

## Judge Harris resigns; seeks court-at-law position

After serving three years as Cooke County Judge, Bill Harris submitted his resignation effective Nov. 30 at 4:00 p.m. At the same time he expressed at his desire to be appointed as the interim judge of the Cooke County Court at Law. "The hardest decision I had to make was getting off of the Commissioners Court," remarked Judge Harris. He will be giving up his law practice if appointed judge of the County Court at Law. He's practiced law for over 40 years. He said he's had fun serving on Commissioners Court. Cooke County's Court at Law officially begins on Saturday, Dec. 1. "All judicial functions of the present County Court will be transferred to the new

County Court at Law effective December 1. Again effective Dec. 1 the county judge will not have any judicial functions," explained Judge Harris. Before that time Commissioners Court will select an interim County Judge and an interim County Court at Law Judge. They will serve until after the next election which is in November 2002.

Besides Judge Harris, Gainesville attorney John Morris has expressed interest in the position. Also Justice of the Peace Bill Freeman has notified Commissioners Court by letter that he would like to serve as the County Judge. If appointed, someone appointed by Commissioners Court would probably serve his office.

Precinct #4 Commissioner Virgil Hess said that he feels a County Court at Law is needed here. "There is a backlog of cases and it's not going to get any better and they're not going to get completed because of all the other deeds the judge has to do," he noted. "Bill tries to have court every day, but there are so many administrative duties he has to do and when he's doing administrative duties he can't be doing court duties." Hess said there are times when Commissioners Court has to be recessed so that the Judge can deal with a juvenile or a mental hearing. At times when he's holding a court hearing, he'll have to recess to take care of some administrative responsibility. Judge Harris estimates that about 90% of

his time is spent performing judicial duties. A county judge could spend eight hours a day just serving on boards and committees, Judge Harris said.

Currently there is a backlog of about 2,000 cases. Some are warrants that haven't been served because the person can't be located. "It will take about three years to get the docket where you can manage it," noted Judge Harris. The docket needs to be at about 600 cases, he said. If you get the number reduced and can try about three cases a month, other dispositions will be made more quickly. It is easier to get plea bargains when cases are tried more quickly, he said.

Judge Harris said that when he was first elected he set a lot of cases, but only five actually came to trial in 1999. Of those five, the newest one was from 1994. Now he is trying 1999 cases. He feels a case should be disposed of in nine to 13

months if possible. "Trying cases has helped me to be Judge because you pretty well know where the rules of evidence and rules of procedure apply to each case," noted Judge Harris. "Having tried a bunch of cases over 40 years has helped me being Judge already. It's hard for me to imagine someone being judge of that Court that hadn't had experience trying cases." He said that's what fascinated him about Paul Hesse. He said Judge Hesse sought a lot of help and knew when to ask for help.

A County Court at Law was first considered about six years ago when Paul Hesse was serving as County Judge. Hesse was the only person in Cooke

## Muenster ISD Board "airs out" concerns

The Muenster ISD Board of Trustees met last Wednesday in regular session. The air quality control report topped the discussion at the meeting. The Texas Association of School Boards (TASB) Environmental Control Department conducted an inspection of the Elementary Pre-K - 2nd grade building and the 3rd-4th grade building earlier this month, due to concerns of 3rd and 4th grade parents whose children had an increase of allergies and cold-like symptoms. The inspection was to determine if any airborne pollutants were present that could cause problems. Results indicated that no harmful contaminants such as stachybotrys (black mold) were present in either

building. Inspection of the 3rd - 4th grade building did indicate above levels of carbon dioxide and bioaerosols (mycelial, fiber, skin cell fragments, pollen, and fungal) levels.

The reason for the concentration was due to lack of movement of filtered fresh air. No immediate fix is possible, so the 3rd and 4th grades are being relocated to the middle and junior high buildings.

Superintendent Clyde Steelman noted that the next step is to work with the district's architect to find the most cost-effective solution to reduce the overcrowded conditions. "We are totally maxed out, with no available classrooms," Steelman commented, noting that the district may have to bring in one or two

portable buildings for next year.

