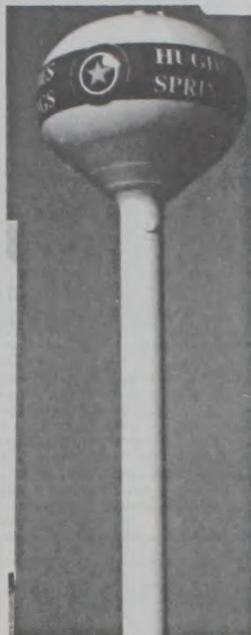


Excitement floated into Cooke County last Friday evening as the unmanned Global Hilton balloon decided to end its 300-mile journey east of Muenster. The propane-powered balloon lifted off in Albuquerque, New Mexico Friday morning, with hopes of being the first to fly nonstop around the world. About an hour after liftoff, the ship's two pilots bailed out after discovering a rip in the inner balloon. The abandoned, crippled, 170-foot tall balloon drifted across West Texas and over Cooke County around 5:30 p.m. As the moon rose in the east, the silvery airship started its descent over south Gainesville. ## City Council accepts the design for new water tower

Following the recommendations of Kimley-Horn and Associates, Inc., the city council decided to accept a single pedestal spheroid shaped elevated storage tank to be constructed on the north side of Muenster. At the Monday, January 5 meeting, Kimley-Horn engineers Bill Pembroke and Jason Gehrig described the advantages of a spheroid type tank. It is designed to withstand a sustained wind load of 100 miles per hour. The tank has better security, an insulated riser pipe, and self enclosed storage. It also collects less ice and has less expensive maintenance. Pembroke said they feel it is esthetically more attractive than other elevated tank designs.

The City of Muenster has been awarded a \$194,606.00 federal grant to assist in paying for the tower and supporting water line construction. The money should be issued in March or April says city administrator, Steve Broyles.

The council approved Kimley-Horn for design, construction, and monthly reports starting immediately. Pembroke and Gehrig forecast that the water tower and system will be on line by June 1999.

The total planned cost of the water tower is about \$400,000.00. \$50,000.00 will come from the recently enacted one-half cent sales and use tax, \$194,606.00 from the grant and the balance from city reserves.

Those reserves are not growing as fast now that Muenster has at least temporarily lost a major water customer, AMPI.

Water discussion continued as Muenster Water District board chairman Bob Bauer reported to the council on the status of the lake to be built north west of Muenster. Referring to state water supply publications, Bauer described a statewide demand for water that is dramatically outstripping the aquifer supply.

Water table depths in wells around Muenster are dropping three feet a year and levels of chlorides and fluorides are increasing. The demand for surface water storage is greatly increasing.

The geo-technical survey for the Muenster lake will start this month, thus gravel and top soil sales have ended.

Water District expenses and revenues so far are listed in general categories on page 2.

The district is planning for a future bond election to fund the estimated cost of \$2.2 million for construction of the dam. The district feels it is imperative to pursue construction of the lake and then perhaps the water treatment plant to provide essential water to a growing Muenster and very likely be able to sell water to communities like Saint Jo. It was reported that Saint Jo's most recently drilled water well is unusable because of poor water quality.

The city council expressed their gratitude to the Water District Board for their work over the years especially that of former president Duane Please See WATER, Page 2

## CCAD seats new board; sets workshop for contract

Members of the 1998-99 Cooke County Appraisal Board Directors (CCAD) were sworn in by Judge Jerry Oodlock at a meeting held Thursday, Jan. 8. Arthur elderhoff, Steve Cole, Ken aiser, Jane Carlton, and onna Doty took the oath of office.

Chairman of the Board Steve ole conducted election of officers for the year. New officers were elected as Ken aiser, president of the board, onna Doty, vice-president; and Jane Carlton, secretary.

After the election members journaled into a very lengthy executive session. When they returned to open session, Steve ole made a motion to appoint a committee or establish a workshop to work on and to define the issues necessary to

deliver a contract to Will Presson, chief appraiser. The board agreed 5-0 to a workshop.

Last year the CCAD voted 4-1 (Betty Buttolph voted against it) to increase the number of members of the Appraisal Review Board (ARB) from five to seven. A resolution was introduced and approved 5-0 to change that number back to five, with two alternatives appointed.

Angelo Nasche, Ken Tackett, and Kevin Sandmann each have another year to serve on their terms. Jack McWilliams of Lindsay and Bob Henderson were nominated and approved by the board to replace outgoing members Brenda Mobley, Jane Carlton, and Orville Anderle. The appointment of alternates was

tabled until the next regular meeting.

