The North Texas Waterworks and Sewerage Association met at the K of C Hall in Muenster, Wednesday at 7:30 P.M. The object of this Association is for the advancement of knowledge of the design, construction, operation and management of waterworks and sewage disposal plants; the encouragement of a friendly exchange of information and experiences among its members; and an endeavor to encourage all operating personnel to secure a license with the State Health Department. Active membership consists of all persons interested in the development and improvement of water and sewer works. Associate membership is open to any manufacturer or representative, or person who wish to contribute to the advancement of the Water and Sewer Industry in this district.

The District Area comprises Cooke, Denton, Wise, Montague, Collin, Grayson counties, where-in thirty-three Cities and Towns may be represented in membership. The Federal Works Agency, Bureau of Community Facilities has furnished the City of Muenster, upon request, an application for advance planning for non-federal Public Works. With this in mind the citizens of our town are invited to give the City Council some idea as to what should be considered in the planning of a Combination City Hall, Public Library, Jail, Fire Station, Recreation Room for Volunteer Fire Department, Council Meeting, Corporation or Justice Court Room, City Office, Vaults and rest rooms. A

plan for a two-story building, and a location should be considered.

It was suggested to front the building South and set it between the elevated Tank Tower and the south-west corner of the City square. What do you think? The City Council at the last regular meeting authorized the application for funds for the architectural expense with regard to a City Hall and Engineering services for the extensions planned in the water and sewer system. Any sound advice and constructive criticism is invited.

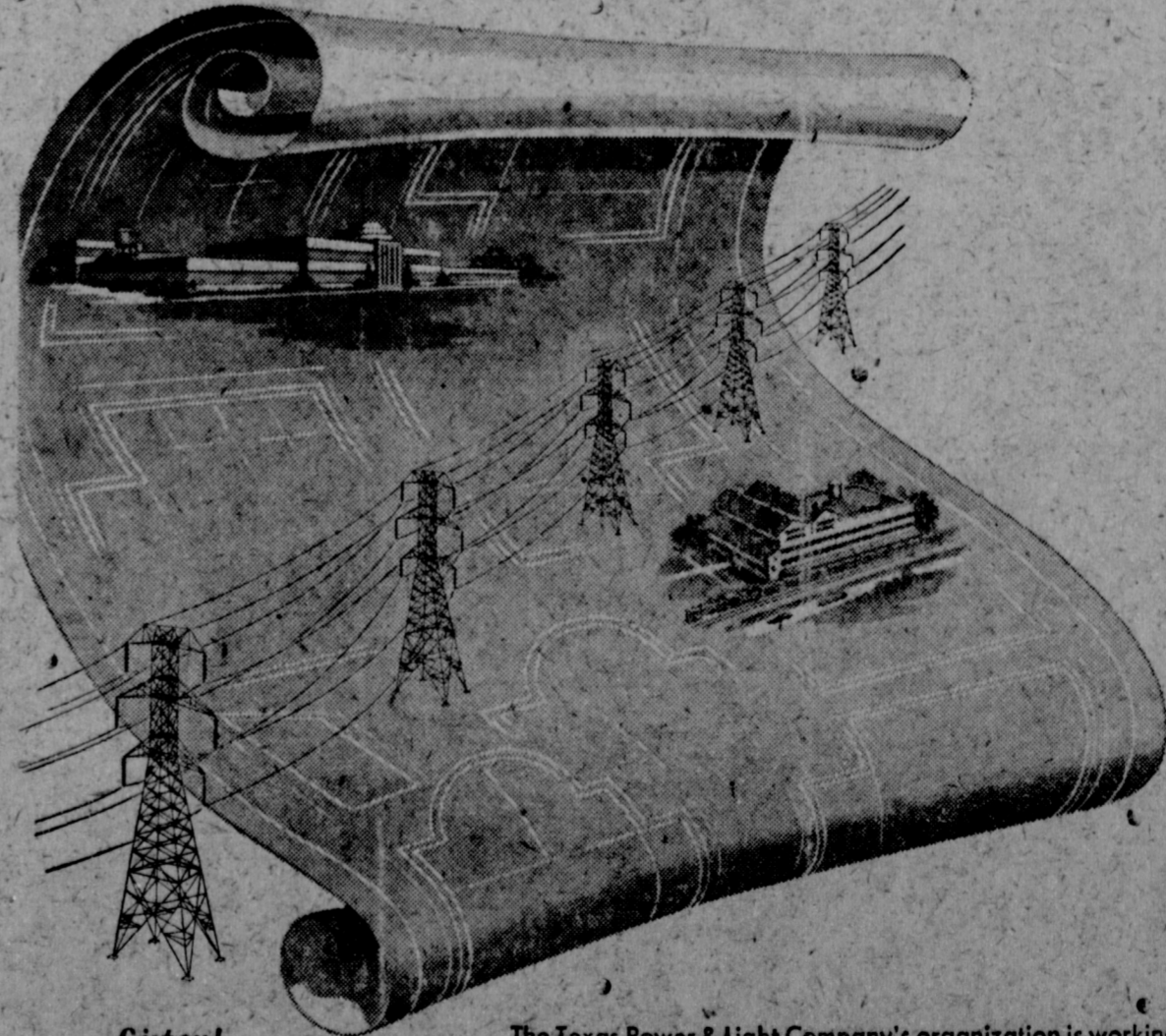

Your BABY

By Lillian B. Storms

There are some "tricks" about introducing new foods which it is just as well to know about even though you may not need to use them.