Steelman will hold a parent forum to discuss the overcrowding conditions at the elementary school and the recommendations made to the Board by the architect and consultants. The meeting is scheduled for Wednesday, Nov. 28 at 7 p.m. in the junior high auditorium.

The Board read several other reports:

- Technology directors: A committee is being established consisting of five teachers, three Board members, and the technology staff. Also the TIF and CAD computers are getting into the network. All obsolete computer equipment will be going to a recycling company in Fort Worth.
- High school/junior high

principal: Phil Newton noted that two Muenster ISD band members, Carrie Grewing, and Shannon Grewing, were selected to participate in the North Texas Honor Band. Also, there will be a meeting with Sivells Bend ISD officials to discuss curricular alignment between the two schools.

• Elementary Principal: Delana Chism was selected to participate in writing the new TAAS test.

• Other reports: There will be a Board training session on Dec. 17 at MISD. Era, Lindsay, and Callisburg will also participate.

The Academic Excellence Indicator System district and campus reports, the annual performance report, and the district and campus improvement plans reports were discussed. Copies are available at the

superintendent's office or on the TEA web page.

In other business, Steelman reported that a little over \$8,000 has been collected in delinquent taxes in September. All consent items, minutes from previous meetings, and budget amendments were approved, along with the financial updates of cash flow, operating expenses, and accounts payable, and investments.

Nine members of the Muenster Lady Hornets Cross Country Team were present to be recognized by the Board for their participation in placing 8th at the state meet.

Mr. Steelman asked the Board to consider an increase in travel reimbursement for employees. The 28¢ per mile rate previously set by the state comptrollers office,

raised the rate to 34.5¢. Steelman noted that it cost the district more to run the school vans than pay for personal car when only one or two travel. "I don't want to get it so low that people start taking out the vans." The Board approved an increase of 30¢ per mile traveled. Also approved was \$30 a day for meals and \$100 for lodging.

Travel allowance for students was increased to \$25 per day. Lodging and transportation is provided by the district.

The Board gave 259.50 votes toward the election of Leon Klement to the Cooke County Appraisal District. The Board also discussed a possible training program available for district teachers that could qualify for high needs areas when necessary.

# Commissioner Virgil Hess recognized

At the Nov. 13 meeting of Cooke County Commissioners Court, Precinct #4 Commissioner Virgil Hess was presented with a certificate for the completion of 64 hour of County Government for Curriculum 2000. County Judge Bill Harris made the presentation and read a letter to Hess from Jim Allison of the County Judges and Commissioners Association of Texas.

Allison's letter noted that the Curriculum 2000 Program requires completion of a 64 hour course of study on county government as prepared and certified by the County Judges and Commissioners Association of Texas in cooperation with the LBJ School of Public Affairs at the University of Texas, the V.G. Young Institute of County Government at Texas A&M University, and

the Texas Association of Counties (TAC). "It's a pleasure to be a part of giving you this certificate," Judge Harris said to Hess. To earn the certification Hess said he attended courses offered at various places for that purpose over the past three years. It is a study of all offices in county government, elected offices and any other office connected to county government. "It gives you a

better understanding of how they function and what part they play in order for the county government to operate. Hess said it definitely was a help to him. "I can understand more how they function and what part they actually play, what their job consists of," he remarked. "Everybody kind of knows what they do, but there are lot of little details that we never see."

## Senatorial runoff election slated for December 4

Voters in Cooke County have the opportunity to vote on Tuesday, Dec. 4 in a run-off election in the State Senatorial District #30. Candidates Greg Underwood, Democrat, and Craig Estes, Republican, received the most votes in the Nov. 6 election. Since neither garnered at least 50% of the votes, the run-off is necessary. There were four Republicans, one Independent, and one Democrat vying for the seat vacated by the death of Senator Tom Haywood. Early voting by personal appearance begins Monday, Nov. 26 at the County Clerk's Office in the Cooke County Courthouse from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. Friday, Nov. 30 is the last day to vote early. Applications for ballot by mail must be received no later than the close of

