

Dr. Gerald McDaniel 1945 - 2001

Dr. Gerald Green Goforth McDaniel, 56, longtime professor of English at North Central Texas College, passed away Wednesday, Nov. 7, the victim of an apparent heart attack suffered while having dinner at a Gainesville restaurant with friends and colleagues from the college.

Known affectionately to both colleagues and students as "Dr. Mac," he had been a member of NCTC's English Department faculty since 1993 and was extremely popular among students, both those he taught and many others with whom he came in contact as an organization sponsor and frequent participant in campus activities.

Dr. McDaniel, in fact, was one of the most active and college faculty outside the classroom, serving on several college committees and task forces, acting as co-sponsor of Phi Theta Kappa honor society, writing scripts for numerous skits and special events and serving as editor of the popular campus newsletter, "The Highlighter."

Most recently, he had served as editor of the voluminous NCTC Institutional Self-Study Report, a key element of the process whereby the college's accreditation is reaffirmed by the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools. "Above all else though

"Above all else, though, Dr. Mac was a dedicated educator and scholar who loved his students and who cherished his role as a teacher said Dr. Ronnie Glasscock, NCTC president. "He dedicated himself to that role completely, and he had a profound impact on all who knew him, students and colleagues alike.

"In so many ways—as an educator, scholar, colleague and friend, Dr. Mac was a constant inspiration to us all. He will be sorely missed."

Dr. McDaniel's brother Robert, also a member of the NCTC faculty, said Dr. Mac lived by a favorite quotation from his beloved Chaucer: "And gladly wolde he lerne and gladly teche."

The popular professor's sudden death was a shock to the entire college community and especially to his teaching colleagues.

"His death is a devastating blow to the English Department and to this institution," said Linda Coolen, fellow English professor who had worked with him throughout his tenure at NCTC. "He was one of those people who is

intricately involved in all
aspects of college life. He is
going to be terribly missed
by us all."
At NCTC, Dr. McDaniel
taught the freshman
composition and literature
courses as well as the
British and world literature
survey courses and creative
writing. An academic
traditionalist in many ways
and an avid history buff, he
was also among the first
faculty members to embrace
new technology and
developed two English
courses, which he taught via
the Internet.

Born in Wichita Falls he

Born in Wichita Falls, he held the B.A. in English, Spanish, and journalism and the M.A. in English from Midwestern State University, and the Ph.D. from the University of Texas at Austin, specializing in medieval, renaissance, and 19th century British literature.

He also had held a National Endowment for the Humanities (NEH) fellowship at the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill, studying Southern literature and culture. He taught a British literature course and a graduate course in medieval English literature for Texas Wesleyan University in their "Summer in Great Britain" program.

Dr. McDaniel taught as a teaching assistant at MSU and UT-Austin, at ETSU (now Texas A&M — Commerce) and at McMurry University in Abilene, where he was chair of the English Department. He also had worked as a newspaper reporter and layout editor and had traveled in France and Spain on an NEH grant to research and photograph material connected with the American expatriate authors, especially Fitzgerald and Hemingway. He was also one of the best barbecue chefs in North Texas and liked to stretch out those cook-outs to past dark.

His greatest love, though were his wife Tracey and their sons Shawn and Chad and his Muenster relatives. He loved, also, his coworkers and friends.

Survivors are his wife Tracey Miller, two sons Shawn Thomas Miller of The Colony, Texas and Chad Michael Miller of The Colony; his father, W.J. Miller of Muenster; his brothers and sisters-in-law, Robert Miller and Betty of Muenster, Alan Miller and Darlene of Muenster, and Mark Miller of Arlington; a sister and brother-in-law Linda Flusche and Jack of

Services were held Friday, Nov. 9, 2001 at 2:00 p.m. at First Baptist Church in Frisco, with Rev. Alan Strickland officiating. Sacred music included "My God And I", "How Great Thou Art," and "I'll Be There."

The presiding minister said, in part, "We have gathered here today to remember and honor the life of Terry Miller. Your presence here today is one of the greatest honors you could pay to Terry and Tracey. It is a strong testimony to your realization of his character, friendship, and inner-worth.

"We all know that in these last months, Terry faced the enemy of cancer, but did so with courage, determination, and dignity. He was truly a man who never gave up...."

The minister continued "To his family let me say...
You can draw strength today from the words of Jesus, just before he was to depart this world and return to the father, but not before he had to go to the Cross... We do not understand why Terry's life was cut short so early... Jesus friends wondered the same... He was only 33 years old... Thus we are reminded today: We were not created for time, but for eternity.

"Honor Terry by passing on the good that he placed in your life. To you he would say 'So grieve if you must, but I won't be far away, for life goes on. So, if you need me, call and I will hear."

The service concluded with all attending, praying in unison "The Lord's Prayer."

