Hail and wind batter area Monday afternoon

Ominous storm clouds made good their threat of bad weather Monday, March 30 as high winds and hail beat a path from Montague County to Muenster, Myra, Lindsay, and Gainesville. The area affected by damaging hail and wind was narrow and hit mostly less populated areas.

Cooke County Electric Cooperative on Highway 82 east of Muenster took a serious pounding. All of the vehicles on the lot, both personal and company, were damaged. Two vehicles had the back windows demolished by hail stones. They were blown in and the vehicles interior's covered by hail and rain. Several front windshields were cracked and some side mirrors broken.

Several school children going home on a Muenster ISD bus took shelter at Cooke County Electric Cooperative. Their driver, Ted Heers, parked the bus under an awning and the

students got inside unharmed. "We watched the hail hit and blow and literally explode as it hit the brick wall," commented Kathy Bauer, Cooke County Electric Cooperative customer relations coordinator. "Everybody was saying that they'd never seen anything like this." Several people estimated that the wind was blowing about 70 miles per hour.

Although it hailed in Muenster for about five minutes damage wasn't heavy. The more severe damage seemed to start about a mile east of Muenster. John Bartush of Cooke County Farm Bureau Insurance reported that they had about 50 reported claims of damage to autos and he said he expects at least that many more. Damage to roofs of several homes insured by Farm Bureau was reported from rural areas. In one home the hail broke skylights allowing hail and

water in to the house. Bartush also noted that the hail seemed heavier near Fisher Road than in Muenster.

Rhonda Hartman of Muenster Farm Mutual confirmed damage to a number of homes insured by that company. A lot of roofs received damage. Some skylights were broken and windows and window screens were damaged. She said that the area around the Electric Co-op was especially hit hard.

From FMW Insurance Pat Henscheld said, "We had a lot of reports, but nothing too serious." A few autos and a few dwellings reportedly received damage to roofs, decks, hoods, and windshields. The vehicles were outside of town when damaged, she said.

From Myra came reports of windows knocked out of dwellings. One business along Highway 82 filed a claim for broken windows, said Mrs. Henscheld.

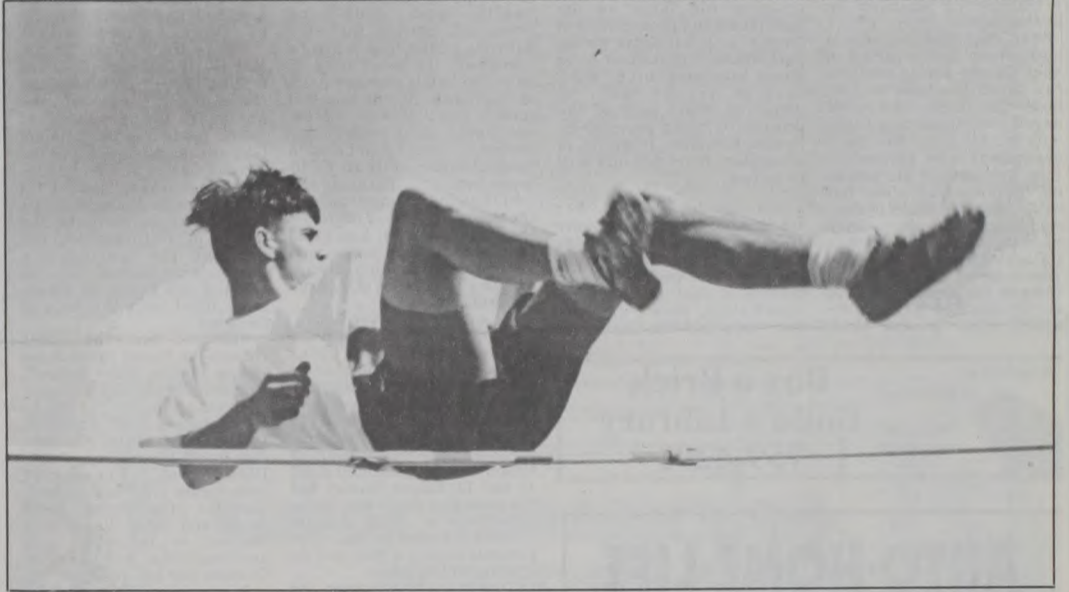

Rep. Ron Clark counsels Citizens Advisory Committee on statutes

State Representative Ron Clark attended the March 10 meeting of the Citizens Advisory Committee in Whitesboro to review with them the state statutes regarding executive sessions, the procedures, the reasons, and their confidentiality.

