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

"One of the greatest problems facing Brownwood and the entire country today is relief for the unemployed. They have been placed where they are because of the lack of proper jobs for them and because of the crash of nearly two years ago. If Brownwood people will try to help the men now sitting around the street corners they will bring about much relief.

"One reason why things are like they are is because people don't have any money. If the times were better the repair work would be easier to find, but in that case the men now begging for small repair jobs

"If people would only realize that even a yard cleaning would bring about much relief to the unemploy ed it would help. Now we will take for example; a man gets his lawn mowed and his back yard cleaned and in all probability it costs him \$1 or less and it really doesn't mean anything to him, but how much good ed time to do them, food will this buy for the family of material at very the man who does the repair work?

"Some, in fact many, can't afford more than a yard cleaning but there are many more who can afford to have repainting, remodeling and repapering done to either their homes or to their store buildings. They are not flush with money, still they can have the work done. If they will do this it will mean at least one days work to some man," Mr. Tunstill said.


