

Four resign from Muenster Hospital Board

Controversy continued at Muenster Memorial Hospital Tuesday night at a special called Board meeting with the resignations of Board President Don Flusche and Board members Charles Bayer, Werner Becker Jr., and Carol Grewing. The packed-in, standing room only crowd heard Flusche, Bayer, and Becker say they were resigning for personal reasons. Grewing said she had tried to do as the people wanted. "They want to keep the hospital, but won't support it. They don't want what I do. I hope you can find someone they do want," she said.

A request was presented to the Board by office manager Doris Muller asking the four to reconsider their decision. It was signed by over 60 hospital employees.

A letter was presented by Lori Painter of the office staff, (see letter on pg. 2).

At this point a heated discussion started with

some asking for the resignation of the three new Board members, John Aytes, James Walterscheid, and Angelo Nasche, some encouraging all to work together, and some questioning the enlistment of Covenant Hospital Systems for consulting and strategic planning. The request for resignation of Aytes, Walterscheid, and Nasche brought applause and Walterscheid's refusal to resign brought applause from others.

Members of the crowd wanted to know if the remaining Board intended to fire Administrator Jack Endres, and also who had hired the accountant, Mr. Tacker, to do an outside audit of the hospital. Aytes said there were no plans to fire Endres, but no one claimed hiring the accountant. Then Kenny Klement stated that he had hired an attorney and contributed to paying Tacker in order to address some rumors he had heard.

"I'm getting a good education and I know a lot more than I did," he said. No one else would admit to contributing to the accountant's pay, even when pressed for an answer.

Flusche asked for a motion to accept the resignations of himself, Bayer, Becker, and Grewing. The vote was unanimous to accept. New Board President Jerry Hess called for an adjournment. Hess who was vice-

president succeeds Flusche as president.

Some left the meeting immediately, but many stayed to congratulate or chastise, or laugh or cry. There were a lot of harsh words and some well-wishes.

Don Flusche submitted the following statement Wednesday morning: "I step aside to let others take control of the MMH with hopes that they do what they say they will do. As

long as Mr. Jack Endres is the Administrator he will do his best to direct the new Board in the right direction. However, he cannot work miracles if they do not choose to use his knowledge and experience. As in the past I will not ridicule anyone with what they believe to be true. In my heart I know that what Duane Knabe, Charles Bayer, Carol Grewing, and Werner Becker Jr., and I did was right for Muenster and MMH. I ask all of the

employees to remain with the Hospital and continue to give the unselfish service that our community expects and deserves. I appreciate all of the support that was given me by so many; my intentions were not to let you down. The Board cannot make good sound decisions while being divided and controversial so the action taken by the five Board members is appropriate and in the best interest of the community.

New hospital tax bills to be mailed in March

Chief Appraiser Doug Smithson of the Cooke County Tax Appraisal District (CCTAD) has submitted the following information regarding Muenster Hospital District taxes.

With the Muenster Hospital rollback being successful, the adopted rate of .4982 will now be reduced to .25723.

The CCAD will prepare and mail the new tax bills for those accounts still due. The estimated mail date is March 1.

The Muenster Hospital delinquency date will be postponed the number of days between the date the original bills were mailed and the date the corrected bills are mailed. Delinquency date will be July 1, 2002.

Some taxpayers have paid their taxes under the original rate. The Muenster hospital must refund the difference between the original rate and the roll back rate within 60 days from the date the results were counted, April 5, 2002.

County agrees to Gainesville's request

Carlos Vigil with the City of Gainesville made a request on behalf of the City at the Feb. 11 meeting of the Cooke County Commissioners Court. Vigil said that the 71st Legislature passed House

Bill 1445, which requires that cities and counties come to an agreement on one of four options for ETJ (extra-territorial jurisdiction). The Bill was brought up because the Texas Association of Builders was having trouble conforming to both the county regulations and the city regulations, explained Vigil. April 1 is the deadline to enter into the interlocal agreement.

Those options are that the county take full control of the subdivision regulations for plating out to the one mile ETJ; the second the city would take full control; the third was that it would be done in conjunction with the city and the county; and the fourth is a divided regulation with the city keeping their control and the county keeping theirs. "The City proposed to go with control of all of the ETJ regulations for subdivisions," said Vigil. He presented an agreement proposal for the Court to review.

Due to the population of Gainesville, its ETJ is for one mile outside the city limits. The County agreed 5-0 to let Gainesville have control over any future subdivisions to be developed in its ETJ. This will make it easier for subdivisions to conform to city regulations should they be annexed to the city in the future.

Vigil asked to be informed before the county rewrites its subdivision regulations. County Judge Bill Freeman agreed to include him in a planning workshop to be held soon.

Eagle Cove Estates, lots 1-35, located off of Blanks Road in Precinct #2 finally received final approval with a 5-0 vote. It has been the subject of much controversy with neighbors opposing it.

Judge Freeman gave the public an opportunity to make a statement concerning the development. Each was limited to two minutes.

