



Senator John Tower's newsletter last week reveals his irritation with legislators who try to sneak bills into law by hitching them to urgent legislation. The scheme is to put the president in a position whereby he is unable to approve the principal issue without also accepting the amendments.

In this case the big issue was legislation to raise the nation's debt ceiling. That bill had to pass. The country had reached its former debt ceiling and was unable to continue operating without the bill which authorized more funds. It was an ideal time for piggy back bills which did not have the merit to go through on their own but might possibly slip through as amendments.

Tower said that in recent times the debt ceiling bill comes up two or three times a year and every time it has become a political football, forcing Congress to waste time on long debates over merits of various tax measures.

One of the bills this time proposed immediate ban of the oil and gas depletion allowance, the pet project of a number of northern and eastern liberals. They still offer it as a tax reform when countless studies of the past show that many oil field people need it to stay in business, and if abolished, the industry would have to increase prices to keep going.

In this connection it might be a good idea for some of the Washington people to understand that their so-called rich proposals usually don't work out. Presumably they are doing things for the consumer, but the public understands that industry raises its prices when expenses go up. There's a saying that big business does not pay tax. Consumers eventually have to pay it.

The same logic applies to proposed tax cuts by which legislators hope to appeal to voters. First of all we have an obvious question of how tax can be cut when a raised debt ceiling indicates that the government was already short of funds. And there's also the fact that a tax cut, by inflationary pressure, would be more than offset in a higher cost of living.

No matter whether the bills are good or bad we have to wonder why our lawmakers don't stop the legislating by amendment. We average people think that legislation which can't pass on its own merit surely should not be slipped through by trickery. To say it more bluntly, there's a bit of blackmail in this kind of procedure. It's like telling the president that he has to tolerate an undesirable law in order to get one that he wants.

Senator Lloyd Bentsen's gripe of the week was on another subject but equally valid. He wants a law to prevent our export-import bank from making tax-subsidized loans to foreign manufacturing plants that compete with US products.

It seems the "Exim" bank has lost sight of its original objective, which was to offer low interest loans to countries that buy from us. Besides helping the foreign country this arrangement stimulated local business and created more jobs for local workmen.

The big problem, however, is that some of the help to others has been bad for us. Some of the things we send over there, on better terms than we offer our own business men, are the equipment for new factories enabling foreign plants to compete with local firms. It doesn't seem right, for instance to subsidize a Japanese textile business or a Russian truck business and indirectly cause the lay off of thousands of our factory workers. It's penny wise and pound foolish. The initial business brings in some very welcome revenue but after that we find that the foreign firms are busy taking business away from us.

An editorial gem from the Edgerton, Minn., Enterprise, is proudly passed on here. "There are certain truths which are true no matter how much the world may question or deny them. In the economic realm, for instance, you cannot legislate the poor into

## 233 Students Register For Free Swim Class

With an enrollment of 233, just one more than a year ago, this community's annual program of free Red Cross swimming lessons is in full swing. The students are from neighboring communities as well as Muenster.

According to Mrs. Jeannine Flusche, director, 167 of those are beginners, 92 are advanced students and 14 are adults. They are divided into two classes one of which is attending this week Tuesday through Saturday and the other will attend next week Monday through Friday. Each class is further divided into three groups with instruction periods starting at 9, 10 and 11 o'clock. And those groups are assigned to a teaching

staff which includes ten with the Red Cross rating of Water Safety Instructor and thirteen with the rating of Life Saver. By that arrangement there is an average of fewer than 70 in each class period for the staff of 23 teachers.

Mrs. Polly Lewis, representing the Cooke County Red Cross chapter, is supervising the course and Mrs. Jeannine Flusche is directing it. Mrs. Lewis is lavish in her praise of the program. She said that the ratio of teachers to students, which determines the attention each person can receive, is exceptionally high, and the staff's qualification with ten WSI and thirteen Life Savers, is also exceptionally good. Still another strong point is the fact that the staff held a special orientation meeting a week before classes started. The program was well organized.

In case there are any who failed to enroll on the first day, because of vacations or other conflicts, they will be welcome when the second week of classes starts next Monday. By registering then they can still get the full course of five one-hour classes.

The same requirement applies for registering. A student must be through kindergarten and must have the application indicating parent's permission and doctor's certification of fitness.

Students finishing the classes will receive tokens of recognition from Red Cross. Beginners, advanced beginners and intermediates will get pins and certificates. Swimmers will get patches for their swim suits.

WSI personnel assisting Mrs. Lewis and Mrs. Flusche are Carol Henscheid, Dorna Flusche, Kathy Luke, Kathy Berres, Jo Ann Pagel, Carolyn Bayer, Wanda Reiter, Karen Wilde and Melissa Teaff.

All of the staff are volunteers. They receive no pay for their efforts. And the city receives nothing for use of the pool.

Grain sorghum is a very important crop in Cooke County, but only about 3,500 acres are planted each year. The livestock industry consumes many times the amount produced. The sorghum looks good, but needs a good rain immediately. Farmers normally expect to make 3-5 thousand pounds per acre. Sorghum is not expected to bring as much this year as in 1973. It will probably sell at \$3.50 to \$4.00 per hundred pounds.