Most babies love cod liver oil, providing mother doesn't show in any way that she doesn't like it. It is not a good practice to mix it with other foods. Give it before the bath so that if some is spilled it doesn't get on his clothes.

Orange juice is diluted with boiled and cooled water. If it seems to upset him it may be put into his milk. If he is breast-fed, postpone giving it for two or three weeks, and then start again. It may be added to the milk and put on his cereal and thus diluted.

Cereals, the special pre-cooked baby cereals, are usually the first more solid foods given a baby. At first use enough milk to make it quite liquid, more nearly like a thickened milk than a cereal. If your baby is breast-fed, starting cereal gives you an opportunity to introduce another form of milk—usually diluted evaporated milk.

When the first strained vegetable or fruit is given, it is fed with a spoon. This method helps to accustom your baby to the spoon as a utensil. If he doesn't seem to like the new food, remember it is a new texture and consistency and not so much a matter of a new taste. Dilute it with milk for the first few feedings. Either vegetable or fruit may be thickened with some of his cereal. It makes the new food more like the cereal he already knows.

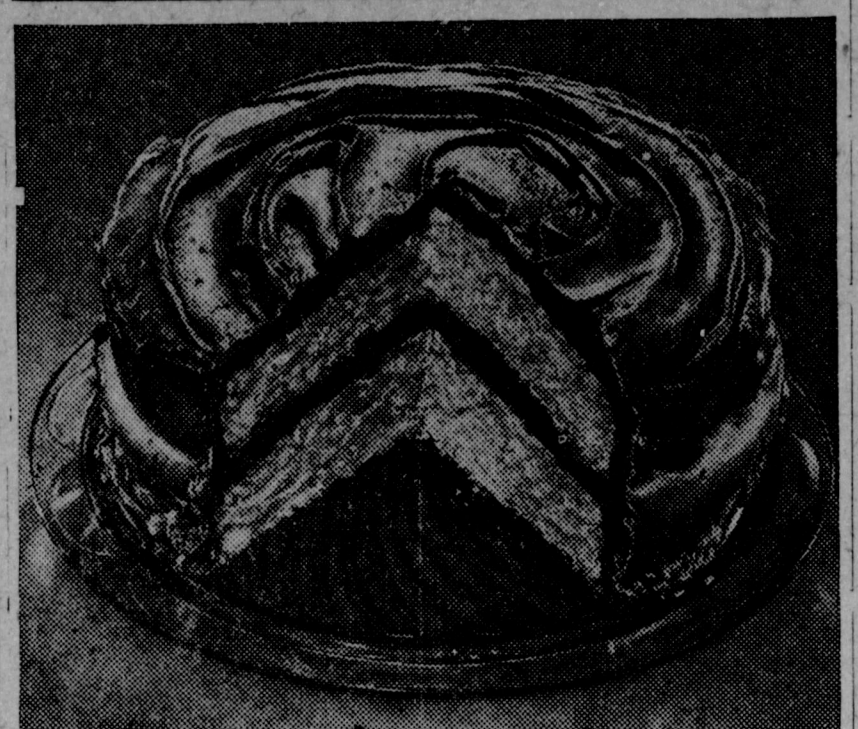

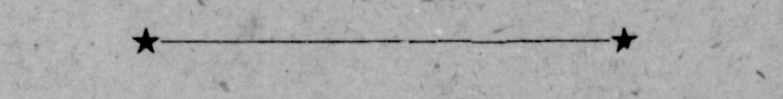

TIME REQUIRED TO GET TIRES AND GAS

Farmers must make their applications for tires and gasoline in time to be processed by the panels, the local War Price and Rationing board warned Thursday. The Bronze Star medal is awarded to Sergeant Henry I. Reinart, Infantry, 53rd Armored Infantry Battalion, U.S. Army, for meritorious service in action against an armed enemy of the United States from July 1944 to 26 April 1945, in France, Belgium, Luxembourg and Germany.

Washington Notes

Washington, D.C. July 6 — The House of Representatives was scheduled to adjourn this weekend until early fall. However, adjournment is indefinitely tied up on account of an appropriation which some are using for the so-called Fair Employment Practices Committee. While a number of sincere congressmen are supporting the FEPC, it is opposed by many, including all of the 21 congressmen from Texas.