business on Tuesday, Nov. 27. These should be mailed to Evelyn Walterscheid, County Clerk, Cooke County Courthouse, Gainesville, TX. 76240. Precincts in the County have been combined for the special election. Polling places are as follows: Precincts # 1, 3, 12, 14, 15, 20, and 34 at the North Central Texas College Library, 1525 W. California, Gainesville; Precincts # 5, 8, 10, 11, and 30 at Calvary Baptist church, 900 S. Wine Street, Gainesville; Precincts # 19, 21, 33, and 35 at Knights of Columbus Hall, North 1-35, Gainesville; Precincts # 2, 4, 6, 7, 9, and 37 at Hillcrest Church of Christ, 1712 O'Neal Street, Gainesville; Precincts # 17 and 18 at 113 South Main Street, Muenster; Precinct # 22 Lake Kiowa Lodge, Lake Kiowa.

County to serve in that position who was not a lawyer. "He hadn't been in there long when he and I started talking about it (a County Court at Law)," remarked Judge Harris. Harris helped Hesse with the workup. Commissioners Hess and Jerry Lewis studied it and found that financially at the time it wasn't feasible for the County to create a County Court at Law in 1995. Certain changes in Legislation make it more financially feasible now, they said. "The reason we didn't do it at that time was because the county attorney would have gotten a huge salary increase and the County would have had to foot the majority of that and the same way with the judge," recalled Hess. "The Legislature passed some Bills. One was that the county attorney would start getting paid by the State." That amount is \$70,000.00. The County attorney gets \$50,000.00 of that and the remainder is paid among the staff. Now the State will

begin to pay the County Court at Law judge's salary, about half of the \$110,000.00 per year salary, they said. The County Judge will receive a salary of \$37,000.00 per year beginning next year. That is a reduction because of the reduced duties. One of the concerns expressed by commissioner Bill Cox was the cost of a County Court at Law. Judge Harris said that he feels much of the cost can be offset if the judge stays busy and gets things done. This includes payment of fines. Hess said that when there is a county judge for administrative duties and one for the County Court at Law, it would take a load off his shoulders. When he has time, Hess said he assists the Judge. One major thing has been all the work he's done on grants to get State funds to restore the courthouse. Another time-consuming project is adding on to or building a new county jail. Hess plans to pass that duty on to the new County Judge who will have more time since his duties

will only be administrative. "That'll give me time to do my job better," Hess said. All of the commissioners split meetings and other responsibilities that the judge simply doesn't have time for. Hess said that he hates to see Judge Harris go. "We've had a good Court," he concluded.

## Samuel Wood 1931 - 2001

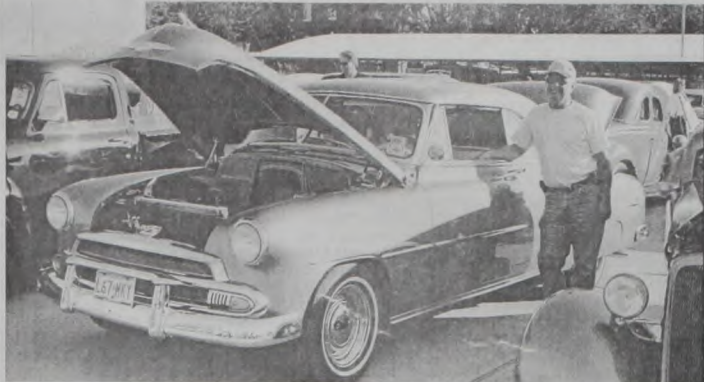

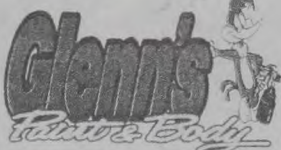

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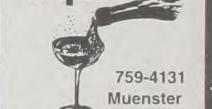


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# Lady Hornets play 5 games

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## Law enforcement to stress seatbelts, sobriety Nov. 19-25

DPS Troopers and other Texas law enforcement officers will be looking for seatbelt violators, speeders and drunk drivers during the Operation ABC (America Buckles up Children) mobilization Nov. 19 to 25.