Clark outlined the reasons for executive sessions, procedures to be used, manner of posting, content, confidentiality, and consequences of breaching that confidentiality. He also distributed written material related to the statutes to Citizens Advisory Committee (CAC) members and answered questions.

One question asked was in regard to the ability to discuss

items from executive session in public. Rep. Clark's advice was that items discussed in an executive session should not be discussed outside of executive session, and that anyone who did so was taking the risk of having to defend themselves in any possible legal action.

Mike Carleton of HDR Engineering reviewed the technical criteria for selecting a landfill. He explained the process and selection of criteria that had been undertaken by CAC members during the last eight months.

A map and selection criteria with ranking were provided by Carleton. There were many questions asked of Carleton from the citizens attending the meeting. Most of these were in regard to specific sites which

the citizens felt were going to be recommended as a landfill site. It was stressed that no selection process has been made and that CAC members have not looked at even one site.

Carleton reviewed the requirements of federal legislation under Subtitle D. He remarked on the various technical requirements for the construction of landfill sites.

CAC members added their remarks. Nancy Pike spoke on the cost issues and the importance for communities in this area to have a publicly controlled landfill for the future. Coy Stanphill remarked on the selection criteria and the effort of the Committee was making to ensure their ability

to recommend a site which is economical, environmentally sensitive, and accessible to all citizens of Cooke and Grayson Counties.

Committee members had visited a landfill in Ardmore, Oklahoma. Britt Swain noted that it was efficient and clean. Citizens attending the meeting took the opportunity to comment on the situation and to ask questions.

Vice-chairman Tom Lawrence adjourned the meeting into executive session to discuss deliberation regarding real property. When the meeting was re-opened it was stated that no action had been taken in executive session.

There were about 75 citizens present at the meeting.

Sales tax rebates remain up statewide

Texas cities and counties received \$163.3 million in monthly sales tax payments in March 1998. That is an eight percent increase over the \$151.2 million allocated to Texas cities and counties in 1997.

"Texas continues for the fifth consecutive year to experience strong economic growth, while consumer confidence remains the highest in the nation," said John Sharp, state comptroller. "Sales statewide for the past several months have surpassed earlier expectations and far

exceeded sales in the previous year."

Sales tax rebates totaling \$147.8 million went to Texas cities, 7.1 percent higher than last March's payments of \$137.8 million. Muenster received a payment of \$13,866.99, an increase of \$20.92 percent from March 1997. Total payments to date for Muenster during 1998, \$53,265.48, is up 45.54 percent from last March.

Lindsay's March 1998 payment was \$4,127.01. That

was 4.55 percent more than the March 1997 payment. To date Lindsay's rebate total for the year is \$15,130.35. That amount shows an increase of 5.82 percent from this time last year.

Gainesville received \$215,064.84 in March 1998 rebates. That amount is 5.06 percent more than the March 1997 payment. To date in 1998 Gainesville received \$825,312.94, 0.15 less than the total in March 1997.

Oak Ridge received a March payment of \$3,157.37, up 15.10

percent from a year ago. Valley View noted a slight increase (0.29 percent) with a March payment of \$2,295.35.

Rebates of \$15.5 million to Texas counties were 16.5 percent higher than allocations of \$13.3 million in March 1997. Cooke County received \$85,293.59 this March. It was an improvement of 3.55 percent from a year ago. To date in 1998 Cooke County has received a total of \$312,593.03 which is 2.77 percent less than the total in March 1997.

And so it came to pass that the Children of Israel, delivered from bondage to Pharaoh, embraced the instructions of Moses and celebrated the annual observance of the Passover. Gramm agreement will give states more road \$\$\$

U.S. Sen. Phil Gramm has brokered a bipartisan agreement in the Senate that would pump \$26 billion more into building and repairing highways.

"We have reached an agreement that will guarantee that over the next six years every penny collected in the 4.3-cent-per-gallon tax on gasoline will go to build roads and only to build roads," Gramm said.

The Senate approved the Byrd-Gramm agreement by a unanimous vote. The measure would amend the federal highway funding bill currently being debated in the Senate and would bring to \$173 billion the total allowed for new highway spending through 2003.