This agency bears its name, The Norton bill, now pending in the House to create a permanent FEPC, proposes to impose on the American people as a permanent agency the most middle-class and troublesome of all the wartime agencies. It would establish a bureau in Washington with power to tell every employer in America, in effect, who he could hire and who he could fire. It would empower its agents to find an employer guilty of violating the law without a trial by jury or without resort to court. This agency would not remove discrimination, intolerance, or prejudice, but would aggravate all these things. In effect, it would cast our Bill of Rights into the ash can. It reminds me of that patriot who cried, "Oh Liberty, Liberty, what crimes are committed in thy name."

A principle is at stake. We'll stay here all summer if necessary to defeat this threat to our democratic way of life. Democracy is apparently under assault in all quarters of the globe. The British elections just held will give us some idea of trends in that country. The votes will not be counted until July 26. Mr. Churchill pulled no punches in his campaign. He warned his people that "Socialism is in essence an attack not only upon business enterprise, but upon the right of an ordinary man or woman to

breathe freely without having a clumsy, tyrannical hand clapped across his or her mouth. Most of us here are pulling for Mr. Churchill.

An important state official returned, tells me he viewed a recent "Victory parade" in Rome and that he saw only the red flag of Communism. An important French official, however, tells me Communism has reached its peak in France and will not be able to command more than 25 per cent of the French vote.

A GMC advertisement has just reached my desk extolling the virtues of our amphibious trucks known as "ducks", built by General Motors. This advertisement says a German officer captured near Isigny pointed to a long line of "ducks" and said "There is America's secret weapon." To some extent he was right. Eisenhower is reported to have said that without the duck we could not have taken our beachheads in Italy or on the Continent. The father of the duck was a truck made by an oil company for Louisiana swamps several years ago.

The War Food Administration advises me they are no longer using sugar in the making of alcohol for synthetic tire production, but now secure this alcohol entirely from other sources.

Kamikaze sounds crazy and is crazy, but these Jap suicide pilots have brought great devastation to our fleet as well as costing many American lives. Reports are that they have damaged "Them" by them selves ground ten billion dollars.

Drew Pearson continues in his determined campaign to discredit General MacArthur. Recent Pearson stories which MacArthur has positively denied are: (1) that MacArthur ran Senator Tydings and his party out of the Philippines recently; (2) that MacArthur would not permit General Patton to transfer to the Pacific, and (3) that MacArthur years ago removed General Eisenhower, then a Colonel, from his command in the Philippines. Colonel Hans of the Veterans Administration, a member of the Tydings party to the Philippines, tells me that instead of MacArthur running them out he gave them every possible assistance and helped them to finish their work in one-half the allotted time.

It is almost universally felt that the United Nations Charter offers our only hope for peaceful world collaboration, and that it will be ratified by the United States Senate. The Charter is not perfect. Nothing ever touched by human hands can attain perfection.

TREATMENT GIVEN FOR PEAR BLIGHT

Pear Blight, also known as Fire Blight, B.T. Haws, County Agent for the A & M College Extension Service, says that it is one of the most difficult of all diseases with which the pear is affected. Withholding fertilizing the trees with materials high in Nitrogen as new quick growth is attacked severely is one control measure. Infected twigs should be cut back several inches below signs of the trouble. Prunings should be burned. Spraying of trees in full bloom with 1-3-50 Bordeaux mixture is sometimes helpful. Avoid over fertilization of trees and do not prune heavily enough to cause excessive new growth. Kieffer Douglas and Garber varieties are somewhat resistant. Highly susceptible varieties such as the Bartlett should not be planted in areas where the disease is serious.

many stories about artistic masterpieces acquired by the Nazi hogs — through looting. It's an amusing distinction in words. When Germans helped themselves to personal possessions in occupied countries they were looting. Our boys were picking up souvenirs. We'll admit of course that our men did not operate on a big business scale like Goering and the others, but the principle is there just the same.

John W. Vandercok thought it was poor policy to publish news stories telling how the Germans rejoiced when American troops moved in to replace the Russians in certain districts of Berlin. He thought the news would offend the Russians.

We doubt whether the Russians were hurt, because we doubt whether they want the Germans to like them. When they marched in they had blood in their eyes and hatred in their hearts, and made no bones about it. But regardless of how they felt, the only real test of news is its veracity. If true the story was all right.

We're getting tired of the policy of twisting some news and suppressing others because a few self appointed nursemaids to the public morale think we should not know or some other country might be offended. We'll take our news straight, thank you, and decide for ourselves whether we like it. We imagine the Reds too would rather have it that way.

State governors in a convention have been complaining about vanishing states rights. It seems that every year the federal govern-

ment encroaches just a little more. There's a remedy for that out the states aren't likely to approve it. They can get back some of their rights if they will accept back some of their responsibilities.
