Precautions In Kite Flying Are Urged By Electrical Company

With spring breezes and sunny days at hand, youngsters thoughts are turning to kite flying, and the power and light company officials today issued an appeal to parents to warn children regarding precautions which should be taken in the pursuit of this popular pastime. Each year brings many serious accidents because of carelessness in flying kites in the vicinity of electric power lines.

In order to avoid accidents in this community, five precautions are suggested, which, if observed, will minimize the hazards of kite flying:

- (1) Don't fly kites in the vicinity of electric light lines.
- (2) Don't climb a pole or use a stick in order to dislodge a kite or string entangled in power lines.
- (3) Don't fly kites with metal strings.
- (4) Don't fly kites with wet strings.
- (5) Don't pick up a wire which might have fallen to the ground.

Unpublicized Texas Resource To Become Important Industry

Opportunity for development of one of Texas' little-known but vital resources, manganese, is seen by the All-South Development Council in actions before houses of the national congress aimed at encouraging domestic production of this ore, termed by the War department the "No. 1 strategic mineral."

The fact that manganese, which "puts the starch in steel" and in fact is indispensable in making sound steel, and as such is the prime importance in national defense, was stressed in a recent congressional committee hearing on the bill of Senator John E. Miller of Arkansas specifying that a proposed million-ton stockpile be compiled from domestic sources.

Texas is one of 29 states having known substantial deposits of manganese, some of which, in Jeff Davis and Val Verde counties, saw development started during the World War, but not carried on after the emergency period. Of the indicated consumption of manganese in the United States in 1937 of 911,563 tons, probably less than 40,000 tons was domestically produced, although there are sufficient manganese ores in this country for all peace time or wartime purposes.

The principal reason for the lack of development of domestic manganese, Washington hearings have shown, has been the comparatively low metallic manganese content of American ores. It was also brought out that the 1935 reciprocal trade pact with Brazil cutting the manganese rate in half and applying also to other foreign sources, principally Russia and Africa, had stagnated domestic production just when new concentrating processes were giving promise of making manganese mining here worth the effort and investment.

Besides the Miller bill there are concurrent resolutions in House and Senate calling upon the Secretary of State to remove manganese from the commodities coming under the Brazil agreement and to exclude it from proposed new tariff treaties. Testimony before the Senate Military Affairs committee was to the effect that, with only that tariff protection, a domestic industry utilizing several new "concentrating" processes would develop within a few years to the point of making this country self-sufficient in manganese. It was pointed out, though, that American ores could not be developed on short notice for "emergency" use.

With the success of these moves, the Council's report said, Texas would be in position to bid for a large share of the 65,000,000 man-hours of employment and \$24,000,000 in payrolls that compilation of such domestic manganese reserve would bring, and a favorable official attitude toward those undertaking this and kindred developmental enterprises would be important factor in attracting this, as well as other types, of industrial investment.

Safety Guard Tires Provide Interesting Experiment Tuesday

A crowd of considerable proportions that attended the demonstrations of Life Guard here Tuesday, expected a liberal quota of thrills when a tire of a speeding car was blow out, found all its thrills in the anticipation.

Several times the big car roaring down the road to have its tires ripped to shreds by railroad spikes fixed in a heavy steel plate or blown out by means of dynamite caps detonated from within the car. Shivers of dread changed to exclamations of relieved surprise as each time the driver brought the car to a smooth, safe stop without weaving, lurching, or leaving the road, even though speeds of approximately 70 miles an hour were attained at the moment of the blow-out.

The test was conducted under the auspices of the Safety Tire and Battery Company, with the assistance of police authorities.

The reason they looked like a suicidal performance proved merely interesting as explained by Mr. D. C. Pratt, Manager of Safety Tire Company, is that when casing and Life Guard, a two-ply reserve tire, placed within the regular tube, supports the car until it can "brought to a stop. They fill a long needed function in the treatment of the criminal by assisting the parolee to become adjusted to the free world and thereby preventing his return to criminal ways.

The Voluntary County Parole Board System has attracted wide and favorable comment, not only for its humanitarian accomplishments but for its vast savings to society by the elimination of the expense of confining prisoners who are capable of rehabilitation and are worthy of clemency and by preventing further loss of property through criminal acts on the part of these parolees.

Relation of Factory Employees to Rural Buyers Pointed Out

In 1929 one and one-half million factory workers had jobs as a direct result of purchase of manufactured products by farmers, economists of the Texas A. and M. College Extension Service say. Farm cash income in that year was about 10 1-2 million dollars.

In 1932 when farm income was less than half the figure for 1929, reduced rural trade resulted in this type of factory employment dropping to \$50 thousand. From 1932 to 1937, farmers bought more manufactured products and factory employment increased.

It is estimated that in 1933 two out of every five factory workers added to payrolls owed their job to improved farm conditions. This term "factory workers" does not include professional people, merchants, and those in the transportation industries, the economists pointed out.
