MMH calls Town Hall meeting on merger

"Texas has been leading the nation in rural hospital closures, so it's good you are looking ahead," said Kevin Reed, legal counsel for Muenster Memorial Hospital and also TORCH (Texas Organization of Rural and Community Hospitals). I have been to many meetings like this and you are not the only one with this problem." In brief, Reed made the following points during a presentation to the hospital town hall meeting Monday night, Feb. 26 in the Muenster High School Auditorium:

• The hospital business is a volume business and rural hospitals cannot generate enough volume - you can't run on 3 or 4 patients a day.

• Hospitals are largely dependent on Medicare which constitutes as much as 50 percent or more of revenue.

• We see little or no

which constitutes as much as 50 percent or more of revenue.

• We see little or no additional federal revenue coming - especially not from the Bush Administration.

• Allowances for rural health clinics and home health have been reduced.

• You have no opportunity to recruit specialized doctors.

• High technology means high cost.

• Muenster Hospital is an old building.

• There is not enough revenue to replace and upgrade equipment.

• Low population means fewer patients available and you are too close to other hospitals.

Reed listed about a dozen smaller hospitals that had closed in Texas since 1995 and compared the struggle to maintain the status quo with raised taxes, close down completely, or join the efforts to combine with a regional hospital. Reed explained some of the points of the enabling legislation through the state that would dissolve the Muenster and Gainesville Districts and create a county-wide district IF the voters approve on both sides, the new hospital board would

have members from each county precinct plus one at large. Reed emphasized a point that he had never seen before in similar legislation for other hospitals. The enabling legislation for the new combined district would require that medical facilities be operated in both Gainesville and Muenster. He said the language is very strong requiring out-patient services of various kinds to continue in Muenster.

After the presentation Reed took questions:

- Is Gainesville considered small? No, not as small and haven't seen one Gainesville's size closed.

- What good are Muenster's 3 or 4 patients on average? Even a few help and don't forget the outpatient services that would go along.

- Where can the legislation be reviewed? On the Internet soon and copies will be available.

- What about the current petition? Reed said since the question is on dissolving the district, that if the vote is to dissolve, then close the hospital immediately, and if to not dissolve, then nothing changes. (Refer to last week's story on the vote).

- Isn't President Bush increasing funding to Medicaid and Medicare? Reed said most of the money would go to big hospitals. "There isn't a hospital administrator in the state who is holding his breath waiting to get more Medicare money."

- Another question about what facilities will stay open in Muenster. Radiology, Lab, Clinic space, St. Richard's Villa, a good solid outpatient facility. Those are the minimum - but no emergency room.

- Do you know of any success stories for other hospitals like Muenster? Reed said none. Michael Oatman, CPA and financial advisor, said the hospitals in Carrico Springs and Smithville had similar situations and showed improvement through the "common thread of

increased utilization."
However, in both cases those hospitals were the only ones in their county.

-Another question about emergency room. Jack Endres responded that the legislation only addressed a minimum of services but two Gainesville board members wanted to see the emergency room stay in Muenster. Endres would also like to see an ambulance in Muenster. A full emergency room requires hospital services to back up the ER. A member of the audience commented that the ambulance was needed more than the ER. Endres said that's what we want, but he couldn't promise anything at the time.

- Comment that even with a new hospital in Gainesville, many people would still go to Sherman or Denton. Reed disagreed, saying there would be plenty of support for the new regional facility.

- Comments at this point supporting the county hospital not just Muenster or Gainesville.

Michael Oatman, CPA from Waco and independent auditor for MMH, gave a presentation on some financial points.

• Some get help for this problem by writing their U.S. Congressmen.

• A recipe for success is to get substantial net income and provide a modern building and equipment which will attract and retain physicians which use the hospital.

MMH has effective expense control.
 Income and cash flow are both falling since 1997.
 Medicare and Medicaid hits are beyond control.

• The lack of volume is what's hurting us. Oatman predicted that income and cash flow would continue decreasing and a 100 percent tax increase would be necessary over the next two or three years. He said personal costs and debts are

controlled and MMH taxes are substantially lower than other places. "What's missing here is volume," he said, "New payment methods are generally volume driven. Where do you decide to quit? You have the opportunity here to plan ahead."

- Question about private owned hospitals. Endres gave examples of reasons not to be involved with them like repeated sell-outs and fraud problems.

- If neither hospital (Gainesville or Muenster) is doing well, why do we want to combine? A new hospital is more attractive to patients and doctors.

- Question about insurance problems. Merger doesn't solve the problem, but gives a tool to address the problem.

- Who are the Muenster members of the initial combined board? (Before the first election). Jerry Hess, Werner Becker, Charles Bayer, and Don Hess.

- Who are the Muenster figure in? He had no idea. There is no plan. Only favor he asked was sufficient notice so he could look for something else if necessary. One lady in the audience said we should want Endres there too, to watch out for See HOSPITAL, pg 10

CCAD appraisers work Muenster area

Muenster is currently
being scrutinized by
appraisers from the Cooke
County Appraisal District
(CCAD). Appraisers have
been working Muenster for
about six weeks now and
have completed at least
half of the re-inspection of
property in town as well as
some of the rural area
around Muenster.

While doing a reinspection the appraisers
will take photos of the
property, look for Class and
condition, and check for any
new add ons or tear downs.
There are six appraisers
working. Target date for
completion is May 15. That
is when Smithson would
like to mail out the notices
of change in values.

