### Change in EMS antenna location will be beneficial

Northeastern Cooke County and all of the county located west of Muenster will soon benefit from a change in the location of the EMS radio repeater and antenna. At the request of EMS Director Bob Harbin, Cooke County Commissioners Court gave its approval at the April 24 regular meeting for Cooke County EMS to apply to the FCC to move the device to another tower.

Presently the radio antenna is located on a 168 foot tower at the county jail. At 148 feet, this isn't sufficiently high enough to provide radio service for the ambulances operating in some areas of the county. Cellular phones are used to communicate when radio communication doesn't work. Even

the cellular phones have areas where communication is impossible within the county. The antenna will be moved to the top of the 400 foot Self tower east of Gainesville.

With area volunteer fire department equipped with the JAWS of Life good communication has become even more important. According to Mr. Harbin there are now three sets of JAWS located at different areas of the county. Besides the one housed at Cooke County EMS, there is one with the Valley View Volunteer Fire Department and one with the Lake Kiowa VFD.

Muenster VFD is currently building a rescue truck and when it is completed the county will provide a JAWS for that truck as well as training for the volunteer firemen.

"I think this is going to really enhance emergency service in Cooke County," noted Mr. Harbin. "This is a big step forward, especially to get the volunteer fire departments to work with the JAWS. They can begin to extricate people before we (EMS) can get there. We will save more lives."

Harbin told Commissioners Court that the antenna presently on the Sheriff's Department tower will be left up to be used should something such as a tornado happen to the primary tower.

The initial cost of setting up at the Self tower is \$3,262.00. There is money in the budget for this, said Harbin. A monthly fee of \$200 will be charged for the use of the tower.

The county's ongoing Rural Addressing Project (911 Location ID) was taken a step further by Commissioners Court. Part-time help will be hired to identify structures by number and residents and to enter the information into a data bank. It is expected that 900 hours will be needed to complete the project.

At \$6 per hour, working five days a week, the part-time help will cost the county about \$5,400.00. Mileage will be paid at 0.25 per mile. With an estimated 3,900 miles to cover this will cost about \$975.00.

There is \$23,932.00 remaining in the county budget for the Rural Addressing Project. It is expected that it will require only about half that amount, said Cooke County Judge Paul Hesse.

In an effort to collect \$12,000 in back taxes owed on a tract of land known as the former Curtwood Motel and to get the property back on the tax roll, the Court asked that the property be put up for auction. It fronts I-35 and is just west of California Street in Gainesville. The land is currently the property of all the taxing entities in the county since being taken in 1991 for delinquent taxes.

The minimum bid must be at least as much as the money owed to all of the taxing entities. This is estimated to be \$45,000. The 1.7 acres has been appraised at \$975,000. Please See EMS, Page 2

### County and district clerks attend seminar

"It is designed to update participants on duties and responsibilities of their offices, helping them become more capable and effective in serving the public."

"You Are an Elected Public Official" was the theme for the 1995 educational program. Topics and discussions included: Working with a Jury; Working Effectively with the Legislature; Processing Juveniles; Budgeting

and Purchasing; Optical Disk Programming; Informal Probate; State Jail Felonies/ Penal Code; and Proposed and Pending Legislation.

Pat Payne, District Clerk, said, "Talking with others who hold the same office from different counties helps one learn how to handle similar situations and problems if and when they arise."

Sponsors of the seminar were the V.G. Young Institute of County, Government, the County and District Clerks' Association of Texas, the Texas Association of Counties and the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. Clerks who attended receive college credit from Texas A&M University in Continuing Education. State law requires them to complete a minimum of 20 hours of continuing education every 24 months.

### FHA celebrates golden anniversary

June 11, 1995 will mark the 50th anniversary of the National Organization of FHA. This organization began in 1945 and Muenster Public School joined in September 1949 with 40 charter members. April 23-29 is the national observance of the 50th anniversary of FHA.

The mission of FHA is to promote personal growth and leadership development through home economics education. Members develop skills by focusing on the multiple roles of family member, wage earner and community leader.

The colors that represent FHA are red and white. Red suggests strength, courage and determination - personal qualities leading to happiness through a positive self-image. White symbolizes sincerity of purpose and integrity of action, qualities that will help individuals build a better tomorrow.