"Wearing seatbelts is the best form of insurance I know," said Col. Thomas A. Davis Jr., director of the DPS. "As adults, we need to make sure that our children are properly secured any time they ride in a vehicle - and that we also use our seatbelts."

Texas is one of many states participating in Operation CARE (Combined Accident Reduction Effort) - part of a nationwide effort by all state police agencies to reduce fatalities during holiday periods. Troopers, along with law enforcement agencies across the state, will be out in force the week

of Thanksgiving to target speeders, drunk drivers, and seat belt violators.

"Our troopers will be looking for people who are not properly secured in their vehicles, and they will be writing tickets," Davis said. "DPS has a zero-tolerance policy regarding seatbelt violations. We do not issue warnings for those violations."

In 2000, DPS troopers issued more than 140,000 citations to adults for not wearing seatbelts and more than 19,800 citations to adults who were transporting children who were either not wearing seatbelts or were not properly secured in child safety seats.

State laws regarding seatbelts and child safety seats changed in September. The law now requires children under age 4, or less than 36 inches, to be

# County Agent's Report by Craig Rosenbaum

## Crop land stable since WWII

A report prepared by Doane's Agricultural Report examining data from 1945 to 1997 to evaluate the impact of competing uses such as urban sprawl, new highways, parks, etc., on crop land, shows the nation's total crop land base has been remarkably stable since World War II.

In 1997, U.S. farmers cropped 349 million acres, down 4 percent from 1945, but well above the acreage cropped in the 1960s. Total land available for cropping hasn't changed significantly since 1945. The total U.S. crop land base is 456 million acres, which includes land idled by government programs, and pasture classified as suitable for crops. Crop land accounts for about 24 percent of the total land mass in the contiguous 48 states.

## Diesel tax prepaid permit amendment proposed

The Comptroller proposed an amendment to Rule 3.185 concerning diesel tax prepaid user permits. The 77th Legislature, 2001, in House Bill 1241, amended Tax code, Chapter 153 to provide a definition for an agricultural purpose of motor fuel.

Subsection (c) is amended to further clarify that an agricultural purpose does not include processing, packing, or marketing of agricultural products by someone other than the original producer. The amendment adds timber operations to the list of examples of farms, and it includes wildlife management as an agricultural non-highway purpose.

This new law, the Personal Responsibility and Work Opportunity Reconciliation Act, made some food stamp participants ineligible and redesigned the cash welfare system in ways that may have further reduced food stamp participation.

Grass land used for pasture and range is the largest usage category, accounting for 578 million acres, or 30 percent of the total U.S. land base. Since 1945, pasture and range land has fallen by 82 million acres, a decline of more than 12 percent. Much of that decline reflects shifts to urban and recreational uses.

Forest-use land is the second largest classification

at 29 percent of the total land base. This includes land used for parks and wildlife areas. Land in the forest usage category declined from slightly over 600 million acres in 1945 to 553 million acres in 1997. The 8 percent decline is not reflective of deforestation, but most likely represents re-classification of land for parks and other recreational purposes - both of which are major growth areas.

## TDA secures specific exemption to use Oasis

Agriculture Commissioner Susan Combs announced that the Texas Department of Agriculture has been granted approval by the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency to issue a Section 18 specific exemption to use imazapic (Plateau) and imazapic plus 2,4-D (Oasis Herbicide) to control grassy weeds in bermudagrass hay meadows and pastures. The specific exemption allows the use of Oasis from Feb. 1, 2002, until Oct. 31, 2002.

## USDA forecasts 6% higher income for farmers

The Agriculture Department says it expects 2001 farm net cash income to be 6 percent higher than last year, continuing the trend of annual increases since 1998. At \$60.8 billion, the 2001 figure would surpass 1993's previous record. This cash-based measure of income indicates the availability of funds to cover cash operating costs, finance capital investments and savings, service debts, maintain living standards, and pay taxes.

U.S. net farm income for 2001 is forecast at \$49.4 billion, up \$3 billion from last year, as a result of greatly improved market conditions in the livestock sector, particularly for dairy operations. This income measure indicates the profit

or loss associated with a given year's production.

Both forecasts - net farm income and net cash income - are slightly above the 1990-2000 average.

