Your Health

Austin, Texas, — "Environmental sanitation is the public health term for clean, safe housekeeping whether it applies to a private home and its surroundings or to towns and cities. Among other things, it insures safe drinking water, proper garbage and sewage disposal, the safe service of whole-some food including milk, rat and insect control, and general cleanliness of the premises. However, for environmental sanitation to be effective, it is essential that not only public health officials but the citizens living in their respective homes or operating establish ments serving the public cooperate

wholeheartedly with the local sanitation policy," declared Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer.

"Consider, for example, the seasonal housefly hazard. It has been determined that 120 eggs are laid by a single female at one time and that a generation is produced. and that a generation is produced every ten days at summer temperature. Thus, the possibility of reproduction during the warm months of a single fly runs into many millions. While the housefly does not bite, it is dangerous because it breeds and feeds upon both filth

.. Again rats are the source of several diseases of man including plague, typhus fever, infectious jaundice and trichinosis to memtion some of the more important ones. Homes can be made comparatively ratproof by removing rubbish and garbage accumulations, and by closing avenues of access. Approved poisons and traps should be employed when a real

problem presents itself.
"Removal of containers of stagnant water such as tin cans and barrels will do much to eli-minate the mosquito for house-holders. The householder needs to devote more seasonal attention to mossuito eradication than he is to day if this is to be properly con-



The sound of the mower in your pastures about this time of year is music to your cows, sure endugh. Ragweed, goldenrod, thistles, burdock, dog fennel, bitterweed and other pests are now ripe for another clipping.

Clipping pastures at the right time not only keeps weeds from seeding and therefore spreading, but actually increases the food value to the cows. Tests showed about a 50 per cent increase in the amount of forage when a pasture was clipped

Grass gets a healthier growth when weeds are kept down. If you let weeds go you may have to get a posse out to find your cows about this time next year.

How to get more milk and lower cost of production by lengthening the grazing season is the main subject for discussion in the July-August Kraftsman, published for Kraft patrons. You surely won't want to miss the articles on fall and spring grazing pastures. If you are not getting the Kraftsman regularly, write Uncle Bob at 500 Peshtigo, Chicago 90, Ill., and I'll

Most of the hay I saw in recent weeks looked pretty good and indications seem to point to a fairly sizeable crop, at least where I've been traveling. I hope you can take advantage of good yields and get a big supply on hand.



Here's a good idea which comes from a squirrel: it buries nuts, for winter food supply, and you can "bury" some silage for your cows' winter food supply.

This is a good time to check your silo, make sure it is sound. And it's a good time also to make space for

an additional supply of silage. If you are not building another silo, there are quite a few types of temporary silos which will hold the extra cow feed you may need next winter.

Trench, box-type, native lumber, slat fence, baled straw and other such temporary structures give very satsfactory results. Remember, if you use one of these, be sure that it is built so as to prevent air from getting into the silage and to keep the right amount of moisture in.

For help on this point and for instructions on how to build this additional storage space, I suggest you write for Circular 346 "Temporary Silos," Extension Service, University of Missouri, Columbia, Mo.; Circular 320, Extension Service, Oklahoma A & M College, Stillwater, Okla., or Bulletin B-84, Texas A & M College, College Station, Texas.*


