# Michael E. Compton seeks Cooke County Sheriff post

When Michael E. Compton came to Gainesville, he knew he had found the place where he wanted to live, work and raise a family. "I've got a lot of training and education in law enforcement, but my primary goal has always been to stay here in Cooke County." Compton explained. "I never attempted to participate in the promotional process within the Department of Public Safety (DPS) because it would have taken me outside of Cooke County. I recognized soon after moving here that Cooke County was a wonderful place to live. The fact that I could five here in Cooke County was worth far more to me than any job promotions I could have obtained within the department. Consequently all of my law enforcement focus has been in what I could do to enforce the law in Cooke County."

Mr. Compton retired from his job as a trooper with the Texas Department of Public Service in September 1995. He did so with the intention of running for the position of Cooke County. Sheriff. "Law enforcement is my life," noted Compton. "I was in law enforcement I felt that the time had come in my life that I could and should make a change.

What is Compton's plan should he be elected sheriff? "The plan today, tomorrow, at the time of the election, and after the election will always remain the same," said Compton. You've got to be able to pay for what you can do. It's a 1.3 million dollar budget operation and there are 33 employees. This is a never ending task of always trying to provide the best service for the dollar.

"Obviously the plan would include trying to provide the best possible emergency response, the best possible confinement atmosphere as far as a jail is concerned, and the best possible service that a sheriff's office of this size can do guided and directed by the law and the desires of the community."

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## Msgr. Thomas Weinzapfel ... 50 years a priest

Msgr. Thomas W. Weinzapfel, son of the late Mr. and Mrs. J.M. Weinzapfel, was ordained in Sacred Heart Cathedral of Dallas on Dec. 23, 1945, offered his First Solemn High Mass in Sacred Heart Church of Muenster on Dec. 27, 1945 and observed the 50th anniversary of his priesthood on Dec. 23, 1995 in formal ecremonies in St. Pius X Church of Dallas.

The years between included assignment as parochial vicar at Sacred Heart Parish in Texarkana and, later, a year at St. Edward Parish in Dallas. Less than three years after ordination, he was assigned to St. John Church in Valley View, with mission work at Whitesboro and Celina. Late in 1952, he began four years as business manager at The Texas Catholic newspaper. He was an assistant to the publisher for additional years.

In 1956, Bishop Thomas K.

## CCRW hosts candidates for Court of Criminal Appeals

Candidates from the highest court in Texas, the Court of Criminal Appeals, visited Gainesville Jan. 4 to an overflow crowd, at the Cooke County Republican Women's meeting.

Calling for a change in the judicial system, each candidate stated their qualifications and the changes they would enact if elected. Filing for Court of Criminal Appeals Place 1 were James Boone, Susan Brown, Sue Holland and Matthew Paul.

James Boone comes from Anderson County. He has 30 years experience in practicing civil and criminal law and has firsthand knowledge of the criminal system as his county has five prison systems. He stated that victims of crime are not considered in the Texas Court System. "People other than the accused have rights, too," he stated. Judges should consider this in any decision making.

Susan Brown is an assistant to the Harris County District Attorney. She has 12 years of prosecuting experience. Her reason for running is the effect the court has on our daily lives. "Although

victims in our state." Her sensitivity to citizens and victims in our state come from her 12 years experience in Harris County. During that time, she always represented citizens who are crime victims; she never has represented a criminal. "Citizen rights and victim rights should be considered in judges' decisions."

Sue Holland is the District Judge in the Collin County Court. She has held that position since 1981. Prior to that time, she was Juvenile Prosecutor for the Collin County District Attorney's Office. Having been on the trial bench since 1979, she feels that she and other judges should look long and carefully at ourselves before we pass judgment on others. One of her main concerns as a judge is to interpret the laws made by the legislature and not recreate them.

Matthew Paul is the First
Assistant State Prosecuting
Attorney. He has represented the

State at the Court of Criminal Appeals in more than 200 cases. He is running because he thinks the rulings of our High Court should make sense in the real world. Outside the courtroom, real people are raped, robbed and murdered by real criminals. Conservative candidates like Paul, he believes, are needed to insure a strong conservative court to render judgments that make sense in the real world.

Mike Keasler is filing for Criminal Court of Appeals Place 2. He is uniquely qualified, he states, because there is no one now serving who has ever served as a Felony Judge. He has served as a Felony Judge for 14 years. He has spent the last 26 years of his life fighting crime and doing something about crime: 14 years hearing felony cases and 12 years as Assistant District Attorney in Dallas. He is currently chair-elect for both the Judicial Section of the State Bar of Texas and the Texas Center for Judiciary. He has served as dean of the Texas College of Advanced Judicial Studies from 1993 to

present and dean of the Texas Regional Judicial Conference since 1990. As a member of the faculty of the National Judicial College since 1992, Keasler has twice been co-chair of the Ethics Committee of the American Bar Association National Conference of State Trial Judges.

