





This is really a hot subject, a | root growth and good growth burning question which every dairy farmer needs to warm up to. It is also something which needs cool consideration.

A number of farmers I know are in the habit in the fall of setting fire to the grass in their pastures, with the idea that they are helping next year's pasture.

Instead, Oklahoma tells us burning pastures destroys food in the soil and causes greater soil erosion. A discussion of the injury done by burning is found in Bulletin B-247. Extension Service, Oklahoma A & M College, Stillwater, Okla.*

Tests made in Oklahoma show that when grass is burned, nitrogen is lost and organic matter is destroyed. Four per cent of the water which fell on a burned plot ran off but less than twotenths of one per cent of the water ran off a plot which had not been burned.

Ten times as much soil was lost from a burned plot as from an unburned plot. One little match can cause a lot of dollars to go up in smoke in a pasture as well as around a barn or haystack, it seems.

And regardless of whether you are asked to increase your milk production next year or hold your production where it is, the best and cheapest way to produce milk at all times, is by better pastures. Take care of your pastures now and they'll take care of you and your cows next year.