Dale Holzer, a representative of CPS Systems, gave an update on progress being made to correct problems which developed after tax laws changed by the Texas Legislature went into effect this past year. He said that Cooke County and three other districts with similar systems were having problems. His company had already corrected some problems and is doing everything possible to correct all of them. He requested a list of all the problems to present to his programming staff.

Holzer remarked that although the system in Robertson's office is not doing every thing Robertson would like it to, it is working. Holzer asked the board's permission to modify Robertson's system for

his requested changes. He said that there are safeguards that must be in place to prevent changes by an outsider who might assault the program.

Steve Cole remarked that he was on the CCAD when they decided to go with CPS and one of the big reasons was that they said that they would be responsive to the CCAD's request and would make available whatever assets they had to fix any problems. "I think that they haven't done what they should have done in correcting the problems," Cole stated. "They said they would be extremely responsive to our problems and they haven't been because I've been hearing these cries for help for several months. I really think we need to address these problems by next month with some solutions."

Jim Robertson, reported on the CPS System computer in use in his office for collecting delinquent taxes. "Our system is still not working, but Mr. Holzer of CPS tells me that it should be able to be fixed within two weeks," said Robertson. The system was purchased in July. According to Robertson they have been working on it since trying to get things such as penalty and interest on delinquent taxes and a break down per entity.

In the Chief Appraiser's Report Will Presson stated that \$7,561,562.78 in taxes had been collected. That is 36.61 percent of the levy. Last year at this time 38.72 percent of the levy had been collected. Presson attributed the decrease to tax statements being sent out about two weeks later this time.

After an executive session, the board met in open session and voted 5-0 to retain an expert witness in the case of Schachar.

In other business conducted during their Jan. 8 regular meeting the CCAD Board:

- Discussed the Texas Association of Appraisal Districts 17th annual, conference to be held in Houston this February. All members and the chief appraiser agreed to try to attend.
- Approved 4-0 with one abstaining of the minutes of the December 12 and 16 meetings.
- Reviewed and approved bills.
- Reviewed and approved financial statement.

## Students warned to heed new alcohol, tobacco laws

Seminars on the new laws passed by the Texas Legislature and put into effect Sept. 1, 1997 and Jan. 1, 1998, were presented to students from Muenster High School and Sacred Heart High School on Wednesday, Jan. 7. Juniors and Seniors attended the first session. Grades eight through ten from MISD and freshmen and sophomores from Sacred Heart attended the second session.

Speakers at the first session were Justice of the Peace John Roane from Valley View and Corporal Baker Johnson of the Texas Department of Safety. Joining the pair for the second session were Benny Brothers, an agent with the Texas Alcoholic Beverage Commission, and Sergeant Bob Stovall of the Muenster Police Department.

Beginning Sept. 1, 1997 several new laws dealing with minors and alcohol went into effect in Texas. Laws are stricter and punishments more severe, including possible loss of driver's license for several months.

Principal James Hopper introduced the program and the speakers. He urged the students to ask all the questions during the seminars.

Since September 1 the law says that you cannot possess, consume, or attempt to possess anything that is alcohol, Corporal Johnson explained. "If you're caught, you're given a ticket and have to go see the judge, the judge says you go for community service, fines," he said. "There are lots of things that judge can do. One thing that judge now has the authority to do is remove something that is very important to you. The judge can suspend your driver's license up to 190 days."

Johnson warned them not to try driving while their license is suspended because it would cost them another 90 days of suspension. "We don't want you to lose your driver's license," he said. "We want you to be knowledgeable about alcohol because as of Sept. 1 the new law says that if you are under 21 we can file driving while intoxicated if you have any detectable amount of alcohol. If