Speed of work is some
what dependent on the
weather. Other areas being
appraised include Lindsay,
Valley View, Era, and
Sivells Bend.

At the Tuesday, March 6
meeting of the CCAD Board
of Directors, approval was
given to open a bank
account with GNB for
Vehicle Inventory Tax (VIT)
and to have the signatures
of Chief Appraiser Doug
Smithson and another
CCAD employee on the
signature card. Smithson
explained that all of the
automobile dealers in Cooke
County pay into an escrow.
In October that money is
used to pay the taxes.

Previously the County
Tax Assessor Collector

handled the collecting and holding of collected funds. It was reported monthly to the CCAD and the taxes paid to them in October for distribution to the entities. New laws require that the tax assessor collector would have to go-to school-to become certified and registered with the state just like CCAD employees. Any interest or penalty will be kept by the CCAD.

As a result of an executive session two motions were made and approved. The rejudgement in the IMAC case was approved and the Chief Appraiser was authorized to file the appropriate papers. The vote of approval was 5-0. In a second motion the Chief Appraiser and CCAD attorney Peter Low were authorized to proceed in the Hobbs case as discussed in executive session. The vote of approval was 4-0-1 with Don Hobbs abstaining.

Oak Ridge votes yes to sale of mixed drinks

A special election was called by the town of Oak Ridge for Feb. 17 to decide if the sale of alcoholic beverages, including mixed drinks should be allowed. Votes were canvassed and approved at the Feb. 26 meeting of Commissioners Court. There were 19 votes cast, 17 for and 2 against. Commissioners Court scheduled a workshop for Wednesday, March 8 to work out details for updating the County's Subdivision Regulations. Cooke County Judge Bill Harris told the commissioners he would have something drawn up before that time so that they could study proposed changes and be ready for discussion at the March 8 meeting.

Commissioner Young said that the Walnut Bend School Superintendent asked that the County consider setting a 20 mile an hour speed limit on school days from 7:30 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. "We've been out and checked on things and traffic out there just east of the school is getting really heavy in the morning and all day long any more," explained Young.

Commissioner Virgil Hess said, "Before we go any further, I think the law for the counties that the State Legislature allows us to set the speed limit down to 35 miles an hour. Any time we go below 35 mph we have to have traffic study."

Commissioner Bill Cox noted that there is a Bill coming up in the State Legislature that would

allow counties to set limits below 35 mph.

The agenda item was tabled until more information was given by the State.

Why did Muenster build a hospital in the first place? We had a clinic and from what I can remember, it was a cornerstone of the community. Even before our beloved Dr. Myrick passed away there was much discussion about the need of a hospital with a 24-hour, 7 days a week emergency room. The community must have felt a great need because we all worked together to get our district and made pledges to make it happen. Was it all a mistake, or do we not need it anymore? Who should decide?

Out of the blue, the present hospital administrator and some of the board tell us that our debt-free hospital that has ¾ million dollars reserve cash is no longer feasible to operate. They also tell us that they have been working on a merger for 5 years with the idea that our community will regress back to a clinic. I think this raises a lot of serious questions.

First of all, if our hospital was so financially stressed 5 years ago that the board felt justified to switch from overseeing operations to planning the merger of the hospital, why are we not broke and in debt now? Secondly, was the merger planning done in secret to keep awareness of what was going to happen to a minimum? If not, then why are the administrator and some of the board demonizing John Aytes for trying to raise awareness now about something that concerns the whole community? He should be commended not crucified.

Another question is, if an administrator decides he doesn't want to continue to run our hospital shouldn't the board be trying to find someone who does? I don't see how the board and administrator can put maximum effort into building up and maintaining our hospital if they are at the same time planning to dispose of it.

If the board truly feels the hospital should be merged with Gainesville, wouldn't you think that the first order of business would be to find out if the majority of the people of the district want to do this? The people of the district put it here and taxed themselves for it in the first place so they should have the final decision about any changes. (This reminds me of a few years ago when the present hospital board president wanted to solve all of our school problems by merging Sacred Heart School with MISD. Of course, there was also some objection to that idea.) In addition, it does seem strange that a going-business like St Richards that always had a waiting list to get in and always thrived, suddenly became a poor business when purchased by our hospital and run by the present administrator.

In closing I would like to say I think it is time that all the fiebting and name calling.

In closing, I would like to say I think it is time that all the fighting and name calling should stop and the board should do what we elected them to do, oversee the running of the hospital. I think if the members of the hospital board want to avoid unending criticism for the way this issue is being handled, we need a vote now. Let us respect the experience and knowledge of the people of the district and pledge to uphold the will of the people.



A few days later I noticed the wind had calmed, and the windmill wheel was standing still. I realized that this was the time to fix that rascal, and get it back under control.

After finding a piece of heavy wire that would do the job, and making the needed repairs, the mill was turned off and at rest.


Mr. Trew picked me up in his car about 5:30 each day, and as we neared the house he asked me if Sam, one of his hands, had been there that day. "If he was, I didn't see him," I answered.

When I told him I had seen the mill standing still, and took the opportunity to repair it and turn it off, he seemed stunned and later told me that I was the only hand he had ever had that had done anything he hadn't asked him to do, and he asked why I had done so, and demanded to know why.

Well, I could only tell him that at home, I was expected to make repairs, as I found the need.

Mr. Trew was always an easy man to work for, but after this little episode he refused to deduct anything from my pay check for any reason.

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
