# Change in EMS antenna location will be beneficial

Northeastern Cooke County and all of the county located west of Muenster will soon benefit from a change in the location of the EMS radio repeater and antenna. At the request of EMS Director Bob Harbin, Cooke County Commissioners Court gave its approval at the April 24 regular meeting for Cooke County EMS to apply to the FCC to move the device to another tower.

Presently the radio antenna is located on a 168 foot tower at the county jail. At 148 feet, this isn't sufficiently high enough to provide radio service for the ambulances operating in some areas of the county. Cellular phones are used to communicate when radio communicate of the county.

the cellular phones have areas where communication is impossible within the county. The antenna will be moved to the top of the 400 foot Self tower east of Gainesville.

with area volunteer fire department equipped with the JAWS of Life good communication has become even more important. According to Mr. Harbin there are now three sets of JAWS located at different areas of the county. Besides the one housed at Cooke County EMS, there is one with the Valley View Volunteer Fire Department and one with the Lake Kiowa VFD.

Muenster VFD is currently building a rescue truck and when it is completed the county will provide a JAWS for that truck as well as training for the volunteer firemen. "I think this is going to really enhance emergency service in Cooke County," noted Mr. Harbin. "This is a big step forward, especially to get the volunteer fire departments to work with the JAWS. They can begin to extricate people before we (EMS) can get there. We will save more lives."

Harbin told Commissioners Court that the antenna presently on the Sheriff's Department tower will be left up to be used should something such as a tornado happen to the

The initial cost of setting up at the Self tower is \$3,262.00. There is money in the budget for this, said Harbin. A monthly fee of \$200 will be observed for the second fo

The county's ongoing Rural Addressing Project (911 Location ID) was taken a step further by Commissioners Court. Part-time help will be hired to identify structures by number and residents and to enter the information into a data bank. It is expected that 900 hours will be needed to complete the project

At \$6 per hour, working five days a week, the part-time help will cost the county about \$5,400.00. Mileage will be paid at 0.25 per mile. With an estimated 3,900 miles to cover this will cost about \$975.00

There is \$23,932.00 remaining in the county budget for the Rural Addressing Project. It is expected that is will require only about half that amount, said Cooke County Ludge Paul Hosse.

In an effort to collect \$12,000 in back taxes owed on a tract of land known as the former Curtwood Motel and to get the property back on the tax roll, the Court asked that the property be put up for auction. It fronts 1-35 and is just west of California Street in Gainesville. The land is currently the property of all the taxing entities in the county since being taken in 1991 for delignouser taxes.

The minimum bid must be at least as much as the money owed to all of the taxing entities. This is estimated to be \$45,000. The 1.7 acres has been appraised at Places See EMS Page 2

So what is needed for all this - a lot to build on in a localized area handy to schools and public; funds to build a new building or an existing building that can be converted.

## Melanoma Monday and free skin cancer screening

May 1 is not just another Monday - it's "Melanoma Monday", a nationally recognized day to perform a skin self exam and take note of changes in all moles and pigmented lesions on your skin. Examining your skin on this day will prepare you for a free skin screening, Saturday, May 6 from 9:00 a.m. to 3:00 p.m. The screening is sponsored by the Tarrant and Dallas County Dermatological Societies, "the American Caneer Society and six participating medical facilities. If

you find a change in shape, color or size of a pigmented spot on Melanoma Monday, attend one of the following six sites for a free spot check: M.D. Anderson-Moncrief Radiation Center at Fort Worth, Sammons Cancer Center/Texas Oncology P.A., Baylor-Medical Center at Garland, Medical Center of Plano, Presbyterian Hospital of Dallas, St. Paul Medical Center.

Dermatologists will be on hand to check moles and other spots for signs of cancer and determine if further analysis is needed. No appointments are needed and the screening is open to the public.

Follow the ABCD's to look for signs of melanoma during self-examination. A = one half of the pigmented lesion is unlike the other; B = Border Irregularity - a notched, indefinite or poorly defined border; C = Color variation - shades of brown, tan, areas turning black or losing color, sometimes with a red background; D = Diameter - a growing spot greater in diameter than a pencil eraser may represent melanoma. Self-examination should be performed monthly and especially on Melanoma Monday.

Malignant melanoma risk factors include: people of the Caucasian race, fair skin that burns easily, sun exposure during childhood and adolescence - particularly intense, intermittent exposure, personal or family history, and people with indoor occupations and outdoor recreational habits. If these apply to you, it is important to participate in Melanoma Monday and attend the free screening if necessary.



April is awareness month for defects caused by alcohol

The problem of birth defects caused by pregnant women's abuse of alcohol and drugs is the focus of National Fetal Alcohol Syndrome (FAS) Awareness Month. The Texas Department of Health (TDH) has joined national health authorities and non-profit organizations in the

oined national health authorities and non-producting instructions beervance.

National sponsors of the observance are the federal Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), the National Organization of Fetal Alcohol Syndrome and the National Council on Alcoholism and Drug Dependence.

CDC recently estimated that the incidence rate of newborns liagnosed with FAS before hospital discharge is about one in every 1,300 live births. FAS is diagnosed based on three criteria: growth retardation; central nervous system disorders; and certain facial abnormalities.

Gladws Sanchez, an epidemiologist with the TDH Bureau of the production o

abnormalities.

Gladys Sanchez, an epidemiologist with the TDH Bureau of Epidemiology, said that as many as 600 Texas babies may be born each year with fetal alcohol syndrome. Thousands more have other side-effects of their mother's use of alcohol or drugs during pregnancy. FAS is now one of the conditions being monitored by the Texas Birth Defects Registry being pilot-tested in two of the state's public health regions.