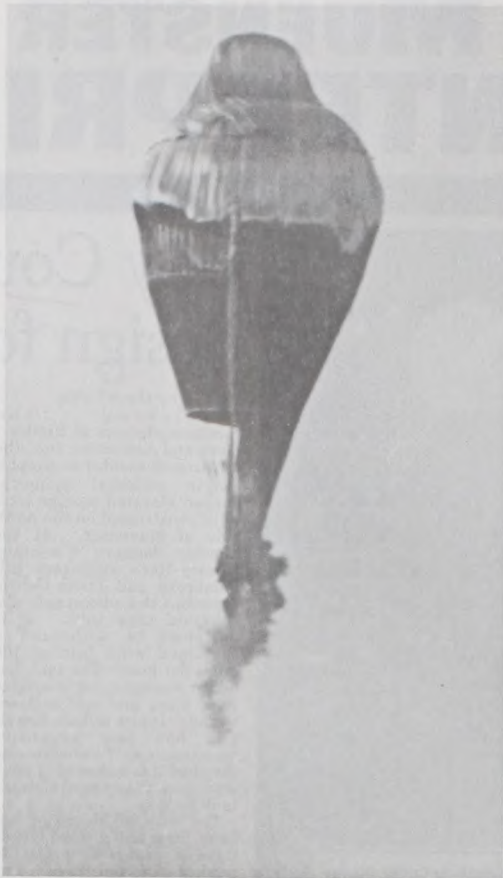
Kathy believes her

Without a pilot, the Global Hilton balloon (above) goes down near North Central Texas College, bouncing down in a pasture. Two propane tanks were dumped and others damaged, lightening the load and allowing the torn aircraft (at right) to bounce back up to about 1,000 feet. After a chase down Highway 82 and north, the balloon struck the ground several times before crashing into power lines a few miles west of Lindsay at approximately 6:45 p.m. None of the 11 propane tanks exploded as they all apparently released their gas during brief touchdowns. The exploding lights and small fire were the result of the basket hitting several power lines. The tethers connected to the basket were cut loose, releasing the balloon, where it came to rest entangled in trees a short distance away.

Rohmer. The council appointed Wayne Grewing as a new member of the water Board and re-appointed Bob Bauer and Pat Stelzer.

Other items of discussion and action included:

- Street paving projects for sections of 4th and 6th Streets were approved.

- Terry Tombaugh, TU Electric Manager from Gainesville introduced himself as replacing Vernon Smith and requested that the City accept refunds to be paid in the form of rate reductions. Collections made in the past in advance of rate increases that were not approved are being returned.

- Steve Broyles described a recent dramatic increase in rain infiltration into the city sewer system. He said the increased flow will require a letter of waiver to the Texas Natural Resources Conservation Commission

explaining the city's efforts to replace old sewer pipes and limit rain-in-flow to the system. Without these measures, the TNRC could require the city to build a larger waste water treatment plant to handle the flow. Over the reporting period 1995 to 1997, while rainfall increased from 31.6 inches to 35.5" per year, effluent from the treatment plant increased from 1.2 million gallons per year to 2.5 million gallons of flow. Broyles said this has to be due to recent collapses in the city sewer system allowing water infiltration. The city is working steadily to replace old clay pipe at the rates of at least 2,000 ft. per year. The TNRC should approve the plan.

- Renter's water meter deposits will increase from \$50.00 to \$100.00.

- Monthly bills totaling \$57,254.56 were approved for payment.

**The Roth IRA**

You can also withdraw money tax free from the Roth IRA prior to age 59-1/2 for college education expense for yourself, spouse, children or grandchildren.

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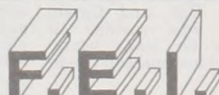

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## Letters to the Editor

Dear Editor:

Call 911 and in Cooke County you might get zapped! Read on if you are interested in information that might affect you in an emergency.

Our 911 service had a startup date of some time after 1990. We have been assessed \$50 per phone line per month plus a surcharge of \$.XXX on all long distance calls every month. Also listed below are all the different taxes on our cellular phone, per phone, per month:

- \*1. Telecommunication Infrastructure Fund Charge \$ .75
- \*2. 911 Service fee .50
- \*3. Federal tax 1.18
- \*4. State tax 5.54
- \*5. County tax 0.00
- \*6. City tax 1.35

\*monthly phone bill of \$97.31 with tax of 9.32.

This all comes to a payment into the 911 system of about \$10,000 per month for the last 96 months, or approximately \$1,000,000 for 1990 to 1998 for Cooke County alone.

Where does this money go and how do we get our share? Our legislators in their last session found so much money in 911 funds they allotted \$5,000,000 out of it to study disasters. Also, all cell phones have city tax, what city gets this money and what is it spent for?

In about 1995 I went to my County Commissioner to see what was being done about getting all the county road signs up, giving all the houses in the county a valid address, and getting it in the databases of the 911 computer, who when you call 911 your name, phone number, and address would be displayed in the 911 dispatcher's computer screen. I was advised that he would get on it and see what he could get done, but he didn't know how much money was in the budget for this.