A red rose represents the flower for FHA because it gives joy through its beauty and fragrance. It symbolizes a desire for beauty in everything living. The emblem we use reads "Future Homemakers of America - Toward New Horizons."

While doing a little research, I would like to recall the very first president and officers in FHA at Muenster Public School: Margie Kathman Wylie, president; Eva Muller Walterscheid, vice-president; Margie Baumhardt, secretary; Lou Edyth Cherry and Lillian Vogel Walterscheid, treasurer; Joan Zipper, historian; Jeanette Walter Karr,

parliamentarian; Mildred Hall, reporter; Jane Hellman Weinzapfel, song leader; Jeanette Fisher Galloway, pianist; Ruby Kelly, sponsor; Mrs. T.S. Myrick and Mrs. M.A. Muller, chapter mothers.

Compared to FHA now, we still have the first six offices in addition to a recreation leader. I believe these founding leaders used their experiences from FHA as a guide throughout their lives. Many of these ladies married, raised a family and had careers.

One of the earliest members, Jane Hellman Weinzapfel, taught Home Economics at Muenster Public School after graduation from NTSU with a Home Economics Education degree. Janie and her husband, Henry, have opened their home to foreign exchange students after

raising four children. Two of the foreign exchange students have been scholarship representatives of the Future Homemakers of Japan.

The activities have changed over the years, but some things are still the same. When FHA was started, some of the activities were: informal installation, social events such as Square Dance Club, programs with special themes on a regular basis, Hobo Day which took all day going around town looking for odd jobs for a small fee that went towards FHA, Mother and Daughter Banquet and several other events. There have been some changes throughout the years, but the Muenster FHA Chapter has continued some of the activities such as the annual banquet.

In recent years, male students have joined FHA. So, we no longer refer to our annual banquet as the Mother and Daughter Banquet, but simply the FHA Banquet. Now sons and daughters can enjoy an evening out with mom. The event is planned and carried out by members. This year's banquet is May 9.

Our club has a personal incentive program for individual members called Power of 1, which developed in the 1970s. A member sets a goal for personal improvement relating to school, community or family. She is then evaluated by peers upon completion of the project. Recognition for attaining the goal that was set is given at Regional and State FHA Leadership Conferences.

 From an idea by the Catholic Daughters of America in 1959, and the help of Mrs. J.M. Weinzapfel in use of her home - a library in Muenster began. In 1965 it was officially adopted by the city to become the Muenster Public Library. At this time Mrs. Joseph (Bettie) Luke became the next active caretaker, opening her home for the library, and giving many years of service. There were other dedicated citizens who later followed these two ladies' footsteps.

Through the efforts, both physically and financially, of Muenster citizens, Muenster has a nice library serving the city and community.

Now the time has come when the library has outgrown its location and has needs to update its services. The library board and librarian are researching ways and possibilities for a new larger library. Applying for grants is a slow and not always successful means for obtaining finances. It comes down to pleas to citizens to come forward with their support and ideas.

The present building is not fit to remodel and does not have the space. Neighboring small town libraries have been visited for ideas and suggestions. We have seen fancy libraries (which we do not need here) to practical, serviceable facilities which the board feels is the kind to strive for.

Some of the things needed to be included is a children's area for the story times etc; a quiet corner for those wishing to do research and study; an office for librarian to have a quiet place to work away from patrons; a work area for the staff to do required work in keeping books available. A TV and VCR were recently received from state library association but there is no place to really use it at present.

So what is needed for all this - a lot to build on in a localized area handy to schools and public; funds to build a new building or an existing building that can be converted.

We would like to reorganize "The Friends of the Library", open an account at the bank (Friends of the Library building fund) for all who wish to donate towards this project and look for some fund raising ideas. Citizens and the city have been very dedicated in the past to get to the present library and now we must move ahead. It is hoped we can receive the same dedication to build a library for Muenster to be proud of and serve all generations.

\$4147,232.00. Precinct 2 Commissioner Richard Brown said that the details are set by law and wasn't sure who would receive any extra money brought in by the auctioning of the property.

Judge Hesse was authorized to set a date to auction all county-owned office items that are no longer used or needed. In March all department heads did inventory. Some of the items were selected by other departments. All items with historical significance will be deleted from the list.

Al Mulrean advised the Court on the forming of a Habitat for Humanity in Cooke County. He invited all the members of Commissioners Court and the public to a meeting the following night. Habitat for Humanity International is a nonprofit Christian group that seeks to eliminate poverty by refurbishing old homes and selling them at-cost to low income families with low interest loans.

