# MMH gears up for new arrivals

As of April 1 Muenster Memorial Hospital will once again be able to offer total family care, from birth through all stages of life. Remodeling has been completed and the hospital's OB unit and nursery will be opened April 1 to patients. Everyone is welcomed to attend the open house on Sunday, March 31 from 11 a.m. to 3 p.m. to view the nursery, birthing rooms, and new Mammography Room. Hosting the event will be the Muenster Hospital Auxiliary.

Jenny Bezner, RNC has accepted the position of OB/Nursery supervisor. She holds a Bachelor of Science in Nursing from UTA with certification in High-Risk Neonatal Nursing. Jenny worked as an obstetrical nurse at Denton

Regional Medical Center and has many years of experience in high-risk neonatal nursing.

"With my experience with higher risk infants and neonatal transport, I've made sure the nursery was well equipped to care for and stabilize infants," Jenny explained. "Care has been taken to ensure the OB nursing staff has adequate experience and training with infants."

There will be RN staffing in the OB department 24 hours a day. All of the nurses hired for the OB unit have been specially trained. Those now on staff are Jenny Bezner, RNC; Darlene Stewart, RN; Joyce Abney, RN; Lisa Schilling, RN; Hayle Dangelmayr, RN; and Toni Diaz, RN.

Dr. Thomas Currier is Muenster's OB/GYN specialist. His office is

located in the south wing of the hospital. Dr. Currier has been delivering babies at the Gainesville hospital while waiting for Muenster's OB unit to be completed. Dr. Diana Arnouk has the pediatric practice in Muenster. She will be working with the newborns. Also having staff privileges in the OB unit and nursery are Dr. Roane McLaughlin, Dr. Douglas Lewis, and Dr. Robert R. McLeroy.

The Family Center approach to childbirth has been chosen for Muenster's new unit. Labor, delivery, recovery, and postpartum care (LDRP) all take place in the same room. Family members are allowed to be present in the room with the mother during labor and

delivery. Mothers are encouraged to keep their baby in the room as much as possible. This promotes bonding and more opportunities for teaching.

Rooms are beautifully decorated to provide a comfortable, home type atmosphere. At the same time they are equipped to make the delivery as safe and comfortable as possible.

Equipment is the latest of everything. Delivery takes place in

the same bed as labor and postpartum care. The beds are described as the "Cadillac of beds".

Childbirth classes taught by Jenny Bezner and Darlene Stewart are one of the services offered. These classes are presented in four segments taught on four consecutive Wednesdays. Included are breathing techniques, relaxation, baby care, and pain management.

While in the hospital the mother will be offered tapes and handouts on child care. Before going home the new parents will be treated to a special meal to celebrate the birth of their child.

A special section featuring the hospital's new facilities, staff, and services will be published in the April 5 or April 12 edition of the Muenster Enterprise.

## Henry Felderhoff Farm inducted into Family Heritage Program

Muenster's Henry J. Felderhoff Farm was one of 60 agricultural operations that have been in continuous operation for at least 100 years and were honored at the 22nd Family Land Heritage ceremony. Theresa Mae Walterscheid of Muenster and Charles Felderhoff of Waco attended the event held at the Lyndon Baines Johnson Auditorium at the University of Texas at Austin.

Texas Agriculture Commissioner Rick Perry presented certificates to the honorees inducted into the Texas Department of Agriculture's Family Land Heritage Program. "These families represent the bedrock of Texas pioneers who made the state what it is today — the nation's second leading agricultural producer," remarked Perry. "Our Family Land Heritage honorees also have shown that they can successfully adapt to changing times and markets, which will become even more important to our industry as we enter the next century."

The Felderhoff farm is located one mile north of Muenster and was founded by Henry John Felderhoff. He moved to Texas after he heard of a new German Catholic colony. The land was purchased December 13,

1890. There were 100 acres in the original farm. Wheat, oats, cotton, corn, cattle and horses were raised by Felderhoff and his wife, Christina.

The couple raised 11 children: Mary, John, Frederick, Bernard, Hubert, Christina, Caroline, Joseph, Henry, Anton J. (Tony), and Rose.

