Iowa's Farm "War."

NEWS from the battlefield in Iowa, where national guardsmen have been engaged in a distressing guerrilla warfare with infuriated farmers, is that a truce has been established and the soldiers may soon be able to return to their homes.

The situation is interesting from the viewpoint of the Texas cotton farmer who next year will operate under regulations provided by the special legislative session.

Lower Utility Rates

ENCOURAGED by the success achieved in a few Texas cities by municipal administrations that have forced downward the rates charged for natural gas service, and inspired by the fact that most commodity prices are lower now than they were two years ago, the city councils at a number of points are attempting to make rate revisions affecting the electric, telephone, gas and other utilities.

A wave of opposition to public utilities of all kinds seems to be sweeping over the country just now, probably as a result of some outstanding instances in the north and east in which utility magnates have exercised unreasonable and

undesirable influence in political matters. The popular clamor for rate reductions is encouraged also by the economic conditions under which all the patrons of the utilities are laboring.

Some of the items entering into the cost of doing business that have not been reduced a penny in the utility field are the capital investment in physical property, the bonds issued for financing extensions of service, the taxes paid upon the property, the depreciation and replacement losses that are inescapable, and similar items.

The Bulletin is not habitually a defender of the public utilities, but believes that the facts here stated are clear to every thinking person who looks at the question of utility rates with an open mind.

Promoting Beer Bills

DISPATCHES from Washington indicate that a flood of "beer bills" will be offered in the House of Representatives when Congress convenes, and that similar proposals will be made in the Senate.

There is little likelihood that any of the "beer bills" will register material progress, because there is a decided majority in both houses of Congress opposed to any modification of the prohibition laws.

Senator Capper, in a statement a day or two ago, pointed out another fact that should be kept in mind in this connection. Even if Congress should surprise everybody and enact legislation permitting the sale of light wines and beers, or either, it would be effective in only four states because all the others have their own prohibition laws and enforcement regulations and most of them have prohibition written into their state constitutions.

The wets can not destroy prohibition by direct attacks. They can not remove the Eighteenth Amendment, or effectively amend the Volstead law. They can, and do, wage an annoying guerrilla warfare for and confidence in the national prohibition statutes; but even that type of warfare is losing its effectiveness.

A. J. Crawford, Who Died at Home of His Daughter Here Sunday, First Native White Child San Saba County

A. J. Crawford, Jr., 74, the first white child born in San Saba county, passed away at the home of a daughter, Mrs. B. F. Fairchild, 304 Ryan street, at 5:30 o'clock Sunday morning. Funeral services were held at San Saba at 5 o'clock Sunday afternoon. Rev. E. Z. Parker of Eden officiated and was assisted by Rev. J. M. Parker and Rev. I. K. Floyd of Brownwood.

Mr. Crawford had been in ill health for about five years, having suffered a stroke of paralysis five years ago and another stroke some months later. The third stroke a few days ago, resulted in his death.

He was one of the thinning group of old timers of this section of Texas who saw the Indians driven out and the country grown and built into one of the most progressive sections in the South.

He attended school in a small log school house and lived all his life in San Saba county. He was one of the prominent ranchmen of the county and took an active part in the affairs of his ranch until a few years ago.

He is survived by five children: Mrs. J. M. Vick, Brockenshire; F. L. Crawford, San Saba; Mrs. B. F. Fairchild, Brownwood; Mrs. E. L. Boyce, Brownwood; and Mrs. A. L. Brown, Arkansas Pass. Five brothers and sisters also survive.

TRADERS STRIKE AT DENVER UNION STOCK YARDS MOST SERIOUS

DENVER, Sept. 30.—(AP)—A traders strike at the Denver Union stock yards assumed serious proportions today with livestockmen moving their stock to other markets rather than pay a charge of 14 cents a head on reweigh stocker and feeder cattle.

Some observers estimated the strike, which has paralyzed trading in stockers and feeders, had cost the livestock industry in Colorado approximately \$50,000. Traders called the strike Monday when the 14-cent reweigh charge ordered by Arthur M. Hyde, secretary of agriculture, went into effect.

Traders refused to buy stocker and feeder cattle on ground they cannot afford to pay the 14-cent charge. As a result shippers had to remove their stock from the Denver yards and reship them to other markets.

The inauguration of the 14-cent reweigh charge on stocker and feeder cattle followed an order by Secretary Hyde several months ago in which the Denver union stockyards company was instructed to reduce its handling rate from 35 to 23 cents per head.