USDA said, however, that government payments will continue to be an important source of farm income. While down slightly from last year, supplemental appropriations this past summer will keep payments above \$20 billion for the third consecutive year.

For this year, the forecast value of production for livestock and products has risen by \$9.6 billion, while the forecast value of crop production has risen only \$2 billion. For the full report, see <http://www.ers.usda.gov/publications/ais77>.

## MANY REASONS FOR ILLNESS IN TREES

When people see a sick tree, they often think that some sort of disease is causing the illness. Actually, a majority of the problems causing trees and shrubs to look sick stem from stress or physical injury rather than disease.

A common symptom of stress or injury is marginal leaf burn, or leaves fringed by dead tissue. This has been a common problem with numerous species of trees and shrubs this summer and fall.

Marginal leaf burns are seldom caused by leaf disease, which usually shows up as random lesions (dead areas) scattered about the leaf.

Leaf burns occur at the leaf tip or along the leaf margin because salts (plant nutrients) accumulate along leaf margins. Anything that causes the plant to pump insufficient water (stress) can result in a toxic burn to this tissue because it contains the highest level of salt.

Stress symptoms ranging from leaf burns to limb dieback or tree death can result from numerous causes.

Drought is the most obvious cause of stress. The extremely dry weather, coupled with the heat of July and August, caused serious problems. Small unwatered trees and shrubs often die early in a drought period. Large trees show responses to stress more slowly. Some of the marginal leaf burns now being observed relate to last July and August.

High temperatures cause plants to pump more water and simply compound drought problems. As

temperatures exceed 100 degrees F, water loss by some trees and shrubs can equal or exceed the ability of the roots to supply water, even when the soil moisture is not deficient.

Because of extreme Texas temperatures each summer, freeze injury is often overlooked, yet it is one of the most common and damaging causes of stress. Direct freeze injury to twigs and limbs is usually fairly evident, and the damaged wood can be pruned. Often the injury is more subtle, occurring on a portion of the trunk with no immediate, noticeable effect on the entire tree or shrub.

Thick bark sometimes remains intact, hiding trunk freeze injury for well more than a year. Probing the bark on the lower three feet of the trunk with a screwdriver or tapping with a mallet (listen for hollow sound) will usually reveal hidden freeze injury if it is present.

Just as drought causes trees to stress, so does excess water. Tree roots need oxygen in order to function properly, so roots that are waterlogged lose their ability to take up water. It can take several years for a seriously injured root system to be regenerated.

In recent years, numerous trees growing in poorly drained soil have been killed or damaged following periods of heavy rainfall. Trees with damaged root systems are

vulnerable to summer drought and heat stress.

Genetic inferiority, chemical damage, systemic diseases and unadapted species are other factors that cause trees stress and physical injury.

## Farm prices' record nosedive signals needed policy reform

Using last month's record commodity price drop as an example, Texas Farmers Union reiterated the need for an adequate safety net for farmers and ranchers to offset severe price fluctuations.

USDA's National Agricultural Statistics Service reported yesterday the largest one-month decline in farm-gate prices since the department began recording the statistic 91 years ago. The 9.5 percent plunge from the September index reflects downturns in prices for milk, soybeans, hogs, corn, broilers, cattle and lettuce, along with seasonal changes in the marketing of commodities.

"There is tremendous uncertainty among producers and their lenders because of the volatility of agricultural markets," said TFU President Wes Sims. "This proves the need for an adequate safety net for farmers and ranchers, which current farm policy lacks."

"These unprotected dips and dives in the market hurt our farmers and ranchers and the rural communities that depend on them," Sims said. "We need a safety net provision that helps farmers when prices are low and that is based on what producers are doing today. This safety net is a vital part of the farm bill that must be completed this year."

## Food stamp participation drops in 2000

In fiscal 2000, the Food Stamp Program provided benefits to 17.2 million low-income Americans, a level lower than any year since 1979.

Just six years earlier, in fiscal 1994, program participation peaked at over 27 million Americans. According to recent studies, the decline in participation was due in part to a strong economy and in part to 1996 welfare reform legislation.
