President Nixon's address to the nation last week, in which he called for a moratorium on pupil-busing orders by the federal courts, was a step in the right direction but unfortunately it did not go far enough. In asking for a ban on further busing he seemed to imply that it's all right to continue busing where it's already in effect.

That's what prompted George Wallace to criticize the proposal. He says that if it's wrong to issue new busing orders it's also wrong to keep observing old busing orders. It's hard to argue with that logic. And Congress, in shaping up legislation to settle the issue will have to be consistent. If it prevents further busing it will also have to nullify the old busing order.

Another disappointment was the president's failure to ask for a constitutional amendment. Instead he brushed aside the idea with a remark that it would take too long. And in doing that he actually left the matter in the hands of the courts under the same arrangement that causes all of the present mischief.

Suppose Congress comes up with a solution which the judges rule to be unconstitutional. We'd be back in the same old mess. The courts could still quote their interpretation of the constitution, and issue orders for the nation to comply according to their way.

We'd have been more pleased if the president had asked for the moratorium for a period during which the nation could decide whether it wants to settle the problem with a constitutional amendment. It might take a bit of time, but that would be well spent if it would bring forth a definite and permanent mandate from the American public.

Actually, an amendment seems like the only reasonable solution. Furthermore it seems like the most pleasing method to the legislators because it would excuse them from responsibility whatever way the issue is finally decided.

The important point here is that Congress, in passing legislation for the amendment, only provides for the states an opportunity to approve or reject busing for racial balance. What happens in the end is up to the public.

From this standpoint one would think that Congress would be eager to refer the problem to the people. Regardless of what a legislator thinks of the issue personally, it's a way to evade political repercussion from both sides while allowing the grass roots to resolve the problem for itself.

Lots of people would be delighted if Congress decides on that solution — mostly because so many are convinced that busing for racial balance is about the biggest boner ever foisted on the country. The left leaning idealists who came up with this brainstorm did not seem to realize that it violates the very sacred high court decree of 1954, that it's an inexcusable burden to the children concerned, a waste of time and money, a violation of rights of both parents and students.

Perhaps this column is guilty of over-simplifying the issue, but it is completely convinced that busing is a violation of the famous 1954 Supreme Court order. The verdict then was that no student can be denied admittance to (Continued on Page 8)

Busing Issue Will Be on Ballot Of May 6 Primary

Texas voters will get a chance to express themselves at the May 6 polls on the explosive issue of forced busing to achieve racial balance in public schools.

Both Democratic and Republican executive committees decided to put a busing referendum on the ballot to encourage voter turnout and demonstrate Texas sentiments to federal authorities. Both ballot items ask Texans to state whether they want a federal constitutional amendment to outlaw forced busing.

Neither party went along with Gov. Preston Smith's suggestion to submit to voters a presidential preference referendum. There isn't much choice for the Republicans, and Democrats dropped the presidential choice poll (which would have had no binding effect anyway) in a scrap over party rules.

New Ordinance On Junk, Trash Passed by Council

Muenster City Council in its regular meeting Monday night passed an ordinance granting authority to demand removal of junk from city streets and private property and also considered the feasibility of setting up a garbage pick-up service.

Regarding the ordinance, the purpose is to be able to dispose of old, discarded items which become an eyesore as well as a health hazard. Reference was made to abandoned automobiles and other kinds of junk which become ugly, broken down havens for rats and possible cause of injury to children.

It differs from the former law in that a property owner is not solely responsible for the condition of a place. A tenant who allows an objectionable condition to develop is to be given a 10 days notice to clean up. If he fails the city can impose a fine and cut off his water service.

The discussion on garbage pickup followed an inquiry on the feasibility of maintaining it here. After considering related costs such as buying a site to bury the garbage and the equipment to transport and bury it and labor costs, the council agreed that people would balk at the necessary charge for service. Also mentioned was the fact that a straw vote here some years ago soundly rejected the idea.

Councilmen agreed to share costs on a 50-50 basis with the Jaycees in their park improvement project.

JCs Start Work On Park Projects

The annual fix-up project sponsored by Muenster Jaycees at the city park is starting this week.

Dan Hamric, chairman, said Monday that the job includes installation of two basketball goals north of the swim pool and the court will get an asphalt surface this summer.

Also on schedule are erection of two barbecue grills and ten additional picnic tables. These tables will have metal frames with redwood seats and tops and all will be mounted on cement platforms.

In addition the Jaycees plan a general paint up, cable repairs at the tennis courts and higher net posts so that the courts can be used for both tennis and volley ball.

