestic production of sisal and of plastic twines has increased.

Additionally, more jumbo balers are being used to harvest hay, and they require less twine per ton of hay. Further, early tests on the use of aluminum in baling wire are encouraging, and more tests will be made. Plans for the tests were made at a meeting in the offices of the Texas Department of Agriculture which has been concerned for some time about the shortage of baling wire and twine.

Field tests of aluminum wire showed that it could be used in baling machines, but the wire broke at places where ties were made when the bale was handled. On the badnews side, the price of baling twine is high, around \$25 per roll, compared to around \$9 in 1973, according to USDA. Meanwhile, rains have improved pasture grasses over much of Texas and cattle have a good chance to go into winter in good condition.
