The recent boorish behavior of AFL-CIO President George Meany toward President Nixon makes it very clear that the labor boss is getting too big for his britches. Meany long ago ceased to be the working man's champion in our economy, and rather has become an opportunist using his important position to throw his weight around.

Even more tragically, he has ceased long ago to represent the best interests of the people he leads. Years of insistence on wage increases which are not justified by production increases have resulted in price increases that hurt the workers as well as the average consumers and have, furthermore, caused millions of workers to lose their jobs.

Meany's attitude continues in his new job as a member of the nation's wage control board. He displayed his own lack of cooperation by maneuvering a lusty salary raise for himself and he has served notice that he intends to follow a policy that is partial to labor. He wants to preserve his image as a great leader by insisting that his members feel less of the pinch in our country's economic adjustment.

Senator John Tower in last week's report to the state said he believed at one time that government fiscal and monetary policies were the principal cause of inflation, but he doesn't think so any more. He is convinced now that the major cause of the inflationary spiral in recent years is the concentration of economic power in the hands of organized labor.

He said "the imbalance came about largely because the basic labor laws under which we operate today are outmoded products of the 1920s and 1930s, enacted to deal with the circumstances of that era.

"These laws have put up a statutory wall of protection for organized labor behind which it can operate with little restraint. The result is that organized labor can virtually bring an industry to its knees, forcing it to accept wage contracts that go beyond any rational relationship to productivity. These settlements drive up production costs, drive up prices and fuel inflation."

As a step toward solution of that condition, Tower has proposed legislation to take jurisdiction in handling unfair labor practice cases from the National Labor Relations Board and return it to the federal courts. Many people have wondered why this method was ever adopted. Obviously partiality was to be expected when Labor's own members sat in judgment on labor cases.

One might say also that another big reason for labor's domination of the economy is its political influence attained through compulsory unionism and unaccountability in the use of union dues. The closed shop made economic slaves of the workers. They have to keep up their membership to hold their jobs and they have to pay whatever dues they are assessed by leaders who apply those political funds without regard to the wishes of the individual members. The end result is that labor bosses have the financial power to influence elections, and they are able to exert political pressure on members of Congress.

So, another reform is in order, along with the one that Senator Tower proposes to strip the NLRB of its power. And that is to strip union bosses of their political power by eliminating compulsory unionism.

The mere mention of that, of course, brings howls of anguish from Labor and charges of an attempt to enslave the working man. But is it true? A little more thought reveals that this liberates rather than enslaves. The fact is that workers are in bondage now, subject to the orders of their bosses. They do as they are told or go hungry. They contribute toward political candidates that they personally oppose.

Suppose, however, that compulsory unionism were banished, that a worker could hold his job and still be free to join or not to join a union. Of course the unions would remain in business, but their attitudes would be altogether different. They'd have to solicit and keep members on merit rather than compulsion. Their first concern would be to do a good job for their

## Bloodmobile to Visit Here on December 22

Another deposit is due in this community's blood bank. David Bright, administrator of Muenster Hospital and custodian of the blood bank account, announced this week that the bloodmobile will make its semi-annual visit here on Wednesday, December 22.

Facilities for donating will be set up in the K of C hall basement from 2 to 7 p.m. Local volunteer nurses will assist technicians from the Red Cross Blood Bank of Wichita Falls in collecting the blood and members of the hospital auxiliary will help with the clerical work and serve coffee and doughnuts. The community's quota this time is 80 pints. According to previous experience this means that about 100 will need to register. Normally some volunteers are not accepted because of present physical condition or medical history.

This community is one of many participating in the Red

Cross Blood Bank program of Wichita Falls. Blood donated here is credited to Muenster's account in the bank and is available without charge to patients of Muenster Hospital and residents of the hospital district if they need blood for surgery in another hospital. The only charge is for service, which covers collecting, packaging, storing, transporting, typing, infusing etc. That means that the actual cost per unit to the patient is \$25 to \$30 below normal. At the same time the hospital saves about \$150 per month in stocking fees.

The blood bank system includes a number of areas with bloodmobile visits so that fresh blood is always available. Each community in its turn furnishes blood for all the others.

Local sponsors of the program are the VFW Post and the K of C Council. J. W. Fisher is the community chairman.

## City's Final Step In Yule Lighting Awaits Weather

The new look in the city's Christmas lighting scheme is mostly installed and the rest of the job awaits more favorable weather.

The finished part consists of 5 strings of lights across Main and six across the highway with brackets for each to angle the ends downward at 45 degrees. This replaces the former straight across installation. Another change is the addition of a flasher in each third socket, which seems to give life to the display.

To be completed when weather permits is installation of the Noel sign on the elevated water tank and installation of about 300 lights on five strings on the tank tower. Yellow lights will be used for Noel because they stand out more prominently at a distance. Other colors will be used for the tower. Those five strings are some of the left overs from previous years and others will be worked into next year's scheme.

Decoration changes resulted from a Chamber of Commerce project, with the city's cooperation. It involved a city wide drive for contributions to finance construction of the framework for the Noel display as well as the angle brackets for stringers across the street.

Ernest Jaska reported this week that almost all donations have been turned in but several more are still expected. Jaska, Ray Wilde and Mrs. Bertha Hamric are accepting the donations. They intend to publish the total amount and the list of donors next week.