John Bradley is filing for Criminal Court of Appeals Place 3. He believes that the punishment should fit the crime. Bradley believes the Court needs justices that lead and will teach prosecutors, judges and defense attorneys to punish with authority, and becreative in the way they deal with people who are the criminal element in our society. Bradley brings with him experience as Assistant District Attorney of Williamson County since 1989 and Assistant Harris County DA from 1987 to 1989, serving as general counsel for the State Senate Criminal Justice Committee during the 74th Legislature, and being named prosecutor and law enforcement hiaison for the Texas Punishment Standards Commission in 1991-93. Bradley was also briefing attorney and research assistant for Judge Charles Campbell of the Court of Criminal Appeals from 1985 to 1987.

be worth 10 million dollars. He might have stock in IBM and know exactly what is going on in the financial markets of the world. This is no place to come to try to blow smoke or to try to impress because the people over here won't tolerate it. Muenster to try to blow smoke at them.

"In the years that I've been here I've watched Muenster and looked at Muenster. Muenster kids grow up and they go off and be doctors, lawyers, professional people. They change things in the world. Muenster may be a little town but it has a worldwide influence.

If you looked at everybody that's from Muenster, Texas that's around the world, the hospitals are full of them, the law firms are full of them, the law firms are full of them. Muenster is literally an exporter of talent. The people who stay here in Muenster - you don't just have mechanics over here, you have craftsmen. When work gets done in Muenster, it gets done correctly and properly. The people in Muenster won't tolerate anything less. They're not brought up that way.

"I intend to give the service to Muenster that Muenster wants. When Muenster wants me to show up, I intend to try to show up. At the same time it's got to be balanced with a certain amount of restraint because if you start butting into people's business in Muenster you're going to get told to go back to Gainesville. You can overstay your welcome in a place like Muenster because they don't want people over here telling them what to do. They want a public servant over here listening to what they want done."
"Muenster is not just a city limits. Muenster is a frame of mind. It goes almost to Marysville, almost to Saint Jo and down south probably to Hood. These people aren't in the city limits, but they consider themselves Muensteries. They want things done like Muenster wants them done which is correctly. The only way I know to do that is to respond. Yes, I can sit here and say that, but I can't prove until I do it.

"I want to come when I'm needed, but I don't want to stay longer than I'm needed. I intend to serve, I don't want to tell Muenster what to do. I want Muenster to tell me what they want done and then I

"Muenster is a different place. When I come to Muenster, I want to come to listen primarily, not to talk, but to listen and to answer questions to find out what the people over here need.

"You can see somebody driving down the road in a beat up old pickup truck with a hay spike sticking out the back and he might

intend to try to do it or at least say why I can't do it — to be honest with them. I want to develop a rapport with Muenster that Muenster will say, if I'm elected and been in office for two years, "This is acceptable."

Compton was born and raised in the Oak Cliff section of Dallas. He graduated from W. H. Adamson High School in 1963. He attended Texas A&M University and was a member of the Corps of Cadets. LATE PLANTED WHEATS

LATE PLANTED WHEATS

We have received some questions recently about late planted wheats and their yield potential. Late planted wheat has several problems including inadequate vernalization, possible winter kill, and reduced tillering. In general, if wheats were planted in December, there should be adequate time for vernalization. Where we get into a problem is with reduced tillering. Primarily yield comes from the main tillers on a plant but secondary tillers also can develop wheat heads. Therefore, the reduced opportunity for late planted wheat to tiller can reduce the potential number of heads, thus resulting in low yields. And, the greatest injury to wheat planted late would possibly be from stand loss due to young plants freezing with their shallow root system. Shallow roots are more vulnerable in dry soil conditions than wet.

TOPDRESSING SMALL

#### TOPDRESSING SMALL GRAINS

GRAINS
Spring offers an opportunity to nerease small grain yields through opdressing with nitrogen fertilizer. The most common nitrogen top-less fertilizers include ammonium itrate, urea, and liquid solutions. In general, all of these cost approxmately the same per actual pound int. Producers should evaluate cost per pound of N unit and make upplications according to that fertilizer that is the most reasonable in cost, they all will produce about the same results.

One of the most important factors is the timing of application for

Wheat requires approximately two pounds of nitrogen per bushel of expected grain yield. Some producers may have applied their nitrogen in the fall in the form of anhydrous ammonia. If you have grazed in the fall, then you have probably eliminated much of your nitrogen stock. Therefore, the addition of 50 pounds of Actual N per acre is recommended.

## Will milk producers see change in '96?

Cooke County Dairy producers may not have fond memories of 1995. For most, milk prices were down and feed prices were up.

The weather in the area was dry, dropping Texas milk production average about 2%. In October, there were 112 fewer dairies in Texas than in October of 1994.

Congress is still debating dairy legislation and regardless what becomes law, the uncertainty will create price fluctuations, says Bud Schwart, extension economist from Texas A&M University. "Dairy producers should not rely on support prices and the repeal of assessments to improve prices. However, milk supply expectations will ultimately determine producers price levels." At current apply rate, producers prices are beginning to strengthen.

Schwart believes feed supply and feed prices worries and credit concerns may tend to keep a lid on increases in milk production for 1996. "However, as a result.

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