The reason for my doing this was that I had checked to see where my house was listed in the 911 system and found it to be listed at the Mountain Springs Community. My house, in fact, is located about 11 miles north of Mountain Springs and 2,000 feet from the Gainesville City limit.

On December 9, 1997, I had a grass fire, called 911 and was told to hang on because I was being transferred to someone else. When the next person answered, she started asking me where I was located, my telephone number, etc. When I

asked if she could display my information on her computer, she advised me that she did not have that capability.

In the process of investigating what had happened on my 911 call, I found all of the following:

We have supervisors and dispatchers who are totally committed to helping people who have an emergency, but the person who answers 911 at the Sheriff's office has so many duties that she is just answering 911 calls among multiple other duties. The equipment she has to work with is outdated and apparently sometimes it fails. If she has to transfer a 911 call to another county, she has to dial a regular phone number and hope it's not busy because the 911 equipment doesn't have transfer capabilities. But, there is 911 equipment on the market that will do this. If she has to transfer the call to the EMS office, she has to push buttons, operate keys and hope it works.

On my call, no information appeared on the printout in the EMS office. On this date only one call that was transferred to the EMS dispatcher had any information printed in her office.

I have valid proof that these dispatchers will go to any length to help locate a person in need. One called a county telephone supervisor at 2 a.m. to get him to send a person to his phone office to verify where a call was coming from. On another occasion, the director of the EMS sent his employees to a known location so that each one knew how to get there in case there was an emergency call because of medical problems.

All of the above is needless work and expense if the time and money would be spent to complete the mapping and addressing of the county houses, replace 911 equipment, eliminate multiple dispatching locations and provide our officials with enough money and people to do the job.

Now is the time for our county and city officials to work together to get new equipment, locate all of it in the new city facility and hire three full-time dispatchers for 24 hour coverage. Then it will be completed once and for all.

This is not meant to point a finger at any one person, but it's time to stop being conservative with money and be concerned that some one loses his life because the job has not been done properly. Let's all point our finger straight up and say we are going to make Cooke County 911 "number one" in the state of Texas - then do it!

If you agree that this needs to be addressed, call your commissioner or councilman today.

## DPS has openings for trooper trainees

The Texas Department of Public Safety is seeking applicants for a recruit school scheduled to begin July 18, 1998. Persons who successfully complete the rigorous six-month recruit training academy in Austin will join one of the country's premier law enforcement agencies. The Application deadline is Feb. 17 for Texas residents.

Graduates initially are assigned to one of the Department's uniformed services - the Highway Patrol, License and Weight or Driver License services. After gaining experience, the trooper may apply for promotions within those or other areas of the DPS.

Applicants must be at least 20 years old on the date of probationary appointment to the position of trooper-trainee and be of good moral character and habits. Applicants must have at least 60 hours of college (prior law enforcement or military experience may be substituted for some or all college requirements). A final conviction (including probation) for any DWI, DUI, or felony automatically will disqualify applicants. Both oral and written statements given during the application process will be verified for accuracy.

Those selected for the recruit school will be required to successfully complete psychological testing, physical examinations, drug screening and additional physical demands. Character, habits, previous employment and other factors also will come under scrutiny.

I stop you and I smell the odor of beer, you can be fined on for driving while intoxicated. The blood alcohol level for a teenager is zero."

According to Corporal Johnson, in the past law enforcement officials didn't take a real serious look at minors in possession. They were usually made to pour out the alcohol, were lectured, and sent on. He said things have gotten so bad and with the change in the laws that is no longer the case. Statistics from 1996 show that in Texas there were 3,738 traffic fatalities and of that number more than 1,100 were teenagers. "Man, that's a big number, and that's just one year," he remarked.

"Generally with new laws we have a 90 day grace," continued Johnson. "From Sept. 1, that's already gone by. The judge has already seen some of you for minor in possession."

Judge John Roane said, "If nothing else, if we can just keep people from getting out away from the house, away from their parents, out on the roads with alcohol, if we just keep one or two of you from doing it - the rest of you I'll see eventually. Hopefully it will be in front of my desk." The alternative could be that he would see them when he had to go out to a wreck to pronounce someone dead.

When a minor is with his parent, legal guardian, or spouse over 21, he or she can legally possess or consume alcohol because the adult is responsible for the minor. The students were reminded that if they drank in the presence of their parents and then left home or where ever without the parent, then they could be fined on if caught and the responsible adult could also be in trouble. "You must be accompanied by your parent," said Johnson.

