Start thinking about this - We all want to see a new and better hospital facility in Gainesville, but why think that we have to give up our Muenster Hospital District in order to see it happen?
wher

Gainesville Hospital Board members have committed to building their hospital with or without the involvement of the Muenster District. The financial analysis they recently completed was
on the basis of going it alone - without the Muenster District, and their tax figures are set accordingly. (This has been publicly stated.) So the new hospital will be there.
No logical person would honestly say that use of those new facilities by residents of our Muenster District would not be greatly appreciated by Gainesville. Our use of their new
facility - and the increased profit to them - is much more important to the Gainesville District than is the tax revenue we would contribute as part of a MERGED District. Currently many of our patients here in this District are being directed out-of-county for advanced medical care. If we here at the Muenster Hospital, or the Muenster Clinic whichever it turns out to be -re-direct just $20 \%$ of those patients to the new Hospital in
Gainesvile it would raise their profit by approximately $\$ 500000$ to $\$ 1,000,000$ per year That is two- to four- times the amount we would contribute in taxes if we MERGED. Just think what that would do in paying off their debt
have repeatedly said in LTE's that we want to work with Gainesville in a manner that will be advantageous to both Districts - such as the above - but we do not want to MERGE
We do not want to give up our District. (And we want to save our Hospital if at all We do not want to give up our District.... (And we want to save our Hospital if at all
possible.) All this could be accomplished, if the current Board and Administrator would only co-operate in the effort. SO DO NOT THINK WE HAVE TO MERGE.

Yes, the two Hospitals Districts could work together as a single medical care system in order to take advantage of any special situation, such as being "sole provider", at an increased Medicare reimbursement rate. The original MERGER plans used exactly that idea - the two Districts were new facility was opened. Obviously, that plan never went into effect, but it could have worked that way for any length of time desired. Of course Gainesvile Hospital is not the only possibility as "partner". SO WHY DO WE HAVE PEOPLE TRYING TO CLOSE OUR HOSPITAL AND GIVE AWAY THE DISTRICT? IS IT TIME TO REPLACE THOSE PEOPIE, and save our Muenster Hospital District? John G.