ROAD SURVEY COUNTY LINE TO MULLIN TO BE MADE, BURKS REPORTS

A permanent highway survey will be made from the Brown county line to the town of Mullin in Mills county, a distance of ten miles, according to a report made by Section Burks at the Chamber of Commerce luncheon Wednesday. Mr. Gilchrist of the state highway department ordering the survey and a verbal agreement with Resident Engineer Leo Ehlinger that the survey will start next Monday or soon after.

Statistics show that about 85 per cent of the business is done by women and through the Federated Club of the city the Business and Professional Women's Club hopes to sponsor a successful buying program.

To Put Idle to Work. Secretary Burks was instructed to see the city and county officers and work out some agreement by which all idle men in the city will go to work or be arrested for vagrancy.

Auto Wreck Fatal To One Of Trio In Speakeasy Holdup

WARREN, O., Sept. 30.—(AP)—One of three men captured when their automobile was wrecked last night while fleeing from a speakeasy slaying and hold-up died today.

The dead man was George Spragins, 30, Cleveland. His two companions, George Barrett, 30, and John Davis, 36, also of Cleveland, were in a critical condition, and hospital attendants said there was no hope for Barrett's recovery.

The trio started for Cleveland but had just passed the city limits when their automobile nicked another machine and was thrown against a tree.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 1-(AP)—With Missouri now in line, ten states will arrive to help their own unemployed this winter.

Completion of an organization in Missouri to care for its unemployed was announced today by President Hoover.

The President received a telegram from Governor Caulfield informing him of the set-up and said he was "glad" to announce it.

"The following states in addition to Missouri," the President said, "have indicated their ability to undertake their own problem: Rhode Island, Indiana, Michigan, Connecticut, Illinois, New York, California, West Virginia and Delaware."

In his telegram, Governor Caulfield said he shared the President's "feeling that this problem should be met by private effort and that great need would result could each community take care of its own citizens."

Representatives of business tomorrow will present their own prescriptions for handling the country's most vexing economic problems.

The directors of the Chamber of Commerce of the United States will be presented with reports from committees which since early in the year have been scrutinizing the troubles besetting industry and the country as a whole.

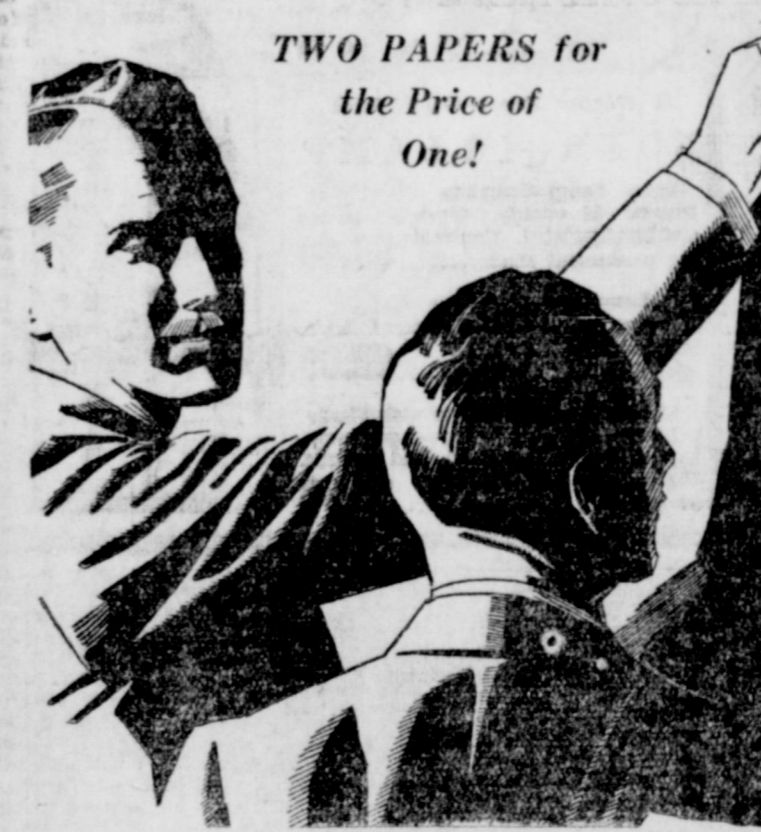

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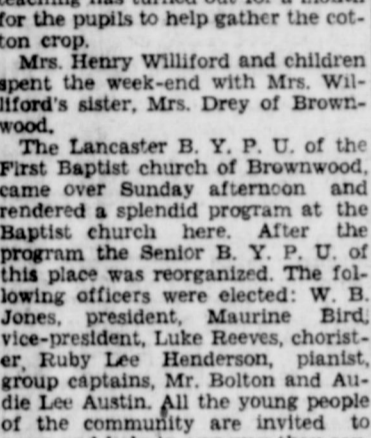
