German immigration to Texas explored at forum

The experience of German immigrants in Cooke and Denton counties was the focus of discussion at the second in a series of "Breaking the Silence: Voices of the New Texas," a trio of forums on ethnic diversity at North Central Texas College Thursday, March 23. The forums were made possible by a grant from the Texas Commission on the Humanities.

Rodney Hess, a graduate student in history at the University of North Texas and a lab instructor for NCTC was the commentator on the panel. As a descendant of Frank Hess, one of the original Muenster colonists, he discussed the traditions of the turn of the century of German immigrants in Muenster - his hometown, that survived to a certain degree in the 20th century.

Hess noted that the first trait to disappear was the German language. Hess explained that some of the first generation settlers were angry when their grandchildren began abandoning the German language.

Hess cited early-day traditions that survived into modern times. He detailed the military Schutzenfest - a marksmanship contest that celebrated the Germanic traditions of military preparedness; the Saint

Nicholas traditions of early December and the communal cooperation of hog-killing time. He saw the modern-day Germanfest as a survivor of the frontier spirit of cooperation in the city.

Dr. Dale Odom of the history department at UNT presented a scholarly discussion of German immigration to America in general and to Texas in specific.

Odom noted that the periods between 1845-1855 and 1880-1890 were the great age of migration of Germans to the United States. He noted that although the factors for coming to America were many, the primary motivation was for farming people to come to America during times of agricultural distress in the homeland.

The lure was abundant, productive farmland in the American plains. Odom noted that the German farmers came from a tradition of intensive farming, by which small farms were worked to the full potential, a practice which led to German-American farms which were comparatively more productive than their non-German counterparts.

Both Odom and Hess noted that the most significant event in the assimilation of German-American

communities like Lindsay and Muenster was World War I. This was a time in which anti-German sentiment was high across America. While rumors were drift around the country about pro-Kaiser sentiment in Muenster, the town was the first in the county to fulfill its war-bond quota and a Muensterite was the first Cooke County man conscripted by the draft.

Mr. Joe Walter, a member from the audience who recalled the early days of German-American interaction, provided personal testimony to these traditions.

The moderator of the forum, Mr. Robert McDaniel of the Muenster High School faculty, provided commentary about the life of the non-German living and working in a German community.

The last of the ethnic diversity seminars, "The Hispanic Experience in Texas," has been rescheduled for Thursday, April 13, from 6:30 to 8 p.m. in the NCTC Library Lyceum. The scholar will be Dr. Rudy Rodriguez of Texas Woman's University.

Cooke County Chorale to present Great Choral Masterpieces April 18 at 7:30 p.m. in Gainesville

After performing selections from Handel's *Messiah* for a standing-room-only crowd in December, what can Cooke County's classical choral group do to follow?

Those who say "definitely something great," are on the right track. Director Mike Linder, Accompanist John David Dill and more than 55 singers in the Cooke County Chorale will present Great Choral Masterpieces Tuesday,

April 18 at 7:30 p.m. at First Baptist Church, Gainesville. Admission price will be \$3.

Great Choral Masterpieces consist of a variety of pieces--both in age and style--that choral musicians would probably list as the major choral *octavos*. Composers and their works include: Beethoven, "Hallelujah," from *Mount of Olives*; Franz Biebl, "Ave Maria" 1985; William Billings,

"Easter Anthem"; Fred Bock, "Praise God!" 1971; Johannes Brahms, "How Lovely Is Thy Dwelling-Place" from *Requiem*; Cesar Franc, "Psalm 150," 1800s; Joseph Haydn, "The Heavens are Telling," from *The Creation*; W.A. Mozart, "Gloria in Excelsis"; and P. Tschesnokoff, "Salvation is Created," 1991.

The Beethoven, Brahms, Haydn and Mozart pieces represent "standard" and "familiarity". However, the rest of the program could be an educational, as well as enjoyable experience.

For example, the "Ave Maria" setting has been done since medieval times; however, this 1985 composition may not be well known in Cooke County. Linder became familiar with it through a

recording by the Men's Choir Chanticleer.

Two works are by Americans. First of all, the Billings "Easter Anthem" was chosen. The 18th century composer is regarded as the first great American composer. The other American represented, Fred Bock, has composed a lively "Praise God!" which, along with a piece "Psalm 150" will showcase the First Baptist Church's newly improved pipe organ.

Continuing the diversity, Tschesnokoff will offer the Eastern European richness, with "majestic harmonies," said Linder. And those who like the Brahms piece will get a taste of what's to come--the Brahms *Requiem* with full orchestra for the Fall 1995 concert.