Their son, Tony became the second owner of the farm which was now 180 acres. Tony raised wheat, oats, corn, hay, and stocker cattle. He was one of the first farmers to have the soil conservationists to help him terrace and build ponds on this farm. Tony was married to Theresa. They had five children, Anthony, Joan, Joseph, Theresa Mae, and Charles.

Their daughter Theresa became the third generation owner. She acquired 100 acres in 1972. Her improvements include a pond, fences, preserving the old home, building a new home, and practicing soil conservation to develop the land. Hay, cattle and grass are currently produced on the farm.

Theresa Mae and her husband Sylvan make their home on the family farm and their son Danny also has a home on it.

Some of the requirements are that the land be agriculturally productive

and owned by members of the family for 100 years or more. If all the land has ever been rented out to someone outside the family, it will not qualify. You must live and work the land. If you live off the historic land, you must actively manage and direct the everyday operation of the farm or ranch.

## County moves forward with 911 rural addressing project

"The following developmental work for the Rural Addressing Project remains to be completed," noted Cooke County Judge Paul Hesse at the March 25 regular Commissioners Court meeting. "We need to complete and verify the address locations and coordinates; need to complete fruition of the MSAG, that's the master addressing data base and 911 data base; also we need to organize maintenance of the maps and data bases; also produce maps and the map book."

The estimated cost of the map project is \$40,000 plus, said Hesse. That cost is eligible for reimbursement with state funds.

Vendors will be brought in to complete some of the above work. Commissioners are seeking proposals by vendors for the completion of the 911 Rural addressing development project.

Commissioners also approved the final plat for Cler Acres Section 3

north of Muenster and three new county roads, 493, 494, and 495, in that area. The approval was not unanimous as Precinct 2 Commissioner Richard Brown cast a dissenting vote on both items. He said that it looked to him like the creek gravel had just been piled loosely on the roads.

Commissioner Precinct 4 Virgil Hesse said that the city of Muenster had already approved the roads and that the property owners had signed off on them. Hesse and Commissioner Jerry Lewis said that they had inspected the roads and they had met with their approval. Brown countered, "It might meet yours, but I'm still questioning whether it meets the county specs."

"I voted against both of them for the same reason," said Brown. "The roads didn't meet county specifications. Specifications call for the material used on roads to be six inch compacted base material, usually crushed limestone suitable

for paving at a later time. The maximum size of the gravel is 1-1/2 inches in diameter. They used creek gravel on those roads and some of the stones are six to eight inches in diameter. At some point in time the county will have to spend money to improve the road."

Hesse said in a later interview that the county specs call for six inches of base rock and that the roads do meet with the county's specs. "Everyone else approved them including Judge Hesse," he said.

Roads built on property to be sold in lots for building homes must meet certain requirements by the county including being a certain width and being constructed properly. The land owner pays for the construction of the roads. The county accepts them only after they have been built and inspected to ensure that they meet the necessary specs.

*A Good Place to Start on Immigration Reform*

To many, American immigration policy sounds like the distracted mother's answer to her child's request: "I said perhaps, and that's final."

We send mixed messages to would-be immigrants. Enforcement of our immigration laws has been up and down like a roller coaster ride. As a result, 4.5 million illegals now swell the ranks of the underclass. They impose a daunting burden on public schools, health care providers and prisons. They compete with Americans and those who are here legally for scarce jobs on the lowest rungs of our economic ladder. It is in our national interest to curb illegal immigration swiftly and effectively.

While the debate over immigration raises many issues, I believe that one principle all can agree on is that obeying our laws is the least we should require of those who wish to come here and live in our country.

In the past we have attempted to enforce our laws by putting the burden on employers. I believe that is the wrong approach. I have a new approach: put the burden on the illegal immigrants.

I have added such an amendment to the immigration bill currently before the Senate Judiciary Committee to address this issue directly. It would disqualify those found to be in our country illegally from applying for legal permanent resident status for at least 10 years, permanently in some cases. If you come here illegally and are caught, you can't even TRY to come back on a legal basis for 10 years.