Junior Stock Show Was Bonanza for 4-H and FFA

The biggest financial success in the long history of the Cooke County junior livestock show and sale was held last Thursday and Friday in Gainesville. At the sale held Friday night at Gainesville Livestock Auction, individuals and business firms paid over \$39,000 for the animals, including premiums of over \$14,600.

The champion calf sold at \$1.10 a pound and the reserve champ at \$1.13 a pound, over \$1000 each. Also the champion lamb brought over \$140 and the champion hog over \$300.

Customary procedure prevailed at the sale. Animals were sold at auction at premium prices and buyers had the option of keeping them or selling at auction to someone else. First State Bank of Gainesville bought the two champion calves and re-sold them. H & W Meat Co. bought and kept the grand champion lamb and reserve champion hog and also bought eight of the calves which were re-sold.

There were 205 animals in the show. Of those there were 61 calves judged by John Holland, county agent of Clay county. Owners of the champ-

ion and reserve champion in the division were Terry Ward of Sivelis Bend and Michael Tibbets of Gainesville. The lamb division had 60 entries, judged by Dr. Jimmy Wolf, ag instructor of ETSU. Both of the top animals were shown by 10-year old Dean Beal of Era.

There were 84 hog entries judged by Jack Boston, ag teacher at Sherman High, and the champ awards went to Pam West of Gainesville and Ricky Johnson of Era.

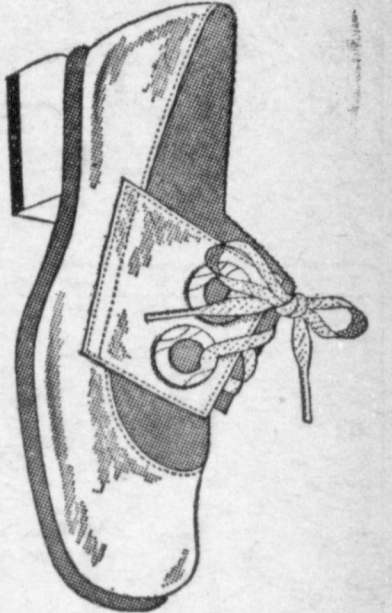

Another copy of the return, poll list, and tally sheet of said election shall be delivered to the president of the Board of Directors in an unsealed envelope and this envelope shall be available in the office of the Administrator open to inspection by the public for 60 days from the date of the election.

7. The presiding judge for said election shall return to District Clerk immediately after the votes have been counted the ballot box containing the voted ballots and all other election supplies and said ballot box shall be preserved and kept in accordance with the terms and provisions of the Texas Election Code.

8. The Board of Directors shall give notice of said election and this combined Election Order and Notice shall serve as Notice for said election. The President of the Board of Directors is hereby authorized and instructed to post or cause to have posted said combined Election Order and Notice at three public places where notices are customarily posted in this hospital district, and said posting shall be made at least 15 days before the date of said election. The President shall also cause a copy of this combined Election Order and Notice to be published one time in a newspaper of general circulation in the county where this hospital district is located. Said publication shall be not more

than 15 days nor less than 5 days before the date of said election. The above order being read, it was moved and seconded that the same do pass. Mrs. Biffle was pianist for group singing and special requests from residents.

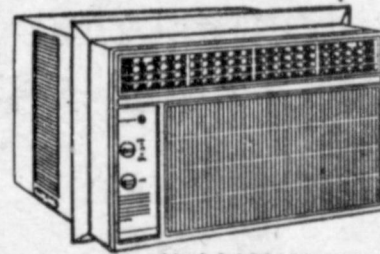

... a school because of race or creed. In plain English that meant that any child has a right to attend where it pleases. But that meaning does not apply in busing. The record shows that millions of kids are not permitted to attend their neighborhood schools. It leaves little doubt that education is subordinate to integration as a motive.

This situation also points to a hypocritical and deceitful use of the word desegregate. We hear endless repetition of the term, as if to claim that children are denied their right to go where they wish. Well, that's not the case. It's doubtful whether any school in the country today turns away a child because of race. In other words segregation is a phony charge, and busing is not a process to achieve desegregation but rather a process of forced integration. And forced integration violates an individual's rights as much as segregation used to.

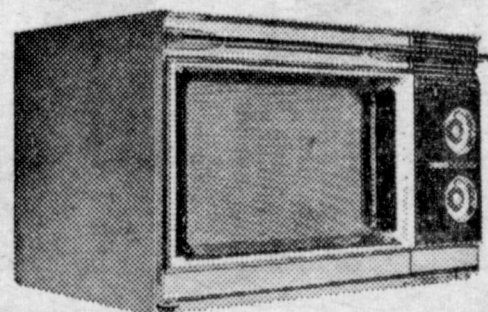
