A petition was filed at the 22-July 28, 1945, to be county clerk's office Friday for an election to determine whether or not vinous and malt liquors containing alcohol of not more than 4 per cent in weight could be sold in Cooke County.

The petition failed to produce the required number of qualified voters and cannot be presented to the commissioners court for an election call, according to County Clerk Tom Blount.

There must be at least 503 qualified voters signing the petition. Blount explained, based on 10 Vincent Felderhoff per cent of the number of votes cast in the governor's race in the last general election

Austin, Texas, -. The exact route through which the poli virus enters the human body has never been conclusively determined. For some time the olfactory lobes and suspected as possible portals of entry, and lately, according to a statement by Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, science is pointing the finger of suspicion to the exposed pulps of teeth.

This interesting theory has been advanced as a result of extensive research and experiments with animals tending to demonstrate that virus might enter the body through an exposed pulp and travel along the nerve pathways.

The result of numerous experments offer evidence too substantial to be attributed entirely to chance. They appear to show that the pulp of teeth do constitute an' oher possible portal of entry for polio, and Dr. Cox pointed out that this portal can be closed readily by proper dental measures.

"Bar any doorway whereby polio can enter your body," Dr, Cox urged Texans. "If dental correct tions can help in shutting out this dread disease, every individual in need of such dental work should have it done immediately."

#### GET READY NOW FOR A FALL GARDEN

Gardening in Texas being poss-B.T. Haws, County Agent for the vice, says that it is not too early to plan for the fall garden. Haws toes is the way people like them says its a good rule to prepare the ground and make the next plant-

> Recently, President Harry S Truman said that "in this fourth year of war the need for every ounce of food which the Amer ican people can produce is greater than ever."

Planting a fall garden, might offset the shortage caused by bad weather last spring. In some parts of the state drought and high winds curtailed gardening, and excessive rainfall had a similar ef-

For a garden which will produce good vegetables, a deep, rich sandy For a refreshing salad combine or sandy loam soil which cumbles easily is preferred. It should have a top soil of ten to twelve inches, soned with grated onion, salt, and and a well-drained, porous clay subsoil. Choose a place which has cream to mayonnaise or salad enough slope for surface water dreinage and sufficient air drainage to prevent possible pocketing of frost. If possible, the soil should be broken to a depth of eight to ten inches, Haws says. But if the subsoil is near the surface do not turn under more than one inch of it per season. In general, he adds, flat culture is preferable to growing crops on raised beds or ridges. For one thing it requires less work. Soils, however, should not be worked when too wet. > Commercial fertilizers for vege sandy loam soils are advisable if barnyard fertilizers cannot be obtained. On small plots, commercial fertilizers may be sown broadrows and thoroughy raked or harrowed into the upper three or four inches of soil. When placed in drills beneath the rows they should be well mixed with the soil. Apply three to six pounds per hundred row feet. It is best, however, to place the fertilizer about two inches to one side and slightly below where the seeds are to be



# MOOS OF THE MOMENT

R emember the old "meller-dram-mers" way back when, and how the cruel old man drove the heroine out in a blizzard? I can get up a lot of sympathy, too, for a calf turn out to shift for itself.

Some folks turn a calf out to pasture with little care, as soon as it is through milk feeding. If you want the youngster to turn into a top producer, however, you'll pay more attention to its care and feeding.

Purdue University recommends keeping calves out of pasture until they are four months old. After they are weaned, and until four months of age, feed them good forage and four pounds of grain daily.

Then they may be pastured but should get three pounds of grain daily until a year old. If they are on good pasture or have high quality roughage they will not need grain supplement until freshening time.

This is one of the many advantages of fall-dropped calves. By the time they are at the proper age, spring pastures are ready and they can be moved into proper feeding without delay.

It is best to keep young heifers away from the rest of the herd. They need plenty of water and should have shade during hot weather.




Cool and collected" is the watch word for dairy farmers this year. Keeping milk cool is one of the most important things for the dairyman to do. The way dairymen are collecting their share of War Bonds completes the slogan very nicely.

This being July, I can't help but start singing my favorite song again -"Get it Cool Quick." The faster you get the temperature of milk down below 60 degrees the less chance there is for the milk to go to waste.

If milk stays warm, bacteria increase at a tremendous rate, but they increase slowly at temperatures below 60 degrees.

Cold running water is the ideal way to cool a can of milk. If you do not have enough milk to require a cooling tank, then a barrel cooler will solve your problem.

The following bulletins show you how to make a simple cooler of this type: Circular 274, Alabama Polytechnic Institute, Auburn, Ala., and Leaflet 191. Purdue University. Lafayette, Ind.\*



reach cannot get all the salt it needs unless the stuff is made available. Salt, says the University of Wisconsin, is the one mineral most likely to be missing in livestock rations.

Most of us think of salt as something that makes food taste better, but actually it is a most important item in your diet and the diet of your cows. All you have to do is eliminate salt entirely from your dairy rations, and watch milk production go down and animal condition get poor.

The extension experts recommend adding one-per cent salt to the grain ration and in addition put a supply of salt out where the cows can get it whenever they choose.

When cows are on pasture, a salt box should be placed in the barnyard or in the pasture, and kept well filled at all times. Loose (granulated) salt is preferred over block salt, but either is much better than none.

The week of July 22 has been set aside as National Farm Safety Week. Fingers which get tangled up with a piece of machinery or



foot which got in the way of an ax, aren't much help around a dairy farm. Another important thing to remember is to put poisons used for sprays, out of the reach of the youngsters.