Burial was in Ridgeview West Memorial Park in Frisco, Texas directed by Cantrell Funeral Homes of Frisco and Celina, Texas. Nov. 15 is Texas Recycles

Recycling reduces toxic air
emissions and energy

communities such as ours,
curbside pick-up of
recyclable items is not
available. However, there
are many ways in which
Muenster recycles and
celebrates Texas recycles
day. Muenster's recycling
celebration began in
September with the
community wide garage
sale. 51 registered
households participated in
the event. To minimize the
amount of solid waste going
into fills citizens are
encouraged to reduce the
amount of waste they
generate, reuse items,
recycle and rebuy. The
community wide garage sale
met all of these objectives.

Recycling aluminum cans
saves 95% of the energy
required to make the same
amount of aluminum from
virgin ores. The Cooke
County Distributing
Company, located at 315 N.
Mesquite, has been
providing recycle services to
the community since 1972
and recycles an average of
56,000 pounds of aluminum
per year. This is a reported
increase of 8 tons of

aluminum recycled per year since Muenster won the last Governor's Community Achievement Award. Muenster youth man the aluminum recycling facilities, which will be open this Saturday to collect your aluminum in celebration of Texas Recycles Day. Cooke County Distributing Company "pays top dollar" for your aluminum cans and is open every Saturday from 9:00 a.m. until 11:30.

Fisher's Meat Market and Grocery provides a beneficial recycling service to the community by accepting cardboard. 

the Oprah Winfrey Show because he feels that is the only way that all the people in New York who need to will hear about Dr. Nedley and his book. Dr. Nedley is an M.D. whose specialty is Internal Medicine with emphasis in Cardiology,

whose specialty is Internal Medicine with emphasis in Cardiology,
Gastroenterology,
Preventive Medicine,
Mental Health, and the difficult to diagnosis patient. He has a full time practice in Ardmore, Oklahoma. Dr. Nedley also lectures on nutrition, lifestyle, and physical and mental health. He's held numerous nutrition seminars, cooking schools with his wife, Erica, and depression and stress seminars. He has recently had his second book, "Depression the Way Out" published.

After completing his vesidence of the service of the

"Depression the Way Out" published.

After completing his residency, Dr. Nedley learned that one out of every three to six patients an internists sees in an outpatient practice are suffering from depression. That would make it the most common disease entity that his patients had, but he felt unprepared to assist them. Thus he said he was determined to find out as much about depression, its causes and treatments as possible. He began to realize that the causes of depression were voluminous.

that the causes of depression were voluminous.

In the 1990's it was learned that the frontal lobe of the brain played a major role in the development of depression. Diagnostic workups weren't being done on these patients and so they weren't being told of the actual cause of their depression. This could result in patients becoming dependent on drugs and or counseling for the remainder of their lives.

Dr. Nedley took a new approach to his patients with depression. He did investigative workups to find the cause, and then put them on a treatment plan that dealt with the underlying causes. "The results were truly amazing," Wrote Dr. Nedley in his latest book. "In just 20 weeks the vast majority of my patients depressed patients were no longer dependent on drug medications, counseling, or even follow-up visits with me!"

were follow-up visits with me!"
His book is filled with information that can help depressed patients. It includes how nutrition affects the brain and a number of recipes to help raise the levels of nutrients needed to feed the brain. Some of these include omega-3, omega-6, folic acid, vitamin B12, and serotonin. There are a number of recipes for food that contains high levels of needed nutrients.
"He does it from a medical

"He does it from a medical stand point, not from a psychology/psychiatry stand point," said Paula. "Even if you're on antidepressants and counseling, you still may stay depressed if you don't have the right nutrition. Not that nutrition will cure, but it can help in tremendous ways. He has in the back of the book a 20-week cure. In the middle of the book he has all of the antidepressants and their costs, their side affects and

his comments – why he would use or wouldn't use them, what the dangers are."

When going to New York in October Paula said Dr. Nedley didn't want to take the book with him because he didn't want them to feel he was there to take advantage of them. She told him, "To me you've given them some free office visits, you've given them a prescription and now you don't want to let them pick the prescription up. It's all right here in the book and once you're in depression your frontal lobe, you lose long-term memory. You can tell them tonight but by tomorrow when they go

home, they can't remember it all."

Paula noted that the interesting thing about this book was that it started printing on Sept. 10, printed all night long and was finished at 8 a.m. on Sept. 11.

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Arnal bunt losses on Rolling Plains exceed \$27 million

An economic analysis recently completed by a Texas A&M economist indicates the fungal disease Karnal bunt has hurt the Rolling Plains regional economy to the tune of more than \$27 million.

Karnal bunt infects wheat, durum wheat and triticale if flowering plants come in contact with disease spores when temperatures are cool and rainfall and humidity are high. The spores can spread from field to field on plants, seeds, soil, farm equipment, tools, vehicles or on the wind.

Once in the soil, Karnal bunt spores can survive for as long as five years if not longer.

Infection typically

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Infection typically damages only a small portion of individual grain heads and kernels. In most cases, however, infestation is well below levels necessary to affect or reduce yield and quality. Infected grain is not toxic to humans or livestock, but flour and feed containing high levels of infected grain often has an off color and unpleasant "fishy" odor.