Gramm's provision dedicates all of 1993's 4.3 cents-per-gallon increase in the federal gas tax to highway spending and guarantees all states at

least a 91 percent return on each highway dollar. In the last six-year highway bill, Texas received just an 82 percent return.

"When people pull up to the pump to buy gasoline, they understand the federal tax they pay goes to build and repair highways. But the 4.3 cent-a-gallon tax that was added in 1993 has been spent for anything and everything except highways," Gramm said.

The proposal will provide \$1.7 billion in added highway funding for Texas, part of \$26 billion that it provides for highways nationwide. It also creates a \$450 million fund to finance such programs as the special "NAFTA Highway" designations that are being sought for I-35, the planned I-69 in South and East Texas, and the I-10/1-25 link at El Paso. All three programs would be eligible for funding from this account, Gramm said.

'The Great Hanging' featured at Museum

The second session in the Horton Museum of Cooke County's Sesquicentennial Spring Series - "Those Left Behind: The Women and Families of the Great Hanging" will take place at the museum in Gainesville at noon on Monday, April 6, 1998.

The Great Hanging was a tragic event that occurred in Cooke County during the Civil War. Much has been written about the men who were hanged and about those who were involved in the local government who prosecuted them. But what of the women and families who were left behind after the deaths of their loved ones? Did the women marry? Did the families stay in Cooke County? After the war, some of the men who served on the jury or who were local officials fled this area for while, many leaving their

families behind. What did those families go through? Some of those questions will be answered in this program with a lot of the information coming from actual descendants.

The second part of the program will focus on the restoration and preservation of trunks with handouts giving participants tips on how to go about accomplishing that. Several trunks will be displayed. This part of the program is being provided by Brooks-Reynolds Interiors of Muenster. Refreshments will be served.

Walter J. Luttmer dies March 28

 Mass of Christian Burial was held for Walter John "Wally" Luttmer of Lindsay on Monday, March 31, 1998 in St. Peter's Church, officiated by Father Eugene Luke, OSB, pastor, of St. Peter's and Father Harry Fisher of St. John's of Valley View. Mass readers were Kenneth Grewing, Walter Luttmer and Jeremy Luttmer.

Walter Luttmer died on Monday, March 28, 1998 at 10:30 p.m. at his home near Lindsay. He was born on Sept. 19, 1923 in Muenster to Herman Luttmer and Gertrude Albers Luttmer. On Sept. 23, 1951 he married Helen Erkamp in Sacred Heart Church. They lived for some years in Muenster and in 1953 moved to Gainesville, and in 1963 settled on their farm north of Lindsay.

Walter John Luttmer was a member of the Merchant Marines, U.S. Navy, and the U.S. Army. Having joined the U.S. Army Marines in October 1943, he served primarily on the west coast of the U.S. He was discharged with the U.S.S. USS Victory Ship and went to Europe. While in Europe, he was able to contact his brother, Harry who was serving in the U.S. Marine Theater, and bring him back home. In 1945, he was drafted into the Army and served in Arkansas and Georgia, and was discharged from the Army in 1946. He was a soil field worker, dairy farmer and an employee at the Muenster Aircraft. He was a member of St. Peter's Church in Lindsay.

Survivors are his wife Helen Luttmer of Lindsay; a daughter, son-in-law Diane and Carl of Muenster; four sons and daughters-in-law Wayne Cathy Luttmer of Lindsay, Robert and Carol Luttmer of Lindsay, Kenneth and Kelly Luttmer of Coppell, and Robert Luttmer of Muenster. There are 17 grandchildren and two great-grandchildren.

Also surviving are one sister, Nancy Bayer of Gainesville and two brothers Wilfred Luttmer and Henry Luttmer of Muenster. Also an aunt, Mrs. Nicholas of Gainesville, and numerous nieces and nephews.

Preceding him in death were his parents and five brothers, Fred, Alfred, Charles and Philip Luttmer.

"I Am The Bread of Life" at Communion and "God Be With You Till We Meet Again" for the Final Farewell. A recording of "Daddy's Hands" was played as a meditation after Communion.