Walter Hess owns property on the outer peninsula next to the subdivision. He is landlocked and hopes to get a right of way access to his property or to sell it to the person who eventually purchases the adjoining property.

Judge Freeman told him the problem will have to be

worked out in District Court.

Judy Stowe owns property across from the development. She said she and her neighbors opposed the subdivision because of issues such as fire, police, and the Court overlooking some of the Lake Ray Roberts Planning and Zoning Board's decisions and recommendations regarding the subdivision.

Stowe noted that the Ray Roberts Board has a distinctive zoning and management separate from the rest of the county. "Their objectives are to make sure there's not excessive congestion around the lake with the sole purpose of that lake area to preserve nature and the natural habitat of wildlife," she said.

The installation of an electrical line across CR 435 in Precinct #4 was approved. Commissioner

Virgil Hess requested that signs be installed on both sides indicating the location of the high voltage lines in case someone were to dig in that area.

In other business Commissioner Court:

• Tabled decision on preliminary plat for Prairie Grove Estates Subdivision, lots 1-7, located off Neely Road in Precinct #2. Corrections are needed on plat.

• Approved Southwestern Bells' request to install a buried telephone cable at FM 678 and the south side of CR 169, heading east on CR 169 to CR 116, turning north on CR 116, with cable to be placed on east side of CR 116 for approximately one mile.

• Approved replat of lots 3 and 4 in Otto Benz Subdivision located off of Lone Oak Road and Otto's Drive in Precinct #2.

I am writing this letter to the board because there are some members who do not seem to understand the bottom line of how the hospital seems to be in trouble. Instead of looking at the bare numbers, they seem to want to put blame where it does not belong and slander good people along the way.

The Muenster Hospital is just as any other business is. You have to bring in more money than what goes out and in only my short one year of being there it doesn't take long to see how the hospital is in trouble. There are many days that we will only have one or two patients in the hospital and even days when there are zero patients.

Can you say that if Rumber Materials made one product a day or Fischer's sold only one loaf of bread a day that they would be in business very long? Or what if they had customers that owed them thousands of dollars and never paid one single dime toward their balance and these people came in day after day? Just today in printing statements for 8 letters of the alphabet I sent "Final Notices" to 33 different families for a total of \$49,354 and that is just for this town alone, and the board members say we have community pride and our people pay their bills????!! It seems that the people just want the services but do not want to pay to support the services that they get. Also what about the patient that has received over \$110,000 worth of services and their insurance has paid actual dollars of \$40,000 and the rest, \$70,000, was write off that the hospital had to eat? These are just a few examples of how things do not work out as a financial benefit for the hospital, think of these on a large scale of hundreds of accounts processed over the past years and it does not take a rocket scientist to figure out the down spin!! People are doing their very best but the bottom line is still the bottom line.

I would also like to clarify how our process works on filing insurance since this has been something that has been what I call "trashed" by board members. As an employee in the Business Office, one of my many duties is to keep up with insurance filings. There has been the misconception that we hold accounts, do not file them timely, etc, etc. When an account is filed with insurance then the account has 60 days for payment to be received, if not the computer automatically generates "tracer" statements which are ran every single week. The accounts are then pulled and the insurance company is called to see why it has not paid. I cannot begin to count the times that an insurance company has said they have not received the claim when we have proof the claim was sent to them whether by electronic filing, mailing or faxing. Sometimes it is all 3 ways and they still say they do not have the claim, other times an insurance company cannot pay a claim because of additional information needed from the patient and the patient does not ever respond. Now how is it that we seem to be getting the short end of the stick and the blame for human errors on other's parts? I guess it is easy to point a finger of blame when you are not sure of how things are run.

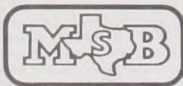
I do not understand how the new board members came in and didn't try to get a feel of things and how things were in our world before they just turned it upside down. This is not only a place of business but was a close-knit family of hard-working employees that has been torn apart by our right lies and now the fear of losing the only allies that we had. We no longer know what our fate will be being left in the hands of the 3 of 4 remaining board members and whoever they decide to put into the vacant seats. I have just prayed that maybe Mr. Flusche, Mr. Bayer, Mr. Becker and Ms. Grewing would change their minds, they are the ones that have had us, the employees, Muenster Memorial Hospital and most of all, and most importantly our patients best interests at heart. They and Mr Jack Endres have fought so valiantly for us. It has been some very sad and depressing times lately which we keep trying to hold our heads up and look for the light at the end of the tunnel but I think that with these resignations the light has been snuffed.

In closing, my wish and I think a lot of other's wishes, is that we keep the board and they ALL try and wipe the slate clean and everyone put their differences aside, lets all open our minds and hearts to what is the best for Muenster Memorial Hospital and its patients. It has been a great place to work and I believe an even better place for patients to get care, so lets all work together for that.

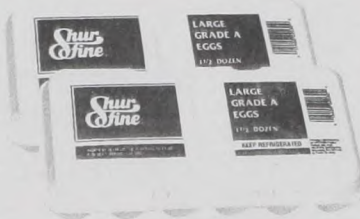