My bill would encourage respect for American law — something which can reasonably be required of anyone who wants to immigrate here. Currently, those who enter our country in violation of our law can later apply for legal status with no risk of punishment or even censure. A recent internal State Department study estimates that 90 percent of some nationality groups waiting for legal immigration visas are already living in the United States.

There are penalties for people who smuggle or harbor illegal aliens, and penalties for employers who hire them. But the only penalty imposed on illegals now is a five-year ban on re-entry, and they can avoid this if they leave voluntarily (rather than be deported). Because the majority of apprehended aliens departs voluntarily, they are not subject to the sanction.

What we have now is an all-carrot, no-stick policy. The message we send is that aliens might as well attempt to enter and remain in the country illegally, because they have everything to gain and nothing to lose. America has been entirely too willing to forgive transgressions of our immigration laws.

Disqualifying apprehended illegal aliens from legal residence for 10 years would attach a consequence to the decision to violate U.S. law. It seems only fair that if we are going to penalize employers of illegal aliens for violating the law, we also should penalize the illegal aliens who do so.

The U.S. government has a responsibility to maintain the integrity of our borders, as well as an obligation to defend the best interests of its own legal residents and citizens. People who break our law should not be rewarded at the expense of American workers and taxpayers.

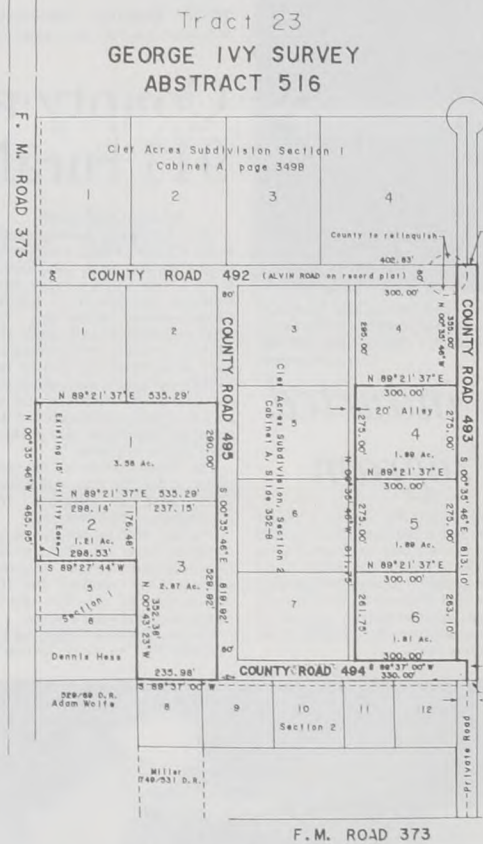

Exxon took second place with an average daily production rate of 87,050 barrels, some 6.206 percent of total state production. Other companies in the top ten included Shell Western E & P Inc., Marathon Oil Company, Mobil Producing TX. & N.M. Inc.,

Chevron U.S.A. Inc., Texaco E&P Inc.

The Commissioners said Exxon Corporation was the top Texas gas producer for the period, averaging 728,311 Mcf (thousand cubic feet) per day which represented 5.874 percent of total state production.

The Railroad Commission issued a total of 952 original drilling permits in February. The total included 714 permits to drill new oil and gas tests, 28 to re-enter existing well bores, and 210 for recompletions.

So far in 1996, there have been 1,797 drilling permits issued.

Permits issued in February included 366 oil, 219 gas, 308 oil and gas, 57 injection, and 2 other permits.

In February operators reported 365 oil, 311 gas, 36 injection and five other completions and reported 968 holes plugged and 134 dry holes.

## Perry: "new bill has provisions that will benefit Texas farmers"

Agriculture Commissioner Rick Perry commented that several provisions in the new Farm Bill, the Federal Agricultural Improvement and Reform Act of 1996 or FAIR, will benefit Texas farmers and ranchers, but one measure was not included that could have helped a small business sector in Texas. Overall, the act will transfer crop production decisions from the government to farmers.