The eulogy was given by Willard Zimmerer. Speaking with deep respect, he told that Walter Luttmer died at his home surrounded by the family he dearly loved as husband, father and grandfather. A strong, hard working man, he dedicated his life to providing for them. Together he and Helen built the beautiful farm they have north of Lindsay. As small boys, his sons began their store of memories, playing at the creek... as teenagers milking cows and hauling hay... relying on his advice if they got into any trouble... coaxing out his wonderful sense of humor... joining him in missing the son and brother when he joined the Marines... and looking forward to "coming home time". Protecting our drinking water sources

Last week, we published an article prepared by the Texas Rural Water Association which provided background information on our drinking water. This is the second in a series of articles on the City of Muenster's resources.

The City of Muenster has a safe water supply. If our water is good, why do we need a special program to protect it? The reason is that the situation has been changing dramatically during recent decades. Our sources of water supply, both surface and ground water, are being endangered by new chemicals or microbiological contaminants.

Concurrently, our ability to detect contaminants has been improving. Modern science can now identify specific chemicals in terms of one part contaminant in one billion parts of water. One part per billion is equivalent to one kernel of corn in 12, 500 bags of seed corn or one second in 32 years. In case you think that such small amounts can't be very significant, keep in mind that you can get sick from a single microscopic virus.

Although we currently know a great deal about the health impacts of drinking water contamination, many questions remain. On-going research will no doubt provide new information which will answer some old questions and generate some new ones. Meanwhile, as City of Muenster citizens can take steps to reduce the risks to our health.

Most of us would agree that a vaccination to prevent illness is well worth the time, expense, and inconvenience. Similarly, many communities are using protection methods to prevent drinking water supply contamination. Communities have found that the less polluted their water is before it reaches the treatment plant, the less extensive--and expensive--the efforts needed to safeguard the public's health.

A **Wellhead Protection Program** is a program which prevents the pollution of the groundwater and surface water that serve as sources of drinking water. The management of land around a well site, such as the City of Muenster water wells, is an example of **wellhead protection**. A **wellhead protection** program typically includes delineation of the protection area, identifying potential sources of contamination that may impact the delineated area, implementation measure to manage these sources, and planning for the future. Later, we will be asking for volunteers to survey the area for the City of Muenster and **Muenster Lake** area.

Wellhead Protection helps safeguard **community** water supplies. It is a program which belongs to, and is managed by, the local community. Unquestionably, communities are the key stakeholders in **wellhead protection**. It is people living and working in communities who have the most to gain or lose from the quality of their drinking water.

The benefits to communities protecting their groundwater might be best understood by describing the costs of failing to protect the source of groundwater. Easily quantifiable costs of groundwater contamination include treatment, remediation, finding and establishing new supplies or providing bottled water, consulting services and staff time, legal costs of litigating against responsible parties, and conducting public information campaigns as a result of public and media interest in groundwater incidents.

Although seldom done, it is relatively easy to estimate the value of a drinking water supply abandoned due to contamination. Such costs can be high when the quantity of water rendered undrinkable is large or the supply of potential drinking water is small. Table 1 shows a sampling of various sized communities that have encountered high, quantifiable costs due to groundwater pollution.

Communities with effective groundwater protection programs may also enjoy substantial saving in the costs of complying with Safe Drinking Water Act regulations. This is because cleaner sources of groundwater require less disinfection, which means reduced requirements for removing disinfection by-products. Water suppliers with **wellhead protection** programs may be eligible for waivers from monitoring requirements that reduce their monitoring costs. Texas water systems which have received these waivers have already saved \$49 million in two-and-a-half years.

Other benefits of **wellhead protection** that can be expressed in economic terms are helping to maintain real estate values in areas served by protected water supplies and avoiding loss of potential tax revenues and jobs because businesses refuse to locate or remain near places with known or suspected problems. A survey of 21 Minnesota cities found that five cities collectively lost more than \$8 million in tax revenues because of real estate devaluation as a result of groundwater pollution.

Wellhead protection can also have important secondary benefits. The protection of groundwater sources is obviously beneficial to fish, wildlife, and recreation. We also must include the reductions in risk to human health which result from cleaner groundwater.

Wellhead protection can be effective only if every citizen and business in the area joins in. A partnership must be formed between the City of Muenster citizens, farmers, and ranchers of the area, and local businesses to assure that the supply of water remains safe. In the next article, we'll discuss what potential sources of contamination may exist in the City of Muenster area that could affect our drinking water and what we can do as individual citizens to protect our valuable drinking water.