Karnal bunt was detected

Karnal bunt was detected in late May in Young County. Subsequent testing by the USDA Animal and Plant Health Inspection Service (APHIS) led to a quarantine of Young, Archer, Throckmorton and Baylor counties in the Rolling Plains. APHIS quarantines infected areas to minimize the potential negative impact on the nation's \$4.9 billion wheat exports, and to contain the Karnal bunt was detected

negative impact on the nation's \$4.9 billion wheat exports, and to contain the disease within an infected area. The United States is currently the leading global wheat exporter.

Roughly 400,000 acres are under quarantine in North Texas, but USDA must wait until the 2002 crop is harvested before it can alter its quarantine because the disease was not detected until harvest was under way and some of the crop was already shipped.

USDA is now negotiating with nations that don't ban Karnal bunt to buy affected grain at discounted prices. Grain elevators in the four counties now hold 1.5 million bushels of infected grain and about 2.1 million bushels of non-infected grain that was mixed with bunted grain.

"These are direct economic losses. When added together, they

samples tested positive at federal laboratories," said Stan Bevers, Texas Cooperative Extension agricultural economist at Vernon.


"Another seven million bushels tested negative as bunted wheat, but, because it was grown or commigled with wheat grown in an infected area it cannot be marketed through normal channels."

"Once a positive identification is made, it is APHIS' charge to contain the disease in an infected area. This effort imposes restrictions on grain sales, use and movement that producers from the disease in an infected area. Right now, that compensation amounts to a maximum of \$1.80 per bushel for bunted wheat, but there isn't any compensation for negatively tested wheat that is still affected by the quarantine. Wheat that is bunt positive cannot be sold for the export market. It's only real use is as livestock feed, and that means a reduced price for producers selling this grain."

Bevers recently completed an economic analysis outlining the projected impact of Karnal bunt on the four-county area economy. That analysis reveals the following losses:

Subterranean Clover; Subterranean clover, also called subclover, is native to the Mediterranean region. Subterranean clover is the common name for three Trifolium species, subterraneum.

common name for three Trifolium species, subterraneum, brachycalcycinum, and yanninicum. Most varieties grown in the United States are subterraneum species. Subclover is best adapted to soils ranging from a fine sandy loam to clay with a pH from 5.5 to 7. Like arrowleaf, it usually becomes chlorotic and stunted on soils with a pH above 7.3. The brachycalycinum species of subterranean clover is adapted to soil pH,s above 7.0 but has less cold tolerance. Subclover has a low growth habit, which forms a dense sod that seldom exceeds a 10°inch height. Its short height is deceiving. Forage yield of a 5- to 6-inch high subclover pasture is similar to a 12-inch high arrowleaf clover pasture.

Flowering and seed development in subclover are different from other clovers. After pollination, the flower develops in a burr. At the same time the stem bearing the burr bends downward, placing the seed in the soil surface. Therefore, grazing can continue during this time without reducing seed production. In fact, seed production is reduced if subclover is now kept grazed down to a 2- to 3-inch height during

grazed down to a 2- to 3-inch height during flowering. The stoloniferous growth habit of subclover makes it well suited for close grazing animals like sheep, goats, and deer.

Subterranean clover is the largest seeded coolseason clover with about 55,000 seed/lb. Therefore, it is quick to emerge and has excellent seeding vigor. Recommended seeding rates range from 16 to 20 lb/acre. However, good stands have been obtained with only 8 lb/acre when planting in a pure stand on a clean, firm COOKE COUNTY

seedbed using a drill. Planting depth is critical on subclover. Seed should not be placed deeper than 1/2 inch. Early forage production is reduced with the lower seeding rates but thick solid stands develop by spring. Near Interstate 1- and south, seedling vigor of subterranean clover is greater than crimson clover. Moving north, crimson clover seedling growth is greater because of better growth at low temperatures. Hard seed percentage can be low because of rainfall during seed maturation that results in unreliable reseeding. Reseeding appears to be better on heavy soils than lighter soils.

Sweetclover: Sweetclover is not a true clover (Trifolium sp.) but is Melitotus genus. At one time, it was the most widely grown forage legume in the United States. It is one of the most drought-tolerant legumes and was grown for forage and soil improvement, particularly in the Great Plains and the Corn Belt. Sweetclover will grow almost anywhere there is a minimum of about 17-in. rainfall and soil pH is neutral to alkaline. 

stands have been obtained in Central Texas when seeded in late January and February. It has a medium seed size with approximately 260,000 seed/lb. Sweetclover plants are 3 to 7 feet tall at maturity depending on variety. Annual sweetclovers are late maturing, flowering from May through June in the southern United States. Sweetclovers contain coumarin that causes a bitter taste to which animals become accustomed. If sweetclover is baled at too high a moisture level, the coumarin changes to dicoumarol, a blood anticoagulant. Cows eating the moldy hay can die of internal bleeding. Genes for low coumarin have been found in a wild sweetclover type but none of the annual sweetclover varieties contain the low coumarin gene. A breeding program has been initiated at Texas A&M University Research and Extension Center at Overton to transfer the low coumarin gene to annuals. At this time, only seed of Hubam sweetclover is available.