"This legislation is a historic gift," Perry said. "Instead of the government deciding what is planted, who plants it and what price is paid for it, our farmers will now make their own decisions. It gives our producers the control and flexibility they need to respond to changing market and consumer demands."

However, Perry expressed disappointment because one provision was not authorized by Congress due to strong opposition from the U.S. Department of Agriculture.

The provision would have allowed meat processed at state-inspected facilities to be shipped

and sold interstate. Meat processed at state-inspected businesses can only be sold in state even though the U.S. Department of Agriculture inspects these facilities annually and certifies the slaughtering and processing as equal to that done at federally inspected plants.

The new Farm Bill maintains the Conservation Reserve Program and adds a voluntary natural resource conservation management program. The Environmental Quality Incentive Program will provide producers with technical assistance and cost-share or incentive payments for implementing one or many conservation plans aimed at protecting water and soil quality.

Overall, the act should help strengthen the nation's agricultural industry, the commissioner said.

"Our farmers are facing an intensive globally competitive market," Perry said. "The new Farm Bill should help maintain and enhance their dominance in producing the best, the safest and the most economical food and fiber supply in the world."

## Economical pasture weed control without restrictions

Raising livestock in Texas is a big enough job without worrying about troublesome weeds that may compete with the grass or injure our grazing cattle. You need a herbicide that is economical and effective on weeds. Early application is the key, as early as February and March.

Amber is a sulfonyleurea herbicide that is economical and effective in wheat and barley. It is now registered for use on pastures, rangeland and Conservation Reserve Program (CRP) acres to control a broad spectrum of weeds, including several that are poisonous to livestock, see label.

Amber can be applied early postemergence at its standard rate (0.28 ounces per acre) to control or suppress common ragweed, croton marshelder cocklebur Western ragweed and, in established grasses, at an enhanced rate (0.56 ounces per acre) to control tougher species. Cattle can graze immediately following an application but grasses should not be cut for hay for 30 days following an Amber application to avoid residue. It provides excellent residual control with low use rates and a wider window of application.

Amber comes in 1.4 ounce Accu-Pak water soluble packets, which offer easy mixing and minimal

worker exposure. These packets and their contents must be thoroughly mixed in water and applied as a spray. Weed growth is inhibited soon after an Amber application, but visible effects of control may not be seen until one to three weeks after application.

## Water cuts injury from herbicide drift

Using a higher carrier volume of water when applying a herbicide will minimize the risk of injury to nearby plants due to drift, say Iowa State University researchers.

After using varying water amounts in the herbicide mix on two common post emergence soybean herbicides, tests showed that a 5-gallon per acre mix of water and herbicide injured corn a lot more than 10-gallon per acre or 20-gallon per acre mixes.

This way farmers can protect crops in neighboring fields while maintaining weed control by simply increasing the water volume.

## Crop rotation boosts corn, soybean yields

Researchers have found that crop rotation enhances root growth and increases yields. Researchers examined seasonal root development of rotated and monocropped corn and soybeans. It was found that even though rotated crops showed better yields, the root systems of corn and soybeans responded differently to cropping sequence.

Monocropped corn, for example, had 22% more roots in the top 5 inches (the plow layer) but less than rotated corn planted at deeper depths. Toxins from decomposing corn roots from previous crops were offered as an explanation.

The only difference in the soybean root density was at the 15 to 20 inch depth, where rotated soybeans showed more roots.

The fact that both crops showed enhanced root growth below the plow layer probably means that more soil volume was explored for water and nutrients by the roots of rotated crops.

## Higher corn population for more profit

If you're looking for higher yields and profits from corn, consider higher plant population in narrow rows.

Part of the key to successfully using higher population in the field is to plant in narrow rows to give equal distance in plant spacing.

Dale Hicks, extension agronomist at the University of Minnesota

believes the optimum for corn planting today is 20 inch rows. He thinks widths should go down to 10 inch rows.

"We had a consistent 7 to 7.5% increase in yield comparing 20 inch rows to 30 inch rows, with no further increase going down to 10 inch rows," Hicks reports.
