
Soybeans will grow on land not suitable to alfalfa or clover, because of lack of lime, poor drainage or some other reason. Dairymen who cannot grow alfalfa have found soybeans an answer to their need for a hay crop rich in food value.

A soy variety which will reach the hay stage in late summer, before the fall rains start, is best for hay purposes, Purdue says. You'll find a variety recommended for your area, which your county agent can tell you about.

It would be a good idea to get copies of Bulletins 231 and 346 from the Extension Service, Purdue University, Lafayette, Ind., for some interesting information on soybeans.