A first offense minor in possession charge can include a fine up to \$500, driver's license suspension up to 30 days, eight to ten hours of community service, and the person must attend an alcohol awareness school. These can be increased on subsequent offenses. Also more serious alcohol related violations carry greater penalties. The adults who provide minors with alcohol should be aware that now much more emphasis is being placed on this offense.

Roane explained the changes in tobacco laws which became

effective Jan. 1, 1998. They apply to persons under age 19. The penalties are much the same as those involving alcohol, including loss of driver's license.

Students asked question after the presentations. On was on being at a party where some of the minors have alcohol, but not everyone is consuming alcohol. Corporal Johnson responded, "If it there you're taking your chances. Leave to be safe, go home. You stay there you take a chance." He also reminded the teens that if they were riding in an automobile and there is a six-pack of beer even if it is unopened they will get minors in possession. The officer doesn't know whose beer it is and so will give tickets to all.

Another student wondered there was a parent at the party if the minors could still be given a ticket. The response was that the parents of all the minors would have to be present since an adult can only permit the minor of whom he is a parent or legal guardian of to use alcohol or tobacco.

Judge Roane answered another question on alcohol at a party in a home and what would happen to those who weren't drinking if they were outside the house. He said that was getting into a gray area and that he would have to decide what to do about the situation if an officer gave the minors a ticket. He said the would come before him in court and he would have to make a decision then.

Johnson reminded the students that if he, or another officer, issues a ticket or brings someone to jail, the person would have to be bonded to get out of jail, even if they go to court and beat the charge, there are still many expenses involved.

DWI convictions remain on drivers records for as long as you maintain a Texas driver's license, said Johnson. That is reflected on the cost of your insurance also for the rest of your life, he said.

"The bottom line is to make young people and parents aware of the penalties involved with alcohol offenses, concluded Judge Roane. "We're not going to change the world but if we can keep a few young people from getting in trouble or getting injured, then we've done our job."

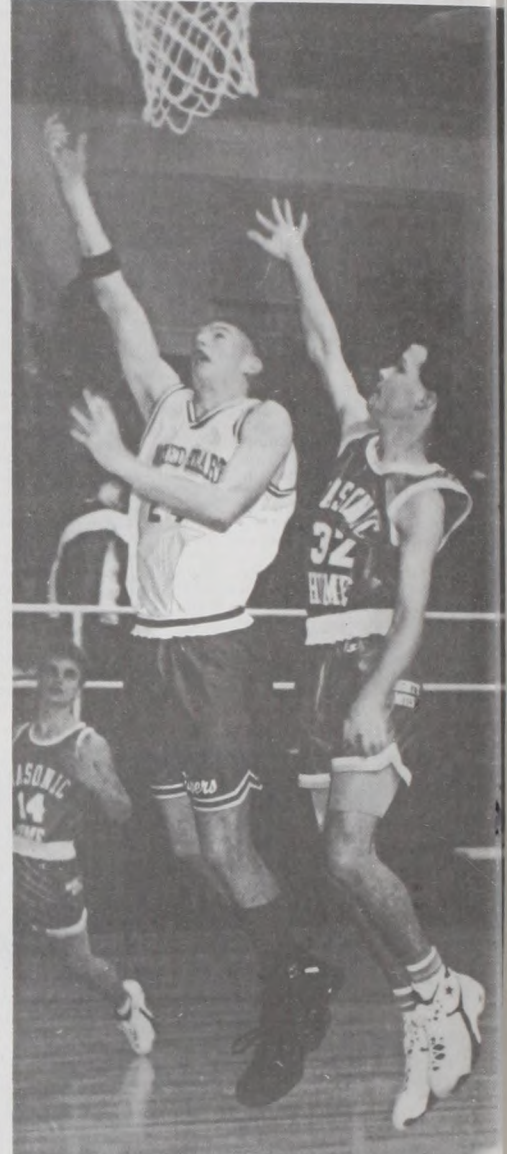

## '97 Ag Census Report forms due Feb. 2

Farmers and ranchers received 1997 Census of Agriculture report forms three to five weeks ago, and USDA's National Agricultural Statistics Service reports that most forms have been returned. Farmers and ranchers who have not yet completed their forms are reminded that the deadline for returning the forms is February 2.

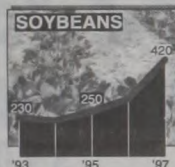
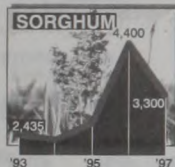
Farmers and ranchers who are holding their forms because their financial records are not available should complete their best estimates. Those who received a Census of Agriculture form but haven't returned it because they don't operate a farm or ranch should make a note of that on the form and return it so they will not be contacted again.