Sanchez explained that alcohol and some drugs used by pregnant women are able to pass through the placenta to affect the unborn child. Substance-abusing mothers also can pass alcohol and drugs to their children in their breast milk.

A child with FAS has irreversible physical and mental impairments. "Typically, an FAS baby will have wide-set eyes, a small head and a smaller-than-normal nose bridge. They can also suffer from heart defects and deafness," Sanchez said.

Other symptoms may be more subtle, appearing only as unusual learning disabilities. Not all children born to alcohol-abusing mothers suffer the same effects. What is certain, according to Sanchez, is that although FAS can be prevented by education and treatment of at-risk women before they are pregnant, it has become the leading cause of mental retardation in the US.

"Early intervention with expectant mothers can make a vital difference in whether their babies are born physically and mentally healthy. It is a difference which can determine the direction of the child's entire life," Sanchez said.

She urged all women who need help avoiding alcohol and drugs while pregnant to call TDH's toll-free maternal and child referral line at 1-800-4-BABYLOVE. 



## Denton Co. Youth Fair steer carcass contest held at Fischer's

by Galen Chandler
Denton County Extension Agent
The Denton County Youth Fair
Steer Carcass Contest was held at
Fischer's Meats in Muenster on
April 12 with about 50 4-Hers,
FFA'ers and parents in attendance.
The carcass contest is an
excellent educational opportunity
for the 4-H and FFA youth to view
their steer projects in its final form
before it's cut into retail cuts. There
were 22 steer carcasses entered this
year.

were 22 steer carcasses entered this year.

Only steers making the youth fair sale and weighing 1300 lbs, and under are eligible for the contest. The Grand and Reserve Champions must be entered in the carcass contest. All steers must dress a minimum of 60% and a maximum of 69%. Carcasses must weigh a minimum of 510 lbs, and a maximum of 575 lbs, to be eligible for placing.

All steers must have a quality grade of USDA Select Average or Better and a yield grade of 1, 2, 3,5 or better. The carcasses are placed based on quality, cut ability, carcass weight and visual appraisal. The carcass judge who was Alan Schluter of Ponder has provided the following data where he makes the placing - fat thickness; ribeye area; percentage of kidney, heart and pelvic fat; carcass weight; quality grade and yield grade and estimated yield of boneless closely trimmed steak and roast meat from the

chuck, loin, rib and round.

The first 10 carcasses are placed with excellent cash premiums totaling \$3,000. The first place carcass receives \$525.00 and a real nice belt buckle donated by the Highview Ranch in Valley View. The premiums range from \$525.00 to \$75.00 for 10th place. The premiums are supported by the Denton County Blue Ribbon Club who also sponsors the contest. Following the contest, each carcass is sold by the halves and whole as a fundraising effort to raise money for next year's contest. A big thank you goes to Fischer's Meats in Muenster for slaughtering the carcasses and allowing us to judge them before the carcass contest.

The placings and breeds for this year's contest are as follows: 1st place, Bodie Noles, Denton 4-H (Maine/Angus Cross); 2nd place, Clay Hawkins, Krum FFA (Limousin); 3rd place, Doug Naylor, Denton 4-H (Limousin); 4th place, Bruce Graham, Krum FFA (Limousin); 5th place, Doug Naylor, Denton 4-H (Alimousin); 5th place, Tiffany Schertz, Sanger FFA (Maine/Angus Cross); 8th place, Ashley Evans, Pilot Point FFA (Limousin/Hereford Cross); 9th place, Kaylie Noles, Denton 4-H (Limousin).

"To ensure the pesticide you are buying is a registered product in the state, check the label for a U.S. Environment Protection Agency registration number and call the Texas Department of Agriculture at 1-800-TELL TDA."

1-800-TELL TDA."
Pesticides must be registered with EPA and TDA before they can be legally used in the state. TDA inspectors ensure that products sold from dealerships meet these requirements, but unregistered products may be sold by salespeople who directly contact a business or solicit customers over the phone.

ginner, joined Mr. Walterscheid in
building, for the times, a very
modern and up-to-date gin, naming
it Muenster Gin Co. This thriving
venture continued in business,
operating through the fall of each
year, until 1945.

Due to the amount of hand labor
needed to raise and harvest cotton,
and the shortage of hands during
World War II, most farmers gave
up cotton. Some took up dairy
farming, and there was just not
enough of the crop in the area to
sustain a profitable operation of a
gin. The gin was sold shortly after,
and was then dismantled and
moved away.

One of my childhood memories
of the gin came about circa 1922
when I was about 7 years old. The
owners had bought a new 2
cylinder diesel engine that, after
being delivered to Muenster by
train, had to be moved to the gin.

This proved to be a formidable
task due to the extreme weight of
the engine. It was decided to drag it
from the depot to the gin on a sled,
using a fairly powerful Case
gasoline tractor that was kept just
across the street, and owned by
John Luke who owned and
operated a small business there.

The tractor moved the load very
slowly, occasionally being brought
to a stop when the wheels would
spin and dig holes in the
unimproved roadway. The operator
would then unhitch and try another
spot, and in this manner the engine
was moved up the grade as far as
2nd Street, where it again pulled
the tractor to a halt.

After the operator tried several
different hitches and only
succeeded in digging more holes, it
was discovered that one of the drive sprockets on the tractor had broken
out a cog, and to save damaging the
tractor any more, it was retired.

Mr. Walterscheid then decided to
get his much heavier AultmanTaylor tractor from his farm about
2 1/2 miles east o