After considerable study, Bob Harbin, requested that MedQuest be hired as the agency to collect past due accounts for Cooke County EMS. They have been used with very good results by other ambulance services, hospitals, etc., Harbin said. The agency receives 30 percent of all fees collected. At this time Cooke County EMS has \$11,420.91 owed by past due accounts. "Our accounts receivable just keeps growing and growing," Harbin noted.

Private pay accounts with no activity for 90 days will be turned over to the collection agency. Harbin assured the Commissioners

Court that EMS would continue to make all efforts possible to collect fees before turning them over. In the past a collection agency has been used in an attempt to collect out of county accounts, but not those due within the county. All overdue accounts will be turned over now.

Bids on an agency aren't required since it is for professional services. An addendum to EMS Department's collection procedures was also unanimously approved to allow for use of the collection agency.

All commissioners were present for the meeting.

In other business Commissioners Court:

- Approved the 1995-96 county budget calendar.

- Approved renaming a county road located in Cler Acres in Precinct 4 from Alvin Road to County Road 492. All county roads are now identified by number and the change was inadvertently left off the plat.

- Considered a recommendation by Phone Billing Exchange Co. to switch long distance service from Southwestern Bell and AT&T to Value Line. Tabled decision until it could be investigated more thoroughly.

- Approved preliminary plat of Red Oaks Two Subdivision.

- Took no action on appointing a member from Cooke County to the Dalhoma Advisory Committee.

- At the request of the Emergency Services Committee, Judge Hesse was appointed as a member. Virgil Hess volunteered to give his place on the committee to Hesse.

- Approved monthly bills and minutes from the last meeting.

you find a change in shape, color or size of a pigmented spot on Melanoma Monday, attend one of the following six sites for a free spot check: M.D. Anderson-Moncrief Radiation Center at Fort Worth, Sammons Cancer Center/Texas Oncology P.A., Baylor - Medical Center at Garland, Medical Center of Plano, Presbyterian Hospital of Dallas, St. Paul Medical Center.  
 Dermatologists will be on hand to check moles and other spots for signs of cancer and determine if further analysis is needed. No appointments are needed and the screening is open to the public.  
 Follow the ABCD's to look for signs of melanoma during self-examination. A = one half of the pigmented lesion is unlike the other; B = Border Irregularity - a notched, indefinite or poorly defined border; C = Color variation - shades of brown, tan, areas turning black or losing color, sometimes with a red background; D = Diameter - a growing spot greater in diameter than a pencil eraser may represent melanoma. Self-examination should be performed monthly and especially on Melanoma Monday.  
 Malignant melanoma risk factors include: people of the Caucasian race, fair skin that burns easily, sun exposure during childhood and adolescence - particularly intense, intermittent exposure, personal or family history, and people with indoor occupations and outdoor recreational habits. If these apply to you, it is important to participate in Melanoma Monday and attend the free screening if necessary.

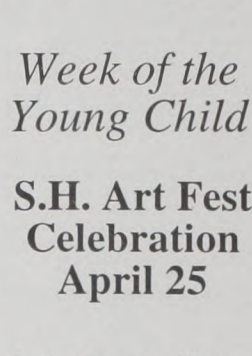

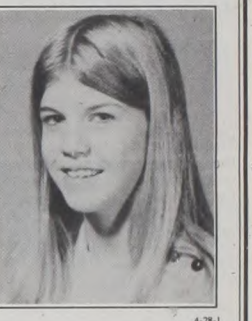
## Danell Reiter honored at SFASU

April is awareness month for defects caused by alcohol

The problem of birth defects caused by pregnant women's abuse of alcohol and drugs is the focus of National Fetal Alcohol Syndrome (FAS) Awareness Month. The Texas Department of Health (TDH) has joined national health authorities and non-profit organizations in the observance.

National sponsors of the observance are the federal Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), the National Organization of Fetal Alcohol Syndrome and the National Council on Alcoholism and Drug Dependence.

CDC recently estimated that the incidence rate of newborns diagnosed with FAS before hospital discharge is about one in every 1,300 live births. FAS is diagnosed based on three criteria: growth retardation; central nervous system disorders; and certain facial abnormalities.