Farmers and ranchers who are thinking about not returning the form are reminded that they are required by law to answer the Census. Each mailed form, reminder or personal visit from a census taker costs time and money and delays the release of data, currently scheduled to begin in the spring of 1999.

Assistance in completing Census report forms is available from the National Agricultural Statistics Service in Austin or in your local area.

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from USDA's Cooperative Extension Service, Natural Resources Conservation Service and Farm Service Agency staff. Farmers can call the National Agricultural Statistics Service toll-free number at 1-888-4AG-STAT for assistance or to obtain a report form.

All information collected in the census of agriculture is kept confidential by law. This Census will provide benchmark agricultural statistics for decision making for the next five years for the U.S., for Texas and for each of the nation's 3,100 counties.

## Feed the right roughage

University of Nebraska research demonstrates that roughage source and particle size can influence performance of cattle on finishing diets.

The trial compared an all-concentrate diet with rations including alfalfa hay or wheat straw. Each roughage source was ground to pass through a 3/4 inch, 3-inch, or 5-inch screen. Roughage tended to improve intake and gains compared with the all-

concentrate ration. Cattle fed the rations containing alfalfa hay gained 7.7 percent faster and 7.7 percent more efficiently than those fed rations containing wheat straw. As the particle size of either roughage source increased, daily gains and feed efficiency tended to decrease with no difference in dry-matter intake. The researchers conclude that decreasing roughage particle size might enhance performance.

## Seedling tree program Sponsored by SWCD

The Upper Elm-Red Soil and Water Conservation District (SWCD) is sponsoring its annual conservation seedling tree program for area land users. The purpose of the program is to encourage the planting of trees for conservation and wildlife benefits.

Hardwood and conifer trees are available. Adapted hardwood species include Green ash, Red oak, Bur oak, Russian olive, and Aromatic sumac. Conifers available include Afghanistan pine, Red cedar, Austrian pine, Red pine, and Pinyon pine. Wildlife packets are also available to enhance wildlife habitat and provide

food for quail, deer, turkey, and squirrels.

The cost of the seedlings is \$25 for a bundle of 50 hardwoods and \$1.95 to \$2.50 per tree for the conifers. The wildlife packets are \$49.50 for 100 trees.

In addition to trees, the district also sells grass and wildflower seed.

The USDA Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS), formerly the Soil Conservation Service, is the technical agency that assists the Upper Elm-Red SWCD in carrying out its programs. For information on the tree program, contact the NRCS or SWCD in Gainesville at (940) 668-7794.



## COW CARE CALENDAR JANUARY

Pregnancy check cows if it wasn't done in the fall. Worm, pour and vaccinate at the same time. In winter, nutrition and lice are two important health problems. Fresh water must always be provided.

For heifers calving in February, vaccinate with E-coli, Scourguard 3KC or Enterotoxemia. Heifers receiving Scourguard for the first time will require two shots, one 30 days before calving and another two weeks prior to calving.

## County Agent's Report by Craig Rosenbaum

### 1997 Dryland Corn Test

Wet conditions have put a stop to all farming activities in this county. However, very soon it will be time to prepare for corn planting if any is to take place.

Each year a State Corn Performance Test is held on various soil and climate regions of Texas. The one in our area is held at Prosper, Texas. The soil type is a Houston black clay. This location was planted on 3-11-97 with a final plant population of 20,000 plants per acre. Fertility was 100 lbs. per acre of 18-46-0 and a broadcast treatment of 450 lbs. per acre of 34-0-0 when plants were 8 inches tall. No herbicide was used. Row width was 40 inches.

Although an optimum planting date was secured, periods of cold

and wet weather hampered early plant growth development. Good growing conditions and timely rains in May resulted in continuous plant growth and development. Then the hot dry conditions hit like they did in Cooke County. Russell Sutton, Experiment Station Researcher, felt that there was adequate rainfall until July 1 when weather conditions became very dry. These conditions made maximum corn production for the area less than desirable.

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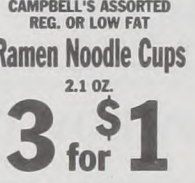

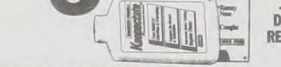

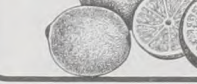