Civic Outlook

The Open Records Law is a Texas law that falls under the First Amendment of the United States Constitution.
The Open Records Law states that all information collected, assembled or maintained by or for governmental bodies according to law or ordinance in connection with the transaction of official business must be made available, upon request, to the news media or the other members of the public.
There are two types of records, readily available material and non-readily available materials.
Copies of readily available material must be provided immediately upon request. Readily available materials are records on letter or legal-size paper that can be copied on a copying machine and the charge is \$.10 per copy.
Non-readily available materials must be provided within a reasonable time, within 10 days. Non-readily available materials are

records that must be run off a computer program, copies of meetings' tapes, copies of microfilm, etc. All charges for copies must be at cost.
If a public official refuses to provide the materials when requested, they are subject to lawsuits and fines, court costs, etc.
Last month, I requested copies of letter and legal-size materials and boy! did that cause a rife with Arthur Hennigan. I took a lot of flack from him at the Monday night meeting. He even pressed for a motion that no records in city hall had to be given out without a 10-days notice.
Here again, we have a motion and vote that is VOID. The City of Muenster is a general law city and we cannot set our own rules that are in contradiction to state law.
It is part of city officials' jobs to make public records available to the public. After all, Arthur, it is our public money.

Bailey marker to be dedicated April 9

A gravesite marker honoring a turn-of-the-century Texas political figure will be unveiled at Fairview Cemetery in Gainesville at 2 p.m. Sunday, April 9.
The plaque honors Senator Joseph Weldon Bailey (1863-1929), who represented North Texas in the United States House of Representatives and the State of Texas in the United States Senate. Senator Bailey also was a member of the Gainesville legal community until he moved his law practice to Dallas

in 1921.
The featured speaker for the occasion will be U.S. Representative Ralph Hall, who occupies the congressional seat once occupied by Sam Rayburn, a protégé of Bailey's. Hall will be introduced by Gainesville Mayor Jim Hatcher. Cooke County Judge Paul Hesse will also participate in the ceremonies.
The marker is an official Texas Historical Commission marker. It cites Bailey as a "colorful and controversial politician ... known for his oratorical skills and fiery temper."

From My Side of the Fence by Ed Cler

Since Fischer's purchased the old Wolf Hotel, or Ranch, and dismantled it, Muenster has a somewhat new look. Much more openness.

It takes a lot of getting used to, as one after another of the old landmarks disappear.

Looking back over quite a number of years, the changes made on N. Main Street are more numerous than one would first believe.

In '46, Endres Motor Co. took over the old Herr Motor Co. property, and later replaced the buildings with a modern and much more attractive structure. In '94 they purchased the Ben Seyler, or Tuggle Motor Co. property, and after considerable renovation, they now have a spacious and up-to-date auto agency and a larger garage to service the many vehicles they sell.

When Ben Seyler first started selling cars, he began his business in the old Hoening grocery and dry goods store which ceased to exist when Ben built the garage that Endres Motor Co. has just taken over.

Moving north on Main, the Frank Schenk property has given way to more modern buildings, that now house a number of businesses, and the old Pagel's store has been replaced by an attractive brick structure that was built by Maurice Pagel for his grocery and dry goods business. This building has since been taken over by Jim Gehrig for his hardware store and shoe shop, as well as a variety of other departments.

The old Henry Hennigan Garage has been given a new look, and now houses a number of small businesses, such as Fischerhaus, The Crafty Olde German, and an antique and collectible shop.

Next in line, the old Gehrig property is now being renovated for a new venture.

Charlie Pagel's grocery and dry goods store, and Joe Trachta's egg and chicken market once stood on the lot now used as parking space by Fischer's Market, who in 1962, after buying and renovating the J.B. Wilde garage building, moved their entire business from 215 N. Main to its present location at 304 N. Main.

It is my understanding that Fischers intend to incorporate their newly acquired space and their present store into one large unit to house and enlarge their entire business.

Just to the north of Fischer's stands Muenster Milling Co., which was originally built as a flour mill by Joe Luke and Martin Friske, in 1922. Anyone not familiar with the original mill, would have a hard time picking it out of the present structure. Sometime between 1929 and 1932, Joe Felderhoff acquired the Mill and operated it in one form or another, until his tragic death in 1937.

For a number of years after Joe's demise, the Mill was operated by several different people, or partnerships, who rented the property from Mrs. Felderhoff.

Eventually the entire business was taken over by Joe's son, Arthur, who, with members of his own family, built it into the diversified and thriving business it is today.

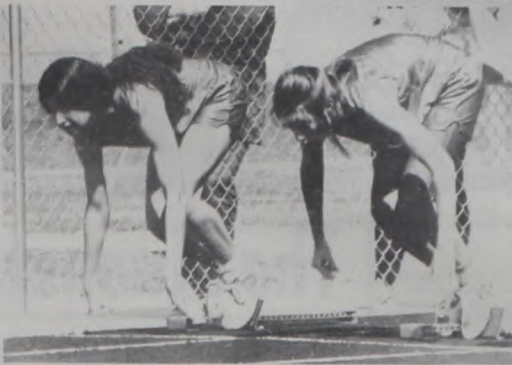

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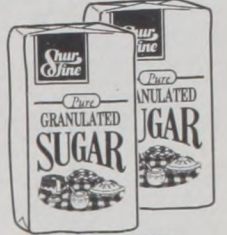
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