Gladys Sanchez, an epidemiologist with the TDH Bureau of Epidemiology, said that as many as 600 Texas babies may be born each year with fetal alcohol syndrome. Thousands more have other side-effects of their mother's use of alcohol or drugs during pregnancy. FAS is now one of the conditions being monitored by the Texas Birth Defects Registry being pilot-tested in two of the state's public health regions.

Sanchez explained that alcohol and some drugs used by pregnant women are able to pass through the placenta to affect the unborn child. Substance-abusing mothers also can pass alcohol and drugs to their children in their breast milk.

A child with FAS has irreversible physical and mental impairments. "Typically, an FAS baby will have wide-set eyes, a small head and a smaller-than-normal nose bridge. They can also suffer from heart defects and deafness," Sanchez said.

Other symptoms may be more subtle, appearing only as unusual learning disabilities. Not all children born to alcohol-abusing mothers suffer the same effects. What is certain, according to Sanchez, is that although FAS can be prevented by education and treatment of at-risk women before they are pregnant, it has become the leading cause of mental retardation in the US.

"Early intervention with expectant mothers can make a vital difference in whether their babies are born physically and mentally healthy. It is a difference which can determine the direction of the child's entire life," Sanchez said.

She urged all women who need help avoiding alcohol and drugs while pregnant to call TDH's toll-free maternal and child referral line at 1-800-4-BABYLOVE. The referral line offers information on a full range of health services and resources for mothers and their children.

"We also desperately need more information than we are receiving about the incidence of FAS and similar conditions seen by physicians and nurses," Sanchez added. Medical personnel can call Sanchez at 512-458-7232, extension 2004, for more information and reporting forms.

 Only steers making the youth fair sale and weighing 1300 lbs. and under are eligible for the contest. The Grand and Reserve Champions must be entered in the carcass contest. All steers must dress a minimum of 60% and a maximum of 69%. Carcasses must weigh a minimum of 510 lbs. and a maximum of 875 lbs. to be eligible for placing.  
 All steers must have a quality grade of USDA Select Average or Better and a yield grade of 1, 2, 3.5 or better. The carcasses are placed based on quality, cut ability, carcass weight and visual appraisal. The carcass judge who was Alan Schluter of Ponder has provided the following data where he makes the placing - fat thickness; ribeye area; percentage of kidney, heart and pelvic fat; carcass weight; quality grade and yield grade and estimated yield of boneless closely trimmed steak and roast meat from the

chuck, loin, rib and round.  
 The first 10 carcasses are placed with excellent cash premiums totaling \$3,000. The first place carcass receives \$525.00 and a real nice belt buckle donated by the Highview Ranch in Valley View. The premiums range from \$525.00 to \$75.00 for 10th place. The premiums are supported by the Denton County Blue Ribbon Club who also sponsors the contest. Following the contest, each carcass is sold by the halves and whole as a fundraising effort to raise money for next year's contest. A big thank you goes to Fischer's Meats in Muenster for slaughtering the carcasses and allowing us to judge them before the carcass contest.  
 The placings and breeds for this year's contest are as follows: 1st place, Bodie Noles, Denton 4-H (Maine/Angus Cross); 2nd place, Clay Hawkins, Krum FFA (Limousin); 3rd place, Doug Naylor, Denton 4-H (Limousin); 4th place, Bruce Graham, Krum FFA (Limousin); 5th place, Tiffany Schertz, Sanger FFA (Maine/Angus Cross); 6th place, Jolie Williams, Lewisville 4-H (Angus Cross); 7th place, Emily Deal, Northwest FFA (Limousin Cross); 8th place, Ashley Evans, Pilot Point FFA (Limousin/Hereford Cross); 9th place, Kaylie Noles, Denton 4-H (Maine/Angus Cross); 10th place, Tommy Naylor, Denton 4-H (Limousin).