Farm management and moisture are the two big factors in production. Moisture being the important one at the present.

## City Nets 13,095 On Sales Tax and Revenue Sharing

Two checks for a total of \$13,095.09 were received this week by the city of Muenster. One is a Revenue Sharing check in the amount of \$4,925 and the other was a sales tax check in the amount of \$8,170.09.

The sales tax check is for the city's 1 per cent share of the tax collected by the state during the first quarter of this year. It drops sharply from the previous check of \$9,825 for tax collected during the final quarter of 1973, however it is an increase over the remittance of \$6,751 a year ago. Both of those checks reflect the fact that local spending drops considerably in the first quarter. Two big factors accounting for the difference is heavier than usual spending during the Christmas season and lighter spending in the tax paying season.

A statement with the treasurer's check explains that the gross amount collected was \$8,241.27 and the state's 2 per cent collection fee was \$164.83. Adding the previous hold-over amount of \$501.98 and retaining \$408.33 for this time accounts for the check's amount of \$8,170.09.

The revenue sharing check is the city's last equal installment on the \$19,700 given to the city by the federal government during the past fiscal year. The fund has been applied for building and improving local streets.

## Person Arrested In Local Burglary

One person was arrested and all the loot was recovered in the burglary of J. C. Trachta's Palace Drug Store early Saturday. The offender, a minor, is in the Cooke County jail charged with burglary and under a \$5,000 bond.

City Policeman James McDonald said the incident took place about 4:45 a.m. after he noticed someone inside the store. Apparently the burglar also saw him and escaped through a back door. But he was caught later when he came back to get his car, which was parked about a block away.

Articles stolen were a box with \$144 in coins and two cartons of cigarettes. They were dropped behind the building as the burglar left the scene.

Entry was gained by forcing a lock on the front door.

## Steele Continues as Sacred Heart Coach

Good news for athletes and fans of Sacred Heart School came in a report last Thursday that Bob Steele will remain as head coach. A fund raising campaign conducted by the Tiger football players produced the inducement for him to change his mind.

Early in the summer Steele said he was changing jobs, reluctantly. He was happy here but had a considerably better offer at Collinsville, so he was changing for financial reasons.

Then several of the Tigers decided that if it was a matter of money they could do something about it. They made contacts and collected almost enough to make up the difference between Steele's pay here and at Collinsville.

That would be plenty, he said. Considering that he can avoid the expense and trouble of a move, he is willing to accept less than the full difference. Besides, it's hard to turn down fellows who show that kind of spirit, and it's also hard to pull up roots after living here for two years.

So, Steele will stay on the job, confident that the Tigers will continue their fine record of the past two years. They were 18-2-1 through two seasons of football and also won seven team trophies in track.

He said he's looking forward to the Tigers' first practice session on August 12 and reminds the boys that their field house will be open on August 1. They are encouraged to start shaping up then, if not sooner, by running and weight

## County Taxpayers Get New Valuation Notices

Taxpayers of Cooke County have received the bad news relative to extensive changes in the valuations of real and personal property in the county.

Jo Hillis, tax assessor-collector said last week that 20,800 notices have been sent out advising people of the

changes. She also said that anyone wishing to discuss his revised assessment can make an appointment this week for a conference next week. The meeting will be with a representative of Professional Appraisers of Fort Worth, which was engaged by the Commissioners Court to study and revise the county tax structure in an effort to equalize the tax. Phone number for making the appointment is 665-0386.

Those appointments are to continue through the week of July 15-19, and problems not settled then can be taken to the county equalization board. Persons are advised that they take the risk of a long wait if they come without an appointment.

Principal changes in the equalization effort concerns land, mineral and industry valuations. Previously most land renditions ranged from \$10 to \$50 an acre. The range now is \$200 to \$225 per acre depending on agricultural productivity, and non-farm land is valued as high as \$700 per acre. On this basis, estimated total valuations are increased from \$240 million to \$410 million. However, taxable value now is set at 20 per cent of actual value whereas it used to be set at 25 per cent, hence the taxable value increases from \$60 million to \$82 million.

Applying last year's tax rate of \$1.02 per \$100 of valuation, the county's total tax receipts should come to about \$820,000. But the rate still is not determined. Before it can be set the board of equalization will have to finalize the assessments and the commissioners court will have to consider total valuations along with budgets needs to decide the tax rate.

## Deposits, Loans At Muenster Bank Set New Records

Deposits and loans of Muenster State Bank have soared to new high figures reflecting gains for both the past year and the past quarter.

The figures were revealed last week in response to a call from the state banking commission for a report of condition as of the close of business on June 30, 1974.

Total deposits here were shown as \$7,934,600, a gain of \$1,261,762 during the past year and a gain of \$537,179 for the past quarter.

Total loans were shown at \$3,238,953, a gain of \$279,022 since June 30 last year and also a gain of \$105,338 since April 24 of this year.

Combined deposits and loans for the four Cooke County banks likewise gained for both the past year and the past quarter.

Total deposits were \$60,198,748, for a gain of 6,052,623 during the past year and a gain of 1,221,431 during the past three months. Total loans were \$31,957,893, for a gain of 3,708,313 since June 30 last year and a gain of \$2,903,560 since April 24.
