Texas law that falls under the First
Amendment of the United States
Constitution.

The Open Records Law states that all information collected, assembled or maintained by or for governmental bodies according to law or ordinance in connection with the transaction of official business must be made available, upon request, to the news media or the other members of the public.

There are two types of records, readily available material and non-readily available materials.

Copies of readily available materials must be provided immediately upon request. Readily available materials are records on letter or legal-size paper that can be copied on a copying machine and the charge is \$.10 per copy.

Non-readily available materials must be provided within a reasonable time, within 10 days. Non-readily available materials are

Proper management of these lands is essential for continued production of livestock. The most effective management tool for rangeland is termed Proper Grazing Use.

Use.

Proper grazing use is the manipulation of livestock as to their grazing of available forage. Manipulation refers to the number of livestock and the amount of time the livestock have access to the

has been phrased "take half and leave half." If livestock are allowed to graze only half of the current year's growth, the plant will be able to survive harsh conditions and maintain its growth and production. The forage production rather than livestock condition is the indicator of good management, for livestock can live on poor vegetation for some time.

Ag Brief

Little difference exists between the final quality of meat from calf and yearling-fed cattle, according to two separate experiments conducted at Texas A&M University. The check-off-funded research also showed yearlings gained weight more rapidly, though less efficiently, than calves and had higher cutability. However, cutability differences would have narrowed had the calves been slaughtered at a lighter weight. - NCA

nitrogen use

Fertilizer use in the United States for 1994 was as follows; nitrogen, 12,643,000 nutrient tons, up 11 percent from 1993; phosphorus, 4,521,000 nutrient tons, up 2 percent; and potash, 5,268,000 nutrient tons, up 2 percent. Total nutrient use was up 7 percent higher in 1994 than in 1993.

Corn was the largest fertilizer using crop, followed by wheat. In Texas, we used 1,040,000 nutrient tons of pitosphorus and 159,000 nutrient tons of phosphorus and 159,000 nutrient tons of potash. Texas was the leading user of nitrogen fertilizers.

RANCH TO RAIL/ TEX-VAC PROGRAM

Now, with many vaccinations available to choose from, producers must understand basic principles of vaccination for an immunization program to work as effectively as possible. TEX-VAC, short for the Texas Value Added Calf, is a calf management program designed to produce a high quality, market ready calf that will be efficient and profitable for the industry. TEX-VAC is also designed to strengthen the Beef Quality Excellence in Texas Program sponsored by the Texas Beef Industry Council. The program is a complete program consisting of calf working, nutrition, and backgrounding.

Ranch to Rail is a program sponsored by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service which allows producers to nominate and submit steers to north Texas or south Texas feedlots. These steers are completely monitored and producers receive performance data at the end of the test on their cattle. Dr. Ron Gill, Extension Livestock Specialist, will present a program on both beef aspects on Thursday, April 13, at 7 p.m., at the North Central Texas College. The program will be held in Room 410 of the Science Building. Beef cattle producers are invited to attend.

LEAF RUST ON WHEAT

LEAF RUST ON WHEAT

To spray or not to spray? That could be a \$100,000 question. Early reports indicate this may be a bad year for rust on wheat. The relatively warm, wet winter allowed the rust fungus to grow and spread. Left untreated, severe rust on the flag leaf can result in little to no yield. Treatment with fungicides such as Tilt (Ciba) and Bayleton (Bayer) will allow for grain production.

Generally speaking, unless you have a poor stand or some other contributing factor that would reduce yield, fungicide applications are economical. Hardest hit are the varieties 2163 and 525. However, the 2163 variety does have some adult plant resistance, so it may produce more than expected. Check your hard wheat varieties closely and your soft wheats for Stripe Rust. We found quite a bit of both Leaf Rust and Stripe Rust this past week on a County Wheat Tour.

Recent cold temperatures increase

Recent cold temperatures increase questions about whether to spray fungicides for rust control. Damage from cold temperatures depends on how high the head is in the boot. Assess freeze damage before deciding whether to spray fungicides for rust control.

Highest yields are normally obtained when the flag leaf is protected. Economically, few can afford to start a fungicide program

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until the flag leaf is emerging. Tilt can be applied until growth stage 8.5, but higher yields are obtained when it is applied to the emerging flag leaf. To avoid possible illegai residues, remember not to apply Tilt after growth stage 8.5. Only one application (4 fl. oz. Tilt per acre) is allowed per season. Bayleton is applied at 4 oz. per acre (Baleton 50%DF). According to John Cagle of Bayer Chemical, Bayleton can be applied later in the season than Tilt and after head emergence. The total amount of Bayleton 50%DF should not exceed 16 oz. per acre per season. The last application should not be made

in the season.

Try to use 5 gallons of water by air plus a silicone surfactant with your spray application.