**NORTH TEXAS SMALL GRAINS FIELD DAY**

The Texas A&M University will hold its annual Small Grain Field Day at the Prosper Farm on Thurs., May 4, from 8:30 a.m. until 2 p.m. The Prosper Farm is operated by the Texas A&M Experiment Station. Dr. David Marshall and Dr. Russell Sutton are in charge of the various breeding and development programs for small grain varieties and other research work.  
 At this Field Day the latest information on wheat, oat, and barley varieties will be discussed and observed. New varieties that will be released can also be viewed. Other work conducted includes small grain diseases, insect management, weeds and herbicides, and fertilizer management. Three (3) Continuing Education Units will be available for participants to apply toward their recertification requirements of Private Applicator Licensing. Producers are invited and encouraged to attend.  
**COOKE COUNTY SMALL GRAIN TOUR**  
 We have a lot of small grain demonstrations located in Cooke County that producers will be able to view and discuss results of at a County Small Grain Tour on Fri., May 5. The tour will begin at 8 a.m. at the Small Grain Breeding Trial located on the Selby Farm at Era. At 9:30 a.m., we will be at the Small Grain Variety and Fungicide plots located on the Bayer Farm on Ash Street at Muenster.

At 11 a.m. the tour will be at the Aloys Fuhrmann Farm located on FM 1199 north of Lindsay. Lunch will be provided by the Extension Crops Committee at noon at the Fuhrmann demonstration location. Following lunch we will look at the Ryegrass and Weed Control Demonstration located at the Henry Popp Farm on Highway 82 west of Gainesville.  
 This year we will look at demonstrations concerning Wheat and Oat Varieties, Foliar Fungicide Applications, Seed Treatment Fungicides, and Seed Mixing. Extension Specialists, Experiment Station Representatives, and Industry Representatives will be at the tour to answer questions and discuss various management and production practices. Two (2) Continuing Education Units will be available for producers who need additional credits to apply toward recertification of their Private Applicator Licenses.

**Comm. Perry: Be aware of unauthorized pesticide sales**

Agriculture Commissioner Rick Perry is warning farmers, ranchers and all other pesticide consumers to beware of pesticide sales that are conducted through mail-order businesses, over the telephone or by direct contact with a sales person.  
 "Nearly every year we have cases where unwary consumers buy diluted pesticides that contain a fraction of the active ingredient needed to be effective," Perry said.

"To ensure the pesticide you are buying is a registered product in the state, check the label for a U.S. Environment Protection Agency registration number and call the Texas Department of Agriculture at 1-800-TELL TDA."  
 Pesticides must be registered with EPA and TDA before they can be legally used in the state. TDA inspectors ensure that products sold from dealerships meet these requirements, but unregistered products may be sold by salespeople who directly contact a business or solicit customers over the phone.

From My Side of the Fence

 Muenster's North Main Street has seen many changes over the years. Some on the east side I wrote about a few weeks ago.  
 The west side also has its tales to tell, not the least being the cotton gin, built in 1916 by Wm. Walterscheid and W. L. Stock.  
 Mr. Stock, an experienced gin, joined Mr. Walterscheid in building, for the times, a very modern and up-to-date gin, naming it Muenster Gin Co. This thriving venture continued in business, operating through the fall of each year, until 1945.  
 Due to the amount of hand labor needed to raise and harvest cotton, and the shortage of hands during World War II, most farmers gave up cotton. Some took up dairy farming, and there was just not enough of the crop in the area to sustain a profitable operation of a gin. The gin was sold shortly after, and was then dismantled and moved away.  
 One of my childhood memories of the gin came about circa 1922 when I was about 7 years old. The owners had bought a new 2 cylinder diesel engine that, after being delivered to Muenster by train, had to be moved to the gin.  
 This proved to be a formidable task due to the extreme weight of the engine. It was decided to drag it from the depot to the gin on a sled, using a fairly powerful Case gasoline tractor that was kept just across the street, and owned by John Luke who owned and operated a small business there.  
 The tractor moved the load very slowly, occasionally being brought to a stop when the wheels would spin and dig holes in the unimproved roadway. The operator would then unhitch and try another spot, and in this manner the engine was moved up the grade as far as 2nd Street, where it again pulled the tractor to a halt.  
 After the operator tried several different hitches and only succeeded in digging more holes, it was discovered that one of the drive sprockets on the tractor had broken out a cog, and to save damaging the tractor any more, it was retired.  
 Mr. Walterscheid then decided to get his much heavier Aultman-Taylor tractor from his farm about 2 1/2 miles east of town, and try and finish the job.  
 Well, this turned out to be a wise move, and the engine was soon moved to the west side of the gin.  
 How it was moved into the building and onto its concrete mount I do not know, but for years, when there was a southeast breeze, the sound of its exhaust could be heard 24 hours a day each fall, on the farm where I grew up about a mile northwest of the gin.
