New 20-channel radios to be purchased for cars

The city council approved the purchase of two, new 20 channel radios for the city police cars at the April meeting Monday. These radios, with more frequencies, will enable the police to be in contact with area fire departments, emergency vehicles and help with weather tracking in stormy situations.

The desired construction starting date for the elevated water storage tank was set for July 1, 1998. This is a legal technicality because of the grant and not likely to be the actual date. The council also approved the closure of Ninth Street (Main to Oak) for 8 to 10 months as needed during construction. The City's north yard at the corner of Main and Ninth Street was approved for zone change from R-1 single family residential to I-1 light

The logo for the water storage tank was approved at the March meeting which is simply - Muenster - in German cript. Chamber breakfast features talks on upcoming regulations, elections

Chamber of Commerce heard two guest speakers at the monthly breakfast meeting Wednesday, April 8 at the Center Restaurant. City Manager Steve Broyles reported on new rules proposed by the TNRCC (Texas Natural Resource Commission Commitce) for Clean Air Quality Standards. Muenster ISD Superintendent Steve Cooper was promoting the district's upcoming bond election

Broyles explained to the 29 members present that these changes could impact some Muenster businesses. The Cleaner Business and Industry proposal could bring regulations and modifications that would be very costly. "It could cost a gas station enywhere from \$10,000 to \$20,000 and an auto paint shop anywhere from \$50,000 to \$100,000," Explained Broyles. Proposed changes are in five

areas. Iney include: 1. Cleaner Business and Industry with new nitrogen oxides controls. The control area would extend for 125 miles from the ozone non attainment area of Dallas and Fort Worth. Also new controls on volatile organic compounds as far as 60 miles from the

2. Cleaner Gasoline, all of East Texas from I-35 to the eastern border of the state of Texas.

"The MISD Board is in a position to pro-act instead of react. If you can pro-act you can save a little money and do a better job," stated Steve Cooper in regard to the school board's decision to call for a bond election to build a new bith acbed

As explained by the MISD superintendent, the reason a new building is needed is that they are out of room. There are no rooms available in the elementary, middle or high schools.

Without additional space, WISD cart: expand their curriculum; meet the state mandated 22 to one student ratio in certain classes; meet dequate space needs to comply with recent increases in graduation requirements from L8 credits to 24 credits; meet he requirements of two of the newest state graduation programs, the recommended orogram, the recommended program; provide adequate science and computer labs.

Should the bond issue fail: space problems could be addressed by purchasing portable buildings; some computer courses couldn't be offered creating a hardship in preparing students to meet challenges in the work place; it would impact MISD's ability to keep students abreast on other curriculum changes; the inability to find space for the students would eventually impact MISD's long standing tradition of academic excellence.

Presently there are 475 students enrolled at MISD. The projected enrollment for 1998-99 is 512 and for 1999-2000 is 518.

MISD has published a booklet containing its capital improvement plan. It contains facts and figures concerning the proposed building plans, costs and also the consequences of not building. Many anticipated questions are answered in the booklet. The **Please See BUILD, Page 4**

A variety of homestead exemptions could lower your property taxes!

A homestead exemption lowers the property taxes on your home by lowering its taxable value. If your home is valued at \$50,000 and you receive a \$15,000 homestead exemption, your home will be taxed as if it were worth \$35,000.

Who qualifies for an exemption?

Anyone who owned a home on January 1st (and used it as their primary residence on that date) is entitled to a \$15,000 home-stead exemption to lower their school taxes this year...and it doesn't matter if your home is a house, condominium, or mo-bile home. (Counties, cities, and special taxing districts may also offer homestead exemptions.)

Are other exemptions available?

Are onner exemptions available: If you're disabled—or if you're 65 years old or older—you are entitled to an additional \$10,000 school tax exemption on you're also entitled to a permanent, locked-in "ceiling" on the school property taxes on your home. (The ceiling does not apply to county or city property taxes, and those entities may offer other exemptions.) The over-65 homeowner's exemptions and school tax ceiling transfers to the surviving spouse, if the spouse is 55 years of age or older at the time of death and lives in and percentage of school tax paid, based on their former home's over-65 school tax ceiling, to a new home.

Do I have to apply each year?

No. If you had a homestead exemption on your home in 1997, you won't need to reapply for 1998 unless your chief appraiser requires it. However, if you haven't received an exemption on your present home—or if you've moved to a new home—you'll need to file for an exemption for 1998. If you are 65 this year, you may file for the over-65 exemption up to one year after the date you turned 65. And if you became disabled during 1997, you need to file for the disabled person's exemption.

When and where should I file?

"Productivity appraisal" may lower the property taxes on your farm, ranch or timber land!

Texas law allows farmers, ranchers, and timber growers to pay property taxes based upon the "production value" of their land rather than on its market value. This "productivity appraisal" means qualified land is taxed based on its ability to produce crops, livestock, or timber—not on its value on the real estate market. And it can mean substantial property tax savings.

When is the application deadline?

If your land has never had a productivity appraisal or you are a new owner, you must apply to your local appraisal district by April 30 to take advantage of this benefit on your 1998 prop-erty taxes. You may get up to 60 extra days if you have a good reason and ask for it by April 30. If you miss this deadline, you may still be able to apply, but you will pay a penalty. Check with your appraisal district office.

Do you need to reapply annually?


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Runoff election slated for April 14

Clyde was bleeding from the right leg, left arm and had several cuts on his head. Stan applied tourniquets to his arm and leg until the EMS arrived. The EMS told Stan that he had saved Clyde's life. Clyde had surgery on his left arm and right leg and received more than 200 sutures. Clyde's recovery was speedy and he is still working cattle.

Farm energy use declines, farm output decreases

Agricultural energy use peaked at 2.2 quadrillion Btus in 1978. However, oil price shock: during the late 1970s and early 1980s forced farmers to become more energy efficient. Many farmers have switched from gasoline-powered to fue efficient diesel-powered adopted energy-conserving tillage practices, shifted to larger multifunction machines and adopted energy-saving methods of crop drying and irrigation. Between 1978 and 1993 energy (excluding electricity used by agriculture declined 25 precent, primarily due to a reduction in the direct use o energy (gasoline, diesel liquefied petroleum or LP gas and natural gas). Energy used to produce fertilizers and pesticides declined only. sighty. The composition of energy. Was has changed significantly Gasoline use has dropped from 42 percent of total energy use to fuel has risen from 13 percent to 29 percent. While farm energy use declined by 25 percent between 1978 and 1993, agricultura output increased by almost 47 percent (in 1987 dollars Economic Report of the President, 1995). As a result the ratio of energy use to agricultural output fell by 50 percent between 1978 and 1993.

Collection times are from 8 a.m. until 3 p.m. at all locations. These public disposal programs are totally free to any Texas resident and designed to reduce hazardous waste in the state. Persons wanting to disposal of hazardous waste should carefully pack and transport all materials in a safe manner, Hoelscher said. All hazardous waste will be handled at the site by a disposal collector. Representatives from the Texas County Clean Up program also will recycle batteries, oil, oil filters and empty, rinsed plastic pesticide containers. Contact your County Extension Agent for more information. The program does not accept explo-sives, fertilizers which are non-hazardous, gas cylinders, penta-chlorophenol, and 2,4,5T herbi-cides.




